**PUBLIC HEARING - HIGH SCHOOL SITE
NOVEMBER 21, 2005**

1. This is the public hearing regarding the acquisition of private property by the Millard Public School District, for a proposed High School building site. The private real property to be acquired is 47.176 acres, more or less, of land owned by Stender Limited Partnership, c/o Kuehl Brothers. Notice of this hearing was published once, at least 10 days prior to today's date (publication date was November 9, 2005) in the Daily Record, a legal newspaper published in and of general circulation in Douglas County, Nebraska. Notice of this public hearing was also provided to each owner or known person having an interest by United States mail.

2. At this time I would ask that Dr. John Crawford, on behalf of the Millard Public School District, address the Board, to explain and discuss:
 - a. The nature of the proposed high school project;
 - b. The necessity for the proposed high school project; (due to the increased population growth near the subject property and anticipated increase in the number of school age children, an additional high school is necessary to meet the growing demands in the property area.)
 - c. The reasons for selecting the proposed location of the high school; (the property location was selected based upon the proximity to the area of increasing student population.) and
 - d. The quantity of land needed to complete the high school project. (All of the property to be acquired shall be for the public purpose and the compensation to be given for the subject property shall be fair market value.)

(Dr. Crawford addresses the above items)

3. Thank you Dr. Crawford. I now request that the District's attorney explain and discuss the following:
 - a. The right of each owner to be represented by an attorney during the purchase negotiations;
 - b. The right of each owner to negotiate and accept or reject the offer of damages, which will be sustained by the acquisition;
 - c. The right of each owner to require that such damages be determined pursuant to the procedures for acquiring real property by eminent domain; and
 - d. That the interest to be acquired in the real property will be in fee simple absolute interest.

4. (After the District's attorney has completed the presentation on legal issues) Thank you, now is the time for comments and objections by any person in attendance at this meeting. I would ask that people try to keep their comments to 3 minutes or less.

5. (After all persons present have had the opportunity to address the Board). There being no further comments, is there a Motion to proceed to acquire the subject property through the powers of eminent domain? (Motion made, seconded, and passed) There being no other business, the Public hearing can be adjourned, upon motion, second and passage of the adjournment motion.

Notice of this meeting was given to all members of the Board of Education and a copy of their Acknowledgment of Receipt of Notice and the agenda are attached to these minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in advance notice and in the notice of the Board of Education of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public.

At 7:00 p.m. Julie Johnson called the meeting to order and asked everyone to say the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll call was taken and members present were: Julie Johnson, Mike Pate, Jean Stothert, Brad Burwell, and Linda Poole. Dr. Johnson informed the other members that Jean Stothert was out of town. Mike Kennedy was expected to come a little late.

Motion by Brad Burwell, seconded by Linda Poole to excuse Jean Stothert from the meeting. Upon roll call vote, all members voted aye. Motion carried.

Motion by Linda Poole, seconded by Brad Burwell, to approve the Board of Education Minutes October 17, to approve the bills, and to receive the Treasurer's Report and place on file. Upon roll call vote, all members voted aye. Motion carried.

The Employees for the Month of November were Nicole Chudomelka, information specialist at Black Elk Elementary, and Cindy Wrenn, secretary at Abbott Elementary.

Superintendent's Report:

1. The football playoffs games are underway at Buell Stadium. The games began today at 1:00 p.m. with another at 4:30 and the last one will be at 8:00 p.m.

2. The digital process for the school board meetings continue. There are some problems downloading at home and some of the pages are a little fuzzy, but we are continuing to work to correct the problems.
3. Connect-Ed is up and running. Several building have used it, and there will be further discussion at a meeting tomorrow to make sure that it is not overused, and that it is used for the things that were set forth from the start. There have been many compliments about the service.
4. Today the survey was released 'One City One School District', which is similar to the one done in June. This survey shows that the Millard Community feel the district is going in the right direction. The survey shows that over 94% of the community is aware of the issues, and is not in favor of the 'One City One School District' plan. They believe that providing extended option enrollment is providing many sources for all the kids in the city is a worthy option.
5. There was the addition to the agenda last Friday for approval of the NASB Standing Positions and Legislative Resolutions. It was posted on the website on Friday.

Comments from the Board:

Linda Poole congratulated the three Millard football teams for making it to the state playoffs.. Since the last board meeting some Millard students participated in the state cross country meet in Kearney. Both Class A champions came from Millard. The Millard West Girls placed third at the meet.

Mrs. Poole reported that as president of NASB she testified before the State Board of Education against mandating all-day kindergarten and increasing foreign language. Both are unfunded mandates and NASB did not want to force districts to do these two things unless there is money to go along with it. It was decided to table the discussion at this meeting. At the next State Board meeting, which was last Friday, it was once again tabled, because they have not received the opinion from the Attorney General whether they can demand these things.

Mrs. Poole said she was present at the unveiling of the water tower where at 144th & Q where it once again has the name of MILLARD on it. This was the accomplishment of the Millard Business Association, and she thanked them for funding this project.

A few weeks ago Mrs. Poole attended the National School Boards Association Technology conference. The main purpose for going to the conference was to sit in the paperless board meeting sessions. At the next meeting of NASB they are going to approve a contract to offer paperless board meetings to all districts across the state. The group who was presenting was

offering the program for \$50,000, but NASB will be offering the program for less than 1/10th of that price. There will be a session at the state conference on paperless board meetings, and she encouraged board members to attend.

Mrs. Poole was able to accept the award that Millard Board received for being one of the top 10 digital school boards in the United States. Dr. Mark Feldhausen did the application for Millard.

Next week Mrs. Poole will chair her last NASB Board meeting as president of the association.

Brad Burwell presented to the Ackerman PTO on the 'One City One School District' concept. There were about 25 parents and staff at the meeting. Everyone is very well informed on the issues, he stated. The only questions were about what could they do to help. They were all unified in their support for the school district and all of the accomplishments. They do realize all of the challenges that everyone faces in educating the students no matter what school district you are in.

On November 2, 2005 Mr. Burwell attended the PAYBAC Business Partner meeting at Millard North High School, where he is a member of the organization.

Mr. Burwell reminded all board members about the Committee meeting next week. Since there are four topics up for discussion the meeting will start at promptly at 7 p.m.

On November 15, 2005 there is a NASB Board Meeting, where Mr. Burwell will attend as the Region 19 Director. He said he will be attending the NASB State Education Conference next Wednesday and Thursday at the Holiday Inn.

Mike Kennedy has heard from some parents that the board, district, or the coalition has not been doing enough in regards to the 'One City One School District' issue. However, with the last survey coming out from a prominent group and bringing in the Minneapolis superintendents to talk about what they do there should show the district is constantly working on this effort. The administration, staff, MEA, and the coalition partners are doing a lot in regards to this issue. The message is getting out, because 94% of the public does understand what the concept means for or against 'One City One School District'. The survey results show that the people understand the implications. Mr. Kennedy said it was time to put away the class, race, or privilege warfare comments that have been used recently by the moderator of OPS, and start talking about issues that can be agreed upon.

Mr. Kennedy stated the community seems to be far behind in the area of vocational education. He suggested that all districts pull together some resources and have sites across the metro area that all students could participate in.

Julie Johnson has talked with the PTO organization at Rockwell, and will be presenting at Bryan and Hitchcock in the next few weeks to update those communities on the status of the OPS issue. Mrs. Johnson said she hears similar comments while at the meetings concerning what can parents do, what is happening, and this is why the board and administrators are out in the community talking to them. This is to help everyone understand what is going on and give them direction. Mrs. Johnson said the district's website continues to be updated with information pertaining to what is happening as well as the presentation that board members are using when talking to the various organizations.

The members of the Board of Education met for a Committee Meeting on Monday, November 14, 2005 at 7:00 p.m. at the Don Stroh Administration Center, 5606 South 147th Street. The agenda items include: 2006 Summer Projects, Middle School Schedule Changes, Technology Update and Substance Abuse Policy.

PRESENT: Mike Pate, Julie Johnson, Linda Poole, Brad Burwell, and Jean Stothert

ABSENT: Mike Kennedy

Others in attendance were Keith Lutz, Ken Fossen, Mark Feldhausen, Judy Porter, Kirby Eltiste, Craig Whaley, Kraig Lofquist, and other administrators.

A consumer science teacher expressed her concern on the proposed changes in the middle school schedule, because she believes it will be difficult to cut a nine week class to six weeks, and this would reduce the time to get to know the students.

Ed Rockwell reviewed the multiple summer projects that would be disruptive if scheduled during the regular school year. Usually, each year \$3 million is allotted for summer projects. The projects will involve paving, track repair, irrigation, storage building, roofs, doors/frames/ flooring, fire alarm, HVAC, plumbing, and painting at the various buildings. Projects were prioritized by the Special Projects Committee.

Ken Fossen reviewed several issues in regards to the remodeling of Ackerman Elementary School. Some of the options discussed were quite extensive and expensive, so the board was in agreement that they would need some time to consider all of the options.

Judy Porter reported on the proposed changes to the middle school schedule as set out in the Strategic Plan in Action Plan 5-12 #5, which states: "Develop a proposal for a PreK-12 world language program." The recommendations are in line with the district middle school philosophies and practices. These changes would allow for foreign language to begin earlier, health class would become a full class in the 6th grade, and the changes would allow integration of computer applications to core classes as well as in a stand-alone class. The downside of the proposal would cut nine week exploratory classes down to six week classes, and changes in staffing would occur. The middle school principals are in agreement with the proposed changes to the middle school schedule.

Mark Feldhausen reported on the 3Com Urban Challenge Grant the district received in 2004. After using this for six months it was determined that it will not provide the broadband network system that is needed for the Millard Public Schools. As of November 7, 2005 a Request for Proposal was released to address the proposed Wide Area Network and telephone solutions for the Millard Public Schools. This will be brought back to the board for approval in December.

During the discussion and review of the materials on the substance abuse topic, board members stressed how important it is to not only educate the students, but to educate the parents on the warning signs of students who use steroids, and what those side effects could be after years of abuse with steroids.

A teacher stated her concerns for the proposed changes in the middle level schedule, and she presented a list of questions that have been raised by special area teachers in regards to the proposed changes.

Remuneration and Reimbursement

Reimbursements and remuneration to board members shall be made through the board treasurer in accordance with the following guidelines:

1. Each board member may attend one major convention per fiscal year; provided, however, that the board member has notified the board in a regular or special meeting of the intention to attend the meeting and the identification thereof. Attendance at any additional meetings or events for which the board member wishes to be reimbursed for expenses shall be approved by the board before the expenses are incurred.
2. Board members will receive \$50 per diem expense money prior to major trips. Receipts and an expense report will be filed at the conclusion of the trip with the District. Any unexpended expense money will be returned to the District.
3. Car rental expenses related to the board member's attendance at meetings will be reimbursed.
4. Board members will pay expenses for spouses or family members who might accompany him or her on a trip, if that expense would not have been otherwise incurred by the board member.
5. Lodging, registration, and reservations may be made through the Superintendent's secretary.
6. Board members will be reimbursed at the current rate established by the Nebraska Department of Administrative Services for use of his or her automobile while on board business and in accordance with rules and opinions of the Nebraska Accountability and Disclosure Commission. A mileage report will be submitted to the District for reimbursement.
7. Board members will be reimbursed for materials purchased, which are deemed necessary by the board for board purposes, such as books and other publications. Those materials will become property of the District and will become part of the board library.
8. A filing cabinet will be delivered to each board member to use at home during his or her term. At the end of his or her term, the board member shall return the file cabinet to the District.
9. Office supplies will be obtained from the central office. A board member will not be reimbursed for the purchase of any supplies by that board member without prior approval of the board.
10. Actual and necessary expenses for long distance telephone calls and broadband internet access will be reimbursed when approved by the board. Installation and monthly charges ~~of one additional phone line for a broadband internet connection that which~~ is to be used exclusively for communication with constituents, internet access, and other board business will be reimbursable. Bills are to be submitted to the District.
11. A computer meeting the "district standard" shall be loaned to each board member during his or her term of office to assist in fulfilling their responsibilities as a board member. Upon retiring from the board of education, the board member will be offered the opportunity to purchase the loaned computer based on fair market value. Board members will also be offered the opportunity to purchase the computer based on fair market value should the computer be replaced during their term of office. Such sales must be approved by a two-thirds vote of the entire board.

OPTION AND LEASE AGREEMENT

THIS OPTION AND LEASE AGREEMENT ("**Agreement**"), dated as of the latter of the signature dates below (the "Effective Date"), is entered into by Millard School District, School District No. 17, Douglas County, Nebraska, having a mailing address of 5606 S. 147th St., Omaha, Nebraska 68137 (hereinafter referred to as "**Landlord**") and New Cingular Wireless PCS, LLC, a Delaware limited liability company, having a mailing address of 6100 Atlantic Boulevard, Norcross, Georgia 30071 (hereinafter referred to as "**Tenant**").

BACKGROUND

Landlord owns or controls that certain plot, parcel or tract of land, together with all rights and privileges arising in connection therewith, located at 14905 Q St., Omaha, , in the County of Douglas, State of Nebraska (collectively, the "**Property**"). Tenant desires to use a portion of the Property in connection with its federally licensed communications business. Landlord desires to grant to Tenant the right to use a portion of the Property in accordance with this Agreement.

The parties agree as follows:

1. **OPTION TO LEASE.**

(a) Landlord grants to Tenant an option (the "**Option**") to lease a certain portion of the Property containing approximately 450 square feet (15' x 30') including the air space above such room/cabinet/ground space as described on attached **Exhibit 1**, together with unrestricted access for Tenant's uses from the nearest public right-of-way along the Property to the Premises as described on the attached **Exhibit 1** (collectively, the "**Premises**").

(b) During the Option period and any extension thereof, and during the term of this Agreement, Tenant and its agents, engineers, surveyors and other representatives will have the right to enter upon the Property to inspect, examine, conduct soil borings, drainage testing, material sampling, radio frequency testing and other geological or engineering tests or studies of the Property (collectively, the "**Tests**"), to apply for and obtain licenses, permits, approvals, or other relief required of or deemed necessary or appropriate at Tenant's sole discretion for its use of the Premises and include, without limitation, applications for zoning variances, zoning ordinances, amendments, special use permits, and construction permits (collectively, the "**Government Approvals**"), initiate the ordering and/or scheduling of necessary utilities, and otherwise to do those things on or off the Property that, in the opinion of Tenant, are necessary in Tenant's sole discretion to determine the physical condition of the Property, the environmental history of the Property, Landlord's title to the Property and the feasibility or suitability of the Property for Tenant's Permitted Use, all at Tenant's expense. Tenant will not be liable to Landlord or any third party on account of any pre-existing defect or condition on or with respect to the Property, whether or not such defect or condition is disclosed by Tenant's inspection. Tenant will restore the Property to its condition as it existed at the commencement of the Option Term (as defined below), reasonable wear and tear and casualty not caused by Tenant excepted. In addition, Tenant shall indemnify, defend and hold Landlord harmless from and against any and all injury, loss, damage or claims arising directly out of Tenant's Tests.

(c) In consideration of Landlord granting Tenant the Option, Tenant agrees to pay Landlord the sum of One Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$1,000.00) within thirty (30) business days of the Effective Date. The Option will be for an initial term of one (1) year commencing on the Effective Date (the "**Initial Option Term**") and may be renewed by Tenant for an additional six (6) months upon written notification to Landlord

and the payment of an additional Six Hundred Twenty-five and No/100 Dollars (\$625.00) no later than ten (10) days prior to the expiration date of the Initial Option Term.

(d) The Option may be sold, assigned or transferred at any time by Tenant to Tenant's parent company or member if Tenant is a limited liability company or any affiliate or subsidiary of, or partner in, Tenant or its parent company or member, or to any third party agreeing to be subject to the terms hereof. Otherwise, the Option may not be sold, assigned or transferred without the written consent of Landlord, such consent not to be unreasonably withheld, conditioned or delayed. From and after the date the Option has been sold, assigned or transferred by Tenant to a third party agreeing to be subject to the terms hereof, Tenant shall immediately be released from any and all liability under this Agreement, including the payment of any rental or other sums due, without any further action.

(e) During the Initial Option Term and any extension thereof, Tenant may exercise the Option by notifying Landlord in writing. If Tenant exercises the Option then Landlord leases the Premises to the Tenant subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement. If Tenant does not exercise the Option during the Initial Option Term or any extension thereof, this Agreement will terminate and the parties will have no further liability to each other.

(f) If during the Initial Option Term or any extension thereof, or during the term of this Agreement if the Option is exercised, Landlord decides to subdivide, sell, or change the status of the zoning of the Premises, Property or any of Landlord's contiguous, adjoining or surrounding property (the "**Surrounding Property**," which includes (without limitation) the remainder of the structure) or in the event of foreclosure, Landlord shall immediately notify Tenant in writing. Any sale of the Property shall be subject to Tenant's rights under this Agreement. Landlord agrees that during the Initial Option Term or any extension thereof, or during the Term of this Agreement if the Option is exercised, Landlord shall not initiate or consent to any change in the zoning of the Premises, Property or Surrounding Property or impose or consent to any other restriction that would prevent or limit Tenant from using the Premises for the uses intended by Tenant as hereinafter set forth in this Agreement.

2. PERMITTED USE. (a) Tenant may use the Premises for the transmission and reception of communications signals and the installation, construction, maintenance, operation, repair, replacement and upgrade of its communications fixtures and related equipment, cables, accessories and improvements, which may include a stealth light pole ("Stealth Light Pole"), associated antennas, I beams, equipment shelters or cabinets and fencing and any other items necessary to the successful and secure use of the Premises (collectively, the "**Communication Facility**"), as well as the right to test, survey and review title on the Property; Tenant further has the right but not the obligation to add, modify and/or replace equipment in order to be in compliance with any current or future federal, state or local mandated application, including, but not limited to, emergency 911 communication services, at no additional cost to Tenant or Landlord (collectively, the "**Permitted Use**"). Prior to the initial installation of Tenant's Communication Facility, or any proposed relocation thereof, Landlord and Tenant shall mutually agree to the location of the Communication Facility on the Property. If Landlord and Tenant cannot mutually agree to location of Tenant's Communication Facility, Tenant may terminate this Agreement with no further liability to Landlord. Landlord and Tenant agree that any portion of the Communication Facility that may be conceptually described on **Exhibit 1** will not be deemed to limit Tenant's Permitted Use. If **Exhibit 1** includes drawings of the initial installation of the Communication Facility, Landlord's execution of this Agreement will signify Landlord's approval of **Exhibit 1**. Tenant has the right to install and operate transmission cables from the equipment shelter or cabinet to the antennas, electric lines from the main feed to the equipment shelter or cabinet and communication lines from the main entry point to the equipment shelter or cabinet, and to make Property improvements, alterations, upgrades or additions appropriate for Tenant's use ("**Tenant Changes**"). Tenant Changes include the right to construct a fence around the Premises and undertake any other appropriate means to secure the Premises. Tenant agrees to comply with all applicable governmental laws, rules, statutes and regulations, relating to its use of the Communication Facility on the Property. Tenant has the right to modify, supplement, replace, upgrade, expand the equipment, increase the number of antennas or relocate the Communication Facility within the Premises at

any time during the term of this Agreement. Tenant will be allowed to make such alterations to the Property in order to accomplish Tenant's Changes or to insure that Tenant's Communication Facility complies with all applicable federal, state or local laws, rules or regulations. In the event Tenant desires to modify or upgrade the Communication Facility, and Tenant requires an additional portion of the Property (the "Additional Premises") for such modification or upgrade, Landlord agrees to lease to Tenant the Additional Premises, upon the same terms and conditions set forth herein, except that the Rent shall increase, in conjunction with the lease of the Additional Premises by a reasonable amount consistent with rental rates then charged for comparable portions of real property being in the same area. Landlord agrees to take such actions and enter into and deliver to Tenant such documents as Tenant reasonably requests in order to effect and memorialize the lease of the Additional Premises to Tenant.

(b) The Stealth Light Pole shall be made of standard aluminum or galvanized steel and shall include space for Tenant and up to one (1) additional carrier to collocate on the Stealth Light Pole. The Stealth Light Pole will be approximately one hundred fifty (150) feet in height, as further described in **Exhibit 1**, attached hereto.

(c) Tenant shall provide Landlord with the initial light bulb to light the Stealth Light Pole and shall be responsible for the initial installation of same, at its sole cost and expense, thereafter Landlord shall be responsible for replacing future light bulbs necessary to light the Stealth Light Pole, by way of a bucket truck at Landlord's sole cost and expense. In no event shall Landlord climb the Stealth Light Pole to replace the light bulb or perform any other maintenance to the Stealth Light Pole.

