At 7:00 p.m. Brad Burwell called the meeting to order and announced that the public meeting act is posted on the wall and available for public inspection. Mr. Burwell asked everyone to say the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll call was taken and members presented included Brad Burwell, Jean Stothert, Mike Pate, and Dave Anderson. Absent at the time of roll call was Linda Poole and Mike Kennedy.

Motion by Jean Stothert, seconded by Mike Pate, to excuse Linda Poole and Mike Kennedy from the meeting, upon roll call vote, all members voted aye. Motion carried.

Motion by Jean Stothert, seconded by Dave Anderson to approve the Board of Education Minutes from December 3, 2007, to approve bills, and to receive the treasurer's report and place on file, upon roll call vote, all members voted aye. Motion carried.

Mike Kennedy arrived at 7:03 p.m.

#### Superintendent's Report:

- 1. A reminder to board members that Friday is the last day of school for this year, and students will return on January, 7, 2008.
- 2. There was a Building Bright Futures community meeting and press conference held today at the Holiday Inn. Each committee summarized what their committee is doing, and everyone is finding out that this is only the beginning.
- 3. This afternoon there was a meeting with the Learning Community Superintendents and Senator Raikes. Ken Fossen presented his financial report. Senator Raikes said he was working on some language and he will let everyone know. Senator Raikes was very cordial and interacted with those in attendance. Senator Raikes said not to look for any changes until February. Dr. Lutz will keep the board informed as the process moves along.

#### **Board Comments:**

Jean Stothert said she attended the meeting with Brad Burwell, Linda Poole, Dr. Lutz, and Governor Heineman a couple of weeks ago. She said that Dr. Lutz did a great job in explaining what is going on in Millard. He provided the Governor with several pieces of material to back-up his presentation. Mrs. Stothert said she didn't get the feeling at all like the Governor was telling Millard that he was getting mixed messages from Millard, and not any more than any other district. The Governor listened to what was being said, and he asked a lot of good questions. It was a very productive meeting.

Mrs. Stothert attended the annual Senator luncheon last week. Mrs. Stothert said it was interesting, that the question was asked about what changes should be made to LB 641, but, Dr. Lutz did a good job of explaining the position of the board and the District.

Mrs. Stothert commented on an article in the Midlands Voices from Sunday by Senator Raikes and Senator Ashford about the Learning Community. Mrs. Stothert said if you read the article it tells all of the positives of the Learning Community and LB 641, but she said it makes her wonder if this is the first of many articles and attempts to educate the public on how well LB 641 is going to work, and to get them ready for the session when there will be very little said and done with LB 641. She, personally, encouraged the Learning Community Superintendent's to compose an article with another point view in how it will affect the individual school districts and the issues that are seen within it. She said not to make it sound like the districts are whining, but wanting to make it work, and everyone wants it to be good, and it needs to work for everyone. It was an interesting article, and she said that the World-Herald opinion is much the same, so it doesn't surprise her that the article was printed.

Mrs. Stothert wished everyone a Happy Holiday.

Dave Anderson thanked the staff at Cody Elementary for their invitation to the Winter Breakfast. He reported that Cody staff members provided some entertainment by singing.

Mr. Anderson wished Happy Holidays to everyone and wished the students good luck on their finals this week.

Mike Kennedy had a few comments in regards to LB 641. Mr. Kennedy began by saying, that the World-Herald has taken it upon themselves to talk about naysayers in there current editorial. It has become laughable how much they protest people that are against some of the concepts of the Learning Community. His personal position as an elected board member of this District, he explained that he was against the governance structure for a couple of reasons. First there is limited voting. He said he has a political science degree, and never once has he heard the words "limited and voting" put together and it means something good for democracy. The process limits the ability of our district and people in the Learning Community to be able to select people that will be able to levy a property tax.

Secondly, it is taxation without representation. The Learning Community is a scheme that is designed to limit people's ability to properly vote for those who will levy a property tax on them. We have people that will be appointed to represent Millard on the Learning Community that don't even live in Millard. They could live in Bellevue, Douglas County West, OPS, Westside, and there is nothing wrong with that, but when you levy a property tax that is something personal. I think for those people in our community whether they are from Papillion/LaVista, Gretna, Millard, and OPS, to say that is undemocratic in nature, you shouldn't be called a naysayer. Mr. Kennedy said, that the World Herald

should be commended for its position on helping with education, but there are other board members, educational board members that have a difference of opinions in the structure. Should we cooperate, yes? But, he says, they keep saying how LB 641 creates this new school between Elkhorn, Westside, and OPS. The truth of the matter is it was created with an existing law. The Learning Community does not go into effect for another year as far as an elected board, nor will they have any monies to spend for over two years. I think we have been able to show that there is cooperation. He wished that those people that speak to our public would tell the truth.

