Minutes Committee Meeting April 20, 2009

The members of the Board of Education met as a committee of the Whole on Monday, April 20, 2009 at 6:30 p.m. at the Don Stroh Administration Center, 5606 South 147th Street. The topics which were discussed included legislation and revenue projections for 2009-2010.

Present: Dave Anderson, Brad Burwell, Mike Kennedy, Linda Poole, and Julie Kannas.

Absent: Mike Pate

Also in attendance were Keith Lutz, Ken Fossen, Mark Feldhausen, Angelo Passarelli, Bill Mueller, district lobbyist, Carol Newton and Charlene Snyder.

Bill Mueller, district lobbyist, updated board members on the debate held in the legislature today in regards to LB 545. Under LB 545 the \$234 million stimulus money will fund schools for the next two years, and there will be no additional state aid for education funding. This represents a sizeable increase in state aid for next year (\$17-20 million increase) and they anticipate an additional increase the following year. State aid funds will be frozen by the state to fund other projects. What will occur after two years when the stimulus funds have ceased is a question of concern by board members? This is what they are calling the "cliff effect" after using stimulus funds in place of general fund dollars.

They discussed the district's position of support for the priority bill advanced by Senator Adams and the Education Committee. A few board members said it was important Senator Adams knew that Millard was in support of LB 545. LB 391 is the priority bill that holds all of the changes to the Learning Community legislation that were approved by the eleven school districts and the Learning Community representatives. The bill (LB 521) that would restore funding diverted to the Learning Community is not prioritized and it appears the best we might be able to do is move this into an interim study.

Ken Fossen reported state aid that original projections of \$65 million will go up to \$75 million with the stimulus dollars included. There are specific rules that need to be followed with the stimulus money. The money can be used for just about everything, except buildings, cars, maintenance and the like.

Mark Feldhausen, Carol Newton, and explained the various areas where the stimulus funding would be of great assistance in the curriculum area, which will help to increase achievement and provide quality teachers. Carol Newton and Charlene Snyder provided input on both Title I and special education areas where the funding could be used.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: As the movement to digital storage continues, the amount of data stored on District devices continues to increase. All District users have home directory space for document storage needs. In addition, departments have common storage areas for documents and data, and various data systems residing on servers also contain storage. Currently, the Technology Division is responsible for maintaining servers and storage devices and backing up all data on these devices. Currently, the Technology Division contracts with Eagle Software in Salina, Kansas for data backup software and maintenance contracts. All backups are done within the District and data is stored at multiple locations to prevent loss. Current data backup needs are 1.5TB per week.

In September 2008, the Technology division began researching a new backup method commonly called data de-duplication. This method of backup will compare data in multiple locations and backup one copy or version of documents and/or data, thereby decreasing storage needs by up to 50%. This solution would increase the life of the current data storage infrastructure and eliminate the need to purchase additional storage capacity in the near future. It will also decrease the amount of time needed to process backups.

Consequently, a Request for Proposals (RFP) was developed and distributed to vendors. Three vendors were notified of the RFP, and two responses were received. Symantec did not respond to our request as they do not support Novell, the District's server operating system. Eagle Software and AOS provided responses which were evaluated based on District needs. Data Domain, provided by Eagle Software, was determined to be both cost effective and technically acceptable.

The cost for the contract, including 3 years of support is \$154,274.00. Anticipated cost per year following the initial 3 years is \$13,500.00. The initial cost is \$25,388 less than the AOS proposed solution, while the ongoing cost is \$11,050.00 less.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the contract for District data backup services be awarded to Eagle Software for Data Domain in an amount of \$154,274.00 and that the Executive Director of Technology be authorized and directed to execute any and all documents related to this project.

Data De-Duplication (Backup) System

Reason: decrease the physical size of the data storage requirements for the District. Currently the District stores approximately 1.5TB per week. After de-duplication the storage requirements are expected to decrease up to 50%, there by extending the life of the current storage infrastructure and eliminating the need to purchase additional storage capacity in the near future.

Data Domain, proposed by Eagle Software, uses a centralized model for data de-duplication. All data is transmitted to the central locations before de-duplication and storage takes place. There is no savings in bandwidth use. High availability and redundancy are provided by a single box with RAID hard drive technology at three sites. Each site is acting as a disaster recovery site for one of the others (A to B, B to C, C to A).