3. **TERM.**

(a) The initial lease term will be five (5) years ("**Initial Term**"), commencing on the effective date of written notification by Tenant to Landlord of Tenant's exercise of the Option (the "Term Commencement Date"). The Initial Term will terminate on the fifth (5th) annual anniversary of the Term Commencement Date.

(b) This Agreement will automatically renew for four (4) additional five (5) year term(s) (each five (5) year term shall be defined as the "**Extension Term**"), upon the same terms and conditions unless the Tenant notifies the Landlord in writing of Tenant's intention not to renew this Agreement at least sixty (60) days prior to the expiration of the existing Term.

(c) If, at least sixty (60) days prior to the end of the fourth (4th) extended term, either Landlord or Tenant has not given the other written notice of its desire that the term of this Agreement end at the expiration of the fourth (4th) extended term, then upon the expiration of the fourth (4th) extended term this Agreement shall continue in force upon the same covenants, terms and conditions for a further term of one (1) year, and for annual terms thereafter until terminated by either party by giving to the other written notice of its intention to so terminate at least six (6) months prior to the end of any such annual term. Monthly rental during such annual terms shall be equal to the rent paid for the last month of the fourth (4th) extended term. If Tenant remains in possession of the Premises after the termination of this Agreement then Tenant will be deemed to be occupying the Premises on a month to month basis (the "**Holdover Term**"), subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

(d) The Initial Term, the Extension Term and the Holdover Term are collectively referred to as the Term ("**Term**").

4. **RENT.**

(a) Commencing on the first day of the month following the date that Tenant commences construction (the "Rent Commencement Date"), Tenant will pay the Landlord a monthly rental payment of One Thousand Two Hundred Fifty and No/100 Dollars (\$1250.00) ("Rent"), at the address set forth above, on or before the fifth (5th) day of each calendar month in advance. In partial months occurring after the Rent Commencement Date, Rent will be prorated. The initial Rent payment will be forwarded by Tenant to Landlord within thirty (30) days after the Rent Commencement Date.

(b) In year one (1) of each Extension Term, the monthly Rent will increase by ten percent (10 %) over the Rent paid during the previous Term.

(c) All Rent or other charges payable under this Agreement shall be billed by Landlord within one (1) year from the end of the calendar year in which the charges were incurred; any charges beyond such period shall not be billed by Landlord, and shall not be payable by Tenant. The provisions of the foregoing sentence shall survive the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

5. APPROVALS.

(a) Landlord agrees that Tenant's ability to use the Premises is contingent upon the suitability of the Premises for Tenant's Permitted Use and Tenant's ability to obtain and maintain all Government Approvals. Landlord authorizes Tenant to prepare, execute and file all required applications to obtain Government Approvals for Tenant's Permitted Use under this Agreement and agrees to reasonably assist Tenant with such applications and with obtaining and maintaining the Government Approvals.

(b) Tenant has the right to obtain a title report or commitment for a leasehold title policy from a title insurance company of its choice and to have the Property surveyed by a surveyor of Tenant's choice. In the event Tenant determines, in its sole discretion, due to the title report results or survey results, that the condition of the Premises is unsatisfactory, Tenant will have the right to terminate this Agreement upon notice to Landlord.

(c) Tenant may also perform and obtain, at Tenant's sole cost and expense, soil borings, percolation tests, engineering procedures, environmental investigation or other tests or reports on, over, and under the Property, necessary to determine if the Tenant's use of the Premises will be compatible with Tenant's engineering specifications, system, design, operations or Government Approvals.

6. TERMINATION. This Agreement may be terminated, without penalty or further liability, as follows:

(a) by either party on thirty (30) days prior written notice, if the other party remains in default under Paragraph 15 Default and Right to Cure of this Agreement after the applicable cure periods;

(b) by Tenant upon written notice to Landlord, if Tenant is unable to obtain, or maintain, any required approval(s) or the issuance of a license or permit by any agency, board, court or other governmental authority necessary for the construction or operation of the Communication Facility as now or hereafter intended by Tenant; or if Tenant determines in its sole discretion that the cost of obtaining or retaining the same is commercially unreasonable;

(c) by Tenant upon written notice to Landlord for any reason, at any time prior to commencement of construction by Tenant; or

(d) by Tenant upon sixty (60) days prior written notice to Landlord for any reason, so long as Tenant pays Landlord a termination fee equal to three (3) months Rent, at the then current rate, provided, however, that no such termination fee will be payable on account of the termination of this Agreement by Tenant under any one or more of Paragraphs 5(b) Approvals, 6(a) Termination, 6(b) Termination, 6(c) Termination, 8 Interference, 11(d) Environmental, 18 Severability, 19 Condemnation or 20 Casualty of this Agreement.

7. INSURANCE.

(a) Tenant will carry during the Term, at its own cost and expense, the following insurance: (i) "All Risk" property insurance for its property's replacement cost; (ii) commercial general liability insurance with a minimum limit of liability of \$2,500,000 combined single limit for bodily injury or death/property damage arising out of any one occurrence; and (iii) Workers' Compensation Insurance as required by law. The coverage afforded by Tenant's commercial general liability insurance shall apply to Landlord as an additional insured, but only with respect to Landlord's liability arising out of its interest in the Property.

(b) Tenant shall have the right to self-insure with respect to any of the above insurance requirements.

8. INTERFERENCE.

(a) Where there are existing radio frequency user(s) on the Property, the Landlord will provide Tenant with a list of all existing radio frequency user(s) on the Property to allow Tenant to evaluate the

potential for interference. Tenant warrants that its use of the Premises will not interfere with existing radio frequency user(s) on the Property so disclosed by Landlord, as long as the existing radio frequency user(s) operate and continue to operate within their respective frequencies and in accordance with all applicable laws and regulations.

(b) Landlord will not grant, after the date of this Agreement, a lease, license or any other right to any third party for the use of the Property, if such use may in any way adversely affect or interfere with the Communication Facility, the operations of Tenant or the rights of Tenant under this Agreement. Landlord will notify Tenant in writing prior to granting any third party the right to install and operate communications equipment on the Property.

(c) Landlord will not use, nor will Landlord permit its employees, tenants, licensees, invitees or agents to use, any portion of the Property in any way which interferes with the Communication Facility, the operations of Tenant or the rights of Tenant under this Agreement. Landlord will cause such interference to cease within twenty-four (24) hours after receipt of notice of interference from Tenant. In the event any such interference does not cease within the aforementioned cure period then the parties acknowledge that Tenant will suffer irreparable injury, and therefore, Tenant will have the right, in addition to any other rights that it may have at law or in equity, for Landlord's breach of this Agreement, to elect to enjoin such interference or to terminate this Agreement upon notice to Landlord.

9. INDEMNIFICATION.

(a) Tenant agrees to indemnify, defend and hold Landlord harmless from and against any and all injury, loss, damage or liability (or any claims in respect of the foregoing), costs or expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs but excluding real property or personal property taxes) arising directly from the installation, use, maintenance, repair or removal of the Communication Facility or Tenant's breach of any provision of this Agreement, except to the extent attributable to the negligent or intentional act or omission of Landlord, its employees, agents or independent contractors.

(b) Landlord agrees to indemnify, defend and hold Tenant harmless from and against any and all injury, loss, damage or liability (or any claims in respect of the foregoing), costs or expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs but excluding real property or personal property taxes) arising directly from the actions or failure to act of Landlord or its employees or agents, or Landlord's breach of any provision of this Agreement, except to the extent attributable to the negligent or intentional act or omission of Tenant, its employees, agents or independent contractors.

(c) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Agreement, Tenant and Landlord each waives any claims that each may have against the other with respect to consequential, incidental or special damages.

10. WARRANTIES.

(a) Tenant and Landlord each acknowledge and represent that it is duly organized, validly existing and in good standing and has the right, power and authority to enter into this Agreement and bind itself hereto through the party set forth as signatory for the party below.

(b) Landlord represents and warrants that: (i) Landlord solely owns the Property as a legal lot in fee simple, or controls the Property by lease or license; (ii) the Property is not encumbered by any liens, restrictions, mortgages, covenants, conditions, easements, leases, or any other agreements of record or not of record, which would adversely affect Tenant's Permitted Use and enjoyment of the Premises under this Agreement; (iii) as long as Tenant is not in default then Landlord grants to Tenant sole, actual, quiet and peaceful use, enjoyment and possession of the Premises; (iv) Landlord's execution and performance of this Agreement will not violate any laws, ordinances, covenants or the provisions of any mortgage, lease or other agreement binding on the Landlord; and (v) if the Property is or becomes encumbered by a deed to secure a debt, mortgage or other security interest, Landlord will use best efforts to provide promptly to Tenant a mutually agreeable Subordination, Non-Disturbance and Attornment Agreement.

11. ENVIRONMENTAL.

(a) Landlord represents and warrants that the Property is free of hazardous substances as of the date of this Agreement, and, to the best of Landlord's knowledge, the Property has never been subject to any contamination or hazardous conditions resulting in any environmental investigation, inquiry or remediation. Landlord and Tenant agree that each will be responsible for compliance with any and all environmental and industrial hygiene laws, including any regulations, guidelines, standards, or policies of any governmental authorities regulating or imposing standards of liability or standards of conduct with regard to any environmental or industrial hygiene condition or other matters as may now or at any time hereafter be in effect, that are now or were related to that party's activity conducted in or on the Property.

(b) Landlord and Tenant agree to hold harmless and indemnify the other from, and to assume all duties, responsibilities and liabilities at the sole cost and expense of the indemnifying party for, payment of penalties, sanctions, forfeitures, losses, costs or damages, and for responding to any action, notice, claim, order, summons, citation, directive, litigation, investigation or proceeding which is related to (i) the indemnifying party's failure to comply with any environmental or industrial hygiene law, including without limitation any regulations, guidelines, standards or policies of any governmental authorities regulating or imposing standards of liability or standards of conduct with regard to any environmental or industrial hygiene conditions or matters as may now or hereafter be in effect, or (ii) any environmental or industrial hygiene conditions that arise out of or are in any way related to the condition of the Property and activities conducted by the party thereon, unless the environmental conditions are caused by the other party.

(c) The indemnifications of this Paragraph 11 Environmental specifically include reasonable costs, expenses and fees incurred in connection with any investigation of Property conditions or any clean-up, remediation, removal or restoration work required by any governmental authority. The provisions of this Paragraph 11 Environmental will survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

(d) In the event Tenant becomes aware of any hazardous materials on the Property, or any environmental or industrial hygiene condition or matter relating to the Property that, in Tenant's sole determination, renders the condition of the Premises or Property unsuitable for Tenant's use, or if Tenant believes that the leasing or continued leasing of the Premises would expose Tenant to undue risks of government action, intervention or third-party liability, Tenant will have the right, in addition to any other rights it may have at law or in equity, to terminate the Agreement upon notice to Landlord.

12. ACCESS. At all times throughout the Term of this Agreement, and at no additional charge to Tenant, Tenant and its employees, agents, and subcontractors, will have twenty-four (24) hour per day, seven (7) day per week pedestrian and vehicular access to and over the Property, from an open and improved public road to the Premises, for the installation, maintenance and operation of the Communication Facility and any utilities serving the Premises. Landlord grants to Tenant an easement for such access and Landlord agrees to provide to Tenant such codes, keys and other instruments necessary for such access at no additional cost to Tenant. Upon Tenant's request, Landlord will execute a separate recordable easement evidencing this right. In the event any public utility is unable to use the access or easement provided to Tenant then the Landlord agrees to grant additional access or an easement either to Tenant or to the public utility, for the benefit of Tenant, at no cost to Tenant.

13. REMOVAL/RESTORATION. All portions of the Communication Facility brought onto the Property by Tenant will be and remain Tenant's personal property and, at Tenant's option, may be removed by Tenant at any time during the Term. Landlord covenants and agrees that no part of the Communication Facility constructed, erected or placed on the Premises by Tenant will become, or be considered as being affixed to or a part of, the Property, it being the specific intention of the Landlord that all improvements of every kind and nature constructed, erected or placed by Tenant on the Premises will be and remain the property of the Tenant and may be removed by Tenant at any time during the Term. Within one hundred twenty (120) days of the termination of this Agreement, Tenant will remove all of Tenant's above-ground improvements and Tenant will, to the extent reasonable, restore the Premises to its condition at the commencement of the Agreement,

reasonable wear and tear and loss by casualty or other causes beyond Tenant's control excepted. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Tenant will not be responsible for the replacement of any trees, shrubs or other vegetation, nor will Tenant be required to remove from the Premises or the Property any foundations or underground utilities.

14. MAINTENANCE/UTILITIES.

(a) Tenant will keep and maintain the Premises in good condition, reasonable wear and tear and damage from the elements excepted. Landlord will maintain and repair the Property and access thereto, in good and tenable condition, subject to reasonable wear and tear and damage from the elements.

(b) Tenant will be responsible for paying on a monthly or quarterly basis all utilities charges for electricity, telephone service or any other utility used or consumed by Tenant on the Premises. In the event Tenant cannot secure its own metered electrical supply, Tenant will have the right, at its own cost and expense, to submeter from the Landlord. When submetering is necessary and available, Landlord will read the meter on a monthly or quarterly basis and provide Tenant with the necessary usage data in a timely manner to enable Tenant to compute such utility charges. Failure by Landlord to perform this function will limit utility fee recovery by Landlord to a 12-month period. Landlord will fully cooperate with any utility company requesting an easement over, under and across the Property in order for the utility company to provide service to the Tenant. Landlord will not be responsible for interference with, interruption of or failure, beyond the reasonable control of Landlord, of such services to be furnished or supplied by Landlord.

15. DEFAULT AND RIGHT TO CURE.

(a) The following will be deemed a default by Tenant and a breach of this Agreement: (i) non-payment of Rent if such Rent remains unpaid for more than thirty (30) days after receipt of written notice from Landlord of such failure to pay; or (ii) Tenant's failure to perform any other term or condition under this Agreement within forty-five (45) days after receipt of written notice from Landlord specifying the failure. No such failure, however, will be deemed to exist if Tenant has commenced to cure such default within such period and provided that such efforts are prosecuted to completion with reasonable diligence. Delay in curing a default will be excused if due to causes beyond the reasonable control of Tenant. If Tenant remains in default beyond any applicable cure period, Landlord will have the right to exercise any and all rights and remedies available to it under law and equity.

(b) The following will be deemed a default by Landlord and a breach of this Agreement: Landlord's failure to perform any term, condition or breach of any warranty or covenant under this Agreement within forty-five (45) days after receipt of written notice from Tenant specifying the failure. No such failure, however, will be deemed to exist if Landlord has commenced to cure the default within such period and provided such efforts are prosecuted to completion with reasonable diligence. Delay in curing a default will be excused if due to causes beyond the reasonable control of Landlord. If Landlord remains in default beyond any applicable cure period, Tenant will have the right to exercise any and all rights available to it under law and equity, including the right to cure Landlord's default and to deduct the costs of such cure from any monies due to Landlord from Tenant.

16. ASSIGNMENT/SUBLEASE. Tenant will have the right to assign this Agreement or sublease the Premises and its rights herein, in whole or in part, without Landlord's consent. Upon notification to Landlord of such assignment, Tenant will be relieved of all future performance, liabilities and obligations under this Agreement.

17. NOTICES. All notices, requests, demands and communications hereunder will be given by first class certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, or by a nationally recognized overnight courier, postage prepaid, to be effective when properly sent and received, refused or returned undelivered. Notices will be addressed to the parties as follows:

Either party hereto may change the place for the giving of notice to it by thirty (30) days prior written notice to the other as provided herein.

18. SEVERABILITY. If any term or condition of this Agreement is found unenforceable, the remaining terms and conditions will remain binding upon the parties as though said unenforceable provision were not contained herein. However, if the invalid, illegal or unenforceable provision materially affects this Agreement then the Agreement may be terminated by either party on ten (10) business days prior written notice to the other party hereto.

19. CONDEMNATION. In the event Landlord receives notification of any condemnation proceedings affecting the Property, Landlord will provide notice of the proceeding to Tenant within forty-eight (48) hours. If a condemning authority takes all of the Property, or a portion sufficient, in Tenant's sole determination, to render the Premises unsuitable for Tenant, this Agreement will terminate as of the date the title vests in the condemning authority. The parties will each be entitled to pursue their own separate awards in the condemnation proceeds, which for Tenant will include, where applicable, the value of its Communication Facility, moving expenses, prepaid Rent, and business dislocation expenses, provided that any award to Tenant will not diminish Landlord's recovery. Tenant will be entitled to reimbursement for any prepaid Rent on a prorata basis.

20. CASUALTY. Landlord will provide notice to Tenant of any casualty affecting the Property within forty-eight (48) hours of the casualty. If any part of the Communication Facility or Property is damaged by fire or other casualty so as to render the Premises unsuitable, in Tenant's sole determination, then Tenant may terminate this Agreement by providing written notice to the Landlord, which termination will be effective as of the date of such damage or destruction. Upon such termination, Tenant will be entitled to collect all insurance proceeds payable to Tenant on account thereof and to be reimbursed for any prepaid Rent on a prorata basis. If notice of termination is given, or if Landlord or Tenant undertake to rebuild the Communications Facility, Landlord agrees to use its reasonable efforts to permit Tenant to place temporary transmission and reception facilities on the Property at no additional Rent until such time as Tenant is able to secure a replacement transmission location or the reconstruction of the Communication Facility is completed.

21. WAIVER OF LANDLORD'S LIENS. Landlord waives any and all lien rights it may have, statutory or otherwise, concerning the Communication Facility or any portion thereof. The Communication Facility shall be

deemed personal property for purposes of this Agreement, regardless of whether any portion is deemed real or personal property under applicable law, and Landlord consents to Tenant's right to remove all or any portion of the Communication Facility from time to time in Tenant's sole discretion and without Landlord's consent.

22. TAXES. Landlord shall be responsible for payment of all ad valorem taxes levied upon the lands, improvements and other property of Landlord. Tenant shall be responsible for all taxes levied upon Tenant's leasehold improvements (including Tenant's equipment building and tower) on the Leased Property. Landlord shall provide Tenant with copies of all assessment notices on or including the Leased Property immediately upon receipt, but in no event less than three (3) business days after receipt by Landlord. If Landlord fails to provide such notice within such time frame, Landlord shall be responsible for all increases in taxes for the year covered by the assessment. Tenant shall have the right to contest, in good faith, the validity or the amount of any tax or assessment levied against the Leased Property by such appellate or other proceedings as may be appropriate in the jurisdiction, and may defer payment of such obligations, pay same under protest, or take such other steps as Tenant may deem appropriate. This right shall include the ability to institute any legal, regulatory or informal action in the name of Landlord, Tenant, or both, with respect to the valuation of the Leased Property. Landlord shall cooperate in the institution and prosecution of any such proceedings and will execute any documents required therefore. The expense of any such proceedings shall be borne by Tenant and any refunds or rebates secured as a result of Tenant's action shall belong to Tenant.

23. SALE OF PROPERTY. If Landlord, at any time during the Term of this Agreement, decides to sell, subdivide or rezone any of the Premises, all or any part of the Property or Surrounding Property, to a purchaser other than Tenant, Landlord shall promptly notify Tenant in writing, and such sale, subdivision or rezoning shall be subject to this Agreement and Tenant's rights hereunder. Landlord agrees not to sell, lease or use any areas of the Property or Surrounding Property for the installation, operation or maintenance of other wireless communications facilities if such installation, operation or maintenance would interfere with Tenant's Permitted Use or communications equipment as determined by radio propagation tests performed by Tenant in its sole discretion, any such testing to be at the expense of Landlord or Landlord's prospective purchaser, and not Tenant. If the radio frequency propagation tests demonstrate levels of interference unacceptable to Tenant, Landlord shall be prohibited from selling, leasing or using any areas of the Property or the Surrounding Property for purposes of any installation, operation or maintenance of any other wireless communications facility or equipment. Landlord shall not be prohibited from the selling, leasing or use of any of the Property or the Surrounding Property for non-wireless communication use. In the event the Property is transferred, the new landlord shall have a duty at the time of such transfer to provide Tenant with a completed IRS Form W-9, or its equivalent, and other related paper work to effect a transfer in Rent to the new landlord. The provisions of this Paragraph 23 shall in no way limit or impair the obligations of Landlord under Paragraph 8 above.

24. MISCELLANEOUS.

(a) **Amendment/Waiver.** This Agreement cannot be amended, modified or revised unless done in writing and signed by an authorized agent of the Landlord and an authorized agent of the Tenant. No provision may be waived except in a writing signed by both parties.

