

The members of the Board of Education met as a Committee of the Whole on Monday, June 9, 2008 at 7:00 p.m. at the Don Stroh Administration Center, 5606 South 147th Street. The evening agenda included an update on the Curriculum Management Audit, a report on Alternative Education, budget discussion, and a review of the Superintendent's work assignments for 2008-2009.

PRESENT:

Brad Burwell, Mike Pate, Jean Stothert, and Dave Anderson

ABSENT:

Mike Kennedy and Linda Poole

The follow-up audit has nine continuing recommendations and numerous sub-points to each requiring the collective efforts of not only Educational Services, but also, Human Resources, Planning and Evaluation, the Business Office, Technology, General Administration, and the Superintendent. Review and implementation of these nine recommendations, where appropriate, is a multi-year project.

The board would like to see a policy and rule developed about reviewing policies and rules every seven years, instead of it being an understood directive.

The Educational Services Division assembled an Alternative Education Task Force that met in January and February 2008. The Task Force reviewed current programs and program evaluations, discussed district and student needs, and reviewed the literature on alternative education best practices. Sub-groups then set forth specific findings to be applied to District Alternative Education programs.

Dr. Feldhausen explained that the first recommendation was to put a definition to what would describe the Millard Public Schools Alternative Program, which would then help provide the direction to be followed.

Brad Burwell explained his emphasis would be on providing a facility for students who have been expelled or suspended from school. The students who are in these categories need more class time than what is currently the practice.

Dr. Lutz explained that the increase of the budget is 7.4%, which equates to \$13,096,107. The estimated revenue increase is \$5,433,030, so that leaves a shortfall of \$7,663,077. Options that have been considered to balance out the shortfall is using two million from the special building fund, reduce the cash reserve by three million, transfer \$1.5 million from the employee benefit fund, borrow \$1.5 million from the employee benefit fund, and increase the levy by one-cent, which would generate \$900,000, which would also leave a balance of a little over \$1.2 million.

There will be continued discussion on the budget.

Dr. Lutz, and the Board members present, reviewed, revised, and clarified their expectations of Dr. Lutz's 2008-2009 work assignments.

Nebraska Department of Education Rule 10 stipulates that "The instructional program in public schools incorporates multicultural education in all curriculum areas at all grades. Multicultural education includes, but is not limited to, studies relative to the culture, history, and contributions of African Americans, Hispanic Americans, Native Americans, Asian Americans and European Americans with special emphasis on human relations and sensitivity toward all races."

In addition, Rule 10 requires (sections 004.01G1 – 004.01G5) that:

- The district has a statement of philosophy or mission for the multicultural education program. Local program goals address multicultural education.
- The district curriculum guides, frameworks, or standards incorporate multicultural education.

#### **Taught Curriculum -- Field Trips**

6262.1

- I. Field trips shall be considered as instruction and planned as such with definite objectives determined in advance. <u>Lists of curriculum-related field trips shall be made available by the offices of elementary and secondary education</u>.
- II. Appropriate instruction shall precede and follow each field trip.
- III. Rules and regulations of the building and Millard Public Schools regarding students and student conduct shall be in effect from the time of departure until the name of return.
- IV. Written approval of parent or guardian is required for participation of pupils in field trips.
- V. All field trips shall begin and end at the school.
- VI. Field trips requiring school bus transportation shall not interfere with the regularly scheduled transportation of pupils to and from school.
- VII. For a field trip, the teacher should make the request in writing to the principal at least ten days prior to date desired. Whenever practical, an alternate date should also be listed. The purpose of the trip and its relation to the course of study must be stated.
- VIII. The principal shall approve or disapprove the request curriculum-related field trips and notify the teacher (if the request is disapproved, the reason for the disapproval shall be stated). If approval is given, the principal shall forward a request for school bus service to the business office seven days in advance of date requested.
  - IX. Teachers or other certified personnel shall accompany pupils on all field trips and exercise control over the conduct of the pupils.
  - X. When a field trip is made to a place of business or industry, it shall be required that an employee of the host company serve as conductor.
  - XI. Appropriate educational experience and proper supervision shall be supplied for any pupils whose parents do not wish them to participate in a field trip.
- XII. Certified staff members will discuss the specific chaperone responsibilities with the volunteer chaperones and provide written guidelines.

#### Millard Education Program – Use of Assessment Data

The assessment system shall take its overall direction from the District strategic plan and from state and federal requirements. The assessment system shall be aligned with the written curriculum and shall measure student progress within the primary, intermediate, middle and high school grade levels. The system shall provide opportunities for reteaching to occur if the student does not demonstrate mastery.

The assessment system will include Essential Learner Outcome assessments (designed to measure the Millard Education Plan outcomes) as well as assessments designed to comply with "No Child Left Behind" state and federal legislation.

As curriculum revisions occur, the assessment system shall reflect those changes and modifications to assessments and shall be approved by the Millard Board of Education. The curriculum content areas, grade levels when administered, and the types of assessments shall be as follows:

The preceding assessments may not be appropriate for some students with disabilities whose individualized education programs prescribe a different course of instruction and/or different requirements for graduation. The participation of students with disabilities, the provision of accommodations, and the provision of alternate

assessments will be in accordance with the District's Assessment Procedures; which include the process for identifying appropriate assessment accommodations and alternate assessments.

#### I. Implementation of Assessment System

- A. In accordance with Policy 6301 and Rule 6301.1, the District shall use all reasonable efforts to provide adequate measurement by:
  - 1. Establishing the reliability and validity of each recommended assessment;
  - Ensuring that the alignment of the assessment contents is consistent with the District's curriculum.
  - 3. Ensuring that the students of the District are provided with the opportunity to learn the material which is the subject of each assessment;
  - 4. Ensuring the establishment of adequate and necessary reteaching; and
  - Ensuring a proper cutscore for each assessment is established through acceptable and reliable methods.
- B. Upon approval and adoption of the cutscore established for each assessment by the Board of Education, the assessment will be incorporated in the District curriculum.

#### II. Description of the Standard Setting Process

A. Psychometrically accepted, standard methods shall be used for setting the cutscores on the assessments. All assessments shall be re-examined and recalibrated as needed to ensure curriculum alignment as well as appropriateness of the cutscore.

#### III. Effect of Student Performance

- A. When a student has successfully met the Essential Learner Outcomes assessment cutscore for each outcome:
  - 1. A notation shall be made in the student's cumulative record. Such information will be communicated to parent(s)/guardian(s) in writing.
  - 2. Students who meet the cutscores for the high school Essential Learner Outcomes assessments have met an essential criterion for graduating from the Millard Public Schools. Upon successful completion of the required number of credits as defined by Policy 6320 and Rule 6320.1, the students shall be eligible for a graduation diploma from the Millard Public Schools.
- B. If a student has not met the cutscore for a given Essential Learner Outcomes, the following shall occur:
  - 1. An Individual Learning Plan (ILP) shall be designed by a team of qualified staff. Classroom teachers may refer students to the Millard Intervention Team (MIT) for assistance in evaluating and implementing problem solving and intervention strategies.
  - 2. Utilizing the Essential Learner Outcomes, school representatives will offer the student supplemental learning activities that address recognized deficiencies. Supplemental learning activities may include, but are not limited to, the following:

- a. Differentiated/complementary instruction during regular classes (i.e., peer tutoring, needs groups, individualized instruction);
- b. Before or after school tutorials;
- c. Study hall tutorials;
- d. Change of interdisciplinary teams or level of instruction;
- e. Repeat of specific course(s) of study;
- f. Attendance at specific class(es) designed to address deficiencies; and/or
- g. Attendance at summer school.
- If the student is verified with a disability the IEP Team may reconvene to review the ILP and to ensure that the IEP is written to assist the student in areas of weakness and that appropriate accommodations are in place.
- 4. If the student has a 504 Accommodation Plan, the 504 Team may reconvene to review the ILP and to ensure that needed accommodations are in place in areas of weakness.

#### C. Procedures for high school students

If after a retake of an assessment, a student has not met the cutscore for a given Essential Learner Outcomes assessment, the following shall occur:

- The Individual Learning Plan will be reviewed by a qualified team and, if necessary, redesigned. Students shall be referred to MIT for identification of needs if not previously referred.
- The student shall be retested using the appropriate Essential Learner Outcomes assessment. Students shall be given the opportunity to be retested multiple times until the requisite cutscore is achieved. Students shall be given notice of the opportunities for retesting.
- The student will be considered ineligible for a diploma from the Millard Public Schools until such time that the requisite cutscores are achieved for high school Essential Learner Outcomes assessments.
- 4. If the student is verified with a disability or has a 504 Accommodation Plan, then the IEP or 504 Team will reconvene to review the education plan and may consider lowering the cutscore requirement as part of the IEP or 504 Accommodation Plan. The student's parent(s) and/or guardian(s) shall be notified and shall also be advised of the effect of lowering the cutscore.
  - a. Applications for approval of lowered cutscore requirements and/or alternate assessments may be submitted by the student's IEP or 504 Team to the Associate Superintendent of Educational Services for consideration and where appropriate, approval. The Associate Superintendent of Educational Services or designee shall decide and respond to all such requests.
  - b. If the lowered cutscore is approved, the student shall then be eligible to receive a graduation diploma with appropriate notation from the Millard Public Schools as provided in Rule 6320.1.
- 5. An additional opportunity is available to demonstrate student proficiency. After two retest attempts to meet the established cutscore(s) for the Essential Learner Outcome assessment(s) without achieving the cutscore, students may register with the Associate Superintendent for Educational Services to participate in a process, as provided in the District's Assessment Procedures, to demonstrate an appropriate level of proficiency in reading, writing, math, science or social studies.

#### D. Demonstration of Proficiency

An additional opportunity is available to demonstrate student proficiency. After two retest attempts to meet the established cutscore(s) for the Essential Learner Outcome assessment(s) without achieving the cutscore, students, under building supervision, shall participate in a process, as provided in the District's Assessment Procedures, to demonstrate an appropriate level of proficiency in reading, writing, math, science or social studies. A student who successfully meets the standards and requirements of a Demonstration of Proficiency shall have met one of the essential criteria for graduating from the Millard Public Schools.

