The members of the Board of Education met as a committee of the Whole on Monday, May 11, 2009 at 6:30 p.m. at the Don Stroh Administration Center, 5606 South 147th Street. The topics which were discussed included the Superintendent goals and the Learning Community.

Present:

Mike Pate, Dave Anderson, Brad Burwell, Mike Kennedy, Linda Poole, and Julie

Also in attendance were Keith Lutz, Mark Feldhausen, Kraig Lofquist, and other administrators.

Dr. Lutz and the Board reviewed and discussed the progress made on the Superintendent's three work assignments for 2008-2009.

"The Superintendent will demonstrate and outline programs and initiatives that are developed as a result of the 40 Assets Program that involve social issues, including any other programs that would benefit the District."

The 40 Assets Program came about through the District's Strategic Plan, which contains several action plans relating to the 40 assets. Millard is the first school district in the Metro area to implement such a program. The research shows that the more assets students have the more likely they will succeed. All buildings are working on the 40 assets in different ways and at different levels. Next year there will be a concentrated effort to work with the high school teachers to give them specific ideas on how to work with their students.

The Building Bright Futures group talked with Dr. Lutz about the program, and they were very impressed with the program. Building Bright Futures will be funding a position at the University of Nebraska Omaha and this individual will work through the Metropolitan Omaha Educational Consortium (MOEC) to help other school districts with the program.

"The Superintendent will research and develop a plan to implement an Early College Program."

Dr. Lutz and Mark Feldhausen discussed the progress completed on this goal. This program provides an opportunity to earn early college credit while still in high school, and was initially developed to help first generation college kids. With the implementation of the career academies in the high schools next year, and the continued dual enrollment opportunity with the University of Nebraska Omaha, the district is on its way helping students to transition from high school into a college setting.

"The Superintendent will develop and implement a plan to ensure that the Millard Public School District's interests are protected as we transition into the Learning Community."

This goal was established to ensure that the boundaries of Millard stay secure. The Learning Community Coordinating Council law will need to be monitored and be fine-tuned to work with Millard, and not against Millard's interests. Several legislative bills relating to the Learning Community are through the General file step in the Nebraska Legislature.

A discussion will be held at the next Learning Community District 4 sub-council meeting about focus schools and magnet pathways. This is the only piece that will benefit Millard without changing the law. The elementary learning centers will benefit a few other districts, but may not benefit Millard

Ken Fossen has been a leader in the finance area in the Learning Community law. He is able to relate the impact of the Learning Community bill to all Metro school districts.

Brad Burwell said the Learning Community Coordinating Council has put in a lot of the fundamentals. With the strategies in place and foundation laid, the council is starting to take some action. In late June they will begin strategically planning for the elementary learning centers.

In the future, Millard will need to figure out how Millard will play a part of this. Mr. Burwell reiterated what was said by Dr. Lutz about elementary learning centers will probably not assist Millard, but Millard would probably want to concentrate more on a focus school. Mr. Burwell asked the board to let him know what it is that board members want to see for the students in Millard and for this district. He will welcome any comments on an ongoing basis about what the board wants for this district, and he will support anything that will benefit Millard.

Mr. Burwell did share some of the difficulties and differences among other members of the council, but commented that the majority of the members do have the same goal and interest to assist all of the students in Omaha and the surrounding area.

Mr. Burwell hopes to begin discussion at the sub-council meeting on Thursday about the need to have a consistent way to figure out how many students fill a building. He believes that there needs to be a policy established, so there will be consistency throughout the Learning Community.

Each administrator, including the superintendent, principals and supervisors or supervisor of any special subjects or subject in which persons actively supervise the work of other teachers in the subject or subjects shall hold either a Nebraska Administrative and Supervisory Certificate or a Nebraska Professional Administrative and Supervisory Certificate. I. All persons holding the official title of (1) superintendent of schools, (2) principal or supervisor of an accredited school, or (3) supervisor of any special subjects or subject in which such persons actually supervise the work of other teachers in that subject or those subjects shall hold a Nebraska certificate to administer.

