Extracurricular school sponsored clubs and activities, and interscholastic athletics and activities involving the transportation of participants or spectators in school-sponsored vehicles shall be subject to the following guidelines:

- I. All trips shall originate and terminate at the school.
- II. On all trips, the rules and regulations of the building and the Millard Public Schools regarding students and student conduct shall be in effect from the time of departure until the time of return.
- III. Written approval of the student's parent or guardian must be secured.
- IV. A trip permit may be signed by a student's parent or guardian and placed on file for the school year.
- V. The principal or designee will arrange transportation for interscholastic and extracurricular activities and athletics. Trips that are scheduled for a length of time beyond sixteen (16) hours, or which may require student involvement or transportation beyond 12:00 midnight, or which require overnight accommodations, shall not be approved unless the mode of transportation has a properly permitted or licensed driver who complies with the hourly driving limitations of Title 92, Nebraska Administrative Code, Chapter 91-005.06G. Certificated staff who are providing transportation for interscholastic or extracurricular activities or athletics shall also comply with the hourly driving limitations of Title 92, Nebraska Administrative Code, Chapter 91-005.06G.
 - A. The coach or club or activity sponsor and principal or designee will ensure that the hourly driving limitations of Title 92, Nebraska Administrative Code, Chapter 91-005.06G are communicated to the provider of transportation prior to the start of the trip.
 - B. The coach or club or activity sponsor will ensure that the provider of transportation provides a plan to the principal or designee prior to the start of the trip that adheres to the hourly driving limitations of Title 92, Nebraska Administrative Code, Chapter 91-005.06G.
 - C. The time of departure for the trip shall be no earlier than 6:00 a.m. on the starting day of the trip. Exceptions to this time of departure must have the prior approval of the District Director of Activities.
 - D. When the anticipated time of departure for the trip is earlier than 6:00 a.m. on the day of the event, the trip shall be subject to the following guidelines:
 - 1. The time of departure must have the prior approval of the District Director of Activities,

or

- The coach or club or activity sponsor must arrange for the overnight accommodations of the students, drivers, chaperones, and coaches or club or activity sponsors involved on the trip for the night prior to the event.
- 3. The overnight accommodations must be reserved prior to the start of the trip and will follow the overnight travel and trip guidelines.
- E. The time of arrival on the return date of the trip shall be no later than 12 midnight on the day of the event. When the anticipated time of arrival on the return date of the trip is later than 12 midnight, that time must have the prior approval of the District Director of Activities.

- F. When the anticipated time of arrival for the trip is later than 12 midnight on the day of the event, the trip shall be subject to the following guidelines:
 - 1. The coach or club or activity sponsor will arrange for the overnight accommodations of the students, drivers, chaperones, and coaches or club or activity sponsors involved on the trip for the concluding night of the event. Those involved on the trip will return to the school on the next day.
 - 2. The overnight accommodations must be reserved prior to the start of the trip.
 - 3. The coach or club or activity sponsor will follow the overnight travel and trip policies and rules.

or

- 4. Upon the arrival to the school the students involved on the trip shall leave the school by means other than walking. A certificated staff member of the school will remain in a designated area at the school with the students involved on the trip until all of those students have left the school.
 - a The designated area at the school is subject to the approval by the principal or designee.
 - b The designated area at the school will be communicated to the parents/guardians of the students involved on the trip prior to the trip.
 - c Students on the trip are to remain in the designated area of the school until they are released by the certificated staff member.
 - The name(s) of the person(s) other than the parents/guardians of the students involved on the trip who will retrieve the student(s) after arrival to the school must be provided to the coaches or club or activity sponsors prior to the trip.
 - e The person(s) retrieving the students on the trip must come to the designated area at the school for the trip to retrieve the students.
- G. Any exceptions to these guidelines must have the prior approval of the District Director of Activities.
- VI. The coach or club or activity sponsor, in consultation with the principal or designee, may give a student permission to use alternate transportation.

Care and consideration should be given to the amount of time these activities take students away from school during school hours or away from studies on "school nights." This policy is applied in such areas as scheduling of interscholastic contests, meetings and trips involving school organizations and in-school activities such as meetings, initiations, etc.