EMC Avamar, proposed by AOS, uses an edge model for data de-duplication. Only the unique data is transmitted to the central locations for storage, resulting in decreased bandwidth demands. High availability and redundancy are provided by RAIN technology at two sites. RAIN technology is a set of RAID hard drive boxes connected together in a redundant array. If one box fails, no data is lost and the system remains operational. Each site has an online spare box.

As the District adds servers to the system, additional licenses must also be added with recurring annual costs when using the Data Domain solution. There would be no additional costs with the EMC solution until additional space is required.

RECOMMENDATION: Data Domain from Eagle Software due to lower overall total cost of ownership and proven working relationship with this vendor.

Calendar

Senators have now completed 72 days of 90 day session. The last day is Thursday, June 4th.

Stimulus Dollars

State aid projections indicate that it would take an additional \$294 million over two years to fund the current formula. The current plan is to use \$234 million in stimulus funding to fund TEEOSA for two years. The state will not put any additional dollars into the formula. They are looking at LB 545 to change the formula to meet the proposed budget of \$234 million (a shortfall of \$60 million).

LB 545

This bill stalled after substantial debate last week. It had enough votes to pass but the amendments proposed by Omaha Senators were not successful and the bill did not have enough votes for Cloture (30/33 votes needed). This bill is now listed a **Speaker Major Proposal** which gives it scheduling priority. This bill will be debated on Thursday (April 30). Senator Adams has a compromise with the averaging adjustment and we expect that will provide enough incentive to move it to second round debate. There may be additional changes on Select File as well. As it currently stands the legislature will have to appropriate an additional 56 million to fully fund the TEEOSA formula if this bill is not approved.

Appropriations Committee

The budget is expected next week and debate will begin on items in that budget.

Learning Community

Senator Adams is going to use the Education Committee priority bill LB 392 to bring the changes we requested to the floor. The elements of LB 391 (growth factor, distribution of funds, and hold harmless) will be amended into LB 392 (primary, new school adjustment, delay elementary learning centers) and LB 545.

National News

State education budget cuts may deepen in the 2009-10 budget years as at least 43 states are projecting a total of \$121 billion in future budget deficits, according to a survey by the National Conference of State Legislatures.

U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan is recommending that \$100 billion in federal stimulus money for education be used to add instructional days to school calendars and reward the best teachers. "You can identify your best teachers and pay them to coach their colleagues who are having trouble," Duncan said. "You may have to scale this down after two years [when stimulus money runs out], but it can really help your younger teachers get up to speed."

Duncan wants the Stimulus money to jump start wholesale reform. He called on "governors and school chiefs" to act as catalysts with the teacher unions, the College Board and other parties, such as the business-baked Gates Foundation "to come up with the (standards)" for making education opportunities and measures more uniform across the country. He acknowledged the enormity of the task, but pointed to the extraordinary scope of the resources just unleashed from Washington, noting that if reform is not the outcome of this investment, there won't be support for further expansion.

Middle School Alternative Program Evaluation

Introduction and Purpose

The purpose of the modifications to the Middle School Alternative Program beginning in 2005-2006 were to better identify the behavior improvement needs of the alternative population, decrease negative school behaviors, increase service to all at-risk middle school students across the district, provide transportation as to increase accessibility to the program for more students and to align the curriculum at MSAP with the district in order to improve student achievement.

MODIFICATION GOALS FOR MSAP PER MSAP 2005 STRATEGIC PLAN:

- A School within a School Concept
- Transportation, Physical Space, and Staffing should be provided to meet the needs of all students
- Transitions and Placement is necessary from the regular setting to MSAP and into high school
- Staff Development Instructional Strategies are necessary in the area of working with at-risk students.
- Before and After School Program should be available to engage students

<u>RECOMMENDATIONS MADE BY THE ALTERNATIVE EDUCATION</u> TASKFORCE IN May of 2008.

I. Focus Area: Middle School Alternative Program (MSAP)

A. Issue/Concern: MSAP students do not benefit from all of the components of middle level education that best practice deems necessary. These include exploratory curriculum and health education.

