Notice of this meeting was given in advance thereof by publication in the Daily Record on, October 12, 2007; a copy of the publication is being attached to these minutes. Notice of this meeting was given to all members of the Board of Education and a copy of their Acknowledgment of Receipt of Notice and the agenda are attached to these minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in advance notice and in the notice of the Board of Education of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public.

At 7:00 p.m. Brad Burwell called the meeting to order and announced that the public meeting act is posted on the wall and available for public inspection.

Roll call was taken and all members were present.

Motion by Mike Kennedy, seconded by Jean Stothert, approved the Board of Education Minutes from October 1, 2007, to approve bills, and to receive the treasurer's report and place on file. Upon roll call vote, all members voted aye. Motion carried.

Superintendent's Report:

- 1. This weekend the Millard Schools will be hosting the State Marching Band Contest at Buell Stadium.
- 2. Next week the ESU #3 Board will be voting on the new election wards.
- 3. November 13, 2007 the district will be participating in the Principal for a Day. This program is sponsored by the Omaha Chamber of Commerce. The district asks PAYBAC partners and people on the Superintendent's Business Advisory Committee to shadow a principal for the day.
- 4. The next committee meeting will be on Monday, November 12, 2007. Tentative topics for the agenda will include an update on the Superintendent's goals, summer projects for next year, and discussion on Millard board resolutions.

Board Comments:

Mike Pate said he attended the Millard Public Schools Foundation meeting last week. He encouraged everyone to checkout their new revamped web site, and now the alumni have the opportunity to register on-line.

Linda Poole said she reported this to the Board a few months ago that the NASB Executive Committee met with the Governor to talk about different educational issues in the State of Nebraska. He gave a list of question he wanted answered, and she had Amy Friedman write a letter for her on the position of the Millard Schools on several of the questions. The Governor wrote back to Mrs. Poole, saying he appreciated the information from Millard, and had additional questions. Mrs. Poole has asked Mrs. Friedman to draft a letter in response to his additional questions. Mrs. Poole gave the letter to Dr. Lutz if any other board member wanted to see the contents.

Jean Stothert commented on her experience on a panel with Pam Brown and Brenda Council, and others on women running for public office at the Ready to Run Conference. She said what was interesting was at the round table discussion during lunch where a current elected representative sits at tables that are designated for a specific elected office. There was no one who sat at the school board or Learning Community tables. When asked why no one sat at those tables the response was it was too complicated and no one understands how to answer the proverbial question about how would you fix the problem. There were about sixty women who attended the conference

Mrs. Stothert said she will be attending the PTO meeting on Tuesday evening, she attended the NASB Area Membership meeting last week, and she will be attending the NASB State Education Conference in November.

Dave Anderson said he appreciated the opportunity to go to the National Federation of Urban Suburban School District Conference. He attended one break out session conducted by the North Kansas City school board about housing in the twenty-first century by students. It was a school to career program where the students build a house, so it is a construction services career program within their curriculum. The second session was on when pandemics would come into schools. It was interesting, he noted, as it related to the safety planning, and recovery planning. The presenter will be sending his power point presentation to the district. The third session was a career center high school in St. Charles, LA, which was relevant because of the move in the alternative program along with the career center choices that the district is looking at.

Mr. Anderson said the tours to the different schools included a magnet school for the performing arts, which was housed within the school. The second tour was a middle school, which was a 100% gender classroom. It was interesting to hear the research, and why they did the 100% gender classrooms. Mr. Anderson gave some information to Dr. Feldhausen on the research. The third tour went to a high school, which had three career academies. One was an engineering academy, one was a future teacher academy, and the third was the International Baccalaureate program. The IB program was fairly new.

Mike Kennedy will not be at the November 5, 2007 meeting.

Mr. Kennedy talked with parents who have a concern about the fundraising policy. Mr. Kennedy said the numbers are down 50% at Abbott Elementary. One PTO member said that this is happening at other schools also.

Mr. Kennedy said he has received kudos on the board's commitment to vocational education. Mr. Kennedy reported that community members have been reading what has been in the paper and monitoring what has been said, and they are glad the district has kept the school. He said that one community member said the school would probably keep their student engaged because of their interest in the proposed culinary program.

Brad Burwell thanked Boy Scout Troop 403 for attending the meeting. The group was in attendance because they were working on their communication badge.

Mr. Burwell said he will be attending portions of the NASB State Education Conference.

Mr. Burwell gave kudos to the Millard South for their organization for the speech interviews. He said that it has become better all of the time, and he offered his congratulations to organizers.