Supervision of Co-curricular Activities

Whenever or wherever held, when conducted under the name of the school or school district or any class or organization thereof, co-curricular activities shall be under the general supervision of school authorities.

Non-Secret

Co-curricular groups shall not be secret in nature.

Participation

Students will be limited in participating in activities of a non-school nature during school hours. Prior to such participation, approval must be granted by the building administrator.



Elementary Summer School Report

The elementary program included courses in kindergarten readiness, reading, math, art, science, drama, and computers. A total of 28 two-week class sections of 1.5 hours were held at Cody Elementary School. Enrollment dipped slightly from 368 in 2006 to 358 students in 2007. Free and reduced numbers decreased by 23 students as compared to 2006. Early childhood and elementary special education classes were offered as well in June at Cody for students with moderate to severe disabilities.

The Kindergarten Readiness class was open to all incoming kindergarten students and was an all-morning class. The 48 pre-kindergarten students had a great experience getting ready for kindergarten!

Points of Special Note:

- 48 preschoolers experienced kindergarten readiness class
- 217 first through fifth graders were enrolled in reading and math classes
- 34 second through fifth graders learned new skills using computers
- 47 second through fifth graders learned more about simple machines and architecture in the Lego Technics class

Considerations:

1. Cody's pre school rooms and multiple kindergarten rooms provided excellent facilities for summer school. Consider needs of pre-K classes when selecting summer facilities.

- 2) During Kindergarten Roundup, continue to publicize the opportunity for preschoolers to attend the kindergarten readiness class.
- 3) Consider gathering data/information regarding the impact/effectiveness of the Kindergarten Readiness class.

Middle Level Summer School Report

During the 2006-07 school year, instead of offering a district wide middle level summer school program, it was decided that schools could have the option of assuming responsibility for summer school within their building or work together with other buildings to create a summer school opportunity. The middle level administrators decided to offer the following:

The middle level parent pay summer classes were held at Russell Middle School and Kiewit Middle School in June. Classes at both sites included opportunities for Math, Reading and Writing with Guitar classes also held at the Kiewit site. Kiewit did not have enough students to offer the Spanish class; however, one of the three interested students then participated at Russell. Central Middle School was not able to offer their program due to lack of enrollment. North Middle School offered a program; however, their numbers were not included in this report as their program was not parent pay. The special education program for students with moderate to severe disabilities was held for three weeks at the Russell site.

Points of Special Note:

- 92 middle level students attended parent pay classes.
- Guitar at Kiewit was the only non-academic class offered to middle level students.

Considerations:

The Jump Start programs at each of the middle schools may be impacting the number of families electing to pay for summer school classes.

The availability of community athletic and interest focused camps and/or programs targeted to the middle level student may be impacting the number of families interested in the MPS Summer School program.

Prior enrollment data would suggest that high interest classes along side of academic core classes draws more students.

High School Summer Session Report

The high school program offers students the opportunity to repeat courses they have not yet passed or take courses that may be difficult to schedule during the regular school year. Incoming ninth graders were encouraged to take Study Skills or Reading if appropriate. The program was held at Millard West High School from June 4 – July 11, 2007 with a total class enrollment of 533 students taking 820 classes.

Re-teaching funds were used to support on-going ELO re-teaching classes. ELO classes in Reading, Math, Science and Social Studies were held without charge for students still needing to meet the cutscore on ELO assessments. To support the District's Strategic Plan, the ACT/SAT Prep class was offered at two different class times and 33 students took advantage of this 3-week non-credit class. Double-period classes of Algebra and Spanish I and Geometry had a combined enrollment of 30 students. Four classes were held in the afternoon—Intro to Aquatics, US Government, ACT/SAT Prep and Art Foundations. Seventy-two students took afternoon classes.

Once again a "whatever it takes" effort to reduce the number of failures in summer classes was in place. When a student started to fall behind, the classroom teacher provided re-teaching assistance. The teachers worked outside of class time individually with students to assist the students to get back on track to successfully complete their classes. The failure rate was about 3% of the total classes.

MNHS students continue to outnumber students from the other two Millard high schools with 282 students from MNHS accounted for 50% of the class enrollments, 127 from MWHS accounted for 25% of the class enrollments, 102 from MSHS accounted for 22% of the class enrollments and 22 other district and non-public students accounted for 3% of the class enrollments.