#### IV. District Procedures for Opting Out of Recommended Reteaching

- A. Should a student participating in the Assessment Program not meet the requisite cutscore and be recommended for one of the reteaching strategies listed above, the student's parent(s)/guardian(s) shall have the right to refuse placement of their student within the recommended strategy and either:
  - 1. Request an alternative teaching strategy; or
  - 2. Refuse such placement at all.
- B. Such requests for an alternative teaching strategy shall be submitted in writing to the appropriate building principal. The building principal or designee shall respond within thirty (30) calendar days.

#### V. District Procedures for New Students

- A. At the elementary and middle school level, new students will take grade level assessments given after their arrival
- B. At the high school level, incoming students shall take all high school assessments designated for that grade level or lower grades, regardless of their grade-level when they enter the District. They may participate in all remedial and supplemental learning activities provided by the District. Students are required to meet the established cutscore on each of the high school Essential Learner Outcome assessments.

#### VI. District Procedures for Students with Disabilities and ELL Students

Pursuant to the Assessment Accommodations section of the District's Assessment Procedures Manual, all students are to participate in the District's regular assessments and the only students to be excluded are those with a disability or language proficiency which has excluded the student from the norm sample of the standardized assessment, and/or those students who have not participated in the area and/or level of the curriculum that the assessment measures. Even for such students, they are not totally exempt and they must take an alternate assessment.

#### A. Procedures for Students with Disabilities

The preceding assessments may not be appropriate for some students with disabilities whose individualized education programs prescribe a different course of instruction and/or different requirements for graduation. The participation of students with disabilities, the provision of accommodations, and the provision of alternate assessments will be in accordance with the District's Assessment Procedures; which include the process for identifying appropriate assessment accommodations and alternate assessments.

#### B. Procedures for ELL Students

Students must meet all graduation requirements in the English language to earn a Millard Public Schools diploma. ELL students who have not demonstrated adequate English language proficiencies may postpone testing according to district procedures.

#### VII. Student's Right to Appeal

- A. Students who have not achieved the necessary high school cutscores as approved by the Millard Board of Education may appeal the denial of a diploma.
- B. A student may appeal the denial of a diploma only on the grounds that the student's failure to achieve the required cutscore is due to:
  - 1. The failure of the District to provide a reasonable accommodation that was previously requested by the student and denied by the District.
  - 2. The failure of the District to provide an alternate assessment or approve a demonstration of proficiency, which had been previously requested by the student and denied by the District.

#### VIII. Procedures for Appeal

- A. Within seven (7) days after the receipt of the notice that the student failed to achieve the cutscore required for graduation from the Millard Public Schools, a written notice of appeal shall be served upon the Superintendent of the Millard Public Schools or his/her designee. Such appeal shall set forth all of the reasons for the appeal as provided herein and shall set forth the relief sought by the student, parent(s) or guardian(s). Such notice of appeal may also include any additional information, which is relevant to the appeal.
- B. Within seven (7) days after the receipt of the written notice of appeal and any supporting information relevant to the appeal, the Superintendent or designee shall consider and render a decision on the appeal based on whether the decision of the District was unreasonable. Such decision shall then be forwarded to the student's parent(s) and/or guardian(s) advising the student's parent(s) and/or guardian(s) of the basis for the Superintendent's decision and the reasons therefore.
- C. Within seven (7) days after the receipt of the written notification from the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee, a written request may be made by the student, parent(s), or guardian(s) to the secretary of the Millard Board of Education or the Superintendent, or designee for a hearing before the Millard Board of Education, or a committee of the Board consisting of not less than two (2) members or more than three (3) members to be held on the issue whether the decision of the Superintendent or designee was unreasonable.
- D. Such hearing shall be held before the Millard Board of Education or committee within thirty (30) days of the date the request for hearing was received. If a hearing request is not received in a timely manner, the decision of the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee shall be final.
- E. The student, parent(s) and/or guardian(s) shall be advised at least seven (7) days prior to the date of the hearing before the Board and such notification shall set forth the date, time, and place for the hearing before the Millard Board of Education or committee.
- F. The parties may, by mutual written agreement, extend the time for hearing or final determination.

- G. The student, parent(s), and/or guardian(s) shall have the right to be represented by legal counsel and shall have the opportunity to present such evidence that is material to the issue or issues stated in the appeal.
- H. The hearing shall be conducted in closed session and in accordance with the student privacy laws unless the student, parent(s), and/or guardian(s) shall request, in writing, that the hearing be held in open session. Any formal action of the Millard Board of Education or committee shall be taken in closed session unless such proceeding was requested by the student, parent(s), or guardian(s) to be held in open session.
- I. The decision of the Millard Board of Education or committee shall be by vote of a majority of the members of the Millard Board of Education and the Millard Board of Education or committee shall reduce its findings and decision to writing and provide the written findings and decision to the student, parent(s), and/or guardian(s) within ten (10) days of the hearing. When conducting such proceedings, the Millard Board of Education or committee shall be exercising a judicial function and deciding a dispute of adjudicative facts.

#### IX. Annual Review

This Rule shall be reviewed annually.

#### **Students Graduation/Separation**

6320

Graduation from our schools indicates that students have satisfactorily completed the prescribed courses of study in accordance with their respective abilities to achieve and that they have satisfactorily passed any dDistrict level assessments, and examinations or other requirements set by the faculty. In addition, students shall have maintained a satisfactory record of citizenship during the students' progression through the instructional program of the schools.

The faculty will establish detailed requirements to agree with the school goals as adopted by the Board. It is expected that, insofar as possible, the faculty will apply measures of achievement to provide evidence that each student has progressed far enough toward school goals to warrant the student's graduation according to the terms of this peolicy.

The principal of each school will arrange each spring for appropriate awards and recognition programs and graduation exercises. Formal graduation exercises for elementary and middle schools will be at the discretion of each school will be held for high school students meeting District requirements and will be coordinated between the high school administrators and the superintendent.

In accordance with the requirements of state law, a student who receives special education services under the Special Education Act and does not qualify for graduation, may receive a certificate of attendance.

#### **Students: Requirements for Senior High School Graduation**

6320.1

Students differ widely in interests, abilities and expectations. For this reason, the following are stated as minimums to allow flexibility in the planning of individual student programs. However, on the assumption that some elements should be shared in common by educated persons, these basic uniform requirements are established for graduation from the Millard Public Schools. In addition to specified credit requirements students must meet district level assessments in reading, writing, mathematics, science and social studies.

#### Minimum Requirements for Graduation - Grades 9-12

I. Credits -- A minimum of **225 credits** is required for graduation. Each student's program shall include but not be limited to the programs and courses listed below and may be amended, revised, or deleted by the Board of Education as approved and published in the curriculum handbooks of each high school.

- A. A grade of four (4) or better must be maintained in any course used to fulfill graduation requirements.
- B. Electives courses are offered in the subject areas previously listed and in business education, foreign language, family & consumer sciences, industrial technology, art, drama, debate, journalism and music.
- C. In order to provide flexibility in such situations as transfers and special needs, waivers may be submitted by staff and approved by the principal.
- D. A student must complete 225 credits as described herein in order to graduate and receive a diploma from the Millard Public Schools.
- E. A student must complete a Personal Learning Plan, meeting district requirements.
- II. Assessments: In addition to 225 credits required for graduation, students must also successfully meet the Essential Learner Outcome assessment score requirements.

#### III. Effect of Student Performance

- A. When a student has successfully met the Essential Learner Outcomes Assessment cut score for each outcome:
  - 1. A notation shall be made in the student's cumulative record. Such information will be communicated to parent(s)/guardian(s) in writing.
  - 2. Having met the cutscores for the high school Essential Learner Outcomes assessments, the student shall have met essential criteria for graduating from the Millard Public Schools.
  - 3. Upon successful completion of the required number of credits, the student shall be eligible for a graduation diploma from the Millard public Schools.
- B. If a student has not met the cutscore for a given Essential Learner Outcomes Assessment, the following shall occur:
  - 1. An Individual Learning Plan (ILP) shall be designed by a team of qualified staff. Classroom teachers may refer students to the Millard Intervention Team (MIT) for assistance in evaluating and implementing problem-solving and intervention strategies.
  - 2. Utilizing the Essential Learner Outcomes, school representatives will offer the student supplemental learning activities, which address recognized deficiencies. Supplemental learning activities may include but are not limited to the following:
    - a. differentiated/complementary instruction during regular classes (i.e., peer tutoring, needs groups, individualized instruction;
    - b. before- or after-school tutorials;
    - c. study hall tutorials;
    - d. change of interdisciplinary teams or level of instruction;
    - e. repeat of specific course(s) of study;

- f. attendance at specific class(es) designed to address deficiencies; and
- g. attendance at summer school.
- 3. If the student is verified with a disability, the IEP Team may reconvene to review the ILP and to ensure that the IEP is written to assist the student in areas of weakness and that appropriate accommodations are in place.
- 4. If the student has a 504 Accommodation Plan, the 504 Team may reconvene to review the ILP and to ensure that needed accommodations are in place in areas of weakness.
- C. If, after a retake of an assessment, a student has not met the cutscore for a given Essential Learner Outcomes assessment, the following shall occur:
  - 1. The Individual Learning Plan will be reviewed by a qualified team and, if necessary, redesigned. Students shall be referred to MIT for identification of needs if not previously referred.
  - The student shall be retested using the appropriate Essential Learner Outcomes
    assessment. Students shall be given the opportunity to be retested multiple times
    until the requisite cutscore is achieved. Students shall be given notice of the
    opportunities for retesting.
  - 3. The student will be considered ineligible for a diploma from the Millard Public Schools until such time that the requisite cutscores are achieved for high school Essential learner Outcomes assessment.
  - 4. If the student is verified with a disability or has a 504 Accommodation Plan, then the IEP or 504 Team will reconvene to review the education plan and to consider lowering of the cutscore requirement as part of the IEP or 504 Accommodation Plan. The student's parent(s) and/or guardian(s) shall be notified and shall also be advised of the effect of lowering the cutscore.
    - a. Applications for approval of lowered cutscore requirements and/or alternate assessments may be submitted by the student's IEP or 504 Team to the Associate Superintendent of Educational Services for consideration and, where appropriate, approval. The Associate Superintendent of Educational Services or designee shall decide and respond to all such requests.
    - If the lowered cutscore is approved, the student shall then be eligible to receive a graduation diploma with appropriate notation from the Millard Public Schools.
  - 5. An additional opportunity is available to demonstrate student proficiency. After two retest attempts to meet the established cutscore(s) for the Essential Learner Outcome assessment(s) without achieving the cutscore, students may register with the Associate Superintendent for Educational Services to participate in a process, as provided in the District's Assessment Procedures, to demonstrate an appropriate level of proficiency in reading, writing, math, science or social studies.
- D. An additional opportunity is available to demonstrate student proficiency. After two retest attempts to meet the established cutscore(s) for the Essential Learner Outcome assessment(s) without achieving the cutscore, students, under building supervision, shall participate in a process, as provided in the District's Assessment Procedures, to demonstrate an appropriate level of proficiency in reading, writing, math, science or social studies. A student who successfully meets the standards and requirements of a Demonstration of Proficiency shall have met one of the essential criteria for graduating from the Millard Public Schools.