(b) **Memorandum/Short Form Lease.** Either party will, at any time upon fifteen (15) business days prior written notice from the other, execute, acknowledge and deliver to the other a recordable Memorandum or Short Form of Lease. Either party may record this Memorandum or Short Form of Lease at any time, in its absolute discretion.

(c) **Bind and Benefit.** The terms and conditions contained in this Agreement will run with the Property and bind and inure to the benefit of the parties, their respective heirs, executors, administrators, successors and assigns.

(d) **Entire Agreement.** This Agreement and the exhibits attached hereto, all being a part hereof, constitute the entire agreement of the parties hereto and will supersede all prior offers, negotiations and agreements with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement.

(e) **Governing Law.** This Agreement will be governed by the laws of the state in which the Premises are located, without regard to conflicts of law.

(f) **Interpretation.** Unless otherwise specified, the following rules of construction and interpretation apply: (i) captions are for convenience and reference only and in no way define or limit the construction of the terms and conditions hereof; (ii) use of the term "including" will be interpreted to mean "including but not limited to"; (iii) whenever a party's consent is required under this Agreement, except as otherwise stated in the Agreement or as same may be duplicative, such consent will not be unreasonably withheld, conditioned or delayed; (iv) exhibits are an integral part of the Agreement and are incorporated by reference into this Agreement; (v) use of the terms "termination" or "expiration" are interchangeable; and (vi) reference to a default will take into consideration any applicable notice, grace and cure periods.

(g) **Estoppel.** Either party will, at any time upon twenty (20) business days prior written notice from the other, execute, acknowledge and deliver to the other a statement in writing (i) certifying that this Agreement is unmodified and in full force and effect (or, if modified, stating the nature of such modification and certifying this Agreement, as so modified, is in full force and effect) and the date to which the Rent and other charges are paid in advance, if any, and (ii) acknowledging that there are not, to such party's knowledge, any uncured defaults on the part of the other party hereunder, or specifying such defaults if any are claimed. Any such statement may be conclusively relied upon by any prospective purchaser or encumbrancer of the Premises. The requested party's failure to deliver such a statement within such time will be conclusively relied upon by the requesting party that (i) this Agreement is in full force and effect, without modification except as may be properly represented by the requesting party, (ii) there are no uncured defaults in either party's performance, and (iii) no more than one month's Rent has been paid in advance.

(h) **No Electronic Signature/No Option.** The submission of this Agreement to any party for examination or consideration does not constitute an offer, reservation of or option for the Premises based on the terms set forth herein. This Agreement will become effective as a binding Agreement only upon the handwritten legal execution, acknowledgment and delivery hereof by Landlord and Tenant.

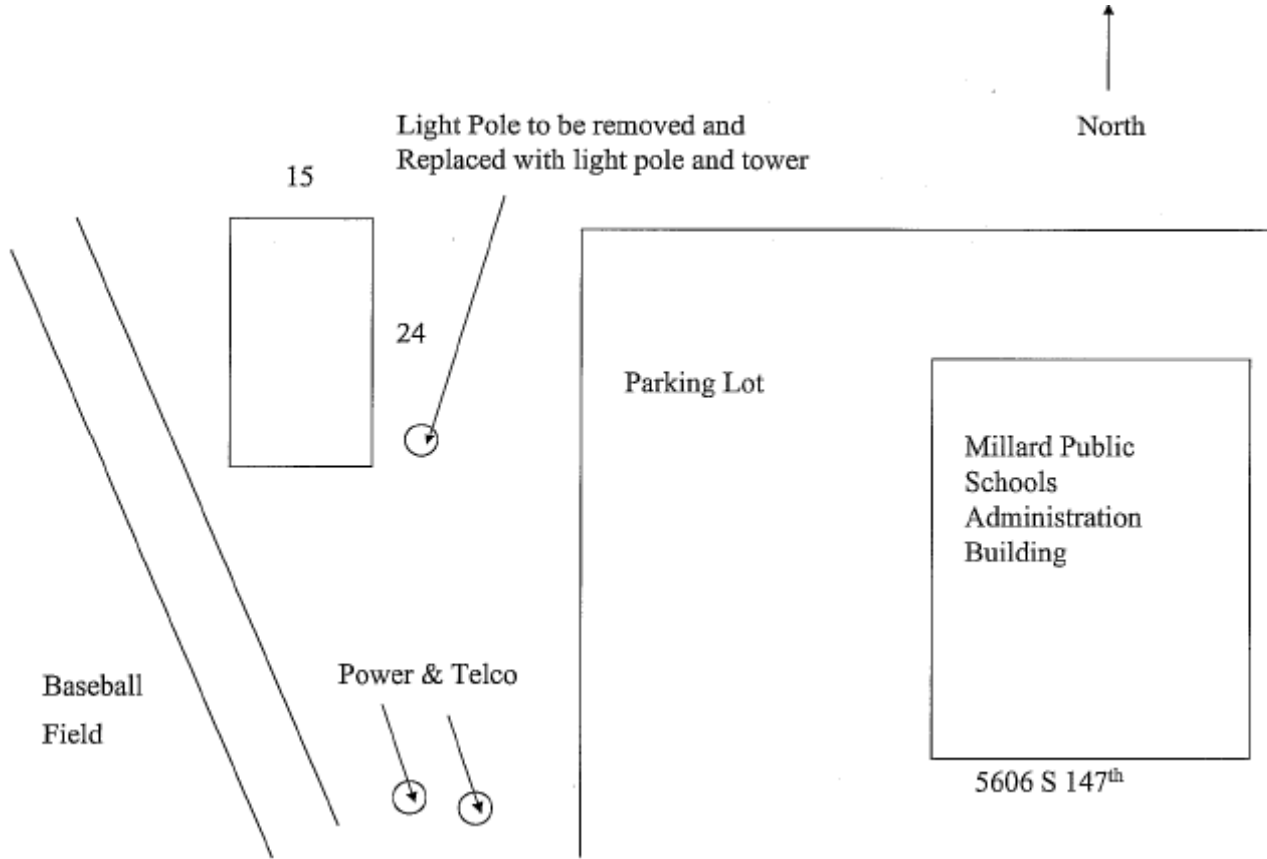

**SUBORDINATION, NON-DISTURBANCE
 AND ATTORNMENT AGREEMENT**

THIS AGREEMENT ("Agreement"), dated as of the date below, between _____ having its principal office at _____, (hereinafter called "Mortgagee") and Millard School District, School District No. 17, Douglas County, Nebraska having its principal office/residing at 5606 S. 147th St., Omaha, Nebraska 68137 (hereinafter called "Landlord"), and New Cingular Wireless PCS, LLC, a Delaware limited liability company, having a mailing address of 6100 Atlantic Boulevard, Norcross, GA 30071 (hereinafter called "Tenant").

W I T N E S S E T H:

WHEREAS, Tenant has entered into a certain lease dated _____, 20__, (the "Lease") with Landlord, covering property more fully described in **Exhibit 1** attached hereto and made a part hereof (the "Premises"); and

WHEREAS, Landlord has given to Mortgagee a mortgage (the "Mortgage") upon property having a street address of 14905 Q St., being identified as Property Identification Number: _____ in the City of Omaha, Douglas County, State of Nebraska ("Property"), a part of which Property contains the Premises; and

WHEREAS, the Mortgage on the property is in the original principal sum of _____ (\$_____) Dollars, which Mortgage has been recorded in the appropriate public office in and for Douglas County, Nebraska ("Mortgage"); and

WHEREAS, Tenant desires to be assured of continued occupancy of the Premises under the terms of the Lease and subject to the terms of this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises, covenants and agreements herein contained, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto, intending to be legally bound hereby, agree as follows:

1. So long as this Agreement will remain in full force and effect, the Lease is and will be subject and subordinate to the lien and effect of the Mortgage insofar as it affects the real property and fixtures of which the Premises forms a part (but not Tenant's trade fixtures and other personal property), and to all renewals, modifications, consolidations, replacements and extensions thereof, to the full extent of the principal sum secured thereby and interest thereon, with the same force and effect as if the Mortgage had been executed,

delivered, and duly recorded among the above-mentioned public records, prior to the execution and delivery of the Lease.

2. In the event Mortgagee takes possession of the Premises as mortgagee-in-possession, including but not limited to, by deed in lieu of foreclosure or foreclosure of the Mortgage, Mortgagee agrees not to affect or disturb Tenant's right to possession of the Premises and any of Tenant's other rights under the Lease in the exercise of Mortgagee's rights so long as Tenant is not then in default, after applicable notice and/or grace periods, under any of the terms, covenants, or conditions of the Lease.

3. In the event that Mortgagee succeeds to the interest of Landlord or other landlord under the Lease and/or to title to the Premises, Mortgagee and Tenant hereby agree to be bound to one another under all of the terms, covenants and conditions of the Lease; accordingly, from and after such event, Mortgagee and Tenant will have the same remedies against one another for the breach of an agreement contained in the Lease as Tenant and Landlord had before Mortgagee succeeded to the interest of Landlord; provided, however, that Mortgagee will not be:

- (a) personally liable for any act or omission of any prior landlord (including Landlord); or
- (b) bound by any rent or additional rent which Tenant might have paid for more than the payment period as set forth under the Lease (one month, year etc.) in advance to any prior landlord (including Landlord).

4. In the event that Mortgagee or anyone else acquires title to or the right to possession of the Premises upon the foreclosure of the Mortgage, or upon the sale of the Premises by Mortgagee or its successors or assigns after foreclosure or acquisition of title in lieu thereof or otherwise, Tenant agrees not to seek to terminate the Lease by reason thereof, but will remain bound unto the new owner so long as the new owner is bound to Tenant (subject to paragraph 3 above) under all of the terms, covenants and conditions of the Lease.

5. Mortgagee hereby expressly waives any interest which Mortgagee may have or acquire with respect to such furniture, equipment, trade fixtures and/or other property of Tenant now, or hereafter, located on or affixed to the Property or any portion thereof and Mortgagee hereby agrees that same do not constitute realty regardless of the manner in which same are attached or affixed to the Property.

6. This Agreement will be binding upon and will extend to and benefit the successors and assigns of the parties hereto and to any assignees or subtenants of Tenant which are permitted under the Lease. The term "Mortgagee", when used in this Agreement will be deemed to include any person or entity which acquires title to or the right to possession of the Premises by, through or under Mortgagee and/or the Mortgage, whether directly or indirectly.

OPTION AND LEASE AGREEMENT

THIS OPTION AND LEASE AGREEMENT ("**Agreement**"), dated as of the latter of the signature dates below (the "Effective Date"), is entered into by Millard School District, School District No. 17, Douglas County, Nebraska, having a mailing address of 5606 S. 147th St., Omaha, Nebraska 68137 (hereinafter referred to as "**Landlord**") and New Cingular Wireless PCS, LLC, a Delaware limited liability company, having a mailing address of 6100 Atlantic Boulevard, Norcross, Georgia 30071 (hereinafter referred to as "**Tenant**").

BACKGROUND

Landlord owns or controls that certain plot, parcel or tract of land, together with all rights and privileges arising in connection therewith, located at 1313 N. 156th St., Omaha, , in the County of Douglas, State of Nebraska (collectively, the "**Property**"). Tenant desires to use a portion of the Property in connection with its federally licensed communications business. Landlord desires to grant to Tenant the right to use a portion of the Property in accordance with this Agreement.

The parties agree as follows:

1. **OPTION TO LEASE.**

(a) Landlord grants to Tenant an option (the "**Option**") to lease a certain portion of the Property containing approximately 450 square feet (15' x 30') including the air space above such room/cabinet/ground space as described on attached **Exhibit 1**, together with unrestricted access for Tenant's uses from the nearest public right-of-way along the Property to the Premises as described on the attached **Exhibit 1** (collectively, the "**Premises**").

(b) During the Option period and any extension thereof, and during the term of this Agreement, Tenant and its agents, engineers, surveyors and other representatives will have the right to enter upon the Property to inspect, examine, conduct soil borings, drainage testing, material sampling, radio frequency testing and other geological or engineering tests or studies of the Property (collectively, the "**Tests**"), to apply for and obtain licenses, permits, approvals, or other relief required of or deemed necessary or appropriate at Tenant's sole discretion for its use of the Premises and include, without limitation, applications for zoning variances, zoning ordinances, amendments, special use permits, and construction permits (collectively, the "**Government Approvals**"), initiate the ordering and/or scheduling of necessary utilities, and otherwise to do those things on or off the Property that, in the opinion of Tenant, are necessary in Tenant's sole discretion to determine the physical condition of the Property, the environmental history of the Property, Landlord's title to the Property and the feasibility or suitability of the Property for Tenant's Permitted Use, all at Tenant's expense. Tenant will not be liable to Landlord or any third party on account of any pre-existing defect or condition on or with respect to the Property, whether or not such defect or condition is disclosed by Tenant's inspection. Tenant will restore the Property to its condition as it existed at the commencement of the Option Term (as defined below), reasonable wear and tear and casualty not caused by Tenant excepted. In addition, Tenant shall indemnify, defend and hold Landlord harmless from and against any and all injury, loss, damage or claims arising directly out of Tenant's Tests.

(c) In consideration of Landlord granting Tenant the Option, Tenant agrees to pay Landlord the sum of One Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$1,000.00) within thirty (30) business days of the Effective Date. The Option will be for an initial term of one (1) year commencing on the Effective Date (the "**Initial Option Term**") and may be renewed by Tenant for an additional six (6) months upon written notification to Landlord

and the payment of an additional Six Hundred Twenty-five and No/100 Dollars (\$625.00) no later than ten (10) days prior to the expiration date of the Initial Option Term.

(d) The Option may be sold, assigned or transferred at any time by Tenant to Tenant's parent company or member if Tenant is a limited liability company or any affiliate or subsidiary of, or partner in, Tenant or its parent company or member, or to any third party agreeing to be subject to the terms hereof. Otherwise, the Option may not be sold, assigned or transferred without the written consent of Landlord, such consent not to be unreasonably withheld, conditioned or delayed. From and after the date the Option has been sold, assigned or transferred by Tenant to a third party agreeing to be subject to the terms hereof, Tenant shall immediately be released from any and all liability under this Agreement, including the payment of any rental or other sums due, without any further action.

(e) During the Initial Option Term and any extension thereof, Tenant may exercise the Option by notifying Landlord in writing. If Tenant exercises the Option then Landlord leases the Premises to the Tenant subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement. If Tenant does not exercise the Option during the Initial Option Term or any extension thereof, this Agreement will terminate and the parties will have no further liability to each other.

(f) If during the Initial Option Term or any extension thereof, or during the term of this Agreement if the Option is exercised, Landlord decides to subdivide, sell, or change the status of the zoning of the Premises, Property or any of Landlord's contiguous, adjoining or surrounding property (the "**Surrounding Property**," which includes (without limitation) the remainder of the structure) or in the event of foreclosure, Landlord shall immediately notify Tenant in writing. Any sale of the Property shall be subject to Tenant's rights under this Agreement. Landlord agrees that during the Initial Option Term or any extension thereof, or during the Term of this Agreement if the Option is exercised, Landlord shall not initiate or consent to any change in the zoning of the Premises, Property or Surrounding Property or impose or consent to any other restriction that would prevent or limit Tenant from using the Premises for the uses intended by Tenant as hereinafter set forth in this Agreement.

2. PERMITTED USE. (a) Tenant may use the Premises for the transmission and reception of communications signals and the installation, construction, maintenance, operation, repair, replacement and upgrade of its communications fixtures and related equipment, cables, accessories and improvements, which may include a stealth flag pole ("Stealth Flag Pole"), associated antennas, I beams, equipment shelters or cabinets and fencing and any other items necessary to the successful and secure use of the Premises (collectively, the "**Communication Facility**"), as well as the right to test, survey and review title on the Property; Tenant further has the right but not the obligation to add, modify and/or replace equipment in order to be in compliance with any current or future federal, state or local mandated application, including, but not limited to, emergency 911 communication services, at no additional cost to Tenant or Landlord (collectively, the "**Permitted Use**"). Prior to the initial installation of Tenant's Communication Facility, or any proposed relocation thereof, Landlord and Tenant shall mutually agree to the location of the Communication Facility on the Property. If Landlord and Tenant cannot mutually agree to location of Tenant's Communication Facility, Tenant may terminate this Agreement with no further liability to Landlord. Landlord and Tenant agree that any portion of the Communication Facility that may be conceptually described on **Exhibit 1** will not be deemed to limit Tenant's Permitted Use. If **Exhibit 1** includes drawings of the initial installation of the Communication Facility, Landlord's execution of this Agreement will signify Landlord's approval of **Exhibit 1**. Tenant has the right to install and operate transmission cables from the equipment shelter or cabinet to the antennas, electric lines from the main feed to the equipment shelter or cabinet and communication lines from the main entry point to the equipment shelter or cabinet, and to make Property improvements, alterations, upgrades or additions appropriate for Tenant's use ("**Tenant Changes**"). Tenant Changes include the right to construct a fence around the Premises and undertake any other appropriate means to secure the Premises. Tenant agrees to comply with all applicable governmental laws, rules, statutes and regulations, relating to its use of the Communication Facility on the Property. Tenant has the right to modify, supplement, replace, upgrade, expand the equipment, increase the number of antennas or relocate the Communication Facility within the Premises at

any time during the term of this Agreement. Tenant will be allowed to make such alterations to the Property in order to accomplish Tenant's Changes or to insure that Tenant's Communication Facility complies with all applicable federal, state or local laws, rules or regulations. In the event Tenant desires to modify or upgrade the Communication Facility, and Tenant requires an additional portion of the Property (the "Additional Premises") for such modification or upgrade, Landlord agrees to lease to Tenant the Additional Premises, upon the same terms and conditions set forth herein, except that the Rent shall increase, in conjunction with the lease of the Additional Premises by a reasonable amount consistent with rental rates then charged for comparable portions of real property being in the same area. Landlord agrees to take such actions and enter into and deliver to Tenant such documents as Tenant reasonably requests in order to effect and memorialize the lease of the Additional Premises to Tenant.

(b) The Stealth Flag Pole shall be made of standard aluminum or galvanized steel and shall include space for Tenant and up to one (1) additional carrier to collocate on the Stealth Flag Pole. The Stealth Flag Pole will be approximately seventy (70) feet in height, as further described in **Exhibit 1**, attached hereto.

(c) Tenant shall provide Landlord with one (1) United States American Flag suitable for flying on the Stealth Flag Pole together with all necessary rigging for same. The initial installation of the rigging and flag shall be borne by the Tenant, at its sole cost and expense, thereafter Landlord shall be responsible for providing any and all additional United States American Flags and any other flag it wishes to fly on the Stealth Flag Pole. Landlord shall be responsible for raising and lowering the United States American Flag along with the maintenance of the same. Upon the completion of the initial installation of the United States American Flag, Tenant shall be relieved of further liability of same. Notwithstanding the above, Landlord or its agent, shall not access the pole above six (6) feet.

(d) Tenant shall not be responsible for the maintenance, replacement or lighting of the United States American Flag on the Stealth Flag Pole nor for the maintenance of any landscaping at the base of Stealth Flag Pole. In the event the rigging on the Stealth Flag Pole requires repair or replacement, Landlord shall notify Tenant of same and Tenant shall perform the necessary maintenance at Landlord's sole cost and expense.

3. **TERM.**

(a) The initial lease term will be five (5) years ("**Initial Term**"), commencing on the effective date of written notification by Tenant to Landlord of Tenant's exercise of the Option (the "Term Commencement Date"). The Initial Term will terminate on the fifth (5th) annual anniversary of the Term Commencement Date.

(b) This Agreement will automatically renew for four (4) additional five (5) year term(s) (each five (5) year term shall be defined as the "**Extension Term**"), upon the same terms and conditions unless the Tenant notifies the Landlord in writing of Tenant's intention not to renew this Agreement at least sixty (60) days prior to the expiration of the existing Term.

(c) If, at least sixty (60) days prior to the end of the fourth (4th) extended term, either Landlord or Tenant has not given the other written notice of its desire that the term of this Agreement end at the expiration of the fourth (4th) extended term, then upon the expiration of the fourth (4th) extended term this Agreement shall continue in force upon the same covenants, terms and conditions for a further term of one (1) year, and for annual terms thereafter until terminated by either party by giving to the other written notice of its intention to so terminate at least six (6) months prior to the end of any such annual term. Monthly rental during such annual terms shall be equal to the rent paid for the last month of the fourth (4th) extended term. If Tenant remains in possession of the Premises after the termination of this Agreement then Tenant will be deemed to be occupying the Premises on a month to month basis (the "**Holdover Term**"), subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

(d) The Initial Term, the Extension Term and the Holdover Term are collectively referred to as the Term ("**Term**").