Incoming ninth graders totaled 43. Three Millard middle school students were enrolled in math classes. Of the 533 students, 282 took one class, 215 took two classes, and 36 took three classes. Out of district students totaled 15. Non-public students residing in Millard attending summer school totaled 7.

Eighteen students completed requirements for graduation during the summer session. One student passed the last ELO test in the summer in order to graduate. Nine students attended a June 12-30 special education program for students with moderate to severe disabilities also at Millard West High School.

The tentative dates and location of the 2008 High School Summer Program will be June 9 through July 16, 2008, at Millard South High School.

Points of Special Note:

- 33 students completed the ACT/SAT prep class
- 18 students completed the College Grammar and Reading class
- 18 students graduated at the end of summer school
- 30 students completed the full year courses--Spanish I (6), Algebra (19), and Geometry (15)--in back to back 3-week semester classes
- 72 students attended classes in the afternoon
- The failure rate was a low 3%

Considerations:

During 9th grade registration publicize the opportunity to take Study Skills, Reading, and Prealgebra during summer school.

Publicize the ACT/SAT Prep offering throughout the year. Track the ACT/SAT scores of students taking these exams.

Consider offering at least one morning session of Introduction to Aquatics.

Reduce tuition rate by supplementing tuition with district funds.

Highlights from the Report

Almost all of the graduating class (94%) expected to continue their education after high school. 96.6% of respondents with reported GPA's of 3.0-4.0+ predicted that they would be either full or part time students a year from taking the survey. Even among students with reported GPA's below 2.0, two-thirds (66.6%) said that they would be either full or part time students a year from taking the survey.

Over half of the students who completed the exit survey stated that they applied themselves only "some" or "a fair amount" while at the same time 61% of all students responding said that they earned a grade point average of 3.0 or higher.

Moreover, 43% of all the respondents report that they did not take the most challenging courses of which they were capable. A close correlation exists between those who felt that they took the most challenging courses of which they were capable (57%) and those who report that they took at least one A.P. course (57%). This is the first year that we have asked the questions about participation in A.P. classes. As the district focus on encouraging participation in A.P. classes continues, we will look for an increase in the percent of students who report taking challenging classes and who also report applying themselves "very much."

POSTGRADUATE (2002) ASSESSMENT—FIVE YEAR STUDY



I Background and objectives of the research

This is the fourth five-year postgraduate study conducted by Weise Research Associates on our behalf. This study was conducted with the graduates of 2002 from all three Millard High Schools. The primary objective of each study was to evaluate graduates' perceptions of their experiences with the Millard high school they attended in terms of preparing them to complete post-high school studies or to enter the workforce.

The specific objectives included

- Evaluate 2002 graduates' current status in terms of employment and post-high school education
- Explore perceptions regarding the impact of Millard's high school programs on graduates' current employment
- Assess the impact of Millard's high school programs in preparing graduates for postsecondary education
- Gain an understanding of graduates perceptions of the impact of the courses offered by the high school they attended on preparing them to achieve educational goals and/or to secure employment

II Sample characteristics

The total sample in this wave is 300 completed interviews, compared to 303 interviews completed in 2000 with members of the class of 1995 and 300 interviews completed in 2003 with members of the class of 1998 and 300 interviews completed in 2005 with members of the class of 2000.

Each sample was drawn to proportionately represent the actual graduate population distributions by high school. For each study administration, telephone interviews were conducted for approximately 8 minutes with each respondent. The questionnaires are essentially identical, with two questions regarding voting registration/experience and current residence added in 2003 and a series of questions related to IB and AP programs and exams added in 2005. Interviews for this survey were conducted between June 11 and June 23, 2007. About three fourths of the respondents live now in the Omaha area.

A point of interest is that the incidence of having voted in the last election was significantly greater among the classes of 2000 and 2002 (70% and 67% respectively) than among the 1998 graduates (49%). The questions about voting were not asked of the 1995 graduates. See Table 1, next page.