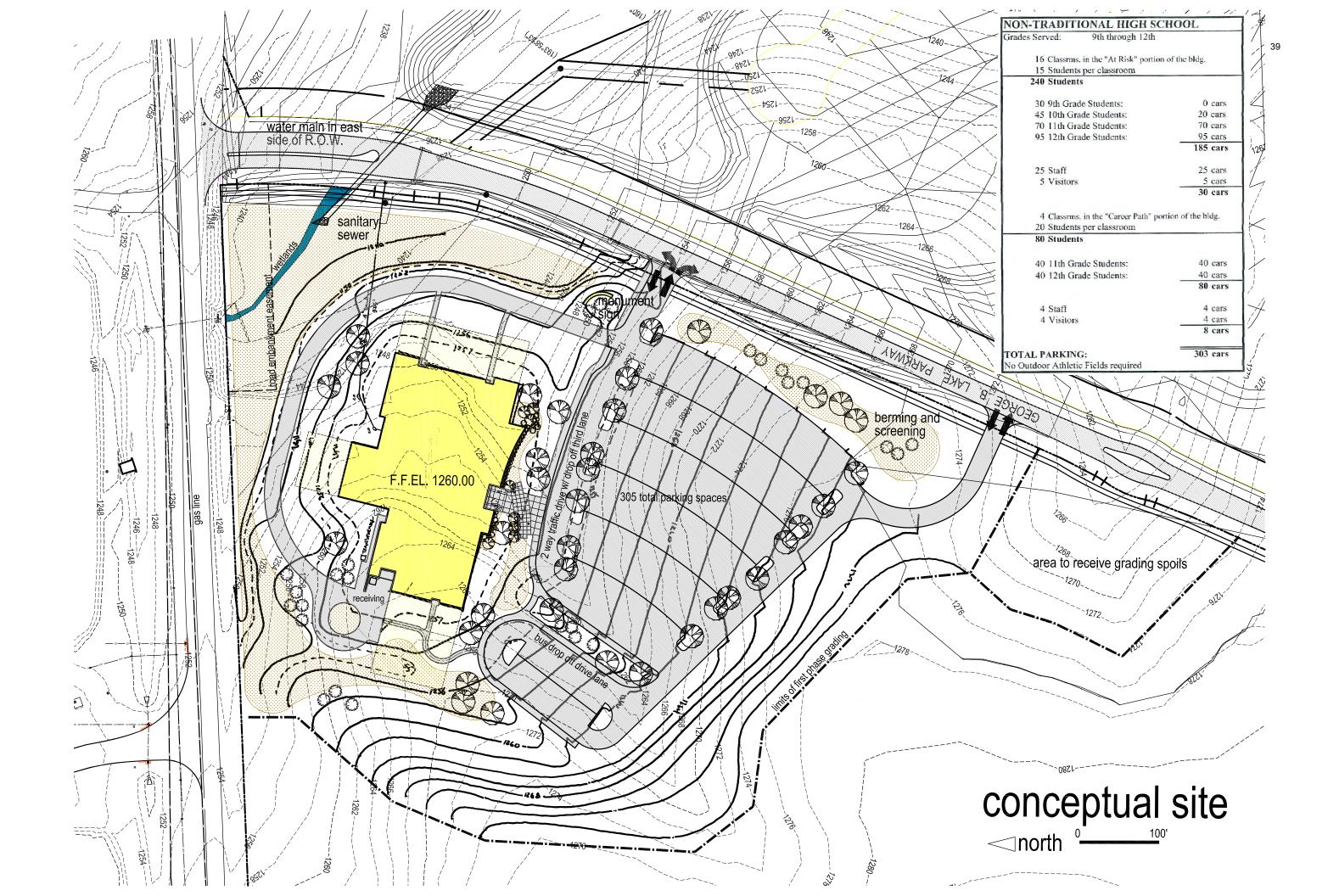
'Q' STREET CAMPUS CONCEPT PLAN

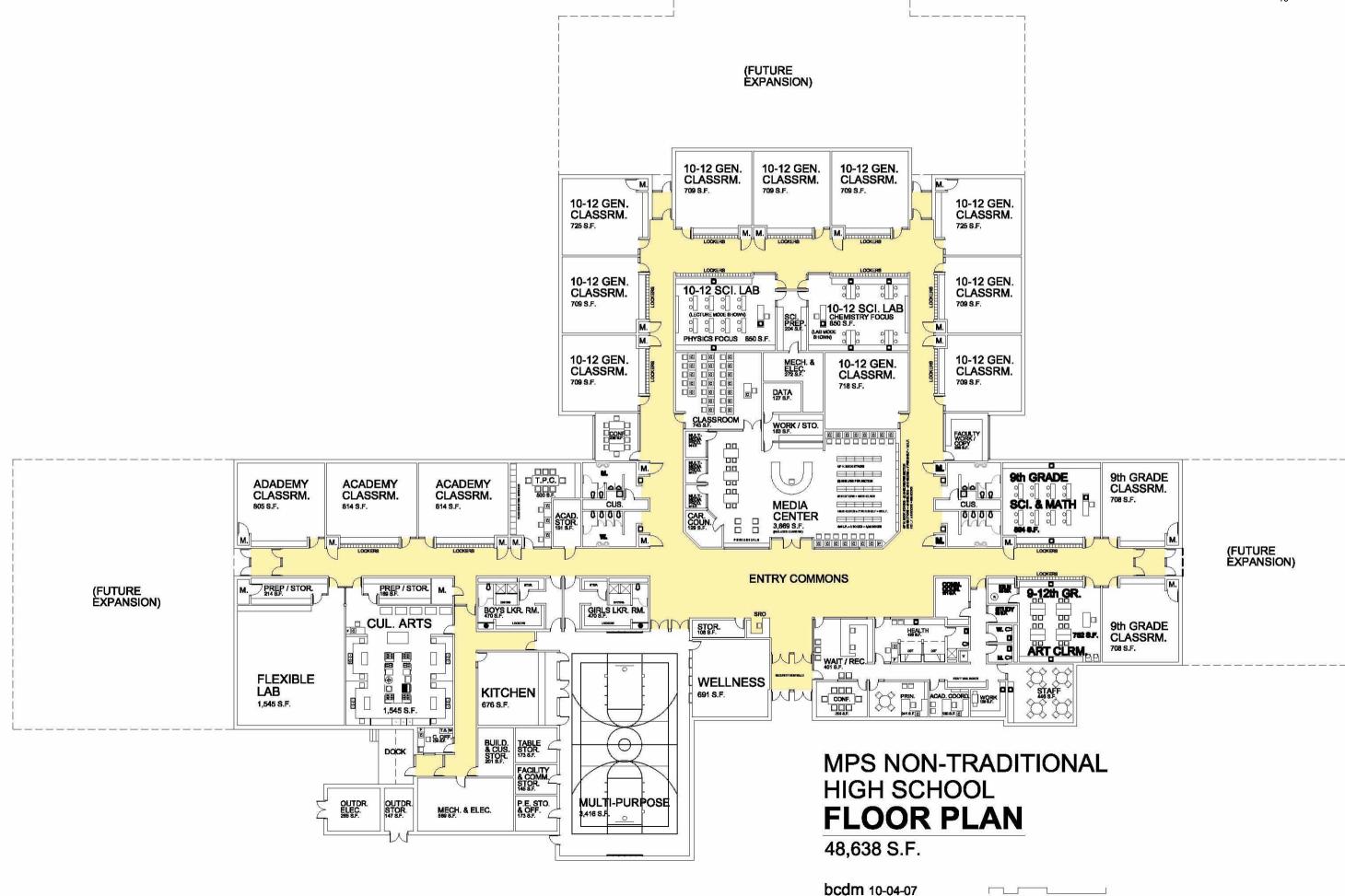


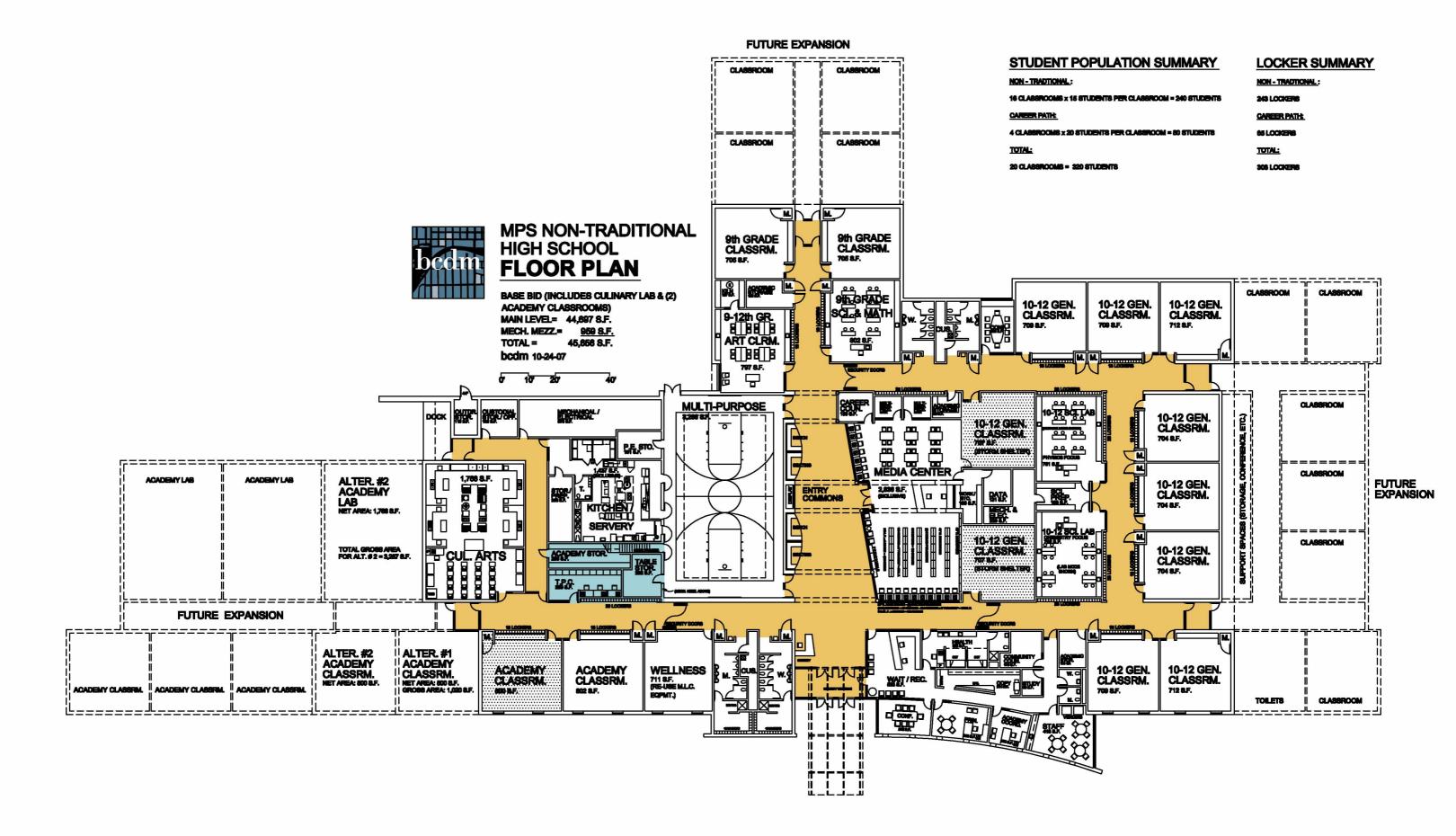














MPS NON-TRADITIONAL HIGH SCHOOL SOUTH ELEVATION

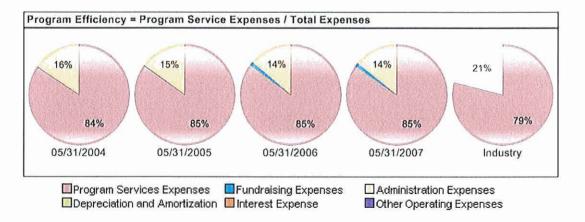
NONPROFIT OPERATIONAL ANALYSIS

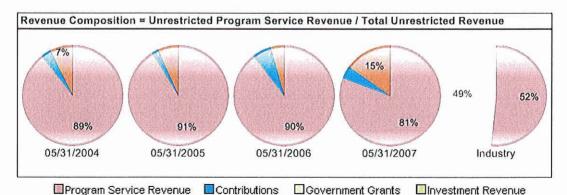
Other Operating Revenue



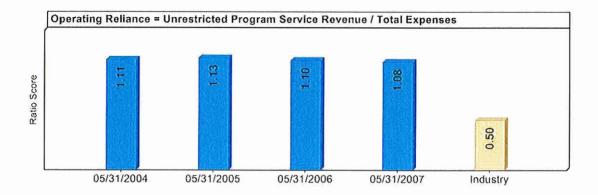
Generally, how is the organization managing money with regard to its sector and mission?

Conditions have stayed quite similar to the way they were last period, at least in this very specific area of the report. The organization's program efficiency ration is "average" or in-line with that of other organizations in the sector. Program efficiency is important because it measures to some degree an organization's discipline in meeting strategic goals and such. It is good to note that much revenue is generated from programs, which also is a big positive, especially since it is clear that program revenues also contribute significantly to paying for total operating expenses. This indicates that the organization does not have to rely heavily on outside funding, yet the organization still was able to generate a higher level of contributions this period as compared to the prior year, which is a good result.