#### IV. Student's Right to Appeal

- A. Students who have not achieved the necessary high school cutscores as approved by the Millard Board of Education may appeal the denial of a diploma.
- B. A student may appeal the denial of a diploma only on the grounds that the student's failure to achieve the required cut score is due to:
  - 1. The failure of the District to provide a reasonable accommodation, which was previously requested by the student and denied by the District.
  - 2. The failure of the District to provide an alternate assessment or approve a demonstration of proficiency, which had been previously requested by the student and denied by the District.

#### V. Procedures for Appeal

- A. Within seven (7) days after the receipt of the notice that the student failed to achieve the cut score or credits required for graduation from the Millard Public Schools, a written notice of appeal shall be served upon the Superintendent of the Millard Public Schools or his/her designee. Such appeal shall set forth all of the reasons for the appeal as provided herein and shall set forth the relief sought by the student, parent(s) or guardian(s). Such notice of appeal may also include any additional information, which is relevant to the appeal.
- B. Within seven (7) days after the receipt of the written notice of appeal and any supporting information relevant to the appeal, the Superintendent or designee shall consider and render a decision on the appeal based on whether the decision of the District was unreasonable. Such decision shall then be forwarded to the student's parent(s) and/or guardian(s) advising the student's parent(s) and/or guardian(s) of the basis for the Superintendent's or designee's decision and the reasons therefore
- C. Within seven (7) days after the receipt of the written notification from the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee, a written request may be made by the student, parent(s), or guardian(s) to the secretary of the Millard Board of Education or the Superintendent for a hearing before the Millard Board of Education to be held on the issue whether the decision of the Superintendent or his designee was unreasonable.
- D. Such hearing shall be held before the Millard Board of Education within thirty (30) days of the date the request for hearing was received. If a hearing before the Millard Board of Education is not received in a timely manner, the decision of the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee shall be final.
- E. The student, parent(s) and/or guardian(s) shall be advised at least seven (7) days prior to the date of the hearing before the Board and such notification shall set forth the date, time, and place for the hearing before the Millard Board of Education.
- F. The parties may, by mutual written agreement, extend the time for hearing or final determination.
- G. The student, parent(s), and/or guardian(s) shall have the right to be represented by legal counsel and shall have the opportunity to present such evidence that is material to the issue or issues stated in the appeal.
- H. The hearing shall be conducted in closed session and in accordance with the student privacy laws unless the student, parent(s), and/or guardian(s) shall request, in writing, that the hearing be held in open session. Any formal action of the Millard Board of Education shall be taken in closed

session unless such proceeding was requested by the student, parent(s), or guardian(s) to be held in open session.

I. The decision of the Millard Board of Education shall be by vote of a majority of the members of the Millard Board of Education and the Millard Board of Education shall reduce its findings and decision to writing and provide the written findings and decision to the student, parent(s), and/or guardian(s) within ten (10) days of the hearing.

#### VI. Graduation

Upon successful completion of the required credits, and assessments, and Personal Learning Plan a student shall be eligible for a graduation diploma from the Millard Public Schools.

#### VII. Annual Review

This rule shall be reviewed annually.

Each student's International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma Program (IB DP) shall include the courses of study as outlined in Rule 6320.1 with such adjustments (additions or substitutions) to the programs and courses as listed below. Such adjustments are made to avoid duplication in the program of study required for IB DP students.

#### Students Certificate of Attendance Requirements

6320.3

At the request of a parent or guardian, the District shall issue a certificate of attendance to a student who receives special education services under the Special Education Act, who has reached seventeen years of age, and who has not completed his or her individualized education plan. The District shall allow a student who receives a certificate of attendance under this Rule to participate in the high school graduation ceremony of such high school with students receiving high school diplomas. A student may receive only one certificate of attendance and may participate in only one graduation ceremony based on such certificate. The receipt of a certificate of attendance pursuant to this Rule shall not affect the District's obligation to continue to provide special education services to a student receiving such certificate.

This Rule does not preclude a student from receiving a high school diploma by meeting the District's graduation requirements pursuant to Neb. Stat. 79-729 or in his or her individualized education plan or receiving a diploma of high school equivalency under Neb. Rev. Stat 79-730 upon completing the requirements of such statute. The District may allow a student who has previously participated in a graduation ceremony based on a certificate of attendance to participate in an additional graduation ceremony when such student receives a high school diploma.

I. The goal for each student participating in extracurricular activities shall be a balanced program of appropriate academic studies and extracurricular school sponsored clubs and activities to be determined by the school, the parents, and the students. This should be a shared responsibility.

- II. Guidance is necessary to encourage the non-participating students to consider extracurricular school sponsored clubs and activities and interscholastic athletics and activities and to prevent the over- enthusiastic students from over-emphasizing clubs, activities, and athletics at the cost of their academic performance.
- III. Activities which are for public view are to be kept to the minimum necessary for their educational value. Public performances of the activities are to be supervised in order to prevent excessive time and effort expenditures by students. Public performances may not be held for purposes which contribute to private gain or advantage.
- IV. District-wide events shall be approved by the Superintendent or designee.
- V. School events should not be scheduled after 5:00 p.m. and should conclude by 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday evenings. Exceptions shall be permitted for district and/or state contest dates determined by the NSAA as well as contest dates determined by the Metro Conference for its tournament schedules.

## Co-Curricular Activities 6700

A vital component of a comprehensive educational program is a co-curricular activities program. Such activities, properly supervised and kept in proper perspective, shall be maintained in the school program in order to give students opportunities for experiences not possible in classroom activities. Care and consideration should be given to the amount of time these activities take students away from school during school hours or away from studies on "school nights". This policy is applied in such areas as scheduling of interscholastic contests, meetings and trips involving school organizations and in-school activities such as meetings, initiations, etc.

## **Supervision of Co-Curricular Activities**

Whenever or wherever held, when conducted under the name of the school or school district or any class or organization thereof, co-curricular activities shall be under the general supervision of school authorities.

### **Non-Secret**

Co-curricular groups shall not be secret in nature.

### **Participation**

Students will be limited in participating in activities of a non-school nature during school hours. Prior to such participation, approval must be granted by the building administrator.

**Procedures and Criteria** 

- I. Extracurricular School Sponsored Clubs and Activities Extracurricular school sponsored clubs and activities are an extension of the selected content curriculum and instructional strategies of the Millard Education Program. Extracurricular school sponsored clubs and activities serve as an extension of the Millard Education Program by providing and promoting opportunities, activities, experiences, and/or programs which supplement the subject matter of specific courses, extend the skills taught in specific courses, reinforce the instruction provided in specific courses, provide career activities and exploration, recognize and promote academic achievement and excellence, provide intramural athletic competition, enhance school support and spirit, or provide for the administration of student government or student body activities.
- II. Approval Procedures and Criteria Certain extracurricular school sponsored clubs and activities are established and recognized as being school sponsored and an extension of the Millard Education Program and they shall not be required to obtain approval, except for funding, when properly operating under this Rule. - A. All other presently existing and all other suggested future extracurricular school sponsored clubs and activities shall be required to seek and obtain approval in accordance with the following procedures and criteria.
  - 1. A suggestion form from the Millard Public Schools Activities Committee shall be properly and fully completed by the school certificated staff member who suggests the formation of the extracurricular school sponsored club or activity and who proposes and is qualified to serve as the certificated staff sponsor. Such suggestion forms will be submitted by certificated staff employed by the Millard Public Schools only.
  - 2. Such suggestion forms shall be submitted to the school principal or designee. All suggestion forms which are not properly and fully completed shall not be considered.
  - 3. The principal or designee shall review the suggestion form and such other information considered to be appropriate and make a written recommendation whether or not to form such a school sponsored club or activity based on the criteria set forth hereinafter. If the suggestion is accepted by the building principal or designee, the suggestion form will be forwarded with recommendation to the Millard Public Schools Activities Committee within forty (40) school days after receipt of the suggestion form.
  - 4. Within eighty (80) school days after receipt of the suggestion form and recommendation, the Activities Committee shall meet, review the suggestion form and recommendation of the principal or designee and such other information considered to be appropriate, and make a written decision to approve or deny the formation of such a school sponsored club or activity based on the criteria set forth below.
  - 5. When reviewing any suggestion to form a new extracurricular school sponsored club or activity, the principal or designee and the Activities Committee shall evaluate the following considerations and criteria. Whether the suggested school sponsored club or activity:
    - a. provides and promotes opportunities, activities, experiences, and/or programs which supplement the subject matter of specific courses, extend the skills taught in specific courses, or reinforce the instruction provided in specific courses.
    - b. provides and promotes opportunities, activities, experiences, and/or programs which involve career activities or career exploration.
    - c. provides and promotes opportunities, activities, experiences, and/or programs which involve career preparation and technical education, such as business education, career guidance and

- counseling, family and consumer sciences, industrial education, marketing education, health occupations education, or diversified occupations education.
- d. recognizes and promotes academic achievement and excellence.
- e. promotes problem-solving skills or higher level thinking skills through club competition or club exercises.
- f. provides hands-on experiences which extend the learning process beyond the classroom or provides opportunities to practice and apply the curriculum or skills taught in specific courses.
- g. provides and promotes opportunities, activities, experiences, and/or programs which involve intramural athletic competition, team leadership and cooperation, sportsmanship, sports and recreation skills, physical development, or physical education.
- h. provides and promotes opportunities, activities, experiences, and/or programs which enhance school support and spirit through organized cheering, support the school's interscholastic athletics and activities programs, or build student morale, student spirit, or positive support for the school and the school's interscholastic programs.
- i. provides for the administration of student government or student body or class activities and programs.
- j. provides for and promotes middle school level exploration of activities, socialization, or citizenship.
- k. shows evidence of strong student interest and has potential for growth and longevity.
- has adequate funding. Funding should not be diverted from existing school sponsored clubs or activities so as to create new ones.
- m. has adequate facilities available.
- n. has qualified and competent sponsors available, who are Millard Public Schools certificated staff, or selected community volunteers, or paid volunteers.
- o. duplicates the general purposes of an existing sponsored club or activity, an existing equal access student group, or existing activities or programs which are already available within the Millard Public Schools or within the community.