III Employment and education status upon high school graduation and at the time of the survey

Among the graduates of the class of 2002, 88% reported that they went on to college upon high school graduation. About 9% of that class reported obtaining full-time employment rather than continuing their education. The incidence of having gone directly to college was found to be greater among those with higher grade point averages. Nearly all (98%) of respondents who reported having a high school GPA of 4.0 or greater stated that they went on to college after graduation. By comparison, 73% of those who reported a GPA under 3.0 also reported going to college after high school graduation compared to only 65% of graduates of 2000 reporting similar grade point averages. 91% of those who participated in high school activities attended college after graduation, while 69% of those who did not participate in activities went on to college. Females were also significantly more likely to have furthered their education (94%) than males (82%). Those who reported that their courses were college preparatory in nature more often went to college than those who saw their high school courses as more general in nature.

Although only 27 people reported that upon graduation they did not go to school but obtained full time work, the vast majority of those (89%) felt that the Millard high school they attended had adequately prepared them for entering that work. Only three respondents (11%) felt that they were not adequately prepared. While the results are not statistically significant due to a very limited sample size, the incidence of *not* feeling adequately prepared for full time work has decreased slightly when compared to the "unprepared" graduates of 2000 (13%) but is still slightly higher compared to those of 1998 (5%) or 1995 (4%).

At the time of the survey, approximately one half (51%) of the respondents reported that they were not attending any school but were working full-time only. An additional 3% were working part-time only. One third (34%) of the former students interviewed from the class of 2002 were both working and going to school at least part-time. Relatively few (9%) of the members of the class were full-time students only, and 3% were neither working nor pursuing an education. These results are very similar to the results of previous waves of this study. No significant differences in student or employment status appear based on which high school the students attended.

Nearly three fourths (74%) of those graduates who obtained full-time employment upon high school graduation continue to work full-time only, but 22% of these who did not continue their education immediately after high school are now pursuing their education at least on a part-time basis.

IV Occupations held and job satisfaction among those currently employed

The majority (87%) of the graduates of the class of 2002 are currently working either full or part-time. Of those who are working, 60% consider that employment to be permanent. One third (34%) of those working view their work to be temporary in nature, and 2% indicate that they are participating in a training program. These results are very similar to those found among the graduates of 2000 and 1998, but the graduates of 1995 viewed their work as temporary slightly less often.

The differences among the graduates of the various high schools are not statistically significant, nor does reported GPA seem to have retained what used to be a significant difference. Among the graduates of 2002, 67% of those reporting a GPA of 4.0 or higher report their current work as permanent and a very similar 63% of those with a GPA under 3.0 also view their work as permanent.

A vast majority (94%) of the graduates of 2002 who reported that they are currently working at least part time also said that they enjoy their present position. This is an increase in reported job satisfaction from the class of 2000, 87% of whom reported liking their jobs.

The survey respondents who are employed at least part time currently hold a very wide variety of occupations (see Table 2 on the following two pages).

V. Postsecondary education level achieved and major course of study

The incidence of having graduated from an educational institution beyond high school has fluctuated slightly since the benchmark study. Among the graduates of the class of 2002, 52% indicate that they have graduated from a college, business or vocational school. In the class of 2000, 44% reported that they had graduated. Among the graduates of 1995, 50% had graduated within five years. The 1998 graduates interviewed reported a graduation rate of 42%. Most Millard graduates report participating in some form of education beyond high school. The incidence of not having attended any educational institution beyond high school was 9% among the graduates of 2002 and is statistically similar to the previous waves.


A greater proportion of Millard West graduates (60%) and Millard North graduates (59%) are current college/business school/vocational school graduates than are those who graduated from Millard South (36%). Much more significant differences are displayed in light of high school GPAs. A majority (85%) of those who report a high school grade point average of 4.0 or higher have graduated from a college, business or vocational school. This compares to 54% of graduates of the class of 2002 with a grade point average between 3.0 and 4.0 and only 17% of those with a high school GPA of less than 3.0 (See Figure 6, next page).

Among the members of the class of 2002 who pursued formal education beyond high school, 82% have attended or are attending a four-year college (compared to 72% of the graduates of 2000). 16% have attended or are attending a two-year college or a business or vocational school, compared to 20% of the class of 2000. Among the graduates of 2002 who are attending or have graduated from a post-secondary institution, 59% have already received a Bachelor's Degree and 13% have achieved an Associate's (two-year) Degree.