- II. Except as provided in paragraph III, each person employed to teach shall hold a valid Nebraska certificate or permit issued by the Commissioner of Education legalizing him or her to teach the grade or subjects to which elected.
- III. The District may employ persons who hold a valid certificate or permit to teach issued by another state as a substitute teacher for not more than ten (10) working days if the person begins the application process on the first day of employment for a Nebraska substitute teaching certificate and the issuance of such certificate is pending.
- IV. Persons not holding a valid Nebraska teaching certificate or permit issued by the Commissioner of Education may be employed to serve as aides to a teacher or teachers.; provided, however, sSuch teacher aides may not assume any teaching responsibilities. TA teacher aides may be assigned non-teaching duties which are nonteaching in nature if the aide has been specifically prepared for such duties, including the handling of emergency situations which mayight arise in the course of performing those duties his or her work.

- A. Grounds for Family/Medical Leave. An eligible employee shall be entitled to a total of 12 work weeks of leave during any 12-month period for one or more of the following reasons:
 - 1. The birth of a son or daughter of an employee and in order to care for such son or daughter;
 - 2. The placement of a son or daughter with an employee for adoption or foster care;
 - 3. To care for a spouse, son, daughter, or parent of an employee if such spouse, son, daughter, or parent has a serious health condition; and/or
 - A serious health condition that makes an employee unable to perform the functions of the position of such employee.
- B. Grounds for Servicemember Family Leave. An eligible employee shall be entitled to leave for qualifying servicemember leave as follows:
 - Thirty days during the time the deployment order is in effect for a spouse or parent of the employee as set forth in the Nebraska Family Military Leave Act;
 - A total of 12 work weeks of leave during any 12-month period because of any qualifying exigency arising out of the fact that a spouse, son, daughter or parent is on active duty or has been notified of an impending call or order to active duty in the Armed Forces in support of a contingency operation; or
 - 3. A total of 26 work weeks of leave during any 12-month period to care for a covered servicemember who is a spouse, son, daughter, parent, or the next of kin, when the covered servicemember is undergoing medical treatment, recuperation, or therapy, or is otherwise in outpatient status or on the temporary disability retired list, for a serious injury or illness incurred in the line of duty on active duty and which renders the servicemember medically unfit to perform the duties of the servicemember's office, grade, rank, or rating. Eligible employees may not take leave under this subparagraph to care for former members of the Armed Forces, former members of the National Guard and Reserves, or members on the permanent disability retired list.
- C. Expiration of Entitlement for Child Birth or Adoption Leave. The entitlement to leave under subparagraph I.A.1. (hereinafter "I.A.1.") and I.A.2. (hereinafter "I.A.2.") shall expire at the end of the 12-month period beginning on the date of such birth or placement.
- D. Combined Leave Total. During any single 12-month period, an eligible employee shall be entitled to a combined total of 26 work weeks of leave under subparagraphs I.A. and I.B. Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit the availability of leave under subparagraph I.A. during any 12-month period.
- E. Paid and Unpaid Leave. If the District provides paid leave for a lesser period of time, the additional weeks of leave necessary to attain the days or work weeks of leave required under this Rule will be provided without compensation.
 - The District shall require the employee to substitute any of the employee's available paid leave for any part of the time period for such leave.
 - No extensions beyond the required periods of leave for any given 12-month period will be allowed without prior <u>Delistrict</u> approval. If an employee, however, uses paid leave under circumstances that are determined by the District not to qualify as FMLA leave, the leave will not count against the weeks of FMLA leave to which the employee is entitled.
 - If any of the above provisions are subject to a collective bargaining agreement, the provisions of the collective bargaining agreement shall prevail.
- F. Intermittent or Reduced Leave.
 - Immediate Family or Employee Health or Servicemember Family Leave for Instructional Personnel. Subject to the following paragraph, in any case in which an eligible district employee, employed principally in an instructional capacity for the District, requests leave under subparagraph I.A.3. (hereinafter "I.A.3.") or subparagraph I.A.4. (hereinafter "I.A.4."), or subparagraph I.B.3. (hereinafter "I.B.3.") that is foreseeable based on planned medical treatment and the employee would be on leave for greater than 20% of the total number of working days in the period during which the leave would extend, the District may require that such employee elect either:
 - To take leave for periods of a particular duration, not to exceed the duration of the planned medical treatment; or
 - b. To transfer temporarily to an available alternative position offered by the District for which the employee is qualified and that:
 - i. Has equivalent pay and benefits, and
 - ii. Better accommodates recurring periods of leave than the employee's regular employment position.