- p. is appropriate for the knowledge level, intellectual maturity, competence, and age of the students.
- q. involves exposure to or risks of injury or harm.
- r. can operate in compliance with federal and state laws and the policies and rules of the Millard Public Schools.
- s. is an appropriate addition to the number and nature of clubs or activities at a school.
- 6. No extracurricular school sponsored clubs or activities shall involve or promote the indoctrination or advocacy of partisan, political, ideological, or religious beliefs.
- 7. No extracurricular school sponsored clubs or activities shall be a secret fraternity or secret organization.

### **III.** Student Participation

- A. Participation of students in extracurricular school sponsored clubs and activities is encouraged, and participation shall be open to and limited to all students who are currently enrolled in the sponsoring school on a voluntary basis. Extracurricular school sponsored clubs and activities may establish academic or course enrollment qualifications for participation if such qualifications are necessarily related to the purposes of that extracurricular school sponsored club or activity.
- B. Students will be limited in participating in activities of a non-school nature during school hours. Prior to such participation, approval must be granted by the building administrator.

### **IV.** Governance

All extracurricular school sponsored clubs and activities shall be under the exclusive governance and control of school personnel. Such exclusive governance and control shall include, but shall not be limited to, the formation, naming, structure, operation, financing, and discontinuance of all extracurricular school sponsored clubs and activities. Extracurricular school sponsored clubs and activities shall not have any separate or individual existence, status, rights, or authority.

### V. Sponsors

- A. Each extracurricular school sponsored club and activity must have a sponsor who is a Millard Public Schools certificated staff member, or selected community volunteer or paid volunteer, who is qualified by virtue of education, training, experience, or special interest to serve as the sponsor. The principal or designee shall select the sponsor. The Millard Public Schools certificated staff member who submits a suggestion form may or may not be selected as the sponsor.
- B. Sponsors shall be required to: develop materials, activities, and a budget; promote membership and participation; communicate with the principal or designee, staff, students, and parents; schedule meeting dates and locations; plan meaningful experiences; supervise students during activities; evaluate and make recommendations; and submit a year end report to the principal or designee.
- C. An assignment as a sponsor is an annual appointment. One (1) activity stipend may be issued to a Millard Public Schools certificated staff member for extracurricular school sponsored clubs or activities, in accordance with budgeting procedures, that have between ten (10) and forty-five (45) active participants. When participation exceeds forty-five (45) active participants, an additional activity stipend may be issued. Under certain circumstances which sometimes exist with different types of extracurricular school sponsored clubs or activities, the individual schools may be excluded from these number restrictions with the approval of the Activities Committee. With the approval of the principal or designee, two (2) or more Millard Public Schools certificated staff members may be allowed to split an activity stipend for an extracurricular school sponsored club or activity.

### VI. Review and Revocation

- A. The principal or designee shall review the activities and purposes of extracurricular school sponsored clubs and activities on a regular basis and the principal or designee may, on their own initiative or upon any complaint or request by students, certificated staff, or parents, recommend to the Activities Committee that recognition of any extracurricular school sponsored club or activity be revoked. Recommendations for revocation shall be forwarded to and processed by the Activities Committee in the manner provided above for applications.
- B. The Activities Committee may on its own initiative, review and revoke the recognition of any extracurricular school sponsored club or activity.

### **Interscholastic Athletics and Activities - Approval**

6700.2

### **Procedures and Criteria**

### I. Interscholastic Athletics and Activities

Interscholastic athletics and activities programs shall be established for both sexes and all such programs shall be sanctioned by and be in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Nebraska School Activities Association, the National Federation of State High School Associations, and the policies and rules of the Millard Public Schools.

## II. Student Participation and Eligibility

- A. In compliance with the rules established by the Nebraska School Activities Association, the principal or designee has the responsibility for determining the eligibility of students.
- B. It shall be the responsibility of the coach to determine which candidates shall be members of the team.
- C. Standards for participation, conduct, and personal appearances shall be established by the coaches and such standards shall be reasonable and in harmony with the philosophy and goals established by the Millard Public Schools. In the case-of any dispute, the principal or designee shall be responsible for resolving the issue.
- D. All participating students shall meet the rules and regulations established by the Nebraska School Activities Association, the National Federation of State High School Associations, and the Millard Public Schools.

### III. Approval Procedures and Criteria for New Interscholastic Sports and Activities

- A. All interscholastic sports and activities shall be required to obtain approval for adoption in the Millard Public Schools in accordance with the following procedures and criteria.
  - 1. An Interscholastic Sports and Activities application form shall be completed by the school principal or designee and submitted to the Millard Public Schools Activities Committee.
  - 2. When reviewing the application for an interscholastic sport or activity, the Activities Committee and the Board of Education shall evaluate the following considerations and criteria. Whether the interscholastic sport or activity:

- a. can be conducted in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Nebraska School Activities Association as well as the policies and rules of the Millard Public Schools.
- will meet a strong student interest which is not being met by the Millard Public Schools or other community sports or activity programs.
- c. is appropriate for the knowledge level, intellectual maturity, competence, and age of the students.
- d. has potential for growth.
- e. will equalize the opportunities for girls and boys and meet the intent of Title IX.
- f. provides adequate opportunity for participation and competition.
- g. duplicates the general purposes of an existing interscholastic sport or activity offered by the Millard Public Schools or other community sports or activities offerings.

### and, whether:

- h. given the number and nature of interscholastic sports and activities in the Millard Public Schools and community, it is appropriate to add the interscholastic sport or activity.
- i. the season in which the interscholastic sport or activity would be held allows for adequate participation and competition, given the weather and geographical conditions.
- j. adequate facilities are available for the interscholastic sport or activity. Adding a newly sanctioned interscholastic sport or activity should not overburden existing facilities.
- k. adequate funding is available for the newly sanctioned interscholastic sport or activity. Funding should not be diverted from existing interscholastic sports or activities to create new ones. All funding requirements, including start up and annual operation costs, must be considered.
- 1. qualified and competent coaches and staff are available.

### IV. Review and Discontinuance

- A. The Activities Committee shall regularly review the activities and purposes of interscholastic sports and activities and the Activities Committee may recommend to the Board of Education that any interscholastic sport or activity be discontinued. Recommendations for discontinuance shall be forwarded to and processed by the Board of Education in the manner provided above for interscholastic sports or activities.
- B. The Board of Education may on its own initiative, review and discontinue any interscholastic sport or activity.

- I. All school social events will be restricted to members of the student body, the class or club concerned, and their guests. Parents are always welcome at school functions.
- II. All school social events are to be properly chaperoned at the direction of the building principal or designee.
- III. Permission to have school social events is to be obtained from the building principal or designee and placed on the calendar. The principal or designee shall require the group and their sponsor to work out all details for preparation and clean-up.
- IV. All school social events held on school nights should end by 11:00 p.m. unless changed by the principal or designee.
- V. The building principal or designee shall determine the number of school social events to be held each year.

- I. The building principal or designee shall be responsible for the building's intramural athletic program which shall be a balanced intramural athletic program for both sexes and with appropriate intramural athletics for appropriate levels.
- II. The building principal or designee shall see that the intramural athletic program is properly organized and supervised, including the supervision of both participants and spectators.
- III. Care shall be taken that intramural athletics are conducted primarily for the benefit of participants.
- IV. The focus of the intramural athletic program shall be on participation.

# **Extracurricular School Sponsored Clubs and Activities** and Interscholastic Athletics and Activities (Travel and Trips)

6700.6

Extracurricular school sponsored clubs and activities, and interscholastic athletics and activities involving the transportation of participants or spectators in school-sponsored vehicles shall be subject to the following guidelines:

- I. All trips shall originate and terminate at the school.
- II. On all trips, the rules and regulations of the building and the Millard Public Schools regarding students and student conduct shall be in effect from the time of departure until the time of return.
- III. Written approval of the student's parent or guardian must be secured.
- IV. A trip permit may be signed by a student's parent or guardian and placed on file for the school year.
- V. The principal or designee will arrange transportation for interscholastic and extracurricular activities and athletics. Trips that are scheduled for a length of time beyond sixteen (16) hours, or which may require student involvement or transportation beyond 12:00 midnight, or which require overnight accommodations, shall not be approved unless the mode of transportation has a properly permitted or licensed driver who complies with the hourly driving limitations of Title 92, Nebraska Administrative Code, Chapter 91-005.07G. Certificated staff who are operating the transportation provided for interscholastic or extracurricular activities or athletics shall also comply with the hourly driving limitations of Title 92, Nebraska Administrative Code, Chapter 91-005.07G.
  - A. The coach or club or activity sponsor and principal or designee will ensure that the hourly driving limitations of Title 92, Nebraska Administrative Code, Chapter 91-005. 07G are communicated to the provider of transportation prior to the start of the trip.
  - B. The coach or club or activity sponsor will ensure that the provider of transportation provides a written plan to the principal or designee prior to the start of the trip that adheres to the hourly driving limitations of Title 92, Nebraska Administrative Code, Chapter 91-005. 07G.
  - C. The time of departure for the trip shall be no earlier than 6:00 a.m. on the starting day of the trip. Exceptions to this time of departure must have the prior approval of the District Director of Activities.

- D. When the anticipated time of departure for the trip is earlier than 6:00 a.m. on the day of the event, the trip shall be subject to the following guidelines:
  - 1. The time of departure must have the prior approval of the District Director of Activities, or
  - 2. The coach or club or activity sponsor must arrange for the overnight accommodations of the students, drivers, chaperones, and coaches or club or activity sponsors involved on the trip for the night prior to the event, and
  - 3. The overnight accommodations must be reserved prior to the start of the trip and will follow the overnight travel and trip guidelines.
- E. The time of arrival on the return date of the trip shall be no later than 12 midnight on the day of the event. When the anticipated time of arrival on the return date of the trip is later than 12 midnight, that time must have the prior approval of the District Director of Activities.
- F. When the anticipated time of arrival for the trip is later than 12 midnight on the day of the event, the trip shall be subject to the following guidelines:
  - 1. The coach or club or activity sponsor will arrange for the overnight accommodations of the students, drivers, chaperones, and coaches or club or activity sponsors involved on the trip for the concluding night of the event. Those involved on the trip will return to the school on the next day, and
  - 2. The overnight accommodations must be reserved prior to the start of the trip, and
  - 3. The coach or club or activity sponsor will follow the overnight travel and trip policies and rules, or
  - 4. Upon the arrival to the school the students involved on the trip shall leave the school by means other than walking. A certificated staff member of the school will remain in a designated area at the school with the students involved on the trip until all of those students have left the school.
    - a. The designated area at the school is subject to the approval by the principal or designee.
    - b. The designated area at the school will be communicated to the parents/guardians of the students involved on the trip prior to the trip.
    - c. Students on the trip are to remain in the designated area of the school until they are released by the certificated staff member.

