



BACKGROUND:	The District's liability insurance does not extend beyond the US (and its territories) and Canada.
	Prior to 9-11-01, some foreign language teachers worked with travel agencies during the summer and promoted foreign travel by students. This travel was not sponsored by the school district, however, many parents thought it was because the travel was organized and promoted by the teachers in their classrooms. In some instances, the funds for the trips were handled through the student activities funds at the buildings.
	As a result of the events of 9-11-01, many of the travel agencies cancelled their scheduled trips to foreign countries and refused to refund the money to the students. Some of the students (actually, the parents) contacted the school with a request that the school refund the moneys because it was a "school-sponsored trip." The administration took the position that the foreign travel was not sponsored by the school and denied the requests for the refunds.
	Subsequently, the administration directed that the line of separation between the activities sponsored by the schools and the activities sponsored by private organizations (in particular travel agencies working with teachers), be made clear. The substance of that directive is contained in the proposed Policy 3921 and Rule 3921.1 attached hereto.
	In recent months, it has become apparent that the administrative directives noted above have begun to erode again. Therefore, a "reminder" has been sent to the buildings and the directive has been reduced to writing in the form of a Policy and Rule for consideration by the Board.

Please find attached a copy of Proposed Policy 3921 and Rule 3921.1. These reflect the administrative directives issued subsequent to the events of 9-11-01. In the past few months, it has become apparent that these directives are "eroding," so I've sent a reminder to the buildings. Additionally, I've reduced the directives to a Policy and Rule to be considered by the Board.

If Board should decide against the policy and rule and request that foreign travel be sponsored by the school, then we will need to reconsider the matter and address the following issues: (1) liability insurance, (2) student fees, (3) administrative supervision, (4) negotiated compensation, (5) competitive proposals, and (6) security of funds.

- 1. With regard to liability insurance, our insurance consultants (i.e., the Harry A. Koch, Co.) have advised us that the District's liability coverage is limited to the US (its territories) and Canada. As a result, if student foreign travel is going to be sponsored by the District, it should seek to purchase liability insurance from the travel company that is arranging the travel (if this is possible). Presumably, the travel agency already has an insurance company that will underwrite the trip and the District may be able to purchase coverage as "an additional named insured" for the trip. There may be an issue if the District desires a higher coverage than the travel agency is willing to provide. I didn't do any further research with regard to this issue.
- 2. With regard to student fees, the issue will become whether or not the travel is considered a curricular activity, an extra-curricular activity, or summer school.
 - a. If the trip is a part of the District's curriculum, the student fees statutes would preclude the charging of student fees, thus, leaving the District with the obligation to pay all of the expenses for all of the students on the trip. (See, *Neb. Rev. Stat.* §79-2,127).
 - b. If the trip is an "extra-curricular activity," the District could charge a fee to the students, however, the District would be required to pay all of the expenses for students that qualified for free and reduced price lunches. (See, *Neb. Rev. Stat.* §79-2,127(1) and §79-2,133).
 - c. If the trip is "summer school," then the District is permitted to charge a fee pursuant to Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-2,127(8) but it is not required to pay for the expenses for free and reduced price students under Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-2,133. [Note: Although not required by law, the District has waived summer school fees for free and reduced price students in past. Also, there may be legal issues if this "class" or "activity" is offered only in the

summer and not during the rest of the year – thus, precluding students of poverty from being able to afford the same educational programs as their more fortunate classmates.]

- 3. With regard administrative supervisions, the buildings would need to develop the rules and procedures to govern student behavior on the trips. They would also need to be prepared to enforce those rules.
- 4. Once the administration determined the proper supervision for the travel, the issue of compensation for those supervisors would need to be determined. Presumably, some (if not all) of the sponsors would be school employees, therefore, the issue of appropriate compensation would need to be negotiated through the Millard Education Associate (MEA).
- 5. With regard to competitive proposals, the buildings would need to develop some process for ensuring that various travel agencies would be permitted to submit competitive proposals for the travel to ensure that the students (and the District) received the best quality and value for the money spent.
- 6. With regard to security of student funds, the buildings (and the District) would need to develop sum type of system whereby the funds paid to the travel agencies were secured and would not be lost if the travel agency cancelled the trip.

No student travel shall be approved, sponsored, or endorsed in any way by the District (or any of its schools or organizations) if such travel is to countries other than the United States or Canada.

Pursuant to Policy 3921, the District does not sponsor nor endorse any student travel outside of the United States or Canada. In furtherance of such policy, the following rules are established:

- A. If a private (non-school-related) organization desires to arrange private foreign travel, the organizational meetings for such travel should be held at non-school locations. However, if the private organization submits a request to use District facilities for such purposes, the request shall comply with the District's facility use policies and procedures and the organization shall be treated as a for-profit organization.
- B. No money for such private travel shall be deposited into school District funds nor shall any expenses for such private travel be paid out of District funds.
- C. No fundraising activities shall be conducted on school grounds or as part of any school activity.
- D. No teacher, administrator, or other employee of the District shall, in his/her capacity as a District employee, promote private travel plans in his/her classroom, at school activities, or during any other time when the teacher is on duty with the District. Notwithstanding the foregoing, a teacher may, during the summer months when he/she is not under contract with the District, provide services to a private organization conducting foreign travel tours.