- G. Immediate Family or Employee Health or Servicemember Family Leave for Non-instructional Personnel. Leave under I.A.3. or I.A.4, I.B.2, or I.B.3. may be taken intermittently or on a reduced leave schedule when medically necessary. The taking of leave intermittently or on a reduced leave schedule pursuant to this paragraph shall not result in a reduction of the total leave to which the employee is entitled beyond the amount of leave actually taken. If an employee requests intermittent leave, or leave on a reduced leave schedule, under I.A.3 or I.A.4, or I.B.3. that is foreseeable based on planned medical treatment, the District can require such employee to transfer temporarily to an available alternative position offered by the District for which the employee is qualified and that:
 - 1. Has equivalent pay and benefits; and
 - 2. Better accommodates recurring periods of leave than the employee's regular employment position.
- H. Birth or Adoption <u>Leave</u>. Leave under I.A.1. or I.A.2 shall not be taken by an employee intermittently or on a reduced leave schedule unless the employee and the District agree otherwise.
- II. **Employee's Notice Requirement for Births or Adoptions**. In any case in which the necessity for leave under I.A.1. or I.A.2. is foreseeable based on an expected birth or placement, the employee shall provide the District Human Resources Office with not less than 30 days' notice before the date the leave is to begin of the employee's intention to take leave, except that if the date of the birth or placement requires leave to begin in less than 30 days, the employee shall provide such notice as soon as is practicable.
- III. Employee's Notice Requirement for Health Leave or Servicemember Family Leave.
 - A. In any case in which the necessity for leave under subparagraphs I.A.3. or I.A.4., or I.B.3. is foreseeable based on planned medical treatment, the employee:
 - Shall make a reasonable effort to schedule the treatment so as not to disrupt unduly the
 operations of the District, subject to the approval of the health care provider of the employee or
 the health care provider of the son, daughter, spouse, parent, or next of kin of the employee, as
 appropriate; and
 - Shall provide the District Human Resources Office with not less than 30 days' notice, before the
 date the leave is to begin, of the employee's intention to take leave under such subparagraph,
 except that if the date of such treatment requires leave to begin in less than 30 days, the
 employee shall provide such notice as soon as is practicable.
 - B. In any case in which the necessity for leave under subparagraph I.B.2. is foreseeable, whether because the spouse, or a son, daughter, or parent of the employee is on active duty, or because of notification of an impending call or order to active duty in support of a contingency operation, the employee shall provide such notice to the District as is reasonable and practicable.
- IV. Certification For Serious Health Condition Leave. The District shall require that a request for leave under I.A.3. or I.A.4., or I.B.3. be supported by a medical certification issued by the health care provider of the eligible employee or of the son, daughter, spouse, or parent of the employee, as appropriate, which sets forth the information required by 29 C.F.R. § 825.306(a). The employee or the next of kin of an individual in the case of leave taken under I.B.3., shall provide, in a timely manner, a copy of such certification to the employer through the District Human Resources Office on forms provided by the District.
 - A. Clarification and Authentication. The District may contact the health care provider for purposes of clarification and authentication of the medical certification, whether an initial certification or recertification, after the employee has been given the opportunity to cure deficiencies and as provided in 29 C.F.R. § 825.307(a). It is the employee's responsibility to provide the District with a complete and sufficient medical certification and to clarify the medical certification if necessary. The District may require that a request for leave under subparagraph I.B.2. be supported by a certification issued at such time and in such manner as the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Labor may be regulation prescribe.
 - B. Second Opinion. In any case in which the District has reason to doubt the validity of the certification provided for leave under I.A.3. or I.A.4., the District may require, at the expense of the District, that the eligible employee obtain the opinion of a second health care provider designated or approved by the District concerning any information certified above for such leave. A health care provider so designated by the District shall not be employed on a regular basis by the District.
 - C. Resolution of Conflicting Opinions. In any case in which the second opinion described above differs from the opinion of the original certification provided under this Rule, the District may require, at the expense of the District, that the employee obtain the opinion of a third health care provider designated or approved jointly by the District and the employee concerning the information so certified under this Rule. The opinion of the third health care provider concerning the information certified under this Rule shall be considered to be final and shall be binding on the District and the employee.
 - D. Subsequent Recertifications. The District may require that the eligible employee obtain subsequent recertifications on a reasonable basis recertification no more often than every thirty days in accordance with 29 C.F.R. § 825.308.
- V. Certification for Qualifying Exigency and Military Caregiver Leave.
 - A. Certification for Qualifying Exigency Leave. The District shall require that for a request for leave under I.B.2., the employee provide a copy of the covered military member's active duty orders or other documentation issued by the military which indicates that the covered military member is on active duty or call to active duty status in support of a contingency operation and the dates of the covered military member's active duty service. The District shall also require the employee to provide Department of