Net Assets Released From Restrictions



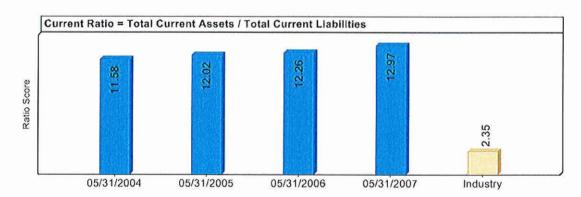

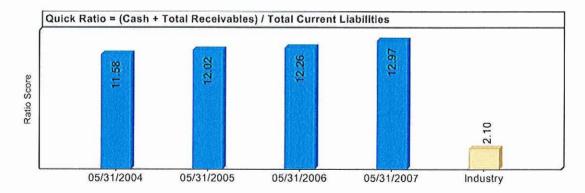


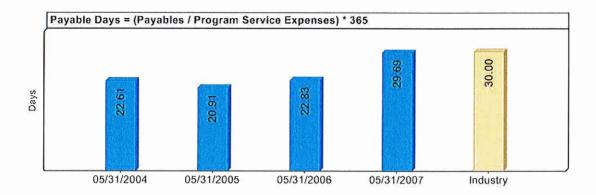
Generally, what is the organization's ability to meet obligations as they come due?

The organization's overall liquidity position is sound and has been kept solid since last period. Even better, this was achieved while the income side of the business improved. Often, when revenues or operating yield dollars are growing, the cash position may suffer, but this is clearly not the case here. It should be noted that the organization's liquidity position is even "strong" related to the industry. Superior liquidity can be used to fund investments, which can ultimately help the organization gain a competitive advantage within its industry.

One additional note: The organization's payable days ratio is about average relative to its sector. Over time, we would generally like to see this key metric float downwards, even though the organization's overall liquidity, as measured by the current ratio, is good.