Mr. Kennedy's final point what, that it has been said that school boards were behind LB 641 from the get go. Not, true. This board did not take a formal position until after the bill was passed, or when a certain member of the legislature said they had 43 votes, and are you going to stand in the way. I think this is the type of revision of the history that is being told to the public right now, this is misinforming about their options in dealing with it. Should the bill be fixed, yes? Should we get rid of the concept of cooperation, no? Do we have the responsibility to help children within our community, we sure do.

Brad Burwell said as an addendum to what Mike Kennedy said, and truthfully to kind of correlate to what Jean was saying about our meeting with the Governor. I don't think it was by chance that he wanted to get our impression of what was going on with LB 641, and get a pulse of what everybody was feeling in the metro community, and truthfully to Mike's point we're about supporting education in the metro community whatever we need to do to be able to get that. The bill is not perfect we understand that. I think that there is a belief, both on our part, on the part of the Governor, and probably Senator Raikes, that there is going to be some tweaking to that bill, but we have no idea at this point in time what that will be.

Mr. Burwell continued with his comments by saying what was most interesting about the meeting with the Governor was asking us about our leadership position and taking the leadership position throughout the metro on the education of children and also doing it in an efficient manner. We did present a lot of information to him, and interestingly, with or without federal aid we are the lowest cost provider of education in the entire metro area. You can look at any numbers that you want, with or without, we are able to do that in a manner that delivers outstanding education, and you can look at the results at a very cost efficient price. We talked about our program based budgeting, we talked about how the concepts of our curriculum delivery, our new high school, and all of the different things that we have going for us in Millard, and we have a growing demographic change in the district. This is not a suburban school district, this is an urban school district in Millard and we have a changing demographic that we are dealing with, and working with, and we're still able to get the results. That is why we were there talking with the Governor. He wanted to know, and to Jean's point, there was not mixed messages. He knew that we were taking a leadership role on this and we will continue to take a leadership role on educating students and children in the Omaha metro area.

Mr. Burwell said that at this time of year that he feels blessed to be in a district such as this, and he wished everyone a Happy Holiday.

Jessica Lamb, student representative from Millard South, Derek Collins, student representative from Millard North, and Jill Hindmarsh, student representative from Millard West, reported on all of their academic and athletic activities from the past few weeks.



**Description:** Summer Sessions 2008 for elementary, middle, and high school students.

**Background:** In order to comply with the Nebraska guidelines for summer school found in LB641, we propose lengthening the class sessions to three hours (plus 15 minutes of recess) in the **elementary** school and offering three four-day weeks for a total of twelve sessions. **The proposed fee is \$100.00. Special education fee is \$95.** 

For **middle school**, we propose the same calendar, but these older students would be able to take two classes. The early classes would be devoted to academic recovery or advancement. The later classes would be for enrichment. Sessions will last from 8:00 - 11:15 and 11:50 to 3:00 with a half-hour lunch break. We will arrange for our food service to sell simple lunches in the cafeteria. **The proposed fee is \$100.00. Special education fee is \$95.** 

At the **high school** level, the three-hour time requirement will result in the least change necessary. The class sessions will be longer, and the days will be fewer than in past summers (three-hour classes for 23 days). All of the classes offered for credit are in the existing curriculum. One change is that high school students will be able to earn a maximum of 10 credits this summer. The days will be long, so we are arranging with food service to sell "brunch" in the cafeteria, and we have built a half-hour brunch break in to the schedule. **The proposed fee is \$100.00. Special education fee is \$95.** 

Non-resident fees are 150% of the fee for a resident. Special education programs are not available for non-residents.

# **Summer Session Proposal**

In order to comply with the Nebraska guidelines for summer school, we propose lengthening the class sessions to three hours (plus 15 minutes of recess) in the **elementary** school and offering three four-day weeks for a total of twelve sessions. Each student would be able to participate in only one class. This will require combining classes that have been written (reading and math) or adding components to classes as follow:

- measurement added to Fizzing Liquids,
- math applications added to Lego Technics,
- and *drama* added to Music and Movement.

We also propose adding the following classes that will need to be written:

- Simple Spanish for Grade 1,
- Books and Bugs (read Eric Carle's books about bugs and study insects)
- Spanish (for both Grades 2-3 and Grades 4-5)
- Math Quest (with Fermi math problem solving)
- Music Explosion!! (vocal and instrumental, plus software)

For **middle school**, we propose the same calendar, but these older students would be able to take two classes. The early classes would be devoted to academic recovery or advancement. The later classes would be for enrichment. Sessions will last from 8:00 to 3:00 with a half-hour lunch break. We will arrange for our food service to sell simple lunches in the cafeteria.