- d. The name(s) of the person(s) other than the parents/guardians of the students involved on the trip who will retrieve the student(s) after arrival to the school must be provided to the coaches or club or activity sponsors prior to the trip.
- e. The person(s) retrieving the students on the trip must come to the designated area at the school for the trip to retrieve the students.
- G. Any exceptions to these guidelines must have the prior approval of the District Director of Activities.
- VI. The coach or club or activity sponsor, in consultation with the principal or designee, may give a student permission to use alternate transportation.

- VIII. In addition to the head coach or activity sponsor, a minimum of one (1) additional gender specific chaperone is required for every 25 students. Based upon the location of the trip, the number of the chaperones may be increased.

### **Use of School Facilities and Equipment**

1340.1

### I. Priorities Categories for Facility Use

The following priorities are established for scheduling the use of <del>School</del> District facilities and equipment:

- A. **Priority Category 1 Uses**: Building or District-wide school events, activities, and programs;
- B. Priority Category 2 Uses: Events or activities that are designed to serve Millard students or are related to any function of the school when such functions and are planned and directed by school-affiliated non-profit groups, and events or activities sponsored by PAYBAC Partners, and programs which meet an action plan in the District's strategic plan;
- C. **Priority** Category 3a Uses: Events or activities which serve Millard area youth (i.e., a majority of participants must be from Millard) that are planned and directed by non-profit youth organizations not directly affiliated with the school;
- D. Priority Category 3b Uses: Events or activities; which serve youth and are sponsored by non-profit organizations not directly affiliated with the school and charitable fundraising events or activities;
- E. **Priority** Category 4 Uses: Non-profit civic, service, or other groups whose purpose is to promote the general welfare of the community;
- F. **Priority** Category 5 Uses: Individuals or groups involved in activities not listed above.

### II. Limitations on Use of School Facilities

In no event will the use of school facilities and equipment be permitted:

- A. when the use would interfere with any class-related use;
- B. when the use would interfere with events sponsored by the school or school groups;
- C. when the use would involve illegal activity;

- D. when the organization or individual(s) involved have previously engaged in (or can reasonably be expected to engage in) any form of illegal discrimination or violence, or, when such organization or individual(s) advocate (or have a reputation for advocating) violence or rebellion against the United States, the State of Nebraska, or any political subdivision thereof;
- E. when the use would be of a morally objectionable nature or would be contrary to any of the District's policies or rules, or, would be contrary to the goals and/or objectives of the District's educational programs;
- F. when the use would result in the District's facilities or equipment being altered, modified, or changed;
- G. when the use would result in the District's facilities being used to store the equipment of the user;
- H. when, in the opinion of the administration, the use would present an unacceptable risk of damage or excessive wear and tear to the facilities or equipment;
- I. when, in the opinion of the administration, the use would present a significant disruption to the effective administration of a building or District program.

District facilities will not be made available for private social functions, including but not limited to, wedding receptions; birthday, graduation, or swimming parties; or other such events. Building administrators may place further limitations on uses in their buildings. Such limitations may include, but shall not be limited to: excluding the use of indoor facilities for soccer and/or baseball practices; excluding the use of science laboratories, media centers, elementary classrooms, and/or administrative offices; and excluding the use of facilities if such would be reasonably necessary to ensure timely cleaning and maintenance. Such additional limitations by a building administrator shall be supported by a reasonable rationale, shall be consistently applied, and shall be reported to the office of the District Director of Activities.

Building administrators or their designees may inspect and review any and all items brought into the building to ensure appropriate building safety and effective administration of the facilities. If, in the opinion of such administrator, any items would be unsafe, inappropriate, or undesirable in the building, he/she may prohibit such item from entering the building or require its removal from the building. In the event the building administrator's directive is not complied with expeditiously, approval for the use of the facility shall be withdrawn immediately by the administrator.

### III. Applications for Use of School Facilities

The administration shall develop an Application for Use of School Facilities form to assist with the administration of this rule. Such form shall be completed by all non-school organizations requesting the use of school facilities or equipment. The application shall require that all applicants:

- A. agree to comply with all District policies, rules, and regulations that govern use of facilities;
- B. agree to be responsible for any damages incurred to facilities, grounds, or equipment during the period of such use;
- C. agree to have the District Director of Activities as the final determiner as to whether repair or replacement is the appropriate remedy for any damages.
- D. agree to be wholly responsible for the supervision and control of all persons and activities during such use;
- E. agree to protect, indemnify, and hold the school District harmless for any and all claims, suits, actions, damages, judgments, or causes of action arising out of or in any way related to such use, and, further that, if requested, the applicant will provide, prior to the planned use of a facility, a Certificate of Liability Insurance in the amount of at least one-million dollars, naming Millard Public Schools as an additional insured.

District employees wishing to use a District facility for other than their assigned contractual duties must submit a completed Application for Use of School Facilities and shall be subject to the same rules (including fees and charges) as non-employees.

## IV. Cancellation of Approved Applications

A previously approved facility use may be canceled for one or more of the following reasons:

- A. failure of the applicant to pay applicable fees or charges for this use or any prior use;
- B. failure to reimburse the District for damages incurred during any prior use;
- C. evidence satisfactory to the District that applicant's use of the facility would violate a District policy, rule, or regulation or would be illegal;
- D. any violation of the terms and conditions of the application;
- E. any change in the school activities that presents a conflict with the use; etc.

- F. any snow or ice accumulation that would require additional removal costs for the District; or
- G. any other event or circumstance which, in the opinion of the administration, necessitates cancellation of the use.

In the event a previously approved facility use is cancelled, the District shall not be responsible for any damages incurred by the applicant as a result of such.

An applicant may, without penalty, cancel a previously approved facility use by giving notice of such to the District at least 48 hours prior to the scheduled use. If notice is given within 48 hours but prior to the use, the facility use fee may not be refunded.

## V. <u>Use of Facilities Rate Schedule</u>

A Use of Facilities Rate Schedule shall be reviewed and revised as necessary and distributed by the business office. Such schedule shall include, but not necessarily be limited to, fees for facilities use, equipment use, access charges, and charges for staff time.

## VI. Rate Schedules

The following fees and charges shall be assessed for the use of school District facilities and equipment:

- A. **Priority** Category 1 Uses: No fees will be assessed. A charge may be assessed for a use which requires additional staff time.
- B. Priority Category 2 Uses: No facility use or equipment use fee fees will be assessed. An access charge will be assessed for weekend usage. A charge may be assessed for a use which requires additional staff time.
- C. Priority Category 3 Uses: No facility use or equipment use fee fees will be assessed. An access charge will be assessed for weekend usage. A charge may be assessed for a use which requires additional staff time. The exception is the use of Lyle Buell Stadium or the Millard South Track Facility, in which a reduced facility use and/or equipment use fee will be assessed and an access charge will be assessed. A charge may be assessed for a use which requires additional staff time.
- D. Priority Category 4 Uses: A reduced facility use and/or equipment use fee will be assessed. An access charge will be assessed for weekend usage. A charge may be assessed for a use which requires

additional staff time. The exception to this is the use of Lyle Buell Stadium or the Millard South Track Facility, in which a reduced facility use and/or equipment use fee will be assessed and an access charge will be assessed. A charge may be assessed for a use which requires additional staff time.

E. Priority Category 5 Uses: A full facility use and/or equipment use fee will be assessed. An access charge will be assessed for weekend usage. A charge may be assessed for a use which requires additional staff time. The exception to this is the use of Lyle Buell Stadium or the Millard South Track Facility, in which the full facility use and/or equipment use fee will be assessed and an access charge will be assessed. A charge may be assessed for a use which requires additional staff time.

Use fees may be waived for public service meetings or presentations <u>by governmental</u> <u>agencies</u>, or for governmental <u>agencies</u> conducting <u>District initiated services</u>, upon prior approval by <u>the</u> District Director of Activities.

## VII. Equipment Requirements

Approval for the use of a facility shall not include the use of school equipment unless specifically requested and approved on the application form.

### VIII. Access Charges

An hourly access charge shall be assessed to compensate the District for expenses incurred in providing building access and other normal overhead expenses <u>during</u> <u>weekend usage</u>, such as heating, air conditioning, lighting, and general maintenance services. Such charge shall be assessed for the hours of the use plus the additional time required to clean up and secure the area.

If a user desires to have a custodian assigned exclusively to assist with the use, an additional charge for such service shall be assessed.

In situations where no advanced cancellation notice has been received by the District and the user does not appear at the scheduled time, the staff assigned shall remain available at the facility for one hour before securing the building and departing. An access fee will be assessed to the scheduled user for such time.

## IX. Special Staff Requirements

District staff must be present when certain school facilities are used. These facilities shall include, without limitation, kitchen facilities, swimming pools (where a life guard must be assigned), auditoriums (where stage and lighting technicians may be needed), and

other such areas as may be determined by the administration. When such additional staff are required to be present, the using organization will be charged for District expenses associated with such additional staff.

Arrangements for any additional staff (except kitchen staff) shall be made by the building administrator or his/her designee. Arrangements for kitchen staff shall be made by the District's Director of Food Service or his/her designee.

If the approved use involves employees other than those specifically *required* required by the District, the user may contract directly with the employee.

## X. Religious Organizations

Religious organizations may make application to use a District facility for a period of one year. An extension may be granted if satisfactory evidence exists that the organization is in the process of constructing or acquiring other non-District facilities for its use.

### XI. Use of Open Areas

School playgrounds, practice fields, and other open areas which are not being used for school activities shall be available to the general public on a first-come, first-served basis from one hour before sunrise to one hour after sunset each day. Thereafter, such areas shall be closed to public use. The only organizations that may submit an application to reserve reserve the use of such areas shall be non-profit organizations serving Millard youth and these organizations shall meet District requirements for the use of District facilities. Any groups using such facilities shall be responsible for any damage occurring as a result of such use and shall be responsible for clearing the grounds of litter after such use.