OPERATING YIELD TRENDS¹



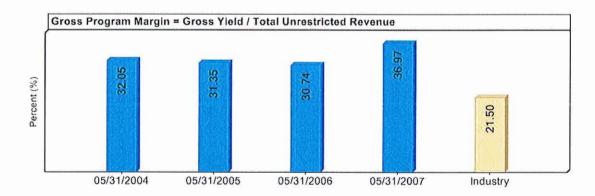
Are trends favorable in the organization?

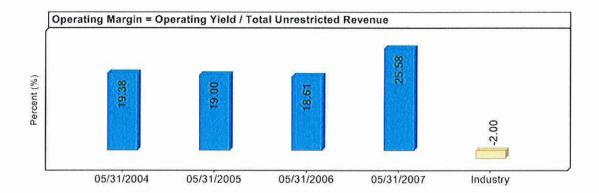
The Foundation's revenues have increased this period, and so have its net gain dollars. This organization is clearly performing well in the Operating yield area at this time. Additionally, it has been able to maintain its above average operating margin from last period. This stable (and strong) operating margin – along with the increase in revenues – indicates that the organization is growing its operations at a good and measured pace. Managers have resisted the tendency to overspend as revenues are rising. This is an excellent result.

Whenever an organization has a good operating margin and increases revenues and net gains concurrently, most other aspects of its finances will fall into place; for example, this will typically cause the Foundation's cash position to improve over time, giving the organization a cushion if revenue growth slows in the future and it generally leads to stronger overall financial health.