Again, to make best use of the required three-hour class sessions, a few classes will need some writing to be enhanced as follow:

- Writing skills will be added to Reading
- Organizing for Success will be added to Study Skills in 6th Grade
- Reading for Pleasure (one of the forty assets) will be added to Study Skills in 7th Grade
- Decision Making and Community Service (more of the forty assets) will be added to Study Skills in 8<sup>th</sup> Grade

In addition, one new academic course will need to be written:

6<sup>th</sup> Grade Math Prep for pre-algebra (must be registered for Pre-Algebra in 6<sup>th</sup> grade)

Among the enrichment classes, a few new classes are suggested and would need to be written. Those include

- Career Exploration Camp (culinary arts, transportation and distribution, criminal justice, business/finance/insurance, business management/entrepreneurship, health—several guest speakers and field trips are planned)\*
- Swing Choir Singing and Dancing Techniques
- Spanish Review
- World Language and Culture Exploration (Japanese, Mandarin, Arabic)\*

At the **high school** level, the three-hour time requirement will result in the least change necessary. The class sessions will be longer, and the days will be fewer than in past summers (three-hour classes for 23 days). All of the classes offered for credit are in the existing curriculum. One change is that high school students will be able to earn a maximum of 10 credits this summer. The days will be long, so we are arranging with food service to sell "brunch" in the cafeteria and we have built a half-hour brunch break in to the schedule.

One change for high school is to offer the opportunity to earn 10 credits of biology in a double session.

One new class that we suggest be added and offered for no cost and by invitation only for elective credit: English Language Learners (for Levels 1, 2 and 3 only).

One new non-credit mini-course that is planned is Writing the College Application Essay. This three-week course will require only a minimum of teacher time to write.

We propose advertising the three summer school administrative positions among the current and past members of the leadership academy who do not currently hold administrative positions. Those hired would in turn hire the appropriate staff for their sites and order the necessary supplies. In addition, each site will need a secretary/health aide, and the high school will also need a counselor.

Depending on enrollment, we may need as many as 16 teachers for our elementary summer session. They would work four hours a day for 12 days. Assuming they earn an average of \$30 an hour, that is a cost of \$23,040.

We may need as many as 17 teachers for 4 hours for 12 days and 4 teachers for 4 hours for 4 days for the middle school summer session. Again assuming an average of \$30 per hour, that is a cost of \$30,240.

We may need as many as 30 teachers for the high school. They would work for 8 hours a day for 23 days. Assuming an average of \$30 per hour, this is a cost of \$165,600.

This is a total cost for instruction of \$218,880, not counting administrative or material costs.

Last year, 358 students attended the elementary summer session, 92 students registered for 122 slots in middle school summer session 533 high school students enrolled in 820 slots in the summer session

If we have similar attendance this summer, tuition would account for \$35,800 for elementary, \$12,200 for middle school, and \$82,000 for high school.

This would be a total tuition collected of \$130,000. We hope that middle school enrollment will increase—we have planned an interesting session that we hope will appeal to students, and the sessions will last nearly all day, which we think will appeal to parents of middle school students.

Some money has been set aside in the strategic plan for summer school: \$147,000.

We would expect to qualify for about \$250,000 reimbursement from the state since we will meet their guidelines.

Considering Policy and Rule 6750.1 regarding student fees for summer school:

According to this rule, <u>elementary</u> students pay \$50.00 for 1.5 hours of instruction per day for 10 days. This equates to an allowable fee of \$ .055 per minute.

Our proposed fee for elementary summer session 2008 is \$100 for 3 hours of instruction and 20 minutes for a scheduled recess each day for 12 days. This equates to \$.042 per minute.

By rule, <u>middle school</u> students pay \$80 for 1.75 hours of instruction per day for 15 days. This equates to an allowable fee of \$.05 per minute.

Our proposed fee for middle school summer session in 2008 is \$100 for 3 hours of instruction and a 15-minute restroom break each day for 12 days. This equates to \$.043 per minute.

The mini-courses at the middle school will also be 3 hours plus 15 minutes each day for 12 days. The fee will be \$35. This equates to \$ .045 per minute

By rule, <u>high school</u> students pay \$170 for 150 minutes of instruction for 27 days. This equates to an allowable fee of \$.042 per minute.

Our proposed fee for high school summer session in 2008 is \$100 for 3 hours of instruction and one 10-minute restroom break each day for 23 days. This equates to \$.023 per minute

The mini-courses at the high school will also be 3 hours plus 10 minutes each day for 14 days. The fee will be \$60. This equates to \$ .0225 per minute.