### XII. Snow and Ice Removal

In the event of significant snowfall (or accumulation of ice) prior to a use of District facilities, the District's operations and maintenance supervisors shall make a determination as to whether or not snow or ice removal is required. If such is required and if snow or ice removal is not necessary for other school-related activities, the scheduled use shall be canceled or, if mutually agreed to by the District and the user, the snow or ice will be removed by District personnel or contractors and an additional charge for such will be assessed to the user.

All snow and ice removal on school District property must be made by school District personnel or by properly insured independent contractors approved by and working for the District. Users will not be permitted to engage in snow or ice removal activities nor will they be permitted to hold activities on school property without proper snow or ice removal.

### XIII. Vehicle Parking

Vehicles may properly park in school District parking areas when attending school activities, when conducting school related business, or when in attendance at any approved use of school facilities. The school District grounds may not be used for any other parking of private vehicles. Any vehicles which are not permitted by this rule Rule to be parked on school property shall be subject to towing from school grounds at the owner's expense. Similarly, vehicles that are improperly parked shall also be subject to towing from school grounds at the owner's expense. Improper parking shall include, but not be limited to, parking in driveways or throughways, parking over painted stall lines, and parking on grassed areas.

## XIV. School-Affiliated Non-Profit Groups

For the purposes of this Rule the term "school-affiliated non-profit groups" shall be narrowly construed so as to only include groups which satisfy the Internal Revenue Service requirements for a non-profit organization, and whose sole and direct mission and purpose are to support a District school or District schools.

A copy of the architect's recommendation and the bid tab are attached. The estimated construction cost was \$7,217,521. The low bid was \$7,471,000 (with no alternates). After visiting with the low bidder and the architect, it appears that inflation is starting to impact construction costs – especially costs related to metals (i.e., structural steel, HVAC, electrical, etc.). The architect will be present to answer questions. With regard to the alternates, we are recommending the acceptance of Alternates #3 & #5. Alternate #3 is \$87,500 for the culinary arts equipment. (This equipment was bid separately because the cost will be allocated to the FFE (furniture, fixtures, and equipment) budget for the project.] Alternate #5 is \$48,000 for modifications to the HVAC system to provide for additional dehumidification capabilities. We have been experiencing humidification problems (e.g., mold) in our buildings during cool humid days (and on days when we are extracting carpets during the summer). This HVAC modification would provide a means for increasing the effectiveness of the dehumidification on these problem days. It is our thought that this would reduce the humidity problems we've been experiencing in other buildings. With the inclusion of Alternates #3 & #5, the total bid would be \$7,606,500. **OPTIONS AND ALTERNATIVES:** n/a **RECOMMENDATION:** It is recommended that the contract for the construction of Millard Horizon High School be awarded to Construct Inc. in the amount of \$7,606,600 (with such amount including the Base Bid plus Alternates #3 and #5) and that the associate superintendent for general administration be authorized and directed to execute any and all documents related to such project. Bids were received for the new Horizon High School project on Tuesday, June 3, 2008. Per the attached bid tab, seven bids were received. The low base bid was submitted by Construct Inc. in the amount of \$7,471,000.00. They also submitted five alternate bids as shown on the attached bid tab. Based on our post bid discussions with District staff, we understand the District would like to accept Alternate Bid #3 for the Culinary Arts Equipment in the additional amount of \$87,500.00 along with Alternate Bid #5 for the Additional Dehumidification in the additional amount of \$48,000.00. These two alternates combined with the Base Bid would result in a total contract award of \$7,606,500.00. Our final estimate for this same scope of work was \$7,217,521.00.

We have worked with Construct Inc. on a number of previous projects and we understand they have successfully completed recent projects for Millard Public Schools. We have no reason to believe Construct Inc. would not be able to perform the work in a satisfactory manner. Based on the bid results and discussions with District staff, we recommend a contract be awarded to Construct Inc. for the Base Bid along with Alternates 3 and 5 for a total contract amount of \$7,606,500.00.

**EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:** In August 2005, the District signed a three year contract with NTI Group for services of Connect-Ed, an automated telephone calling system which allows District Administrators to set up phone calls to selected parents, staff and community members in the event of emergency, to communicate attendance, and to provide information about events and news happening in the District. At the time, NTI Group was the largest vendor for these systems and it was determined that the company could provide the expected services to Millard Public Schools. The per-student cost the past three years was \$3.60 for a yearly cost of \$76,032.00. The contract expires August 12, 2008

Consequently, a Request for Proposals (RFP) was developed and distributed to vendors. The goal of the RFP was to discover other vendors who provide the same services and to determine if there are additional services within the calling system that can be provided to MPS. In addition, the RFP was also to determine potential savings to the District without loss of any current services. Five responses were received—one was evaluated as non-responsive due to missing information in the response. One was eliminated based upon lack of features and high cost. Three vendors were invited to make presentations. Specific additional features that were considered were real-time reporting, complex surveys and multi-language delivery with text-to-speech capability. AlertNow, a product of Saf-T-Net, Inc., was determined to be both cost effective and technically acceptable.

The yearly cost for the contract is based on number of students, and will be \$2.45 per student each year for three years. Anticipated cost per year is \$51,744.00

**RECOMMENDATION:** It is recommended that the contract for student and staff communication software be awarded to Saf-T-Net, Inc. for AlertNow in an amount of \$2.45 per student based on official September enrollment each year and that the Executive Director of Technology be authorized and directed to execute any and all documents related to this project.

Title & Brief Description:

The Professional/Technical Salary Schedule applies to a wide variety of positions and approximately 230 employees of the Millard Schools. This group of employees is due for a wage/salary increase for the 2008-09 school year.

- 1- Each qualified employee, employed during the 2007-08 school year, will be given a 5.0% wage increase.
- 2- The salary ranges for each position will increase. The minimum rate increases 4.0%; the maximum rate increases 5.0%.
- 3- Wage increases are effective with the first payroll in September (the 13<sup>th</sup> for bi-weekly and the 10<sup>th</sup> for monthly).
- 4- The additional increases for employees who satisfactorily complete training programs will be changed from prior years. In prior years, employees could receive up to 3% additional raise every year for completion of 36 seat hours of approved training. Going forward, employees will be eligible for the training increase every three years (e.g. those employees who received a training program increase in 2006-07 and/or 2007-08 will not be eligible for another training program pay increase in 2008-09).
- 5- CCM1 will remain \$250.
- 6- The rate of reimbursement for sick leave buyback will increase from \$75/day to \$80/day for exempt employees and from \$9.35/hr to \$10.00/hr for non-exempt employees.
- 7- Titles on the pay schedule have been updated to match current job titles.
- 8- Job Levels have all been adjusted due to the elimination of the only Job Title that previously fell in Job Level A. This adjustment adjusted the "Letter" only and not the pay rate.
- 9- Job Level "N" Minimums and Maximums have been frozen for the 2008-09 school year. Persons within the range will still receive a pay increase not to exceed the maximum of their Pay Level.
- 10- Business and Emergency Leave will be increased from 2 days to 3 days for all non-twelve month employees.

**Action Desired:** Approval of 2008-09 Professional/Technical Salary Schedule wage & benefit package equivalent to the raises given to other groups of Millard employees.

#### Benefit schedules listed below for full-time employees employed 40 hrs/week or more.

- 1- Employees employed less than 17.5 hrs/wk are not eligible for insurance benefits.
- 2- Paid Leave: may be used for personal illness, family illness, business & emergency leave, and family death. The rules and limitations on these leaves are defined in Board Policy. Unused leave may be accumulated up to the specified maximum. Employees who reach the maximum accumulation are eligible for annual leave buy back. An eligible employee who quits or retires after 20 years of service, or after 10 years of service if the employee is at least age 55, is eligible for buyback of unused paid leave at the rate specified. Leave that has been bought back is no longer available for use.
- 3- Holiday Pay: A new employee must work 20 days prior to being eligible for paid holidays. Part-time employees employed less than 40 hours/week are eligible to receive leave and holiday pay at a rate proportionate to their full-time equivalence.
- 4- Paid Vacation: is earned based upon the employee's vacation eligibility anniversary date. Usage of paid vacation is subject to supervisory approval and must normally be used in full-day increments. With supervisory approval, vacation may be used by hourly employees in full-hour increments. The maximum amount of paid vacation which may be accrued is equal to the amount earned during the previous 12 months. Once the maximum is accrued, additional vacation cannot be earned until the employee uses vacation causing the accrued balance to fall below the maximum. Upon leaving the employment of the District, employees shall be paid for the accrued vacation balance at the employees rate of pay.

# 2007-2008 Report on Multicultural Education

Nebraska Department of Education Rule 10 stipulates that "The instructional program in public schools incorporates multicultural education in all curriculum areas at all grades. Multicultural education includes, but is not limited to, studies relative to the culture, history, and contributions of African Americans, Hispanic Americans, Native Americans, Asian Americans and European Americans with special emphasis on human relations and sensitivity toward all races."

In addition, Rule 10 requires (sections 004.01G1 – 004.01G5) that:

- The district has a statement of philosophy or mission for the multicultural education program. Local program goals address multicultural education.
- The district curriculum guides, frameworks, or standards incorporate multicultural education.
- The district multicultural education program includes a process for selecting appropriate instructional materials.
- The district has a process for provision of staff development in multicultural education including professional development for administrators, teachers, and support staff which is congruent with local district and program goals.
- The district has a process for periodic assessment of the multicultural education program. An annual status report is provided to the local board of education.

In order to comply with the above, Educational Services has proposed the adoption of Policy 6140 and Rule 6140.1, Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment: Multicultural Education Program. Incorporated into the law is the mission of the Multicultural Education Program as defined by a District task force and approved by the Board of Education on October 17, 1994. The multicultural mission has been updated to reflect the current District mission.

Finally, Multicultural Education continues to be one of several filters or screening variables within each of the four phases of the Millard Education Program curriculum model. In this way, the District meets the requirements of Rule 10 ensuring that multicultural instructional materials are identified and secured, staff development provided, and all curriculum documents incorporate multicultural education components.

An example of multicultural incorporation into the curriculum and instructional materials is provided by the following matrix for Scott Foresman Science.