Keep in mind that the operating margin is the operating yield percentage – the cents of net gain extracted from each revenue dollar generated. This Foundation has maintained a strong operating margin over multiple periods, which is particularly good. Consistently operating with a surplus means that the organization is performing well both generally and relative to sector peers; this is depicted in the graph area of the report. The operating margin is the most important Statement of Activities ratio to manage because it indicates how effective you are at balancing its revenue dollars and its expenses.

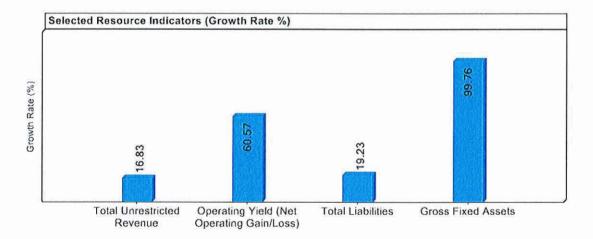

We have reviewed the accompanying statement of financial position of the Millard Schools Education Foundation, Inc. as of May 31, 2007 and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the year then ended, in accordance with Statements on Standards for Accounting and Review Services issued by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. All information included in these financial statements is the representation of the management of the Millard Schools Education Foundation, Inc.

A review consists principally of inquiries of company personnel and analytical procedures applied to financial data. It is substantially less in scope than an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, the objective of which is the expression of an opinion regarding the financial statements taken as a whole. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion.

Based on our review, we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the accompanying financial statements in order for them to be in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

The May 31, 2006 financial statements were audited by us, and we expressed an unqualified opinion on them in our report dated September 1, 2006. We have not performed any auditing procedures since that date.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. NATURE OF ACTIVITIES

The purpose of Millard Schools Education Foundation, Inc. (the "Foundation") is to promote the welfare of children and youth in school and community, to raise the standards of school life and to bring into closer relation the home and the school so that parents and teachers may cooperate in the training of children.

The Foundation has been providing services and funds to the Millard Public School District (the "District") since 1984. It issues scholarships and operates the Kids' Network Child Care Program in 23 elementary schools in the District. These programs are currently being operated absent of any rental fees. The Foundation also provides grant money to the District.

The Millard Schools Education Foundation, Inc. has been classified by the Internal Revenue Service as an organization other than a private foundation and is exempt from Federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting as required by generally accepted accounting principles in the United States of America.

Financial Statement Presentation

The Foundation has adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, "Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations." Under SFAS No. 117, the Foundation is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted.

<u>Unrestricted</u> - Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Board of Directors or may otherwise be limited by contractual agreements with outside parties. As of May 31, 2007, the Board had designated \$47,293 for scholarships.

<u>Temporarily restricted</u> - Net assets whose use by the Foundation is subject to donor-imposed stipulations that can be fulfilled by actions of the Foundation pursuant to those stipulations or that expire by the passage of time.

<u>Permanently restricted</u> - Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently by the Foundation. Generally, the donors of these assets permit the Foundation to use all or part of the income earned on these assets.

Expenses are generally reported as decreases in unrestricted net assets. Expirations of donor-imposed stipulations that simultaneously increase one category of net assets and decrease another are reported as reclassifications between the applicable categories.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS, CONTINUED

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, CONTINUED

Temporarily restricted net assets for which donor-imposed restrictions are met in subsequent reporting periods are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported as net assets released from restrictions. Net assets released from restrictions also include unrestricted, temporarily restricted or permanently restricted net assets where donors have added, changed or removed restrictions on contributions. Net assets which have no donor stipulated restrictions, as well as contributions for which donors have stipulated restrictions but which are met within the same reporting period, are reported as unrestricted support.

Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Foundation considers all unrestricted highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Contributions

Contributions are recognized when the donor makes a promise to give to the Foundation that is, in substance, unconditional. Donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets depending on the nature of the restrictions. When a restriction expires, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets.

Receivables

The Foundation records receivable balances at net realizable value using the allowance method to record anticipated uncollectible balances. There were no accounts receivable as of May 31, 2007.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment is recorded at acquisition cost if purchased. Donations of property and equipment are recorded as support at their estimated fair value at the date of gift. Such donations are reported as unrestricted support unless the donor has restricted the donated asset to a specific purpose. Assets donated with explicit restrictions regarding their use and contributions of cash that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as restricted support. Absent donor stipulations regarding how long those donated assets must be maintained, the Foundation reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service as instructed by the donor. The Foundation reclassifies temporarily restricted net assets to unrestricted net assets at that time. Property and equipment is depreciated using the straight-line method over the assets' estimated useful lives of three to forty years.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS, CONTINUED

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, CONTINUED

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Comparative Information

The financial statements include certain prior-year summarized comparative information in total but not by net asset class. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles in the United States of America. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the Foundation's financial statements for the year ended May 31, 2006, from which the summarized information was derived.

3. BANK DEPOSITS

At May 31, 2007, the carrying amount of the Foundation's deposits was \$479,698, and bank balances were \$1,259,941 of which only \$226,289 was covered by FDIC insurance.

4. INVESTMENTS

Investments are initially recorded at their acquisition cost if they are purchased and at fair value if they are received as a contribution. Investments in equity securities with readily determined market values and all debt securities are reported at their fair value. Unrealized gains and losses resulting from changes in fair value are reported in the statement of activities and result in increases or decreases to unrestricted net assets unless their use is temporarily or permanently restricted by donors to a specified purpose or future period.