4. **RENT.**

(a) Commencing on the first day of the month following the date that Tenant commences construction (the "Rent Commencement Date"), Tenant will pay the Landlord a monthly rental payment of One Thousand Two Hundred Fifty and No/100 Dollars (\$1250.00) ("Rent"), at the address set forth above, on or before the fifth (5th) day of each calendar month in advance. In partial months occurring after the Rent Commencement Date, Rent will be prorated. The initial Rent payment will be forwarded by Tenant to Landlord within thirty (30) days after the Rent Commencement Date.

(b) In year one (1) of each Extension Term, the monthly Rent will increase by ten percent (10 %) over the Rent paid during the previous Term.

(c) All Rent or other charges payable under this Agreement shall be billed by Landlord within one (1) year from the end of the calendar year in which the charges were incurred; any charges beyond such period shall not be billed by Landlord, and shall not be payable by Tenant. The provisions of the foregoing sentence shall survive the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

5. APPROVALS.

(a) Landlord agrees that Tenant's ability to use the Premises is contingent upon the suitability of the Premises for Tenant's Permitted Use and Tenant's ability to obtain and maintain all Government Approvals. Landlord authorizes Tenant to prepare, execute and file all required applications to obtain Government Approvals for Tenant's Permitted Use under this Agreement and agrees to reasonably assist Tenant with such applications and with obtaining and maintaining the Government Approvals.

(b) Tenant has the right to obtain a title report or commitment for a leasehold title policy from a title insurance company of its choice and to have the Property surveyed by a surveyor of Tenant's choice. In the event Tenant determines, in its sole discretion, due to the title report results or survey results, that the condition of the Premises is unsatisfactory, Tenant will have the right to terminate this Agreement upon notice to Landlord.

(c) Tenant may also perform and obtain, at Tenant's sole cost and expense, soil borings, percolation tests, engineering procedures, environmental investigation or other tests or reports on, over, and under the Property, necessary to determine if the Tenant's use of the Premises will be compatible with Tenant's engineering specifications, system, design, operations or Government Approvals.

6. TERMINATION. This Agreement may be terminated, without penalty or further liability, as follows:

(a) by either party on thirty (30) days prior written notice, if the other party remains in default under Paragraph 15 Default and Right to Cure of this Agreement after the applicable cure periods;

(b) by Tenant upon written notice to Landlord, if Tenant is unable to obtain, or maintain, any required approval(s) or the issuance of a license or permit by any agency, board, court or other governmental authority necessary for the construction or operation of the Communication Facility as now or hereafter intended by Tenant; or if Tenant determines in its sole discretion that the cost of obtaining or retaining the same is commercially unreasonable;

(c) by Tenant upon written notice to Landlord for any reason, at any time prior to commencement of construction by Tenant; or

(d) by Tenant upon sixty (60) days prior written notice to Landlord for any reason, so long as Tenant pays Landlord a termination fee equal to three (3) months Rent, at the then current rate, provided, however, that no such termination fee will be payable on account of the termination of this Agreement by Tenant under any one or more of Paragraphs 5(b) Approvals, 6(a) Termination, 6(b) Termination, 6(c) Termination, 8 Interference, 11(d) Environmental, 18 Severability, 19 Condemnation or 20 Casualty of this Agreement.

7. INSURANCE.

(a) Tenant will carry during the Term, at its own cost and expense, the following insurance: (i) "All Risk" property insurance for its property's replacement cost; (ii) commercial general liability insurance with a minimum limit of liability of \$2,500,000 combined single limit for bodily injury or death/property

damage arising out of any one occurrence; and (iii) Workers' Compensation Insurance as required by law. The coverage afforded by Tenant's commercial general liability insurance shall apply to Landlord as an additional insured, but only with respect to Landlord's liability arising out of its interest in the Property.

(b) Tenant shall have the right to self-insure with respect to any of the above insurance requirements.

8. INTERFERENCE.

(a) Where there are existing radio frequency user(s) on the Property, the Landlord will provide Tenant with a list of all existing radio frequency user(s) on the Property to allow Tenant to evaluate the potential for interference. Tenant warrants that its use of the Premises will not interfere with existing radio frequency user(s) on the Property so disclosed by Landlord, as long as the existing radio frequency user(s) operate and continue to operate within their respective frequencies and in accordance with all applicable laws and regulations.

(b) Landlord will not grant, after the date of this Agreement, a lease, license or any other right to any third party for the use of the Property, if such use may in any way adversely affect or interfere with the Communication Facility, the operations of Tenant or the rights of Tenant under this Agreement. Landlord will notify Tenant in writing prior to granting any third party the right to install and operate communications equipment on the Property.

(c) Landlord will not use, nor will Landlord permit its employees, tenants, licensees, invitees or agents to use, any portion of the Property in any way which interferes with the Communication Facility, the operations of Tenant or the rights of Tenant under this Agreement. Landlord will cause such interference to cease within twenty-four (24) hours after receipt of notice of interference from Tenant. In the event any such interference does not cease within the aforementioned cure period then the parties acknowledge that Tenant will suffer irreparable injury, and therefore, Tenant will have the right, in addition to any other rights that it may have at law or in equity, for Landlord's breach of this Agreement, to elect to enjoin such interference or to terminate this Agreement upon notice to Landlord.

9. INDEMNIFICATION.

(a) Tenant agrees to indemnify, defend and hold Landlord harmless from and against any and all injury, loss, damage or liability (or any claims in respect of the foregoing), costs or expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs but excluding real property or personal property taxes) arising directly from the installation, use, maintenance, repair or removal of the Communication Facility or Tenant's breach of any provision of this Agreement, except to the extent attributable to the negligent or intentional act or omission of Landlord, its employees, agents or independent contractors.

(b) Landlord agrees to indemnify, defend and hold Tenant harmless from and against any and all injury, loss, damage or liability (or any claims in respect of the foregoing), costs or expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs but excluding real property or personal property taxes) arising directly from the actions or failure to act of Landlord or its employees or agents, or Landlord's breach of any provision of this Agreement, except to the extent attributable to the negligent or intentional act or omission of Tenant, its employees, agents or independent contractors.

(c) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Agreement, Tenant and Landlord each waives any claims that each may have against the other with respect to consequential, incidental or special damages.

10. WARRANTIES.

(a) Tenant and Landlord each acknowledge and represent that it is duly organized, validly existing and in good standing and has the right, power and authority to enter into this Agreement and bind itself hereto through the party set forth as signatory for the party below.

(b) Landlord represents and warrants that: (i) Landlord solely owns the Property as a legal lot in fee simple, or controls the Property by lease or license; (ii) the Property is not encumbered by any liens, restrictions, mortgages, covenants, conditions, easements, leases, or any other agreements of record or not of record, which would adversely affect Tenant's Permitted Use and enjoyment of the Premises under this

Agreement; (iii) as long as Tenant is not in default then Landlord grants to Tenant sole, actual, quiet and peaceful use, enjoyment and possession of the Premises; (iv) Landlord's execution and performance of this Agreement will not violate any laws, ordinances, covenants or the provisions of any mortgage, lease or other agreement binding on the Landlord; and (v) if the Property is or becomes encumbered by a deed to secure a debt, mortgage or other security interest, Landlord will use best efforts to provide promptly to Tenant a mutually agreeable Subordination, Non-Disturbance and Attornment Agreement.

11. ENVIRONMENTAL.

(a) Landlord represents and warrants that the Property is free of hazardous substances as of the date of this Agreement, and, to the best of Landlord's knowledge, the Property has never been subject to any contamination or hazardous conditions resulting in any environmental investigation, inquiry or remediation. Landlord and Tenant agree that each will be responsible for compliance with any and all environmental and industrial hygiene laws, including any regulations, guidelines, standards, or policies of any governmental authorities regulating or imposing standards of liability or standards of conduct with regard to any environmental or industrial hygiene condition or other matters as may now or at any time hereafter be in effect, that are now or were related to that party's activity conducted in or on the Property.

(b) Landlord and Tenant agree to hold harmless and indemnify the other from, and to assume all duties, responsibilities and liabilities at the sole cost and expense of the indemnifying party for, payment of penalties, sanctions, forfeitures, losses, costs or damages, and for responding to any action, notice, claim, order, summons, citation, directive, litigation, investigation or proceeding which is related to (i) the indemnifying party's failure to comply with any environmental or industrial hygiene law, including without limitation any regulations, guidelines, standards or policies of any governmental authorities regulating or imposing standards of liability or standards of conduct with regard to any environmental or industrial hygiene conditions or matters as may now or hereafter be in effect, or (ii) any environmental or industrial hygiene conditions that arise out of or are in any way related to the condition of the Property and activities conducted by the party thereon, unless the environmental conditions are caused by the other party.

(c) The indemnifications of this Paragraph 11 Environmental specifically include reasonable costs, expenses and fees incurred in connection with any investigation of Property conditions or any clean-up, remediation, removal or restoration work required by any governmental authority. The provisions of this Paragraph 11 Environmental will survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

(d) In the event Tenant becomes aware of any hazardous materials on the Property, or any environmental or industrial hygiene condition or matter relating to the Property that, in Tenant's sole determination, renders the condition of the Premises or Property unsuitable for Tenant's use, or if Tenant believes that the leasing or continued leasing of the Premises would expose Tenant to undue risks of government action, intervention or third-party liability, Tenant will have the right, in addition to any other rights it may have at law or in equity, to terminate the Agreement upon notice to Landlord.

12. ACCESS. At all times throughout the Term of this Agreement, and at no additional charge to Tenant, Tenant and its employees, agents, and subcontractors, will have twenty-four (24) hour per day, seven (7) day per week pedestrian and vehicular access to and over the Property, from an open and improved public road to the Premises, for the installation, maintenance and operation of the Communication Facility and any utilities serving the Premises. Landlord grants to Tenant an easement for such access and Landlord agrees to provide to Tenant such codes, keys and other instruments necessary for such access at no additional cost to Tenant. Upon Tenant's request, Landlord will execute a separate recordable easement evidencing this right. In the event any public utility is unable to use the access or easement provided to Tenant then the Landlord agrees to grant additional access or an easement either to Tenant or to the public utility, for the benefit of Tenant, at no cost to Tenant.

13. REMOVAL/RESTORATION. All portions of the Communication Facility brought onto the Property by Tenant will be and remain Tenant's personal property and, at Tenant's option, may be removed by Tenant at

any time during the Term. Landlord covenants and agrees that no part of the Communication Facility constructed, erected or placed on the Premises by Tenant will become, or be considered as being affixed to or a part of, the Property, it being the specific intention of the Landlord that all improvements of every kind and nature constructed, erected or placed by Tenant on the Premises will be and remain the property of the Tenant and may be removed by Tenant at any time during the Term. Within one hundred twenty (120) days of the termination of this Agreement, Tenant will remove all of Tenant's above-ground improvements and Tenant will, to the extent reasonable, restore the Premises to its condition at the commencement of the Agreement, reasonable wear and tear and loss by casualty or other causes beyond Tenant's control excepted. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Tenant will not be responsible for the replacement of any trees, shrubs or other vegetation, nor will Tenant be required to remove from the Premises or the Property any foundations or underground utilities.

14. MAINTENANCE/UTILITIES.

(a) Tenant will keep and maintain the Premises in good condition, reasonable wear and tear and damage from the elements excepted. Landlord will maintain and repair the Property and access thereto, in good and tenable condition, subject to reasonable wear and tear and damage from the elements.

(b) Tenant will be responsible for paying on a monthly or quarterly basis all utilities charges for electricity, telephone service or any other utility used or consumed by Tenant on the Premises. In the event Tenant cannot secure its own metered electrical supply, Tenant will have the right, at its own cost and expense, to submeter from the Landlord. When submetering is necessary and available, Landlord will read the meter on a monthly or quarterly basis and provide Tenant with the necessary usage data in a timely manner to enable Tenant to compute such utility charges. Failure by Landlord to perform this function will limit utility fee recovery by Landlord to a 12-month period. Landlord will fully cooperate with any utility company requesting an easement over, under and across the Property in order for the utility company to provide service to the Tenant. Landlord will not be responsible for interference with, interruption of or failure, beyond the reasonable control of Landlord, of such services to be furnished or supplied by Landlord.

15. DEFAULT AND RIGHT TO CURE.

(a) The following will be deemed a default by Tenant and a breach of this Agreement: (i) non-payment of Rent if such Rent remains unpaid for more than thirty (30) days after receipt of written notice from Landlord of such failure to pay; or (ii) Tenant's failure to perform any other term or condition under this Agreement within forty-five (45) days after receipt of written notice from Landlord specifying the failure. No such failure, however, will be deemed to exist if Tenant has commenced to cure such default within such period and provided that such efforts are prosecuted to completion with reasonable diligence. Delay in curing a default will be excused if due to causes beyond the reasonable control of Tenant. If Tenant remains in default beyond any applicable cure period, Landlord will have the right to exercise any and all rights and remedies available to it under law and equity.

(b) The following will be deemed a default by Landlord and a breach of this Agreement: Landlord's failure to perform any term, condition or breach of any warranty or covenant under this Agreement within forty-five (45) days after receipt of written notice from Tenant specifying the failure. No such failure, however, will be deemed to exist if Landlord has commenced to cure the default within such period and provided such efforts are prosecuted to completion with reasonable diligence. Delay in curing a default will be excused if due to causes beyond the reasonable control of Landlord. If Landlord remains in default beyond any applicable cure period, Tenant will have the right to exercise any and all rights available to it under law and equity, including the right to cure Landlord's default and to deduct the costs of such cure from any monies due to Landlord from Tenant.

16. ASSIGNMENT/SUBLEASE. Tenant will have the right to assign this Agreement or sublease the Premises and its rights herein, in whole or in part, without Landlord's consent. Upon notification to Landlord of

such assignment, Tenant will be relieved of all future performance, liabilities and obligations under this Agreement.

17. NOTICES. All notices, requests, demands and communications hereunder will be given by first class certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, or by a nationally recognized overnight courier, postage prepaid, to be effective when properly sent and received, refused or returned undelivered. Notices will be addressed to the parties as follows:

Either party hereto may change the place for the giving of notice to it by thirty (30) days prior written notice to the other as provided herein.

18. SEVERABILITY. If any term or condition of this Agreement is found unenforceable, the remaining terms and conditions will remain binding upon the parties as though said unenforceable provision were not contained herein. However, if the invalid, illegal or unenforceable provision materially affects this Agreement then the Agreement may be terminated by either party on ten (10) business days prior written notice to the other party hereto.

19. CONDEMNATION. In the event Landlord receives notification of any condemnation proceedings affecting the Property, Landlord will provide notice of the proceeding to Tenant within forty-eight (48) hours. If a condemning authority takes all of the Property, or a portion sufficient, in Tenant's sole determination, to render the Premises unsuitable for Tenant, this Agreement will terminate as of the date the title vests in the condemning authority. The parties will each be entitled to pursue their own separate awards in the condemnation proceeds, which for Tenant will include, where applicable, the value of its Communication Facility, moving expenses, prepaid Rent, and business dislocation expenses, provided that any award to Tenant will not diminish Landlord's recovery. Tenant will be entitled to reimbursement for any prepaid Rent on a prorata basis.

20. CASUALTY. Landlord will provide notice to Tenant of any casualty affecting the Property within forty-eight (48) hours of the casualty. If any part of the Communication Facility or Property is damaged by fire or other casualty so as to render the Premises unsuitable, in Tenant's sole determination, then Tenant may terminate this Agreement by providing written notice to the Landlord, which termination will be effective as of the date of such damage or destruction. Upon such termination, Tenant will be entitled to collect all insurance

proceeds payable to Tenant on account thereof and to be reimbursed for any prepaid Rent on a prorata basis. If notice of termination is given, or if Landlord or Tenant undertake to rebuild the Communications Facility, Landlord agrees to use its reasonable efforts to permit Tenant to place temporary transmission and reception facilities on the Property at no additional Rent until such time as Tenant is able to secure a replacement transmission location or the reconstruction of the Communication Facility is completed.

21. WAIVER OF LANDLORD'S LIENS. Landlord waives any and all lien rights it may have, statutory or otherwise, concerning the Communication Facility or any portion thereof. The Communication Facility shall be deemed personal property for purposes of this Agreement, regardless of whether any portion is deemed real or personal property under applicable law, and Landlord consents to Tenant's right to remove all or any portion of the Communication Facility from time to time in Tenant's sole discretion and without Landlord's consent.

22. TAXES. Landlord shall be responsible for payment of all ad valorem taxes levied upon the lands, improvements and other property of Landlord. Tenant shall be responsible for all taxes levied upon Tenant's leasehold improvements (including Tenant's equipment building and tower) on the Leased Property. Landlord shall provide Tenant with copies of all assessment notices on or including the Leased Property immediately upon receipt, but in no event less than three (3) business days after receipt by Landlord. If Landlord fails to provide such notice within such time frame, Landlord shall be responsible for all increases in taxes for the year covered by the assessment. Tenant shall have the right to contest, in good faith, the validity or the amount of any tax or assessment levied against the Leased Property by such appellate or other proceedings as may be appropriate in the jurisdiction, and may defer payment of such obligations, pay same under protest, or take such other steps as Tenant may deem appropriate. This right shall include the ability to institute any legal, regulatory or informal action in the name of Landlord, Tenant, or both, with respect to the valuation of the Leased Property. Landlord shall cooperate in the institution and prosecution of any such proceedings and will execute any documents required therefore. The expense of any such proceedings shall be borne by Tenant and any refunds or rebates secured as a result of Tenant's action shall belong to Tenant.

23. SALE OF PROPERTY. If Landlord, at any time during the Term of this Agreement, decides to sell, subdivide or rezone any of the Premises, all or any part of the Property or Surrounding Property, to a purchaser other than Tenant, Landlord shall promptly notify Tenant in writing, and such sale, subdivision or rezoning shall be subject to this Agreement and Tenant's rights hereunder. Landlord agrees not to sell, lease or use any areas of the Property or Surrounding Property for the installation, operation or maintenance of other wireless communications facilities if such installation, operation or maintenance would interfere with Tenant's Permitted Use or communications equipment as determined by radio propagation tests performed by Tenant in its sole discretion, any such testing to be at the expense of Landlord or Landlord's prospective purchaser, and not Tenant. If the radio frequency propagation tests demonstrate levels of interference unacceptable to Tenant, Landlord shall be prohibited from selling, leasing or using any areas of the Property or the Surrounding Property for purposes of any installation, operation or maintenance of any other wireless communications facility or equipment. Landlord shall not be prohibited from the selling, leasing or use of any of the Property or the Surrounding Property for non-wireless communication use. In the event the Property is transferred, the new landlord shall have a duty at the time of such transfer to provide Tenant with a completed IRS Form W-9, or its equivalent, and other related paper work to effect a transfer in Rent to the new landlord. The provisions of this Paragraph 23 shall in no way limit or impair the obligations of Landlord under Paragraph 8 above.

24. MISCELLANEOUS.

(a) **Amendment/Waiver.** This Agreement cannot be amended, modified or revised unless done in writing and signed by an authorized agent of the Landlord and an authorized agent of the Tenant. No provision may be waived except in a writing signed by both parties.

(b) **Memorandum/Short Form Lease.** Either party will, at any time upon fifteen (15) business days prior written notice from the other, execute, acknowledge and deliver to the other a recordable

Memorandum or Short Form of Lease. Either party may record this Memorandum or Short Form of Lease at any time, in its absolute discretion.

(c) **Bind and Benefit.** The terms and conditions contained in this Agreement will run with the Property and bind and inure to the benefit of the parties, their respective heirs, executors, administrators, successors and assigns.

(d) **Entire Agreement.** This Agreement and the exhibits attached hereto, all being a part hereof, constitute the entire agreement of the parties hereto and will supersede all prior offers, negotiations and agreements with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement.

(e) **Governing Law.** This Agreement will be governed by the laws of the state in which the Premises are located, without regard to conflicts of law.

(f) **Interpretation.** Unless otherwise specified, the following rules of construction and interpretation apply: (i) captions are for convenience and reference only and in no way define or limit the construction of the terms and conditions hereof; (ii) use of the term "including" will be interpreted to mean "including but not limited to"; (iii) whenever a party's consent is required under this Agreement, except as otherwise stated in the Agreement or as same may be duplicative, such consent will not be unreasonably withheld, conditioned or delayed; (iv) exhibits are an integral part of the Agreement and are incorporated by reference into this Agreement; (v) use of the terms "termination" or "expiration" are interchangeable; and (vi) reference to a default will take into consideration any applicable notice, grace and cure periods.