By rule, elementary special education summer school students pay \$105 (for 3.25 hours per day for ten days in June) or \$90.50 (for 3.5 hours per day for eight days in July). This equates to \$.054 per minute.

Middle school special education summer school students pay \$140 (for 3.75 hours per day for 15 days in June). This equates to \$.041 per minute.

High school special education summer school students pay \$140 (for 3.75 hours per day for 15 days in June). This equates to \$.041 per minute.

The proposed fee for '08 Summer Session for special education students in both elementary and middle school is \$95. The sessions will follow the regular education elementary and middle school schedule. This equates to a cost to parents of \$ .04 per minute. The proposed fee for the high school special education summer session is \$100. This session would be 14 days long for 190 minutes day, resulting in a cost to parents of \$ .037 per minute.

#### COURSE SELECTION

Select a class based on interest or on areas of weakness. Students will gain experience in academic areas in preparation for the coming school year. Kindergartners will gain experience in school routine, following directions, working with others, taking turns, etc. in activities that do not require academic skills. Students entering 6<sup>th</sup> grade should register for Middle Level Summer Session at Kiewit Middle School (715-1470). Registration forms are available at all elementary and middle schools.

#### SUMMER ATTENDANCE

Parents must arrange transportation for their children to summer session. The district does not provide transportation for summer school, and no parent pay transportation is available.

Parents are asked to call the school office if their child will be absent or tardy.

#### TUITION ASSISTANCE

A full tuition waiver is available to students who qualify for the Federal free or reduced price lunch program during the regular school year. Families not currently participating in the Federal lunch program who need information about qualifying should call 715-1433. There is no other tuition assistance available.

#### REGISTRATION

Register for the grade level your student will attend next school year. Students going into Kindergarten should register for the Kindergarten Readiness class. Students entering Grade 6 register for Middle Level Summer Session. Millard resident (public & private) tuition for each elementary course is \$100. (Nonresident \$150.) Please complete the registration form, enclose the tuition payment, and mail to Deb Ady, Don Stroh Administration Center, 5606 So. 147<sup>th</sup> Street, Omaha, NE 68137. DO NOT SEND REGISTRATION WITH YOUR CHILD TO SCHOOL. Payment must be received before a student will be registered. Checks should be made payable to Millard Public Schools. Because class sizes are limited and filled on a first-come basis, students are strongly encouraged to register as soon as possible. After May 16<sup>th</sup> classes may be canceled if there is insufficient enrollment. If a class is already full when your request is received or canceled due to low enrollment, a full refund will be made. Letters verifying summer school enrollment will be sent out the first week in June.

#### PARTIAL REFUNDS

A \$10 processing charge will be assessed for each course registration canceled.

Partial refund requests must be received by 4:00 PM., Friday, June 6<sup>th</sup>.

# **ATTENDANCE**

Daily attendance during summer school is very important. Substantial work is completed each day. If the District declares a program, class, or school unavailable to option students due to lack of capacity, the District will set forth in the resolution the maximum number of students it has determined constitutes capacity of its programs, classes, grade levels, and school buildings based upon available staff, facilities, projected enrollment of resident students, projected number of students with which the option district will contract based on existing contractual arrangements, and availability of special education programs.

**OPTIONS AND ALTERNATIVES CONSIDERED**: An option is to keep schools, grades, and programs open. To do so would require more staff and overcrowd facilities.



#### **Issues and Happening**

- Day one is scheduled for January 9. The last day of this short session is April 17.
- The budget was completed last session so the focus will be on new legislation and bills held over.
- October revenue projections were up over previous estimates by \$52 million.
- NDE has projected a \$39 million increase in TEEOSA over previous estimates.
- TEEOSA aid for the 2008-09 year is estimated at \$862 million (24% of the entire General Fund).
- Committee membership usually stays the same although Mick Mines departure may prompt some shuffling.

# Senator Raikes has indicated that he will seek the following changes:

- Adjustment for student growth
- Clarify class size and summer school factors
- Add an adjustment for new school start up costs
- Factors to recognize hours of instruction
- Phase out class size allowance and require a maximum of 20 in all K-3 classrooms
- Replace adjusted valuation with taxable valuation in state aid formula
- Increase the local effort rate to reflect the removal of the valuation adjustment. Budget authority would equal 120% needs (eliminate budget exception for interlocal agreements) for 3 years budget would be based on the greater of the proposed method or old method

#### **State Policy Considerations:**

- School facilities finance should be equalized
- State school board is to implement LB 653 in a fashion that is fully compliant with NCLB
- Move SPED from special receipts to a separate allowance to include 85% of allowable excess costs

- LB 498 (White) Business partnerships in Rural Education Program Act.