When respondents who are either currently attending a post-secondary educational institution or who have already graduated from one were questioned as to their major, 10% of them identified business. When combined with those who named marketing (7%), accounting (2%) and finance (1%), one fifth of those surveyed in the class of 2002 either have majored or are majoring in the business field.

VI Performance of Millard High Schools in preparing students and perceptions of quality and adequacy of subject courses taken

From an overall perspective, 45% of all Millard graduates of the class of 2002 indicated that they perceived that the major emphasis of their high school courses was general education versus college preparatory (39%).

Small differences in this perception are displayed according to high school attended and to GPA earned. Millard South graduates less often viewed their curriculum as being college preparatory (32% compared to 42% at the other two high schools). The higher the GPA achieved during high school, the more likely the respondents were to report that their curricula were college preparatory in nature. Slightly more than three-fourths (77%) of those who reported a GPA of 4.0 or higher, 38% of those with GPAs between 3.0 and 4.0, and 11% of those with a GPA under 3.0 viewed courses as college preparatory.

Perceptions of courses taken tie in with respondents' current level of education achieved; those who have not yet graduated from college tend to view their high school work more as general education than as college preparatory. However, among college graduates, 57% view their high school courses as being college preparatory, while only 28% felt that the courses were more of a general education.

This is the second wave of the survey to include questions to determine the incidence of having taken Advanced Placement[®] courses or tests.

More of the graduates of 2002 took at least one Advanced Placement[®] course—58% compared to 51% of the class of 2000. Among the class of 2000, 20% of those who took an A.P. course actually took an A.P. exam. In the class of 2002, 24% of those taking an A.P. course took an A.P. exam. Graduates from Millard North and Millard West were more likely than their Millard South counterparts to have taken an A.P. exam (28% and 27% compared to 17% respectively). Students who reported high school GPAs of 4.0 or higher were much more likely to have taken an A.P. exam (60%) than were students with 3.0 to 4.0 (21%) or below 3.0 (8%).


A.P.® exams most frequently taken were in English (33%) or American history (27%). Other exams mentioned fairly often were calculus (20%--up from 13% in 2000), history (20%) and biology (18%).

Among those who took an Advanced Placement[®] exam, 60% reported that they received college or university credit or had courses waived on the basis of their exam grade. This translates into 15% of the graduates of 2002 having courses waived or receiving college credit as a result of scoring well on an A.P.[®] exam in high school (see Figure 11D, next page).

Letter grade ratings for four performance areas


All respondents were asked to give their high school a letter grade for each of the following four performance areas:

- The high school making certain that you were able to read, write, do math. listen and speak effectively
- The high school teachers making you believe you could succeed as a student
- The high school encouraging you to want to continue with learning, or your education, after graduation
- The high school teachers holding high expectations and demanding quality work

More of the graduates of 2002 assigned a letter grade of A to each performance area than those of any previous wave. Although these increases are slight, a general trend toward increased satisfaction for each performance area is evident. Results related to *making sure you could read/write/do math/listen/speak effectively* continues to receive the highest average grade, while *teachers holding high expectations* is lowest, but still with 92% ranking that category with an A or a B. See figure 12, next page. Figure 12 A displays the results for only the class of 2002 by high school attended.

All respondents were also asked to assign a letter grade to courses taken in thirteen subject areas at the Millard high school they attended. Figure 13 illustrates the results. For most of the subject areas, the graduates of 2002 gave a slightly higher grade than the graduates of any of the previous studies. The areas in which the 2002 graduates did not give a higher grade included physical education and industrial technology (See Figure 13). On an overall basis, graduates of each high school gave positive grade point averages to each of the 13 subject areas evaluated. In fact, the highest average grade given by Millard North graduates was 4.70 for English, followed by art (4.65). Graduates of 2002 from Millard South rated physical education highest (4.58), followed closely by music (4.56). Music was the highest rated subject area among Millard West graduates (4.78), followed by science (4.65) and English (4.62). These ratings were established by those who actually participated in those courses.