(g) **Estoppel.** Either party will, at any time upon twenty (20) business days prior written notice from the other, execute, acknowledge and deliver to the other a statement in writing (i) certifying that this Agreement is unmodified and in full force and effect (or, if modified, stating the nature of such modification and certifying this Agreement, as so modified, is in full force and effect) and the date to which the Rent and other charges are paid in advance, if any, and (ii) acknowledging that there are not, to such party's knowledge, any uncured defaults on the part of the other party hereunder, or specifying such defaults if any are claimed. Any such statement may be conclusively relied upon by any prospective purchaser or encumbrancer of the Premises. The requested party's failure to deliver such a statement within such time will be conclusively relied upon by the requesting party that (i) this Agreement is in full force and effect, without modification except as may be properly represented by the requesting party, (ii) there are no uncured defaults in either party's performance, and (iii) no more than one month's Rent has been paid in advance.

(h) **No Electronic Signature/No Option.** The submission of this Agreement to any party for examination or consideration does not constitute an offer, reservation of or option for the Premises based on the terms set forth herein. This Agreement will become effective as a binding Agreement only upon the handwritten legal execution, acknowledgment and delivery hereof by Landlord and Tenant.

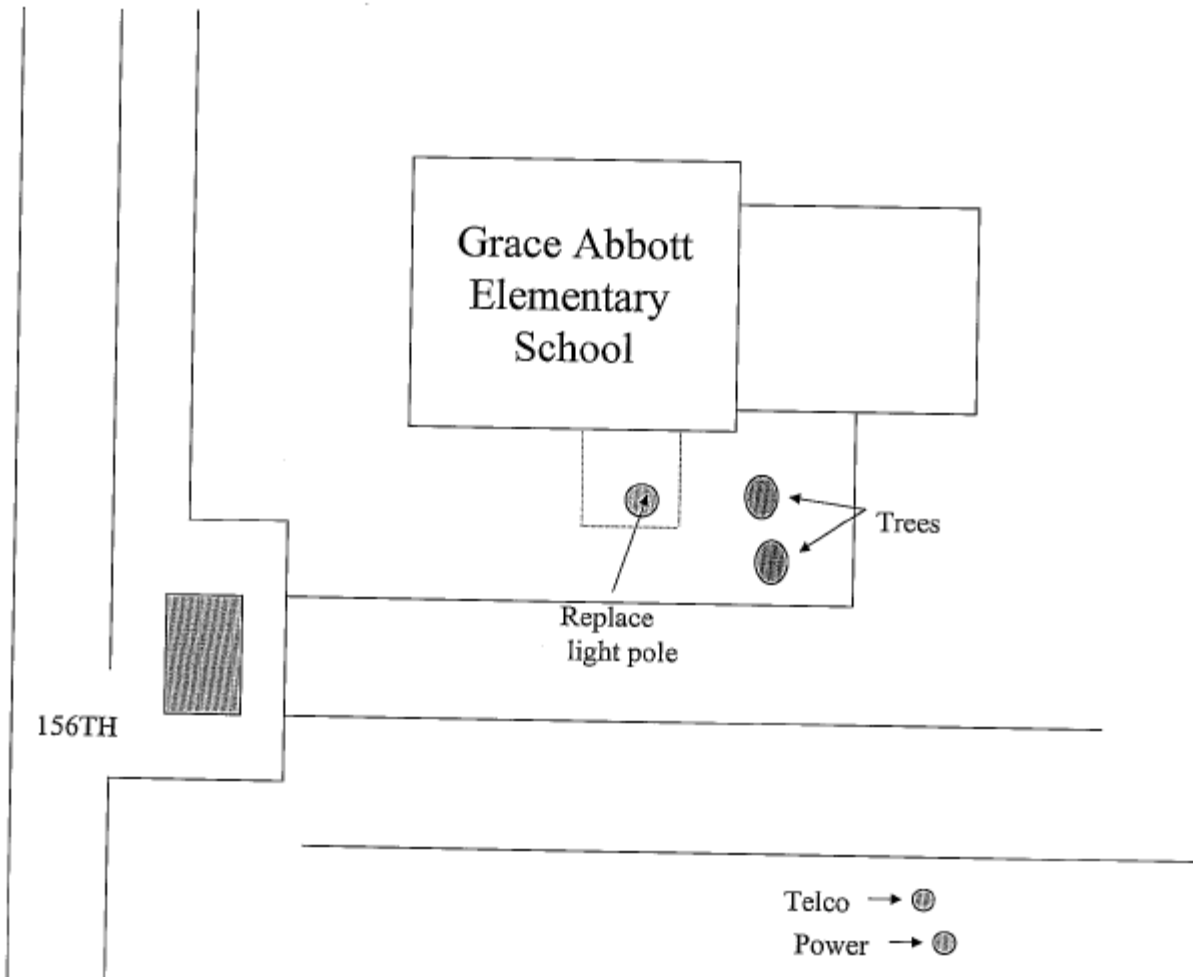

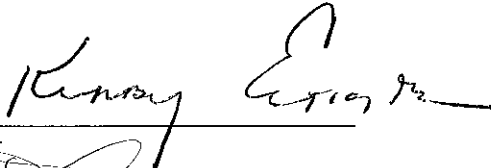

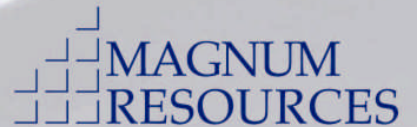

Executive Summary

Administrative Overview

- Continuation of weekly meetings with the Bond Committee consisting of Ken Fossen, Mark Feldhausen, Ed Rockwell, Kim Thompson, Bob Snowden, Don Mohlman, Randy Schroeder, and Ron Hager.
- Work-in-progress for the Master Control Budget for interface between MPS accounting and Constructware continues.

Project(s) Overview

- **Buell Stadium** – Warranty work has been completed on the field turf primarily consisting of glue-down at game markings.
- **South High School: Phase 1** – Complete
- **South High School: Phase 2** – *Contract Documents* have been presented by the DLR Group to the Bond Committee and will be presented, as a separate agenda item, to the School Board on November 21, 2005. Mechanical HVAC renovation has been designed for the 300/400 wing as part of the Base Bid construction. The bond fund will be supplemented from the building fund in the amount of \$1,650,000 for construction (compared to \$2,025,000 previously estimated prior to the bond issue). Bids are anticipated to be received January 24, 2006.
- **North High School** – *Contract Documents* are in progress with an anticipated bid date of February 7, 2005.
- **West High School** – *Contract Documents* are in progress with an anticipated bid date of February 21, 2005.

- **Elementary #24** – Site pre-grading is nearly complete. Public improvements have been awarded to Heimes Corporation. Commencement of public improvements are pending approval of the final plat by the City Council. General Construction has been awarded to ConStruct Inc.
- **Elementary #25** – Reeder Elementary was toured by DLR Group for a general background of specific functional requirements desired by MPS. Fire Ridge Elementary (Elkhorn) was then toured by the MPS planning committee and technical staff. Several design meetings have taken place and DLR Group is in the process of making some minor modifications to the plans as a result of the meetings.
- **Ackerman Elementary** – Progress is currently in the *Schematic Design* phase. A preliminary report has been presented to the School Board.

Budget Overview

- Eighteen percent (18%) of the bond issue projects have been awarded under budget.

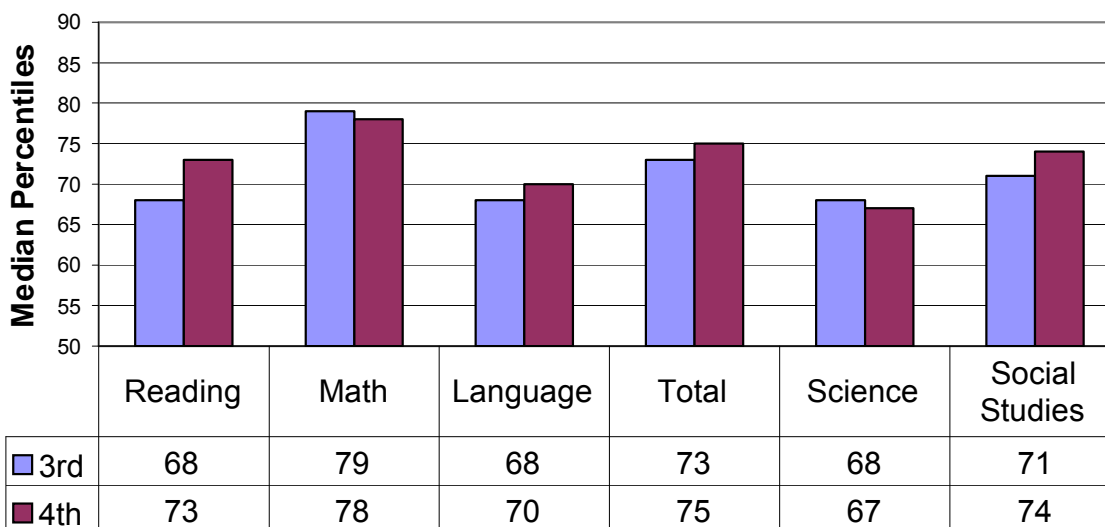

Elementary *TerraNova* Results

This is the sixth year that Millard Public Schools has administered the *TerraNova* achievement test, published by CTB-McGraw Hill. Elementary schools test in the fall (starting in late September), assessing all students in the 3rd and 4th grades.

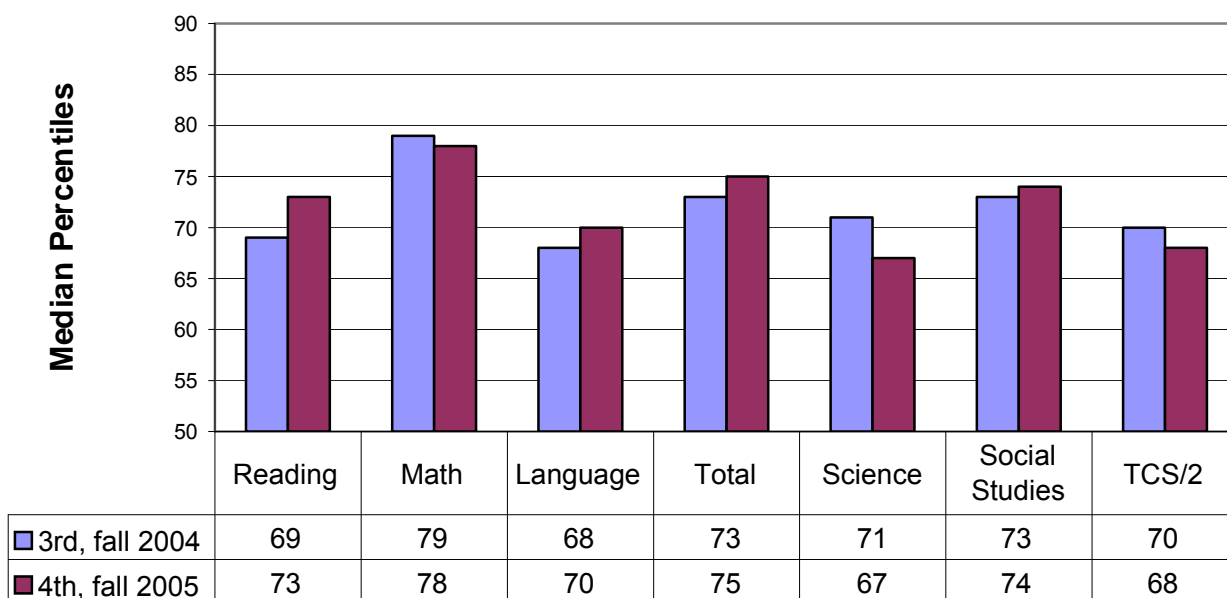
The following graph shows the overall results for each of the major subtests. The national percentile ranks range from the 68th to the 79th percentiles. Third grade language scores were at the 68th percentile and 3rd grade math scores were at the 79th percentile rank (78th percentile in 4th grade).

***TerraNova* Results, Fall 2005**



The next graph shows a comparison of last year's third grade data with this fall's 4th grade scores, districtwide. This is the same cohort of students (other than for differences due to mobility, this is the same group of students across 2 academic years). Results showed that these students made gains in reading (+4 points), language (+2 points), total (+2 points), and social studies (+1 point). Math declined by 1 point; science declined by 4 points.

**Comparison of Prior (3rd grade) *TerraNova*
and Current (4th grade) *TerraNova***



The table on the next 3 pages shows two years' data for individual buildings. The diagonal arrow draws attention to the cohort results for each school. Wherever the 4th grade scores for this fall are higher than the 3rd grade scores from last fall, those students showed more growth than would have been predicted by national norms.

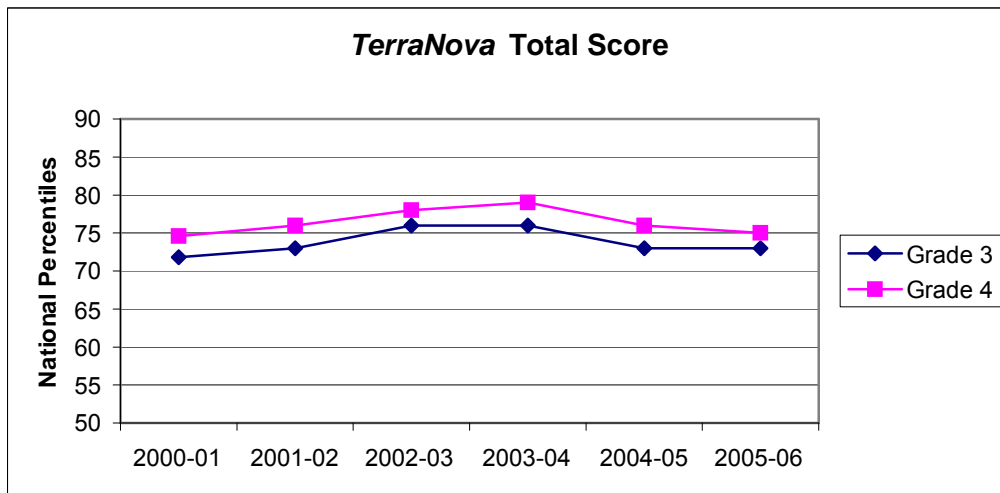

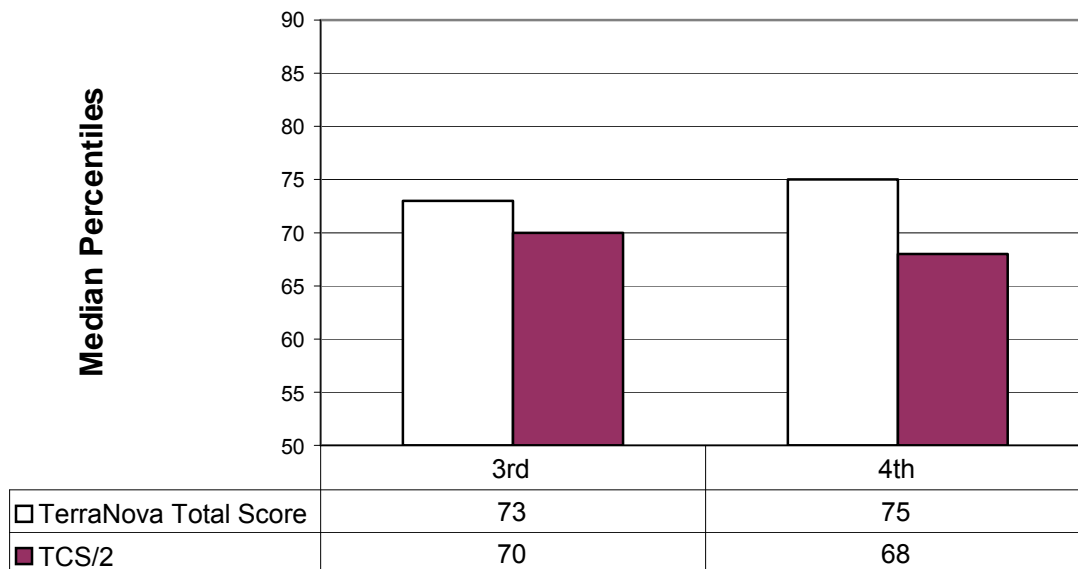

The following chart shows the total score trend over the six years we have been using the *TerraNova*.



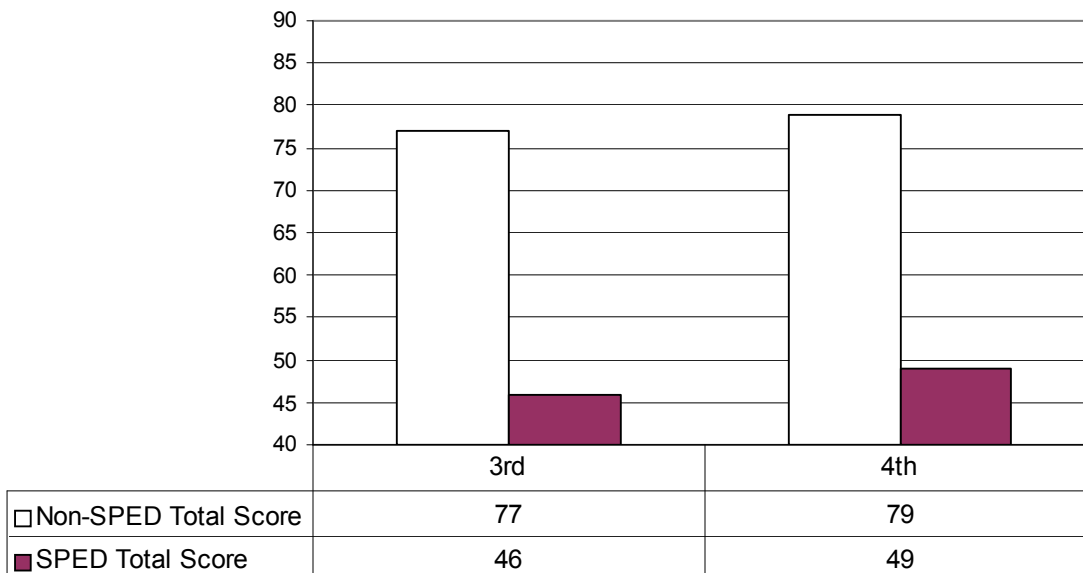
The following chart compares the achievement results with the Test of Cognitive Skills, a group-administered academic aptitude test. In both third and fourth grade, the achievement scores are higher than the TCS/2 percentiles.

The next chart presents special education scores, disaggregated within the districtwide data, and building-by-building. While the special education scores are generally lower, they range as high as the 75th to the 89th percentile ranks at some buildings. The Special Education scores for the district as a whole are near the national norm of the 50th percentile (at the 46th and 49th percentiles nationally).

The last chart is a measure of the percent of Millard students who scored at or above the 75th percentile. By the national norming distributions, one would expect 25% of the students to be in the top quartile. However, in the Millard data for the last three years, the percentage in the top quartile has ranged from 48% to 55.5%. The percentages in this top quartile were higher in 2003-04 than in 2004-05 and 2005-06.

Recommendations: At the high school level, for the second year in a row, all students who had attained the 225 credits were able to pass all the ELO assessments. Seven students made use of the “demonstration of proficiency” option and 22 were given lowered cutscores on the recommendation of the IEP team.

Reteaching Program Evaluation, 2004-2005

Introduction/Background

This report is intended to provide descriptive information on the reteaching program implementation in the 2004-2005 school year. Each year schools are given an allocation of funds, which they use for working with students to ensure that all have achieved the performance standards in reading, math, writing, science, and social studies. For the 2004-2005 school year, those funds amounted to approximately \$427,300 districtwide.