Investments presented in the financial statements are part of a cash management account, which has investments in the following:

7. PENSION PLAN

The Foundation maintains a defined contribution pension plan. Employees are eligible to participate in the plan upon completion of six months of service and attaining age twenty. Employees may generally elect to contribute up to \$12,000 of their salary to the plan. The Foundation may make discretionary matching contributions up to the lesser of 50% of the contribution or 10% of salary for each employee participating in the plan. The Foundation made matching contributions for the year ended May 31, 2007 in the amount of \$26,702.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS, CONTINUED

9. COMMITMENTS

The Foundation leases office facilities under a noncancellable operating lease that expires August 31, 2008. Rent expense for the year ended May 31, 2007 amounted to \$24,600. The foundation also leases a copier and printer under an operating lease agreement that expires December 31, 2007. Rent expense for this equipment for the year ended May 31, 2007 was \$2,566. The future minimum rental payments on these leases as of May 31, 2007 are as follows:

11. RESTRICTIONS ON NET ASSETS

Temporarily restricted net assets at May 31, 2007 consist of contributions received for scholarships to be awarded in future periods and contributions held for certain schools in the Millard School District, which are intended for school improvements.

Permanently restricted net assets at May 31, 2007 consist of endowment fund investments to be held in perpetuity, the income from which is expendable for scholarships.

12. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent to May 31, 2007, the Foundation closed on a land purchase which they had placed a good faith deposit of \$25,000 on prior to the fiscal year end. Additionally, the Foundation spent \$1,610 on architect fees prior to year end that are related to this project. Both of these amounts are included in other assets on the Statement of Financial Position.

BYLAWS OF

MILLARD SCHOOLS EDUCATION FOUNDATION, INC.

ARTICLE I

The name of the corporation shall be: Millard Schools Education Foundation, Inc.. sometimes referred to in these Bylaws as the Foundation.

ARTICLE II

Purposes

1. The purposes for which this Foundation is formed are those set forth in its Certificate of Incorporation, as from time to time amended; namely, to promote the welfare of children and youth in school and community; to raise the standards of school life; and to bring into closer relation the hone and the school, that parents and teachers may cooperate in the training of children.

The Foundation is not formed for pecuniary or financial gain, and no part of the assets. income or profit of the Foundation is distributable to, or inures to the benefit of its directors or officers except to the extent permitted under the Nonprofit Corporation Act of the State of Nebraska. No part of the activities of the Foundation shall he the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting. to influence legislation. and the Foundation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.

2. The purpose of the Foundation is to provide financial support for the propagation of educational, vocational, and athletic development and education of students.

ARTICLE III

Basic Policies

The following axe basic policies of the Foundation:

- 1. The Foundation shall be noncommercial, nonsectarian, and nonpartisan.
- 2. The name of the Foundation or the names of any members in their official capacities shall not be used in any connection with a commercial concern or with any partisan interest or for any purpose not appropriately related to promotion of the objectives of the Foundation.
- 3. The Foundation shall cooperate with the schools to support the improvement of education in ways which will not interfere with administration of the schools and shall not seek to control their policies.
- 4. The Foundation may cooperate with other organizations and agencies concerned with student welfare but persons representing the Foundation in such matters shall make no commitments that bind the Foundation.

ARTICLE IV

Board of Directors

1. Composition

- (a) The Board of Directors shall consist of fifteen members. One member shall be a current Board of Education member appointed by the President of the Board of Education. One member shall be the Superintendent of the Millard School District. One member shall be the Director of Communications of the Millard School District. The other twelve members shall be residents of the Millard School District or have a sincere interest in the welfare of the Millard School District and its community. Only two of those twelve members shall be employed by the Millard Public Schools and shall be appointed by the Superintendent. The members of the Board of Directors shall serve until the election and qualification of their successors.
- 2. The Duties of the Board of Directors shall be:
 - (a) To transact necessary business of the Foundation;
 - (b) To create standing committees;
 - (c) To approve the plans of work of the standing committees;
 - (d) To appoint an auditor or an auditing committee;
 - (e) To approve a budget for the fiscal year.

3. Term of Office

- (a) The term of office for Directors shall be two (2) years unless otherwise elected for a shorter term. There shall be no election in the first year.
- (b) Members of the Board of Directors shall elect the directors for the succeeding years at the annual meeting of the Foundation.
- (c) Each Director shall hold office commencing on the day of his or her election until the conclusion of the annual meeting which coincides with the expiration of his or her term, or until his or her earlier resignation, death or removal from office. A Director may be elected to succeed himself or herself. Only the designee of the President of the Board of Education and the Superintendent of Schools may serve more than three (3) consecutive terms.
- 4. Resignation, Removal and Vacancies

A director may resign at any time by instrument in writing to that effect filed with the Secretary.

Whenever any vacancies shall occur among the Directors, the remaining Directors shall constitute the Directors of the Foundation until such vacancy is filled or until the number of Directors is changed. The remaining Directors shall, by a vote of a majority of their number, fill any vacancy for the unexpired term.

5. Voting, Quorum and Adjournments

A majority of the total number of Directors shall constitute a quorum at any duly called meeting. Any meeting called by a majority of the Directors may adjourn from time

to time and place to place within or without the State of Nebraska, provided that notice of adjournment is given to any Directors who may not have been present at the time of the vote for the adjournment. All business and acts of the Directors shall be determined by the affirmative vote of a majority of the Directors present.

6. Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the Board of Directors shall be held in April of each year at the Millard Education Foundation office at 7:00 p.m. OR at such other time and at such place after written notice has been given to all Directors, as may be fixed by the Board of Directors, or if it falls to do so, by the President. The annual meeting shall be held for the purpose of electing Directors and officers and transacting any other business.

7. Regular Meetings

Regular meetings of the Directors shall be held at least quarterly at such time and place as is determined by the President and set forth in the Notice of Meeting.

8. Special Meetings

Special meetings of the Directors ma,y be held at any time within or without the State of Nebraska upon call by the President or by any two (2) Directors. Notice of each such meeting shall be given to each Director in writing or in person not less than forty-eight (48) hours prior to such meeting. Unless otherwise specified in the notice thereof, the business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that set forth in the Notice of Meeting.

9. Notice and Waivers of Notice

Except as otherwise provided in these Bylaws, notice of each annual or regular meeting of Directors shall be given to each Director in writing or in person not less than five (5) nor more than thirty (30) days prior to such meeting.

Notice of special meetings shall be governed by Section 8 of these Bylaws.

Any Director may waive notice of any meeting and by attending any meeting without protesting the lack of proper notice, shall be deemed to have waived notice thereof.

10. Electronic Voting

Any action which shall or may, be taken at any annual or special meeting of the board of directors may be taken without a meeting, without prior notice and without a vote, if a consent in writing, setting forth the action so taken, shall be signed by not less than the minimum number of members of the board of directors that would be necessary to authorize or take such action at a meeting. A facsimile, e-mail or other electronic transmission consenting to an action to be taken and transmitted by a member of the board of directors to the corporation shall be deemed to be written, signed and dated for the purposes of this section, provided that any such facsimile, e-mail or other electronic transmission sets forth or is delivered with information from which the corporation can determine that the facsimile, e-mail or other electronic transmission was transmitted by the member of the board of directors and the date on which such member of the board of directors transmitted such Facsimile, e-mail or electronic transmission. The date on which such facsimile, e-mail or electronic transmission is transmitted shall be deemed to

be the date on which such consent was signed. Any copy, facsimile or other reliable reproduction of a consent in writing may be substituted or used in lieu of the original writing for any and all purposes for which the original writing could be used, provided that such copy, facsimile or other reproduction shall be a complete reproduction of the entire original writing. Prompt notice of the taking of the corporate action without a meeting by less than unanimous written consent shall be given to those members of the board of directors who have not consented in writing." Ratification of any actions taken in this manner will be done by a simple vote at the next regular board meeting, accomplished similarly to approval of the minutes.

11. Compensation

The Directors shall not receive salaries, fees or compensation for their service as Directors or for their attendance at any meeting or committee meeting of Directors.

12. Duality of Interest

A Director having a conflict of interest or conflict of responsibility on any matter involving the Foundation or any other business entity or person shall refrain from voting on such matter.

No Director shall use his or her position as a Director of the Foundation for his or her own direct or indirect financial gain.

ARTICLE V

Committees

The Directors may create such committees, including an Executive Committee, and appoint such persons and assign such duties and powers to them to facilitate the administration of the Foundation.

ARTICLE VI

Officers and Their Election

1. Officers

- (a) The officers of the Foundation shall consist of a President, a President-Elect, a Secretary and a Treasurer.
 - (b) Officers shall be elected I the Directors at the annual meeting.
- (c) Officers shall assume their official duties following the close of the annual meeting in April.
- (d) The President shall serve for a term of one (1) year, to be succeeded by the President-Elect.
- (e) The President-Elect shall serve as President-Elect for one year, and upon the end of his or her term, shall assume the title and duties of President.

(f) The Secretary and Treasurer shall each serve for one (1) year. The Secretary and Treasurer shall not be eligible to serve more than two consecutive terms in the same office.

2. Election

- (a) There shall be a nominating committee composed of three (3) members selected by the Board of Directors from its body.
- (b) The nominating committee shall nominate one eligible person for each office to be filled, and report its nominees at the regular meeting in January.
 - (c) Other persons may be nominated by members of the Board of Directors.
- (d) Only those persons who have signified their consent to serve if elected shall be nominated for or elected to such office.

3. Vacancy

A vacancy occurring in any office shall be filled for the unexpired term by a person elected by a majority vote of the Board of Directors, notice of such election having been given. In case a vacancy occurs in the office of President, the President-Elect shall serve notice of the election.

ARTICLE VII

Duties of Officers

- 1. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Directors at which he may be present; shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed by these Bylaws or assigned to him by the Board of Directors and shall coordinate the work of the officers and the committees of the Foundation in order that the purposes may be promoted.
- 2. The President-Elect shall act as an aide to the President and shall perform the duties of the President in the absence or disability of that officer to act.
- 3. The Secretary shall record the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors and shall perform such other duties as may be delegated to him.
- 4. The Treasurer shall have custody of all of the funds of the Foundation; shall keep a full and accurate account of the receipts and expenditures; and shall make disbursements in accordance with the approved budget as authorized by the Board of Directors, or a special committee. The Treasurer shall present a financial statement when requested by the Board of Directors and shall make a full report at the annual meeting. The Treasurer shall be responsible for the maintenance of such books of account and records as conform to the requirement of the Bylaws.