Adequacy of coursework taken


All respondents were asked whether or not they felt that they took enough courses while attending their high school given 11 subject areas. Eight to nine in every ten graduates in all four five-year surveys felt that the amount of coursework they took in the given subject areas of English, physical education, social studies, science and mathematics was adequate. A smaller majority of graduates in each study also felt that the amount of coursework related to world language, family and consumer science, oral communications, and art was adequate as well. Among the 2002 graduates, 48% felt that the amount of coursework in industrial technology was adequate. This compares to 60% of the graduates of 1995, 49% of the class of 1998, and 52 % of the class of 2000. The incidence of feeling that coursework taken was adequate was lowest in all four waves of this study in the area of business education. Only 45% of the graduates of 2000 and of 2002 felt that coursework in that area was adequate (see figure 14 on the next page).

In nearly all subject areas, no significant differences were seen in results among high schools regarding taking adequate coursework. However, Millard West graduates from 2002 more often felt that the coursework taken related to industrial technology (57%) and business education (54%) was adequate than did those from either Millard North (39% for IT, 40% for bus. ed.) or Millard South (51 % for IT, 41% for bus. ed.). With the exception of those two areas at North and South, the majority of graduates of 2002 felt that they had taken adequate coursework in all subject areas (see figure 14 A).



HIGHLIGHTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The majority of respondents from the class of 2002 reported feeling adequately prepared by the Millard High Schools to achieve their educational goals and/or to enter the workforce. They gave high grades to the courses they took. Nearly all were satisfied with the amount of coursework they took in the "required" subjects, but at Millard South and Millard North, they were not able to take all of the electives they would have liked, especially in business and industrial technology.

The vast majority of this class (88%) went on to college, but only about half of the class perceived their high school work as college preparatory. Those who had graduated from college were more likely to recall their high school work as college preparatory. Slightly over half of the class of 2002 (52%) report having graduated from a post-secondary institution, the most in any of the study waves to have graduated in five years after high school. Among the graduates of 2000, 44% reported having graduated, and 42% of the graduates of 1998 had done so.

Among the graduates of 2002, 58% took at least one Advanced Placement[®] course, and 24% of those who took an A.P. course actually took an A.P. exam. Among those who took an Advanced Placement exam, 62% reported that they received college or university credit or had courses waived on the basis of their exam grade. This translates into 12% of the graduates of 2000 having courses waived or receiving college credit as a result of scoring well on an A.P. exam in high school. The students in this survey were not able to earn dual enrollment credit from UNO for A.P. classes, though they could have earned them from Peru State College. Since this class graduated, creating an A.P. culture has become a focus in the strategic plan, and participation in both A.P. courses and A.P. testing has increased significantly. Maintaining our focus on encouraging every college bound student to take at least one A.P. course may increase our students' perceptions of their school work as college preparatory.

The adequacy of coursework in industrial technology and business education has continued to be deemed less than adequate by a majority of the respondents in every wave of this survey. Yet, one fifth of those 2002 graduates surveyed who went on to college report majoring in some aspect of business, and 13% of those surveyed who are currently employed work in some area of industrial technology. As we begin to decide about the career clusters and/or academies we may choose to offer, these two areas would seem likely to appeal to our students.

These calendar parameters were developed by the last calendar committee in 2004. The board has made some adjustments in the past and we have built calendars based on the adjustments.

- 1. School will start the Wednesday prior to the 3rd Monday in August
- 2. Each semester will have a balanced number of days. First semester will end at the winter break.
- 3. Four placeholder days will be noted at the end of the calendar and will be used for the first five snow days that are taken.
- 4. There will be two full weeks of vacation at Winter Break.
- 5. A full week of Spring break will be placed at the end of the third quarter.
- 6. There will be two planning days for staff, one at the end of the first quarter and one at the end of third quarter.
- 7. The committee recommends adding days to the calendar when it is financially feasible to do so. Calendar days that are added should be incorporated into the body of the existing calendar.
- 8. There will be no school for students on Martin Luther King and President's Day
- 9. The calendar will have as many full weeks for student learning as possible.
- 10. Seniors shall remain in school for the entire school year. We should seek to move graduation to the end of the school year as quickly as the Civic Center schedule allows.