Recommendations:

- Maintain common core area teacher planning time.
- Determine a plan for providing exploratory options for all students at MSAP. Exploratory options at the Millard middle schools include computer science, art, family consumer science, health, P.E., industrial technology, music, and world language. MSAP exploratory options could be tailored to fit the needs of the learners in that setting. Ensure that space and material needs (curriculum; technology) for this are met.
- Provide for the health and wellness for students at MSAP, including health education and mental health services- counseling, psychological, and social

B. Issue/Concern: To maximize student engagement, MSAP students require intentional programming designed to meet their unique needs. This includes integrated curriculum, real world application, service-learning, mentoring (relationship-building), technology, flexible scheduling, and curriculum support for all levels of learners.

Recommendations:

service.

• Determine a staff to student ratio and caps per grade level to ensure that there is enough staff to teach all subjects for all three grade levels while meeting the students' individual needs. This includes relationship-building and mentoring.

• In order to allow for flexible scheduling and reading support for low level readers, MSAP needs the capability to have Read 180 classes in their building. This keeps them from being tied to the CMS schedule.

• Transportation is needed to allow MSAP students to experience community service projects and career field trips. This transportation is also critical to continuing the Take Flight program.

• Due to lack of "time out" space, MSAP students often end up at CMS for time out. Due to relationships built over time with MSAP staff, students are much more successful working through problems at MSAP than at CMS. It is recommended that there is an additional "time out" area at MSAP.

C. Issue/Concern: MSAP student transition disrupts the normal daily operation of the program.

Recommendations:

• Separate the department head and the behavior interventionist position at MSAP. The behavior interventionist would work with students all day every day. The department head could handle transition and day to day program operations (attendance, subs, budget, scheduling, parent meetings, etc.). As time allows, he or she could also assist with behavior intervention at the other middle school buildings.

D. Issue/Concern: MSAP students do not have access to after school programming options.

Recommendations:

• MSAP students, like all middle school students, benefit from after school programs for homework assistance and for clubs and sports. MSAP students are rarely successful in CMS after school programs because these programs are not part of the structure they are used to with the people whom they know well.

• It is recommended that MSAP teachers may be paid like other middle school

teachers to sponsor after school programs for their students. These programs would be for career exploration, re-teaching, homework assistance, and special interest clubs.

E. Issue/Concern: MSAP teachers need professional development that addresses the uniqueness of their student population.


Recommendations:

• MSAP teachers benefit from the same professional development offerings as traditional teachers, but they also need opportunities for learning that are specific to their alternative setting. It is recommended that district staff development assists in determining opportunities that meet the professional learning needs of MSAP teachers.

Participation

Students are recommended for placement in the Middle School Alternative Program from all middle schools in the district. Transportation is provided for all students who wish to participate in the program.

The following graphs illustrate the home attendance zones for the students enrolled in the program.




MSAP Enrollment








All MSAP parents were sent a survey asking questions about their experiences and satisfaction with the MSAP program. Fourteen parents returned the surveys. Of the 14 returned, one parent had a student in 6^{th} grade, seven parents had students in 7^{th} grade, five of the parents had students in 8^{th} grade, and one was unknown. The following graphs indicate their responses to survey questions.



Has the staff at MSAP provided you with a clear understanding of the philosophy of and instructional practices related to MSAP?


Do you feel that the program has provided the type of opportunity for your child that you expected based on your understanding of the philosophy of and instructional practices related to MSAP?






What is your level of satisfaction with the instructional practices that your child has received in the MSAP classrooms?

Summary and Conclusions

The Millard Middle School Alternative Program began to operate under the adaptations made in their site plan during the 2006-2007 school year. Many of these adaptations are in alignment with the recommendations of the Alternative Education Taskforce. Staff Development appears to be one area that has not been an area of concentration as per the plan.

Each of the district's six middle schools has capitalized on the program to serve students. The largest proportion of students attending MSAP comes from the Andersen and Central areas. Students generally come to MSAP with academic and/or behavioral deficiencies. When examining achievement data on the district ELO exams, MSAP students yield respectable scores which indicate academic recovery in all areas with the exception of Social Studies.

Behavior data indicates that annually, there is an infraction rate of a little over one per student per year on average, however, all of the infractions last year could be attributed to fifty percent of the student body at MSAP, which means that half of the students had no behavior infractions all year long.

Parent survey responses and student focus group comments indicate overwhelming support and gratitude for the program.

It may be concluded that MSAP is well on its way in accomplishing the goals that they have established in their site plan and that the program is working toward meeting the goals of the district strategic plan and the recommendations of the District Alternative education taskforce. Continued efforts to align curriculum and instruction as well as augment staff development with training in cognitive recovery will only enhance the program.