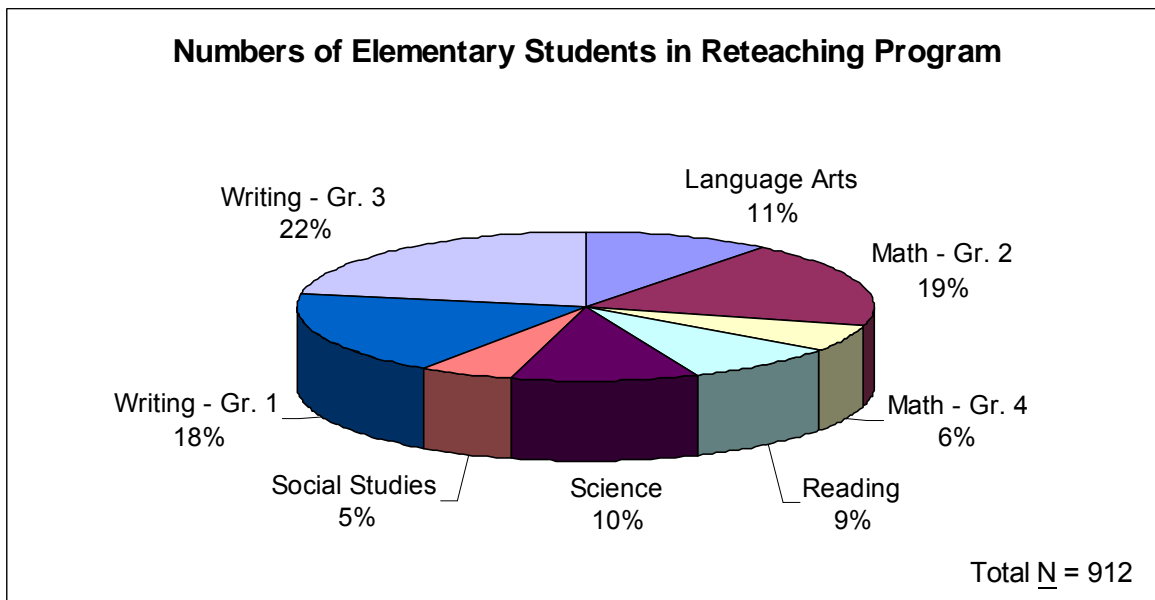
Schools then submit brief plans describing how they propose to expend the funds to help students reach the designated cutscores on the assessments. Options include in-class assistance, extension of the school day, extending the school year into the summer, individual tutoring, having contracted teachers or paraprofessionals work with students, lab/pullout instruction, etc. In many cases, the interventions were combinations of these different modes.

Because the effects of the interventions are confounded with school and teacher effects, and because many students receive more than one kind of intervention, at this time it does not seem possible to determine the efficacy of particular remediation models. In the future, we may want to conduct case studies of those students who are successful (as well as those who are not successful), following the remediation. The current evaluation is planned to focus on describing the programs, along with presenting information on the expenditures related to the building remediation plans.

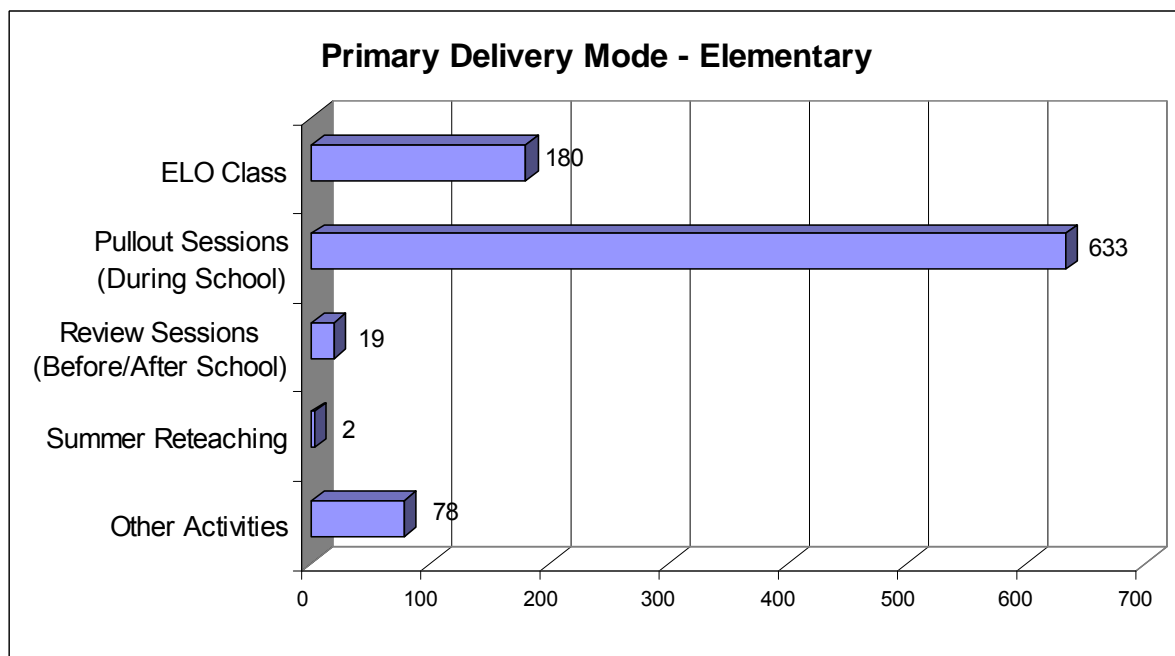
During the 2004-2005 school year, a web-enabled system of reporting on remediation was used. This system decreases the chance of students going without reports, because we are able to pre-load all students not achieving the cutscore into the database. The person responsible for tracking the reteaching program at each building can then call up each student and click on the boxes representing the kind of reteaching intervention the student received. At the end of the year, the buildings are able to run reports showing any students who did not have data entered. The definitions of the web-based data entry system codes are in the appendix.

Elementary

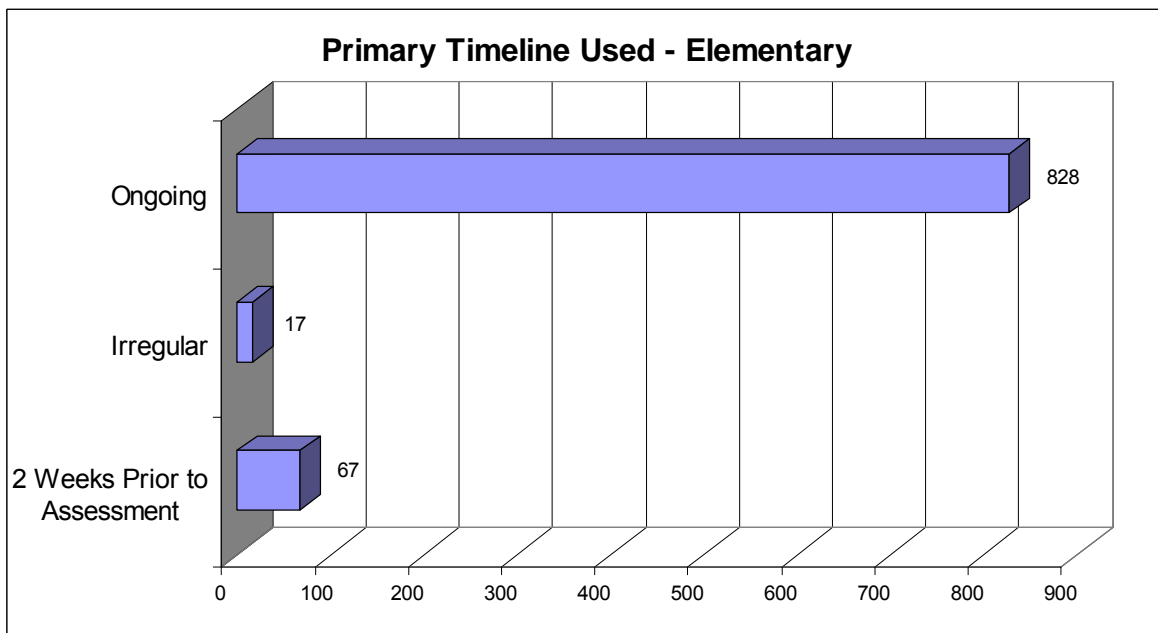

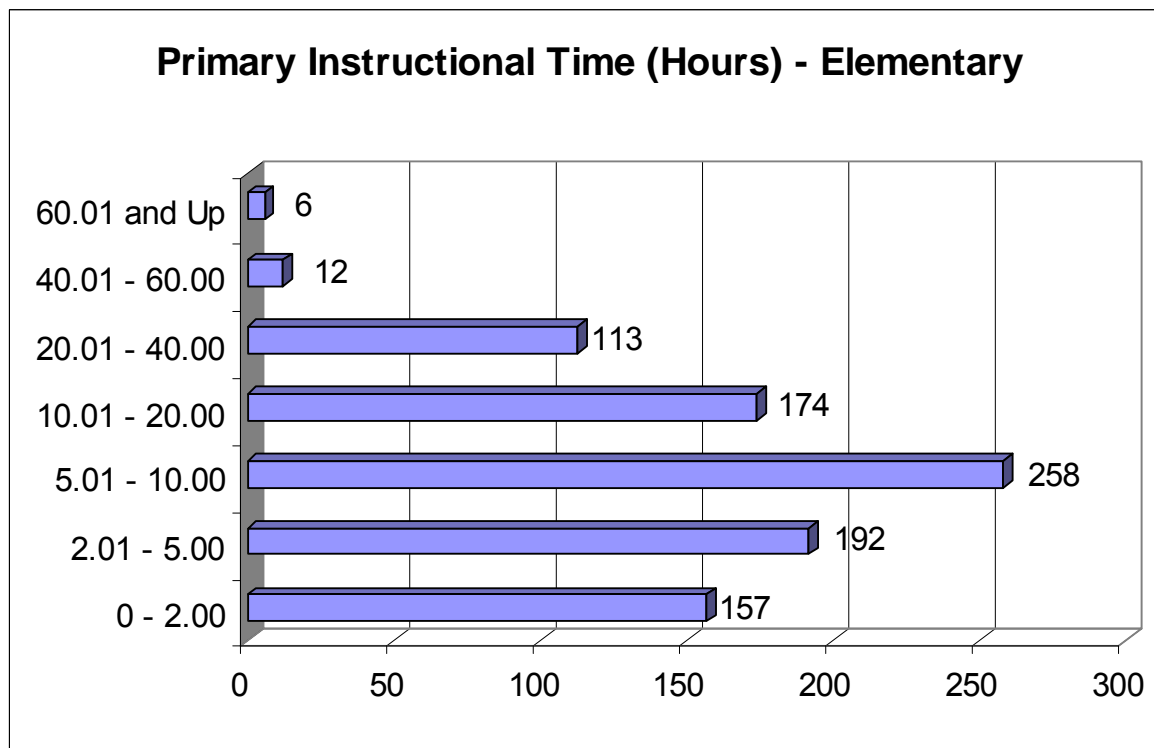
The next graph shows the delivery mode for elementary reteaching. Pullout sessions during the school day was the model most commonly used for reteaching at the elementary level.



The following graph displays the timeline used for remedial instruction. The majority of elementary reteaching was classified as “ongoing” throughout the school year.

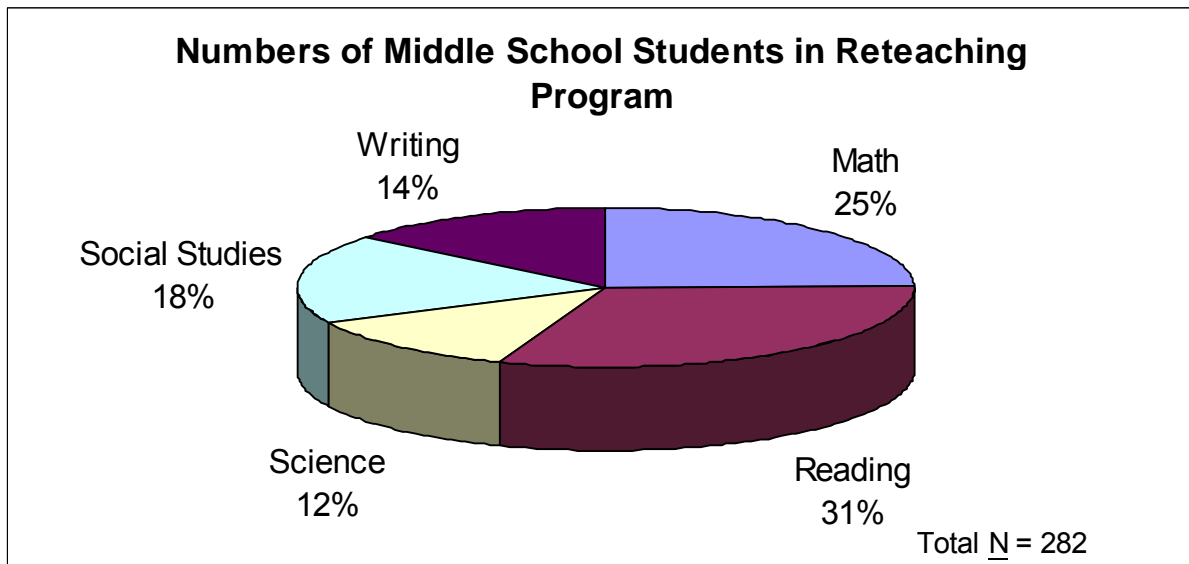

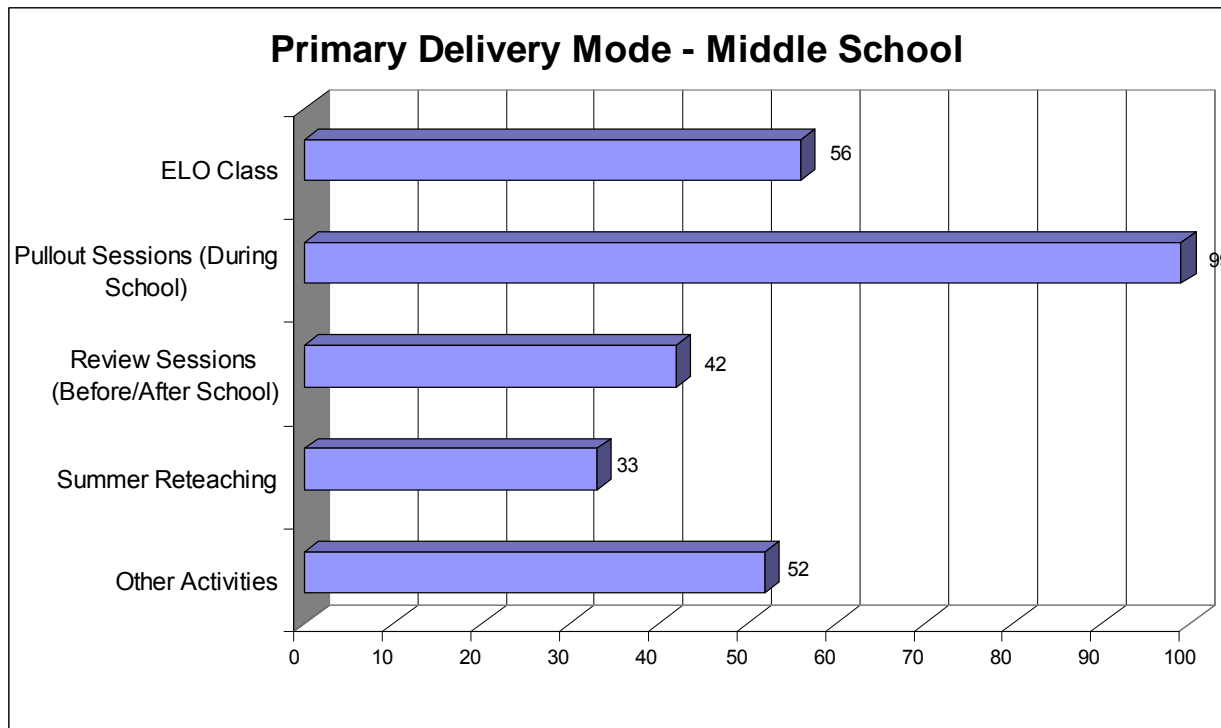


Middle School

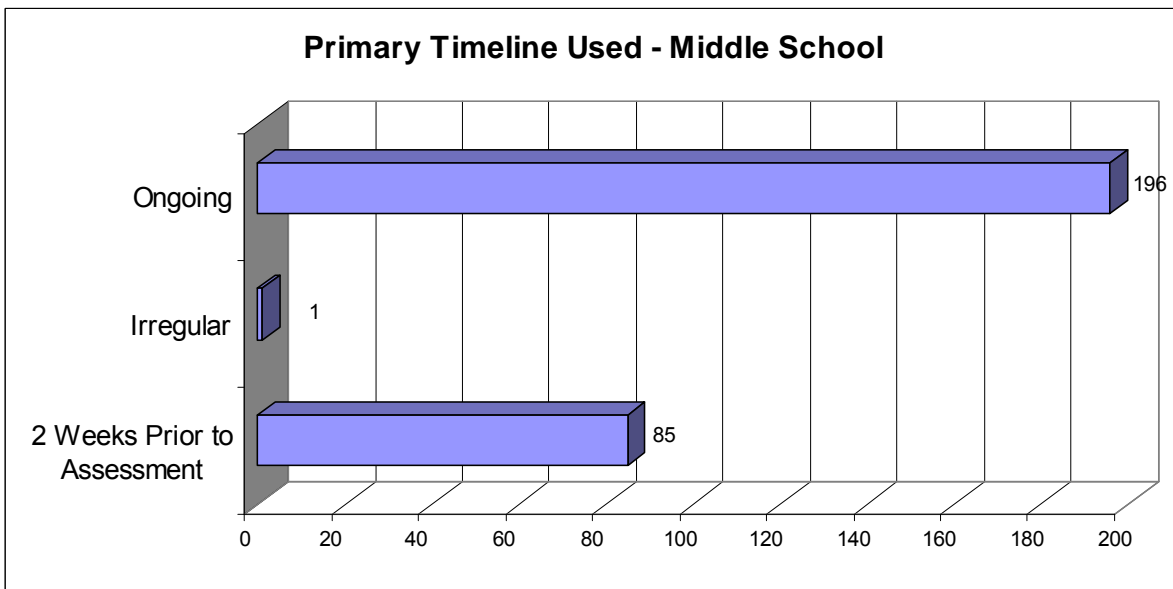
The next 4 graphs summarize reteaching activity at the middle level for 2004-2005. The first graph shows the numbers of students in the reteaching program by content area.



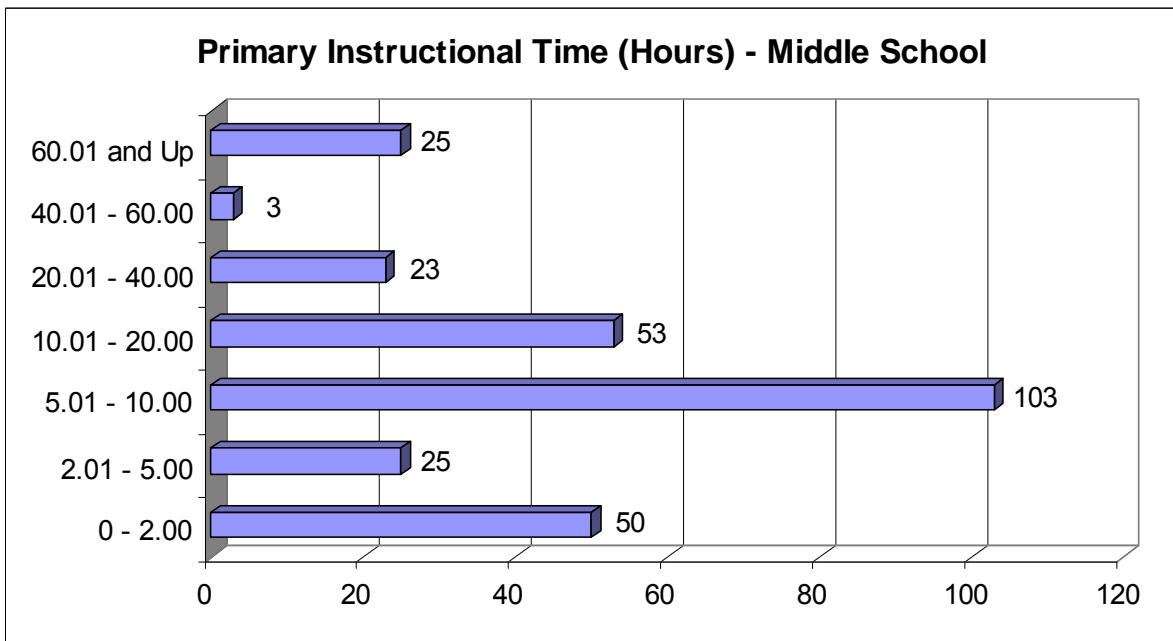
Middle school delivery mode data show in-school pullout sessions being the primary delivery mode for about 1/3 of the students receiving reteaching services. ELO classes and “other activities” each accounted for about 20% of the students.



The following graph displays the primary timeline used for remedial instruction. Most reteaching at the middle level was ongoing throughout the school year.