## 2007-08 – Office of Staff Development Multicultural Report

One workshop that has been an annual offering to Millard Public Schools staff is the *Educator Training on Managing Issues of Religious Diversity in Public Schools* put on by the Malashock Project for Interfaith Affairs of the Anti-Defamation League. This workshop was facilitated by Beth Katz and a panel of representatives from the Jewish, Mormon, Muslim and Jehovah Witness communities. Administrators, teachers and classified staff learned about the basic beliefs of these major religions and the religious accommodations needed for students from these traditions.

Besides this annual workshop, the Office of Staff Development was primarily in a year of research and development in 2007-2008 with professors from the University of Nebraska-Omaha. Drs. Nancy Edick, Sarah Edwards and Laura Schulte met more than twelve times with Millard Public Schools staff to determine the needs of Millard Public Schools and develop their staff development proposal based on the Millard Mission and Millard Instructional Plan. The Office of Staff Development planning and research was initiated to comply with the state requirements of the MPS Poverty Plan and the local legal issues of the Learning Community. Culturally Responsive Teaching ensures that students (a) "experience academic success, (b) develop and/or maintain cultural competence, and (c) develop a critical consciousness." (Ladson-Billings, 1995, p. 160)

Culturally Responsive Teaching was selected as one of the topics of our three year staff development initiative as explained in the 2007 MPS Comprehensive Staff Development Plan. All staff will participate in a four-hour class and a one-hour follow up workshop during their implementation year. However, not all of our staff will participate in Culturally Responsive Teaching in 2008-2009. In 2008-2009, returning elementary staff, PK-12 psychologists, and PK-12 special education itinerant staff will participate in the Culturally Responsive Teaching class. Middle school staff will participate in this required course in 2009-2010 and high school staff will participate in 2010-2011.

The four-hour Culturally Responsive Teaching class objective is: Participants will demonstrate comprehension of culturally responsive teaching by participating in interactive discussions and responding to researched based principles. The primary goals of the Culturally Responsive Teaching class are to 1) consider cultural lenses of teachers and students (e.g. age, gender, race, poverty); 2) identify current Culturally Responsive Teaching practices in alignment with the Millard Instructional Model; 3) consider possible Culturally Responsive Teaching practices and 4) set goals for next steps to be refined during focus group sessions.

- 5th grade African drumming unit-students studied music from different parts of Africa and how it has influenced music in America today. Students studied African art and then spent two weeks learning to play African drumming patterns.
- 4th grade-Dances from around the world-Students learned a new dance once a month from countries such as Finland, Russia, United States, and France.

- As we continue to implement the Primary Years Programme, we are focusing on the International Baccalaureate Learner Profile. Central to the PYP is the development of the international person. The Learner Profile outlines the ten most important attributes of an international person. In the classroom, the teachers model these attributes and intertwine the learning and fostering of ways to develop these characteristics in all areas, using a variety of strategies. The Learner Profile helps teachers and students establish goals, plan units of inquiry, and assess performance.
- IB PYP Units of Inquiry The curriculum framework consists of five essential elements: concepts, knowledge, skills, attitude, and action. The five essential elements listed above are incorporated into this framework, so that students are given the opportunity to:
  - gain knowledge that is relevant and of global significance
  - develop an understanding of concepts, which allows them to make connections throughout their learning
  - acquire transdisciplinary and disciplinary skills
  - develop attitudes that will lead to international-mindedness
  - take action as a consequence of their learning.
- All students, kindergarten through fifth grade, participate in Spanish instruction for 50 minutes a week. Language activities include experiences with cultural practices and integration of the Primary Years Programme units of inquiry. These experiences emphasize listening, speaking, reading and comprehension in meaningful, communicative contents: social/cultural situations, games, songs, and rhymes plus experiences with arts, crafts, and movement.

<u>World Bicycle Tour</u>: Bruce Junek and Tass Thacker are a husband and wife team who bicycled and traveled through 52 different countries over the last 30 years. They presented a slide show igniting student interest in social studies, science, geography, culture, history, writing, art and healthy lifestyle choices.

- Field trips taken to the Joslyn Art Museum allowed students to experience contributions by various artists, backgrounds and cultures. An extensive study of Native American's was completed.
- Students learned about Native American History and even learned how to weave!

- Every Morton student attends The Rose and The Symphony; the presentations are rich in culture from around the world.
- Calendar activities provide daily opportunities to celebrate special days for various groups. This provides a nice opening for literature sharing (about a holiday, custom, etc.).

- We promote a variety of library books from diverse cultural backgrounds to classes as they work in the library with assorted projects.
- We did a piece on refugee resettlement (modern-day) when we studied *The Diary of Anne Frank* and Collection 8 "We Shall Overcome" in the literature book.
- When we studied *To Kill A Mockingbird* we talked a LOT about racism and it's prevalence in the '30s, '60s and present day.
- Teachable moment discussions about student diversity in our building as the year progressed.
- We took some time to cover some of the Native American groups since the text doesn't provide too much info.
- We read some Native American tales about animals such as the possum and created star quilts significant in the Lakota Sioux culture.
- Biographies: Student self-select and research a person (from a list, though their additions may fit) who has made a significant contribution to the human condition.
- Origin of myth and folktales as a means of transmitting the culture comparison of various myths across cultures and significance of specific symbols across cultures.
- Sports Unit E-Sheet research on famous figures in sports who either used their talents to advance/change a sport, or used their sport to advance humanity.
- We have the students read excerpts from MLK Jr. and Malcolm X and compare and contrast the two different schools of thought. We also do some extra education about the Holocaust and Anti-Semitism during the Anne Frank unit.

- We research famous scientists who have diverse background. It shows successful minority men and women.
- We complete a webquest about the Holocaust. Students learn additional information about the concentration camps not covered in Anne Frank.
- In reading class we read a story about racism and civil rights. We did extension activities on-line example we listened to Martin Luther King Jr.'s I Have a Dream speech. Also, we read about a story involving the Japanese internment camps during WWII. We went to a website that gave pictures and info about the camps.
- We do cover the impact of culture and tradition on the foods that are eaten in 8th Grade Foods. We learn about heritage and customs related to 12-15 different regions/countries around the globe. We go above the required curriculum in our delivery of this when we introduce several related foods lab experiences.
- In Spanish class, we teach a little bit about illegal immigration as far as why and how it takes place. The kids have to do some research and find out more via internet.
- In Orchestra, the instructor and guest performed some South Indian Classical music. They both studied in India for a year. They also talk about the music and do some interactive things.

- A 7<sup>th</sup> grade writing unit based on injustices. We started by discussing MLK and the civil rights movement. From there we discussed the Holocaust, Trail of Tears, and Japanese Interment camps. They wrote essays on these subjects as well as compared the similarities and differences between them.
- Many of the 8th graders chose a female or minority figure for their Asset Day "Person of Success". They read about them, identified their contributions to society, and then determined which assets they had which helped them succeed.
- Tuskegee Airman came to present to the 8<sup>th</sup> grade students.

- Posters depicting history and configurations of math symbols used in Europe, China, Japan, Africa, Arabia, and India.
- Greek alphabet and vocabulary used during different times of year to help with vocabulary, work with variables, and geometry.
- Contributions of different cultures (Babylonian, Persian, Greek, Chinese, African, etc) to the area of mathematics are discussed throughout the year.
- Posters of major American mathematicians from various backgrounds are displayed throughout the year.
- ELL students are encouraged to share language, classroom, and cultural differences as opportunities occur through the curriculum.

- Mix It Up at Lunch- an opportunity to encourage students to sit with students they don't know at lunch. The objective is to create a more inclusive school.
- Challenge Day- Seventh grade students participated in this day to promote an inclusive school.
- ELL After School Program and Family Nights- Our ELL students participated in after school programs every Monday for much of the year.

School: Kiewit Middle School

**Professional Development Activities:** (List and describe professional development activities that were designed to support multicultural education, diversity training, or the development of inclusive communities at your building.)

- Information on a variety of topics including multicultural education and sensitivity was regularly shared with staff via the Kiewit staff development newsletter. Also, through the weekly "Words of Wisdom" and 40-Development assets programs, students and staff receive information that related to an appreciation of cultural diversity. These programs included hundreds of motivational and multicultural quotes and aphorisms from philosophers, religious thinkers, entertainers, sports figures, and fictional characters. Some teachers utilized the quotes as points of discussion or as instructional motivators.
- The bulletin board in the main foyer was occasionally used to highlight various cultural celebrations. During the implementation of the life skills/asset curriculum, each month a different life skill/asset was highlighted on the bulletin board. Many of the life skills related to respecting diversity and individuals. Project for Interfaith Affairs instructed our teachers on different cultures and religions. The speaker brought in a 5 team panel to answer questions from staff. This was very powerful and teachers were engaged and enthusiastic. In addition to the asset/life skill bulletin board, we had another bulletin board featuring prominent black history leaders throughout the month of February.

**Learning Experiences:** (List and describe those provided for students <u>that are beyond those called for by district curriculum):</u>

• Grade 6 - In addition to the social studies classes which consistently highlighted cultural aspects of the world, students participated in a multicultural math game, a study involving the cultural aspects of clothing, watched films about "The Irish in America," played games relating to different civilizations, had musical days inventing civilization raps with the Greek, Roman, or Egyptian units, and much more. The 6th grades also participated in an interdisciplinary unit about the Iditarod unit with an emphasis on the Alaskan/Eskimo cultures. One team also attended an IMAX movie with content related to the Egyptian mummies. "Justice for All," a Hal Unit, was offered to qualified students working with reading books and activities on Japanese internment during WWII. Challenge math students read Grandfather Tang's Story and discussed Chinese culture and area of figures using Tangrams. Math 6 students learned how to use the Sieve of

Eratosthenes efficiently and researched other major math contributions of this fine mathematician. In addition, sixth grade prealgebra students discussed Greek customs while learning about the Pythagorean Theorem and Chinese Triples.