Health Education

As provided in state statute, programs will be provided for instructing pupils in a comprehensive health education program which shall include instruction (1) as to the physiological, psychological, and sociological aspects of drug use, misuse, and abuse and (2) on mental retardation and other developmental disabilities, such as cerebral palsy, autism, and epilepsy, their causes, and the prevention thereof through proper nutrition and the avoidance of the consumption of drugs as defined in this section. For purpose of this section, drugs shall mean any and all biologically active substance used in the treatment of illnesses or for recreation or pleasure. Special emphasis shall be placed upon the commonly abused drugs of tobacco, alcohol, marijuana, hallucinogenics, amphetamines, barbiturates, and narcotics.

The health education program will be accomplished through the provision of a multi-cultural, gender-fair, disability-sensitive instructional program, based on the acquisition of knowledge and the development of personal skills that promote healthy behavior.

In the area of family life education and the study of human sexuality, it is essential that there be understanding, support and continual communications among home, school and community religious organizations. As it regards district programming, a pro-abstinence position will be conveyed and supported by the district and its personnel. In addition, the following will be adhered to:

- A. instructional materials to be used in Health/Family Living will be available for inspection by the parent or guardian. These materials may be viewed at the student's school or during Parent Orientation Nights as set forth in Rule 6800.1;
- B. if, after a review of the materials and a conference with the teacher/principal, a parent/guardian requests that his/her child not participate in a given course or aspect of a course, an alternative educational assignment will be arranged for the student as set forth in Rule 6810.2.

Attached please find a bid tabulation for the ten bids received for the above referenced project on March 28, 2006. The low base bid was received from MGM Hardscape Construction. However, immediately following the bid opening they approached us and indicated they did not fill in their bid form correctly as can be seen by comparing their alternate bids to the majority of others that were received. Based on our post-bid conference with District staff it was determined that this irregularity could not be waived.

It is our understanding since the bids received were well within estimate, the District would like to accept all three alternates. When considering the base bids with all three alternate bids there is a tie between Dostal Construction and Navarro Enterprises at a total amount of \$82,900.00. We have worked with both contractors and have contacted references for both. We have no reason to believe that either of these two contractors would not be able to perform the work in a satisfactory manner.

Based on our understanding that Douglas County will cover the costs associated with the Alternate 3 bids (widening the west sidewalk from 5' to 10'), it is our recommendation that a contract for the base bid work and all three alternates in the amount of \$82,900.00 be awarded to Navarro Enterprises since this will result in the lowest cost to the Millard School District.







Issues and Happening

• LB 1024 was voted out of committee by a vote of 6 to 2. Senators Howard and Kopplin did not vote to advance this bill. It appears that the first round of debate will be as early as Monday.

Dates and Reminders

• The Legislature will be in recess March 31 and April 7. The last day of the session is April 12th.

Legislation we are tracking:

- LB 803 Define and require reporting of total per pupil cost by school districts.
- LB 821 Senator Erdman's bill that allows for enrollment of part-time students.
- LB 998 Provide for the extension of school district boundaries. This is Senator Cornett's bill to resolve the Bellevue and Papillion-LaVista boundary issue.
- LB 1006 This was introduced by Senator Bourne at the request of the Governor to reduce the property tax levy to \$1.025 per \$100 of valuation for the 2006-2007 school year. The levy is set to drop to \$1.00 in 2007.
- LB 1017 This is the bill sponsored by Senator Kopplin that incorporates the Coalition proposals protecting our boundaries, providing transportation for children on free and reduced meals and allowing inter-local agreements to create magnate schools. Senators Pahls, Pedersen, Jensen, Brown and Stuhr have signed on as well.
- LB 1024 This is Senator Raikes bill on learning communities. It has been amended and now freezes school district boundaries as they existed on January 1, 2005 as well as offering protection in the future. It allows funding at or above current levels. It creates a Learning Community Board with a limited scope of responsibilities and allows focus schools including a mechanism for funding the operation of these schools. The purpose of focus schools is to attract diverse students from multiple school districts.
- LB 1107 and 1148 allow students to self-administer medications for diabetes and asthma. Our current policy is in line with these bills.
- LB 1167 Senator Redfield's bill has a high school and feeders in a district and sets the size at a minimum of 4,000 students.
- LB 1208 is the result of the interim work on Distance Education. This bill lays out an infrastructure for school districts to upgrade technology capability and access academic offerings.
- LB 1262 is Senator Brashear's proposal. The Senator has indicated on numerous occasions that this is a shell bill that could represent a compromise.

Carryover Legislation we are tracking:

- LB 129 is a comprehensive school finance bill. It is likely that part or this entire bill may become a part of LB 1024. Senator Raikes has indicated that this bill is a priority. He has strong feelings that this legislation needs to be considered. This bill is currently held in committee.
- LB 579 is a technical clean-up bill that repeals the 1981 law and has language that changes items such as transportation, option enrollment, and items dealing with early childhood.

• LB 627 – is a bill that will require school districts to adopt a policy on bullying. This bill is not ⁹⁹/_{yet} out of committee.

The students who are identified as at-risk due to not passing the district ELO assessments, will be the primary targets, but all students are welcome.