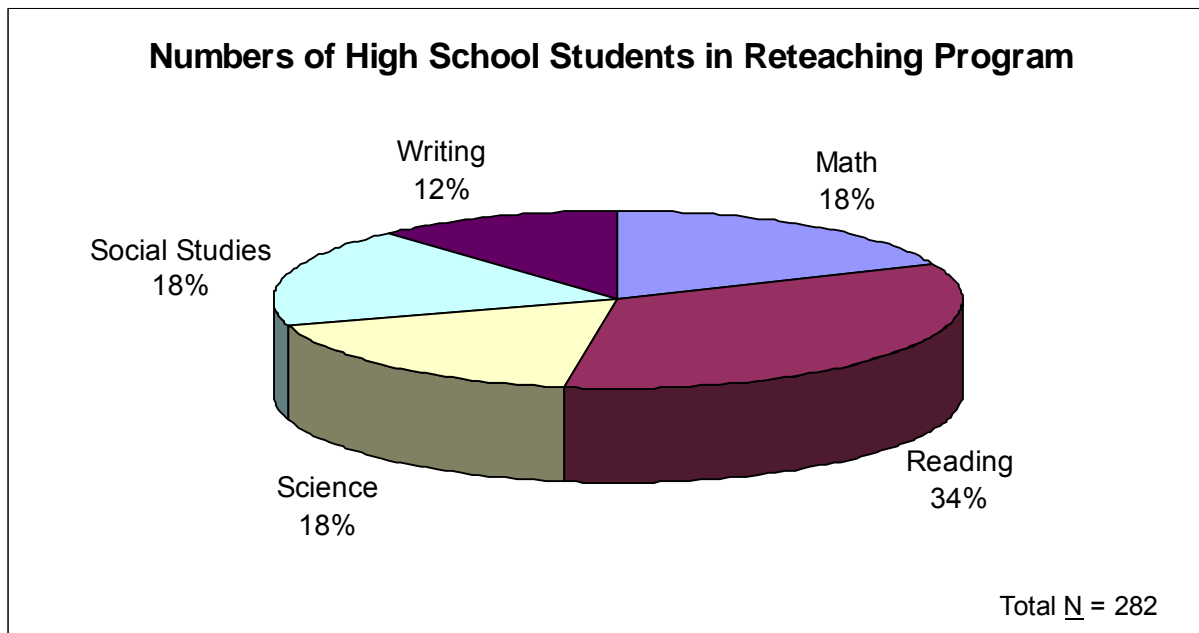


The fourth and final graph for the middle level shows reteaching instruction time in hours. More than 1/3 of the students received between 5.01 and 10.00 hours of remediation, while about 1/4 of the students received 5 hours of remediation or less. About 9% of the students received more than 60 hours of remedial instruction.

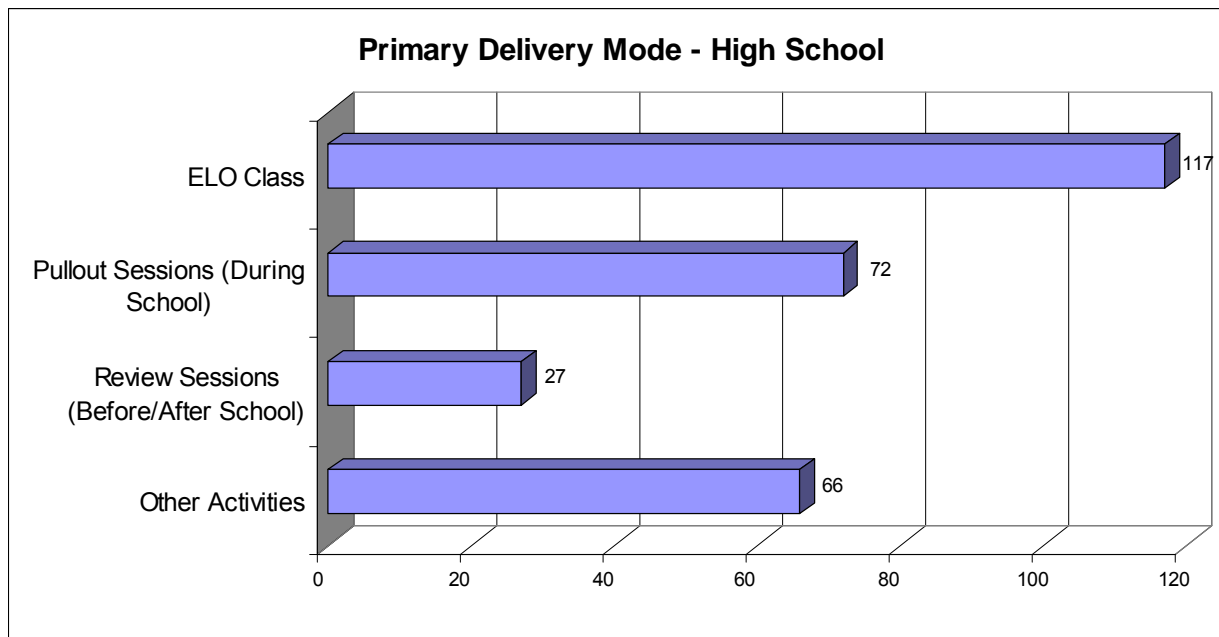


High School

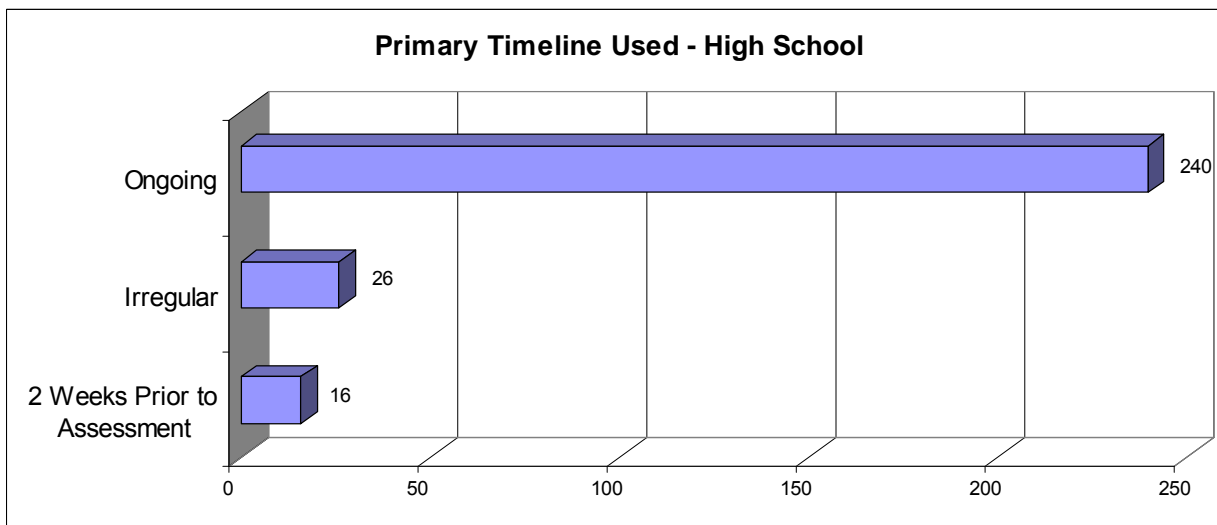
The next 4 graphs summarize reteaching activity at the high school level for 2004-2005. The following graph shows the numbers of students in the reteaching program by content area.



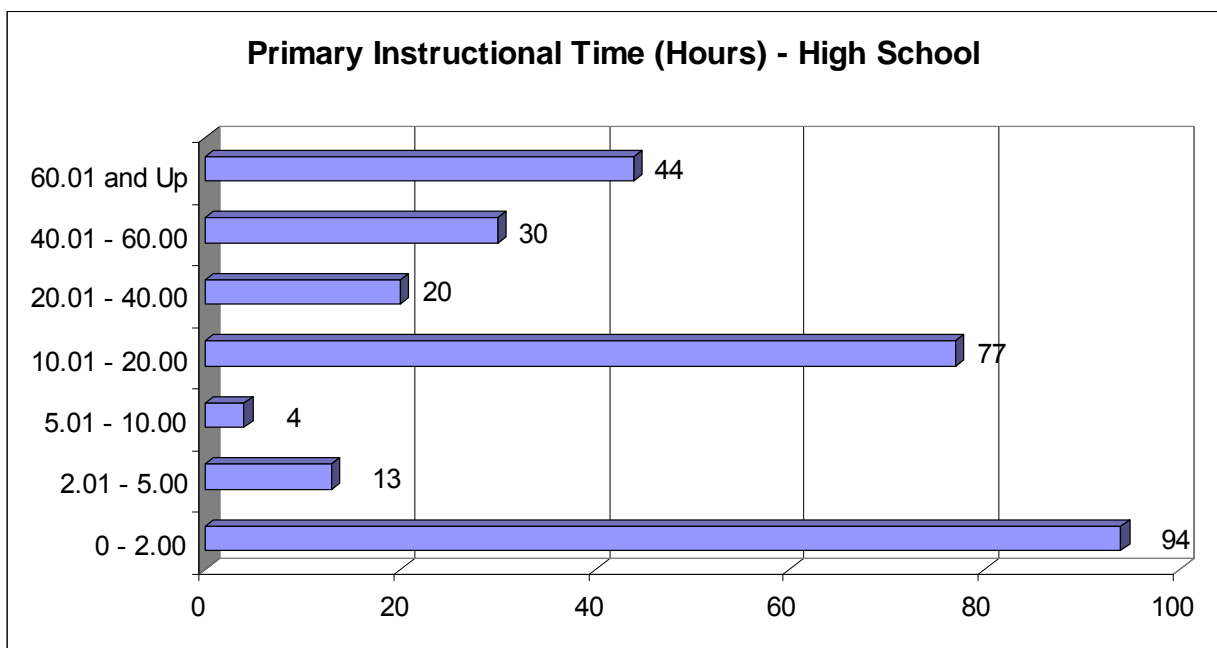
High school delivery mode data show over 40% of students received remedial instruction in an ELO class. Pullout sessions during the school day and “other activities” each accounted for about 1/4 of the students.



Results for the primary timeline used show about 85% of high school reteaching was ongoing throughout the year.



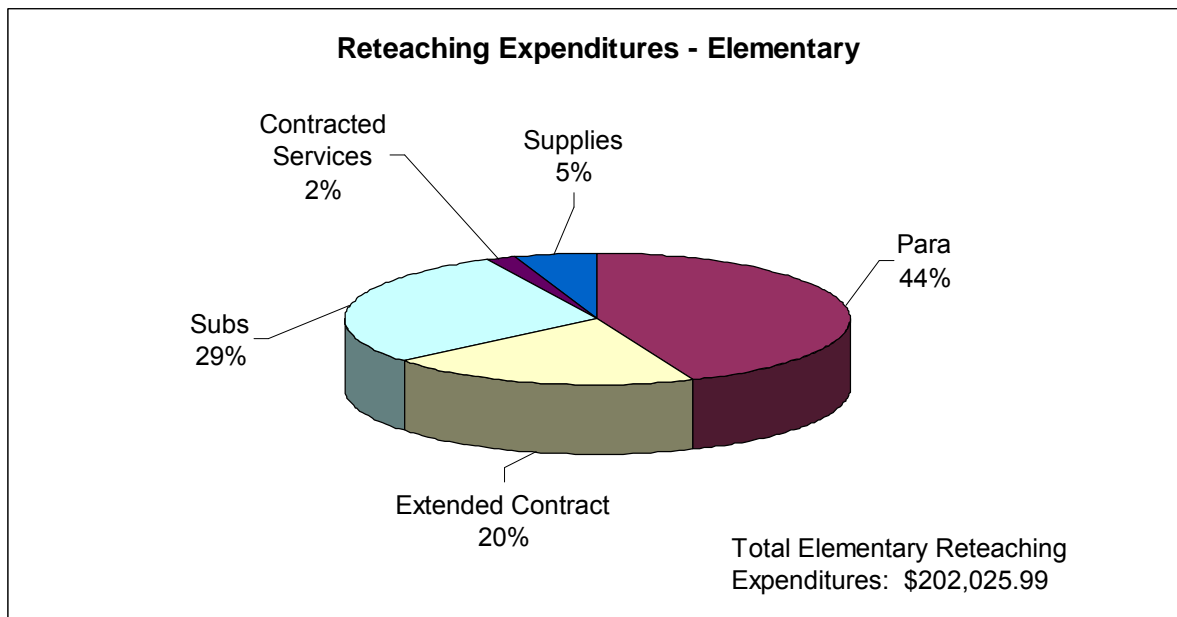
The last graph for high school shows reteaching instruction time in hours. One-third of students received 2 hours or less of remedial instruction, 27% of students received 10.01 to 20.00 hours of remediation, and over 26% of high school students were reported as receiving more than 40 hours of remediation.



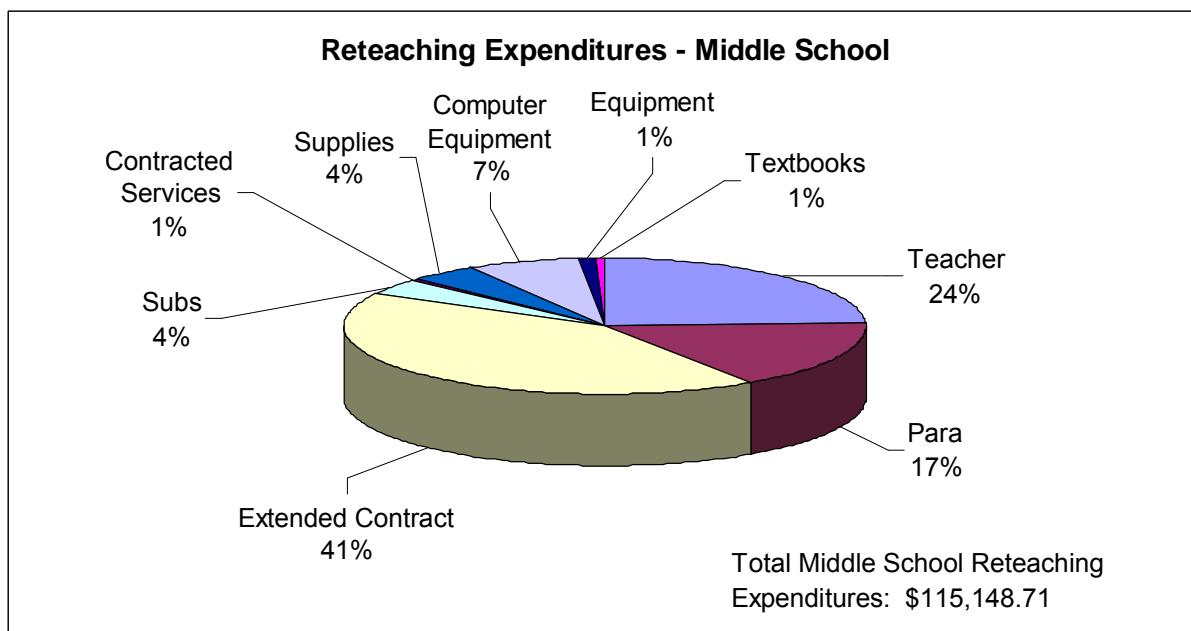
Expenditures

In the 2004-2005 school year, approximately \$483,000 was allocated for the reteaching program. The following graphs show that the sum of the actual expenditures totaled \$427,303.

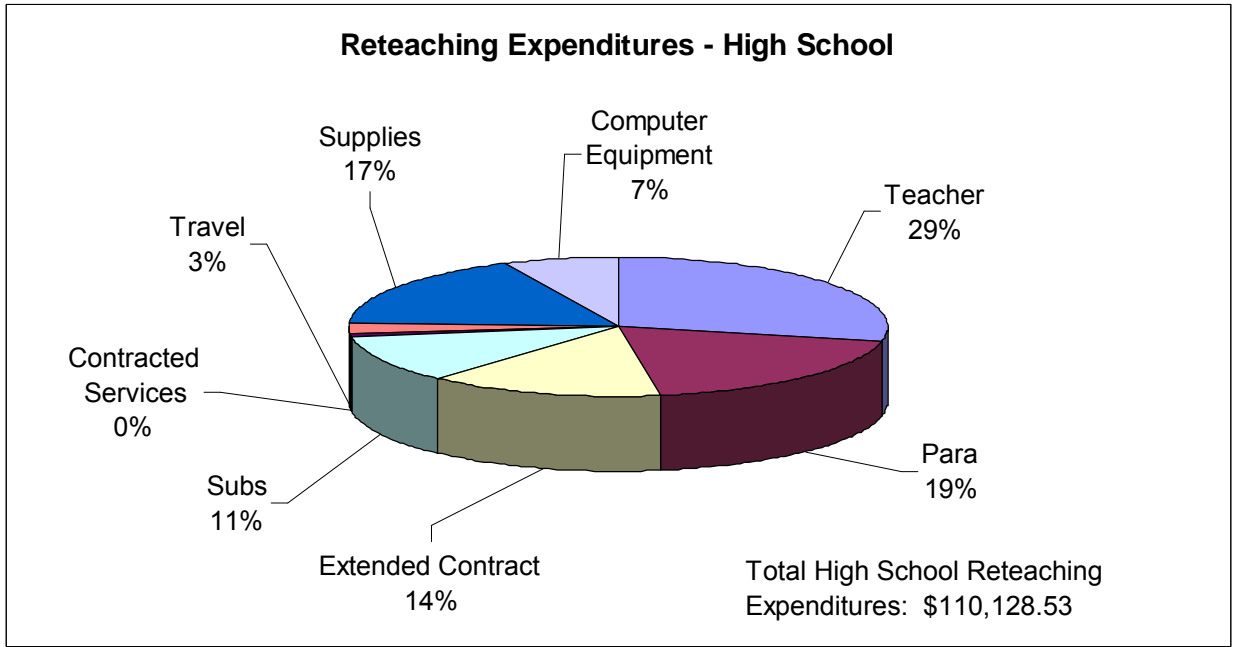
About 73% of the funds for elementary programs went to paraprofessionals and substitute teachers.



At the middle level, the largest expenditure categories were extended contracts and teacher salaries, making up 65% of the total.



At the high school level, the two largest categories of expenditures were teachers and paras, amounting to 48% of the total.



Reteaching Outcomes

During 2004-05, a number of new assessments were piloted. Those “pilot” exams are not part of this analysis, although they will be in future years. The following table reflects the elementary and middle school retesting (following reteaching) which was not dependent on those new tests.

Seniors: All of the 1,473 seniors who had sufficient credits for graduation also were able to demonstrate mastery of all the ELO assessments (7 were successful via the “demonstration of proficiency” method). This is the second graduating class where remediation has been successful in getting all students to the defined competence levels in writing, reading, math, science, and social studies.

Definitions of Program Codes for Tracking Reteaching Interventions

I.L.P. – Definitions, Additional Information

Student and Testing Information:

NOTE: When considering the addition of Individual Plans, you should do so only if there were multiple reteaching activities employed, each of which exceeded 20% of all remediation. For example, if a student received lab/pullout instruction during the school day for a whole semester, which accounted for 90% of remediation, then went to one or two before/after school sessions, which accounted for the remaining 10% of remediation, the “Delivery Mode for Reteaching Actions” should be recorded as “In lab or pullout setting during the school day” only.

Reteaching Actions 2004-2005:

Activities

These represent general categories for the way that the student engaged in reteaching.

- **“ELO Class”** – This is a class providing reteaching opportunities to students who have not met cut scores in ELO assessments. High school students may earn 5 credits for this class.
- **“Review Sessions (not during school)”** – As the label implies, this should be checked if the student is engaged in reteaching activities outside of normal school hours.
- **“Pullout Sessions (during school)”** – This should be checked if the student is removed from the regular classroom for reteaching during normal school hours.
- **“Summer Reteaching”** – This should be checked only if the student engages in reteaching during summer months.
- **“Other Activities”** – These would include any reteaching activities that would be unique to a particular building.

Timeline

- **“Ongoing”** – This should be checked if the student engages in reteaching on a regular basis, for example, this could be a pullout during their study hall one day a week for six weeks, or the student may attend review sessions outside of the school day on Thursdays for nine weeks. The key here is the scheduled regularity of reteaching. It is happening on a regular, consistent basis over a designated period of time.
- **“Irregular”** – This should be checked if there was not a regular, extended schedule for a student to engage in reteaching activities. Instead, reteaching occurred when either the student or instructional provider were available. An example of this would be that a student missed the cut score on the 4th grade Math assessment by 2 points when they took it in the spring of 2003. Since the student came close to meeting the cut score, and they were not scheduled to retake the assessment until Spring of 2004, no formal reteaching schedule was established, rather, it was understood that the reteaching would be targeted to the missed items sometime immediately prior to the retake by the classroom teacher. The key is that no reteaching schedule was established.
- **“2 wks prior to assessments”** – As the name implies, this should be checked if all reteaching occurs within two weeks prior to the date the student retakes the assessment.