The Treasurers accounts shall be examined annually by an auditor or an auditing committee of not less than three (3) members, who, satisfied that the Treasurer's annual report is correct, shall sign a statement of that fact at the end of the report.

5. All officers shall:

(a) Perform the duties prescribed in the parliamentary authority in addition to those outlined by these Bylaws and those assigned from time to time.

(b) Deliver to their successors all official material not later than ten (10) days following the election of their successors.

6. Compensation

The Directors are authorized to determine or provide the method for the compensation reimbursement of expense of all officers. No Director shall receive compensation for serving as a Director, provided, however, reimbursement for reasonable expenses may be paid if it does not endanger the tax exempt status of the Foundation.

ARTICLE VIII

Indemnity and Reimbursement

1. Persons Covered.

Any person made a party to or threatened with any action, suit or proceedings (civil or criminal), by reason of the fact that he or she is or was a director, officer or employee of this corporation or is or has been serving at the request of the corporation as a director, officer or employee of another corporation shall be indemnified by this corporation against reasonable expenses including attorneys' and accountants' fees and court costs actually and reasonably incurred in connection with the defense of such instituted or threatened action, suit or proceeding, or in connection with any appeal therein, if such person conducted himself or herself in good faith, and reasonably believed: (i) in the case of conduct in his or her official capacity with the corporation, that his or her conduct was in its best interests; (ii) in all other cases, that his or her conduct was at least not opposed to its best interests; and (iii) in the case of any criminal proceedings, the director had no reasonable cause to believe his or her conduct was unlawful, except in relation to matters as to which he or she shall be adjudged in action, suit or proceeding to be liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of his duty in said capacity. Moreover, any person who serves as a director or officer of the Corporation shall be indemnified from and against any civil liability or damages for any act or omission which results in damages or injury if such person was acting within the scope of his or her official functions and duties as a director or officer (unless such damage or injury was caused by the willful or wanton act or omission of such director or officer).

2. Reimbursement.

This corporation shall also reimburse to any person qualifying for indemnification of costs under Section 1 of this Article VIII, the reasonable costs of settlement of the underlying action, suit or proceeding referred to therein.

3. Nonexclusive Provision.

The foregoing right of indemnity and reimbursement shall not be deemed exclusive of any other rights to which any officer or director or employee may be entitled under any other Bylaw, agreement, or otherwise.

4. Amount of Indemnity.

The amount of indemnity or reimbursement to which any of the foregoing indemnities may be entitled shall be fixed by the Board of Directors, except that in any

case where there is no disinterested majority of the Board of Directors available (whether a quorum or not) the amount shall be fixed by a committee of arbitrators appointed by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IX

Procedure

All meetings of the Foundation shall be conducted pursuant to Roberts Rules of Order.

ARTICLE X

Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended, repealed or altered in whole or in part by a majority vote at any regular or special meeting of the Board of Directors of the Foundation.

Millard Public Schools Board of Education Legislative Resolutions and Standing Position 2007

Continuing Resolutions

BE IT RESOLVED, that members of the Millard Public Schools' Board of Education are committed to providing quality education for the children of the Millard Public Schools District and ensuring that the boundaries of the Millard Public School District continue to exist as they exist today, and to take whatever action is necessary to ensure that the best interest of our students are, as they always have been, the paramount concern of the Millard Public Educational System; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Education for the Millard Public Schools is charged with the duty and obligation to provide a quality education to the students and residents of the Millard Public School District, and the Millard Board of Education is adamantly opposed to any action by the Omaha Public School District, or any other entity which interferes or disrupts the education of the students or the established curriculum of the Millard Public Schools District; and

THEREFORE BE IT8RESOLVED that the Millard Public Schools District and its Board of Education will take any and all action necessary in the Courts and/or in the state legislature to resist such actions by the Omaha Public Schools, or any other entity which is intended to interfere, disrupt or encroach on the Millard Public School District (2006).

Standing Positions

1. The Millard Public Schools supports the independence of established Class III school districts within cities of the metropolitan class. We believe that any legislation should clarify and support the right of these Class III school districts to remain as independent districts, and that such districts may only waive their right to exist independently of other districts within cities of the metropolitan class through existing reorganization laws, the consent of the

boards of education of each affected district and approval by the residents of each affected district (2006).

- 2. The Millard Public Schools supports legislation that seeks accurate and transparent accounting of all funds that support education from local, state and federal sources (2006).
- 3. State funding should be sufficient to keep teacher's salaries regionally competitive (2003).
- 4. A legislative solution is the most effective way to resolve the issues that are represented in the current finance litigation (2003).
- 5. Additional state funding should follow any new requirements for new or revised assessments (2002).
- 6. School finance studies should focus on adequacy of funding (2002).
- 7. State and local taxpayers share the responsibility for the Pre-K through 12th grade educational program. The funding should reflect an equitable distribution of state revenue (2001).
- 8. School districts should be encouraged to support ongoing maintenance of school buildings; therefore spending and levy restrictions should be removed from the building fund (2001).
- 9. Federal and state governments should never impose un-funded mandates (2001).
- 10.Local boards of education are accountable to their community for making decisions regarding the educational program and are in the best position to make decisions on curriculum, management and funding (2001).
- 11. Financial decisions on lids and levies are best made at a local level where elected officials are most accountable to the community (2001).