- Grade 7 Diverse cultures were discussed via current events through political cartoons and CNN discussions. One 7<sup>th</sup> grade team focused on Martin Luther King and subsequent projects included letters, painting, and collages which represented freedom, equality, and justice. 7<sup>th</sup> graders also researched the diversity of other cultures by "visiting" a country of their choice for four days and sharing what was learned about such topics as language, traditions, customs, clothing, economy, and government. Korean folktales were read in some homerooms. Reading class now requires that students read books of cultural diversity as part of their genre requirement and the teachers give book talks on that genre. In one of their reading texts, the students explore a variety of themes/stories related to ancient worlds and minorities. Contributions of scientists from various countries were also shared. Math students learned about Greek life and philosophers through the study of the Pythagorean Theorem. As a bonus for the year, Ryan Carlson (7<sup>th</sup> grade teacher) and his team of actors, re-enacted parts of the Viking era for the entire grade level. Students were engaged and learned what it was like to live in a different culture.
- Grade 8 The social studies classes highlighted various cultural aspects of the world. In history, students read about Harriet Tubman, wrote Native American poems, and studied immigration. The 8<sup>th</sup> grade curriculum lends itself to multicultural education as the curriculum includes instruction on African American history, simulations of the slave ships, assembly lines, Native American culture, etc. Students participated in an interdisciplinary unit on Lewis and Clark. Teams completed ethnic pie graphs and attended a "Living Voices" assembly about Irish immigration on May 15<sup>th</sup>. English classes read The Diary of Anne Frank and discussed the Holocaust. Students also read "Ashes of Roses" which was a story about immigration. 8th grade English students choose a variety of multicultural topics for their MLA research papers and read a variety of short literature from authors of various backgrounds and cultures. In 8th grade science the students discussed contributions made by different cultures to astronomy.
- Exploratory and Specialists Every foreign language class has cultural connections—language, geography, products, customs, food, shopping, sites, etc.
- Students in music classes learned about music from various cultures including how African Americans contributed to blues and jazz. The music department makes a special effort to include a wide variety of cultural music selections. Selections from a set of CD's called "Planet Soup" which combined music from different cultures were used. Sixth graders studied music from other countries and the teacher showed the students instruments she has collected from her travels. Students also played a world instrument bingo game that included pictures, maps, and listening examples from other cultures.
- Physical Education classes integrated sports, games, and dance from around the world— Middle East, Europe, and Africa.

- The 8<sup>th</sup> grade "Know Yourself" class included lessons on stereotyping, discrimination, and sexism.
- In FCS the importance of the American Food Pyramids was discussed. Food pyramids from different cultures such as Asian, Hispanic, Native American, and Mediterranean were also studied. Herbs and spices from various parts of the world were explored for the medicinal and culinary properties. In 8th grade "Foods," students discuss the life style of vegetarianism. Various religious and cultural aspects are explored and respectively acknowledged. Geographical areas are researched and students visited a website devoted in entirety to multiculturalism. Students also formed a restaurant from a different country and created a menu devoted to that area's cuisine. Then students created several menu items from their restaurant in celebration of a Food Block Party. Many foods from other nations, religions, and regions within the U.S. were created in the food labs.
- The art department continues to highlight various artistic aspects of the international world with a strong focus on Native American pottery and African American masks. Students studied Egyptian art, Spanish tile design, Aboriginal art, Mexican folk art, and African art with an emphasis on quilt stories. Students also studied batik textile designs used in India and Africa. Sixth grade students participated in "Artist of the Week" reports which included various artists who represented different cultures, nationalities, and genders. Eighth graders completed Master Sketch assignments in drawing and painting which included reading about and duplication of styles and techniques from artists around the world. Printmaking classes study the culture of their ancestors to incorporate into a print.
- The students who participated in the KCC, Kiewit's after school program, studied a different culture each month through videos, the cooking of ethnic foods, the arts, and games students learned about cultures. Example: India: the students made chicken chaat and naan to eat, learned the real way to wrap a turban, and made batik cloth designs.
- Information Center activities included research with 6th grade students on Inuit Native American culture and Japanese-American Internment during World War II. Seventh grade students spent many hours researching cultures from the Western hemisphere and Western Europe. Students were also supplied with lists of Multicultural titles for their independent book selections. The center also sponsored a visit by a guest author, John Ritter who has written books with Hispanic characters, language, and settings.

For example: Chinese wall hangings, African jewelry, Japanese prints and origami, French Impressionist paintings, German expressionist drawings, and Native American totem pole designs. Ethnic diversity is an integral part of our studies. Differences in customs, beliefs, and traditions influence forms of art from painting to architecture.

**Pre IB Art** includes studies of Egyptian and Prehistoric Cave Art to present day practices in art.

**IB** Art - Integrated into their studies, references to other cultures is an essential part of their evaluation criteria.

**Pottery** classes created Grecian urns. Also studied the Mid-eastern tradition of mosaic art. Maria Martinez's pottery style/heritage highlighted and discussed from Southwest.

**Art Foundations** classes include a specific multicultural outcome objective (usually a 3D project) in addition to being inherent in units. For example; 3D and pottery units exemplify Native American traditions of construction and symbolic designs.

Studies of portrait painters such as Frida Kahlo (Mexico) include discussions of her life and culture where connections can be made to Hispanic traditions in America.

- Simon Rohde organized 5 delegations of 17 students to participate in the Model United Nations and was awarded "Best School."
- Simon Rohde sponsored a student who attended the district and state National History Day competition
- Dave Bacon made arrangements for guest speakers representing the areas of:

- Catholic Christianity, Protestant Christianity, Orthodox Christianity, iconography, Zen Buddhism, Judaism, and Islam
- Brent Snow took students on a guided fieldtrip of traditional ethnic neighborhoods within the greater Omaha metropolitan area.
- Tricia Rohde (a MN alumnus) brought three deaf students to make a presentation on Deaf Culture in Theory of Knowledge and World Geography classes.
- Leslie McFee and Weylon White have students research statistical information from foreign countries then present the information graphically in Functions and Discrete class.
- IB math classes we deal with currency conversions as well as history of mathematicians and their origins.
- On, or near, Australia Day (Jan 26) each year Doug Thomas takes a day to discuss with students about Australia and some math (money/time/distance/temperature conversions and examples of their currency) related to living there.

- The Millard North High School team, organized by Simon Rohde won the African American History Challenge Bowl - Senior Division Champions!
- This Millard North team (Adriene Garcia, Maurice Green, and Joe Ann Moser) will be representing Nebraska in the National competition in Orlando Florida on June 11<sup>th</sup>.
- All Art classes were involved in the 2007 International "Pinwheels for Peace" Day, Sept. 21, 2007. Through the Pinwheels for Peace project, we enabled our students make a public visual statement about their feelings about war/peace/tolerance/cooperation/harmony/unity to, in some way, awaken the public and let them know what the next generation is thinking. Students helped "plant" their pinwheels outside in front of the school as a public statement and art exhibit/installation.
- We started a Diversity Club this year under the sponsorship of Carmen Hippen.
- MNHS joined the IncluCity human relations program. This multi-cultural program is
  designed to break down barriers of prejudice and oppression by enhancing diversity
  awareness. Carmen is coordinating a group of our students to participate in a leadership
  conference this summer

- Jennifer Reid and Rebecca Prochaska facilitated training sessions in using the Sheltered Instruction Observation Protocol (SIOP) Model. The SIOP Model serves as an instructional framework under which other effective instructional approaches reside, such as cooperative learning, sheltered instruction strategies, and differentiated instruction. It was developed during a seven-year research project (1996-2003) for the Center of Research on Education, Diversity & Excellence, funded by the Institute for Education Sciences, U.S. Department of Education.
- Ten Millard South High School teachers participated in this training that focused on implementation of the major features of sheltered instruction to promote academic achievement among ALL students in mainstream classrooms. The objective was for participants to demonstrate application and evaluation of The SIOP Model features by developing and conducting lessons designed with an emphasis on SIOP features and evaluating the effectiveness of the SIOP Model as a means to increase student achievement.

## **Special Education**

The special education department parallels the curriculum from the general education classes in the areas of: English, Science and Social Studies. Through this curriculum parallel the special education teachers include multicultural activities listed in the core areas.

### **World Languages**

### French Club:

This year French Club went to the Orpheum to see The Phantom of the Opera by Gaston Leroux. The club members visited two authentic French restaurants in our area, Le Voltaire, and The French Cafe. We had several early morning "Croissants et Chocolat" sessions where we spoke French with students while enjoying a typical French continental breakfast.

## Other French Department Activities:

The French teachers sponsor a trip abroad to France for our students every other year. That trip includes a 5 night home stay in a French family. Some French teachers in our department organize Internet e-mail exchanges and pen pal experiences with students in other countries. We continue to welcome a growing population of French-speaking students from other countries, especially Africa, to our program.

### German Club

In the fall, German Club and Diversity club held a reception to welcome all the exchange students at MSHS and to introduce them to the students and faculty. Club members celebrated authentic German Christmas customs with their Niklaustag activity. The German Club visited the German restaurant, Gerdas. Cultural food experiences in the club included eating Spaghetti Eis, sampling German cakes, and a enjoying a German-style breakfast.

Each year the German students go to the German Convention held in Omaha at various schools. There they compete in cake making, poetry, art, vocal and instrumental music, cultural trivia, cultural power point presentations, and so on. They also learn folk dancing and singing, German crafts, and cooking.

### Other German Department Activities

The German teachers are involved in a travel exchange program with Helene-Lange-Gymnasium in Dortmund, Germany (one spring we host German students here, and the following year the MSHS students go to Germany in the summer).

In March fifteen students and three teachers from Dortmund stayed with MSHS families and attended school with their host brothers or sisters. They made seven presentations to MSHS classes about various aspects of the German culture.

In April, a former MSHS student was a guest speaker on the subjects of Berlin, the UNL semester in Berlin, and international business.

### Spanish Club

This year Spanish Club experienced authentic food at Azteca and Espana restaurants.

Students competed in the UNL Foreign Language Fair in vocal, drama, and poster events.

At the fair, students participated in Swahili, Russian, Japanese, and Chinese language mini-lessons. They also learned Czech and Russian Folk Dances.

## Other Spanish Department Activities

The summer of '07, Spanish teachers and students traveled to Spain. Students stayed with host families in addition to traveling as a group. Some Spanish teachers will travel to Spain with students this coming summer as well.

- Three teachers participated in The ADL (Anti-Defamation League) a workshop titled, *Managing Religious Diversity Issues in a Public School Setting*.
- All teachers reviewed the "Ism's as presented by CIC. They discussed in small groups the issues they saw most affecting Millard West. Our Justice Club sponsor then shared what the club had been doing this year and shared significant learnings about students' experiences and perceptions at West.
- All teachers in their PLC Course group identify an Inclusivity Issue that they thought impacted the students in their specific course (gender, age, race, etc...). They then brainstormed strategies to create more inclusive environments for all of their students.