Instructor

- ***“Teacher Reg. Assignment”*** – This should be selected if, as the name indicates, the student’s regular classroom teacher or subject area teacher was the person to provide reteaching. This should only be checked if the reteaching offered was readily identifiable as being separate from regular classroom instruction. This item should **not** be checked if reteaching was so integrated as to be indistinguishable from regular classroom instruction.
- ***“Teacher Extra Duty”*** – This should be selected if certified Millard Public Schools staff are facilitating reteaching outside of their regular contracted hours.
- ***“Substitute”*** – This should be checked only if the substitute was the person who actually delivered the reteaching activities. There are situations where a substitute is brought into a classroom to enable the regular teacher to work with designated students on reteaching activities. If that was how reteaching was delivered, then the regular classroom teacher would be the person designated as the person delivering reteaching activities as long as they were distinguishable from regular instruction.
- ***“Para-professional”*** – In those situations where a person classified as a para-professional delivered reteaching, either in the student’s regular classroom or in a pullout setting, then this item should be checked.
- ***“Contracted certified teacher”*** – If a certified teacher is hired specifically to provide reteaching, exclusively or in combination with other duties, then this item should be checked.

Hours Attend/Planned

- The figure entered in this box should indicate the amount of time (in hours) that the student was engaged in reteaching activities. If the student engaged in reteaching activities in the regular classroom, ***then only the activities that were readily distinguishable from regular classroom instruction should be counted.*** If reteaching is so integrated into regular instruction that the total amount of instructional time spent in a class or discipline has to be counted, then that figure should not be entered here.

Diploma Paths Announced for Classes of 2008 and Beyond

A world-class school district facilitates student goal-setting. Therefore, beginning with the Class of 2008, high school students in the Millard Public Schools will choose a diploma path to pursue during their high school years. In addition to the Regular Diploma, there are two categories of diplomas that students may choose. One diploma path, the Liberal Arts path, specifically addresses the needs of students who plan to earn a baccalaureate degree after graduation. The second diploma path, the Specialty path, focuses on the needs of students who plan to specialize in a particular career field. In the Specialty areas students must complete an approved sequence of study in a career field. Both paths include incentive categories by which students can achieve a more rigorous diploma by taking more classes and achieving a higher GPA. These incentive categories are labeled "Commended" and "Distinguished." The minimum requirements for the diploma paths and categories are outlined below:

Specialty Areas for 06-07 include Industrial Technology, Family and Consumer Science, Fine and Performing Arts, Business, Technology, Health Occupations. Students may choose to change diploma paths and/or incentive categories during their high school years. These diploma paths function as one tool to help students set goals challenging themselves to reach their full potential. It supports the philosophy that the path to graduation begins much earlier than senior year.

Board member question about how many graduated with bare minimum of 25 credits in math and 25 credits in science:

In 2003-04,

131 graduated with only 25 credits in math
188 graduated with only 25 credits in science
58 graduated with only 25 credits in both math and science, and
261 graduated with the bare minimum in either math or in science (131 plus 188 minus the 58)

So, out of a class of ~1500 seniors, we have about 17-18 percent who are not taking beyond the minimum.

At the state level, there were very few districts having 25 credits as the requirement in math. About $\frac{1}{2}$ of the districts in the state require more math, and about $\frac{1}{2}$ require less math, putting us near the 50th percentile.

BACKGROUND: The annual Personnel Report contains information regarding the District's staffing levels, classroom enrollment averages, teacher preparation, experience, and student teacher internships. Report highlights include:

- This year sixty-two percent (62%) of our certified staff hold advanced degrees. This is the same as last year (62%) and up from 58% in '03-'04.
- The average teacher has 15.6 years of experience in education down from 15.9 in '04-'05 and from 15.4 years in '03-'04. The average teacher has 11.7 years experience in Millard compared with 11.9 years and 11.6 years in '04-'05 & '03-'04 respectively.
- Supply and demand for candidates varies from year to year. The District continues to receive limited applications in the areas of foreign language, special education, family/consumer science, industrial technology, math, and science.
- A historical look at personnel distribution and ratios between staff positions is provided along with graphs to illustrate trends since 1976.
- The personnel distribution history (p.45) also reflects that while we have seen increases in staff, due to the increases in the number of students, the district has maintained ratios of students to staff, students to teachers, staff to administrators and teachers to administrators.
- Information has been provided on the retention percentage of teachers hired over the past 6 years.
- The information provided is a "snapshot" of information that can change from day-to-day and year-to-year. As a result, staff changes reflect the difference in the "snapshot" from 10/04 to 10/05.

The best part of teaching is the “light bulb” moments. These moments are not just intellectual, but social and emotional as well. When you have a true connection with your students, it is overwhelming to see them understand or apply that which you have taught.

Teaching is about patience and trying new and different techniques in order to reach all children. When you realize your time and effort is paying off and a child is bettered for it – that is the reason we become teachers.

The teaching profession is not only a job and responsibility, but also a privilege. I am honored to be a teacher and I believe it shows in my personality and educating.

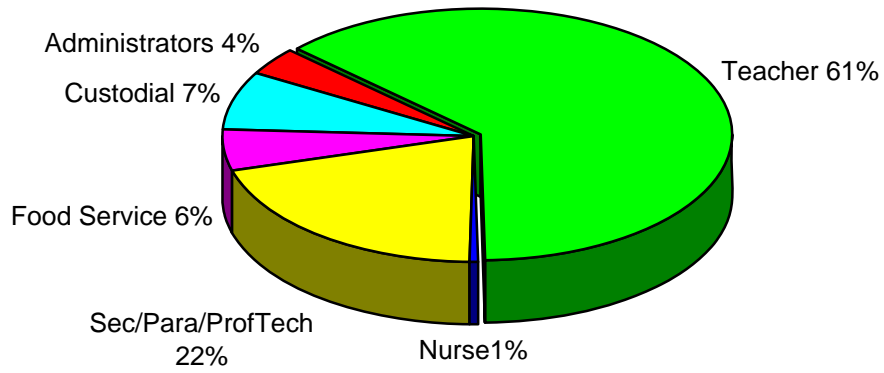

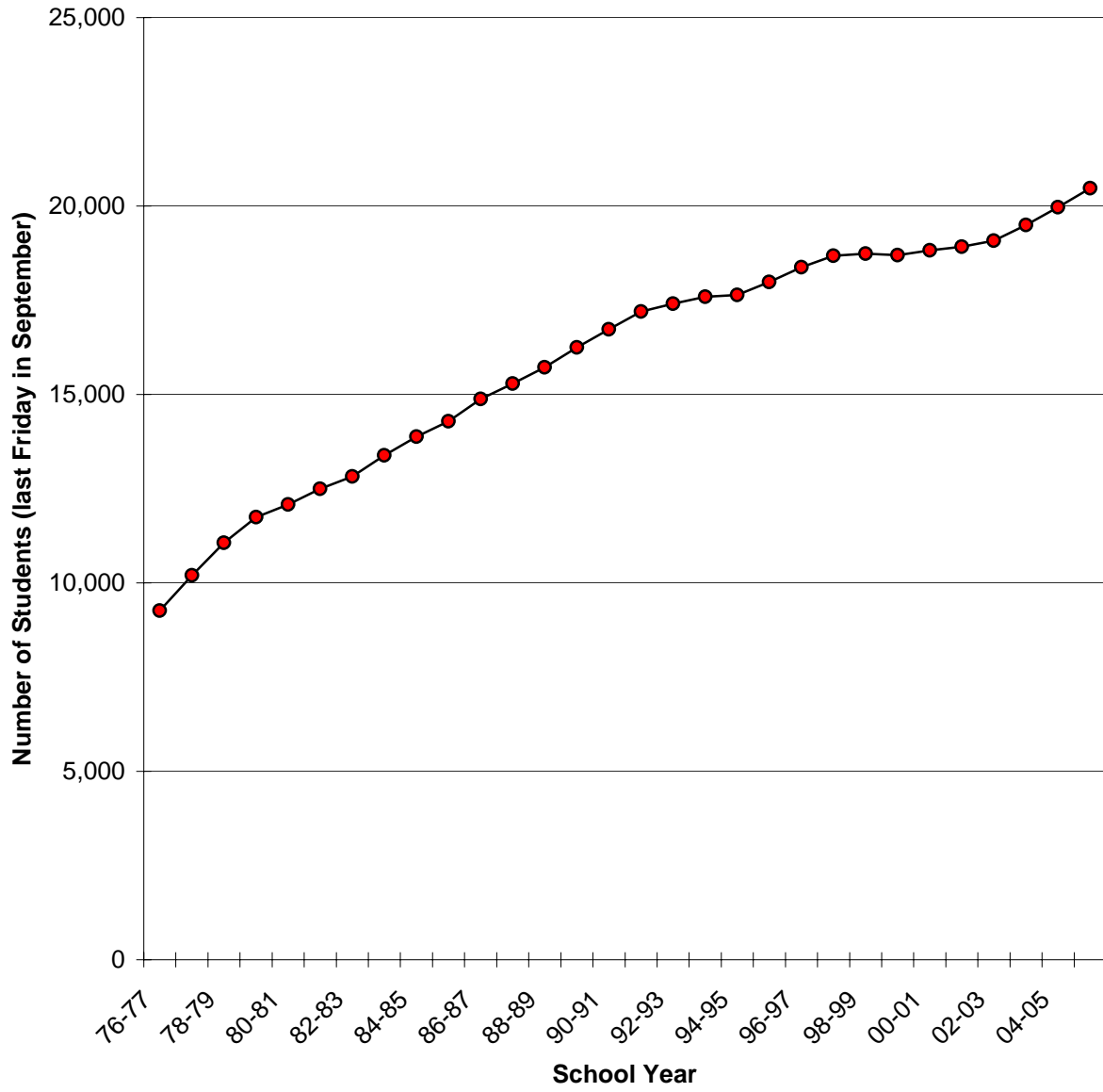

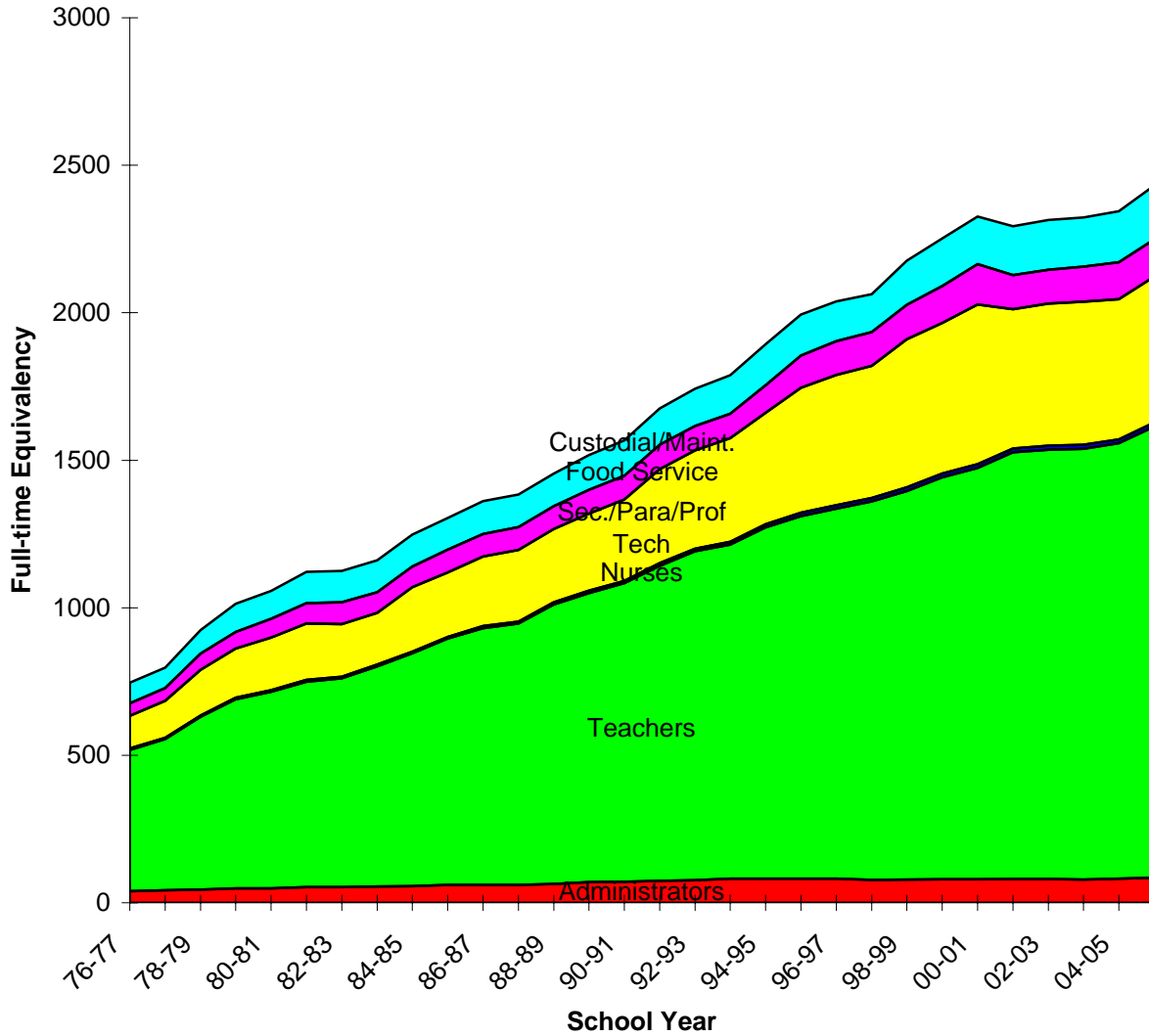
Personnel Distribution 2004-05

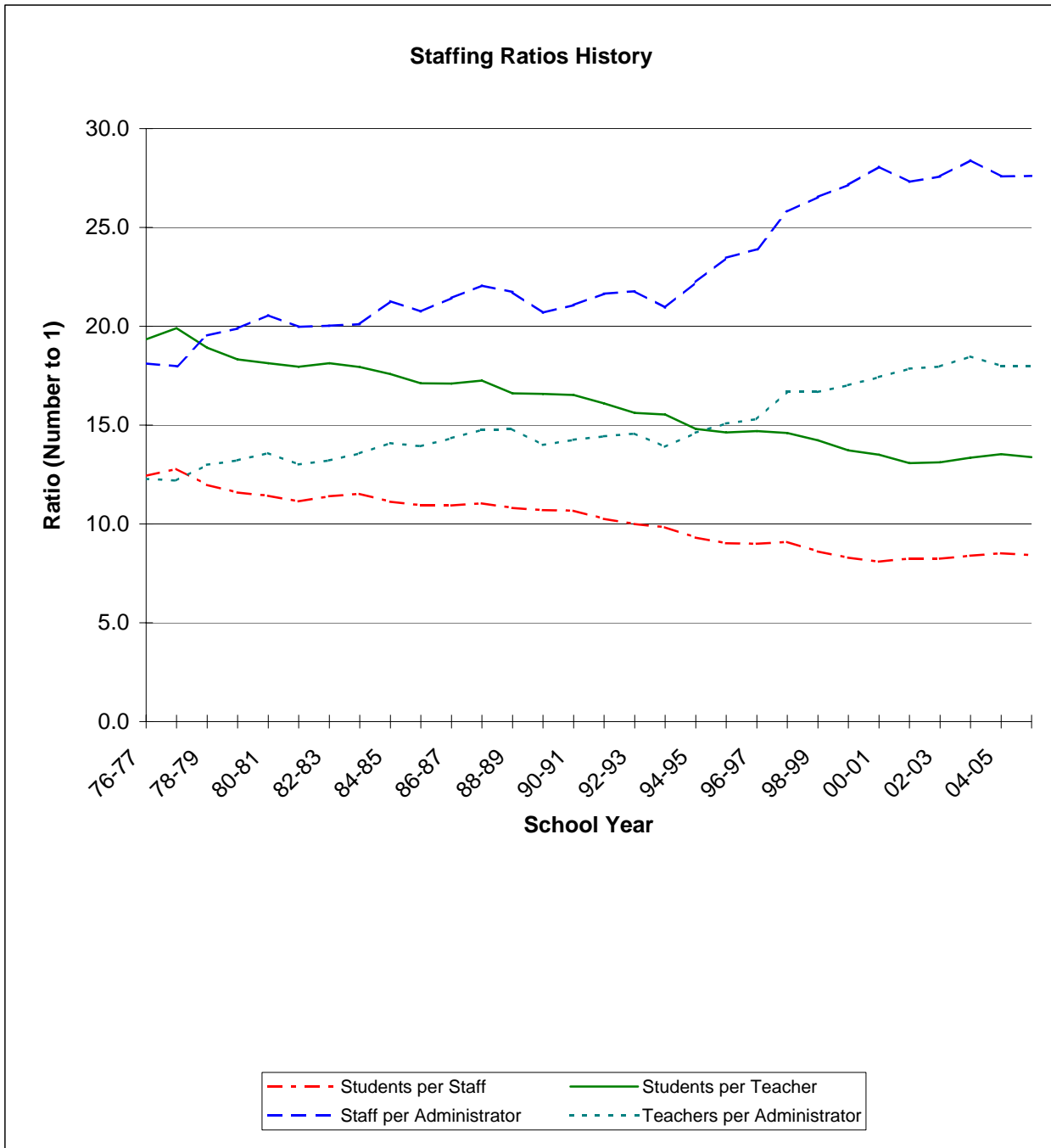


Student Enrollment



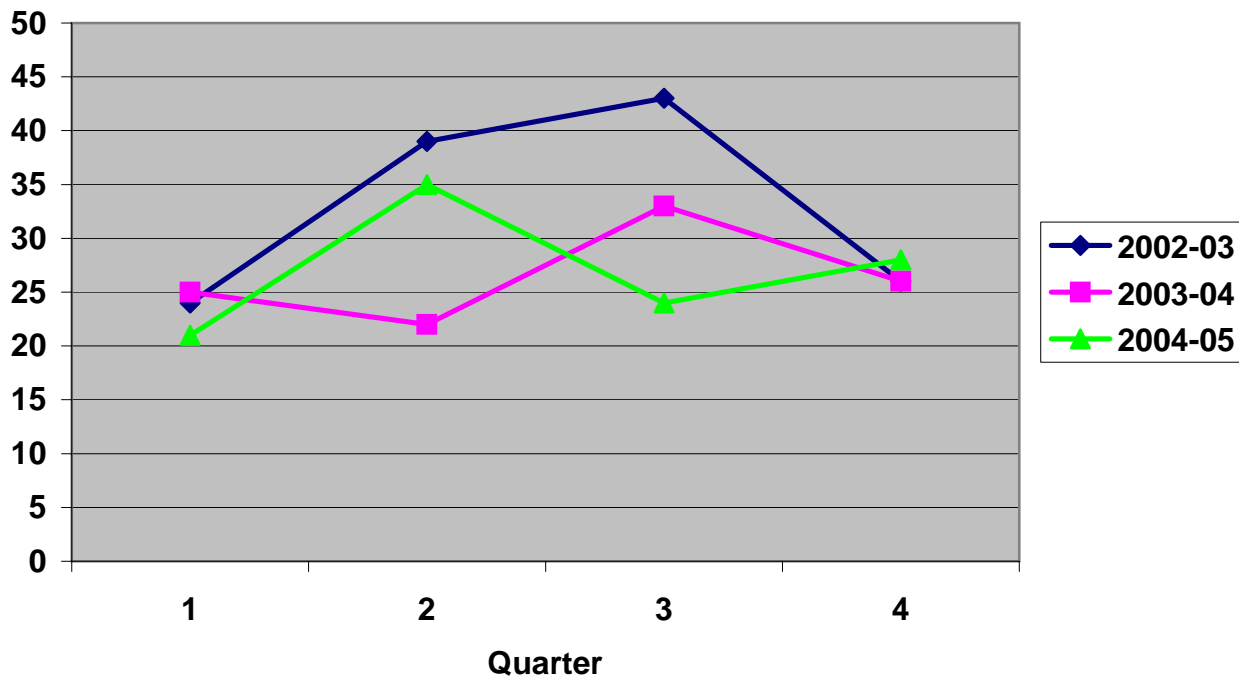
Personnel Distribution History