- <u>Labor Form WH-384 (Appendix G to Part 825 of the Code of Federal Regulations) or another District form containing the same basic information.</u>
- B. Certification for Military Caregiver Leave. The District shall require that for a request for leave under I.B.3., the employee provide a certification completed by an authorized health care provider of the covered servicemember. The District shall also require the employee to provide Department of Labor Form WH-385 (Appendix H to Part 825 of the Code of Federal Regulations) or another District form containing the same basic information, or , in lieu of such certification, the District shall accept the invitational travel orders (ITOs) or invitational travel authorizations (ITAs) issued to any family member to join an injured or ill servicemember at his or her bedside.
- C. Authentication and Clarification. The District may seek authentication and clarification of and ITO or ITA pursuant to 29 C.F.R. § 825.307, but the District may not utilize the second or third opinion process of 29 C.F.R. § 825.307 or the recertification process of 29 C.F.R. § 825.308 during the period of time in which leave is supported by an ITO or ITA.
- VI. **Spouses Employed by the District**. In any case in which a husband and wife entitled to leave under this Rule are both employed by the District, the aggregate number of work weeks to which both may be entitled will be limited as follows:
 - A. To 12 work weeks during any 12-month period in which such leave is taken under subparagraphs I.A.1., I.A.2., or Al.A.3.; and
 - B. To 26 work weeks during any 12-month period in which leave is taken under subparagraph I.B.3. and I.A.1., I.A.2., or I.A.3.
 - C. If the leave taken by a husband and wife includes leave described in subparagraph V.A. above, the limitation in subparagraph V.A. shall apply to such leave.

VII. Employment and Benefits Protection.

- A. Restoration to Position. Except as otherwise provided, any eligible employee who takes leave under this Rule for the intended purpose of the leave shall be entitled, on return from such leave:
 - 1. To be restored by the District to the position of employment held by the employee when the leave commenced; or
 - To be restored to an equivalent position with equivalent employment benefits, pay, and other
 terms and conditions of employment. For purposes of determinations relating to restoration to
 an equivalent position, such determination shall be made on the basis of established district
 board policies and practices and collective bargaining agreements.
- B. Employment Benefits. The taking of leave shall not result in the loss of any employment benefits accrued prior to the date on which the leave commenced.
- C. Limitations. Nothing in this section shall be construed to entitle any restored employee to:
 - The accrual of any seniority or employment benefits during any period of leave; or
 - 2. Any right, benefit, or position of employment other than any right, benefit, or position to which the employee would have been entitled had the employee not taken the leave.
- D. Periodic Reporting. The District may require an employee on leave under I.A.1. through I.A.4. to report periodically on the status and intention of the employee to return to work.

VIII. Maintenance of Health Benefits.

- A. Coverage. Except as provided in the next succeeding paragraph, during any period that an eligible employee takes leave under this Rule, the District shall maintain coverage under its group health plan for the duration of such leave at the level and under the conditions coverage would have been provided if the employee had continued in employment continuously for the duration of such leave.
- B. Failure to Return from Leave. The District may recover the premium that the District paid for maintaining coverage for the employee under such group health plan during any period of unpaid leave if:
 - 1. The employee fails to return from leave under this Rule after the period of leave to which the employee is entitled has expired; and
 - 2. The employee fails to return to work for a reason other than:
 - i. The continuation, recurrence, or onset of a serious health condition that entitles the employee to leave under I.A.3., I.A.4., or I.B.3.; or
 - ii. Other circumstances beyond the control of the employee.
- C. Certification. For a claim made under preceding paragraph VII.B.2., the District may require a timely certification by the treating health care provider on a form provided by the District to be submitted to the Human Resources Office.
- IX. Rules Applicable to Periods near the Conclusion of an Academic Term. The following rules shall apply with respect to periods of leave near the conclusion of the District's academic term in the case of any eligible employee employed principally in an instructional capacity by the District:
 - A. Leave More than Five Weeks Prior to the End of Term. If the eligible employee begins leave under this Rule more than five weeks prior to the end of the academic term, the District may require the employee to continue taking leave until the end of the term, if:
 - 1. The leave is of at least three weeks duration; and
 - The return to employment would occur during the three-week period before the end of such term.
 - B. Leave Less than Five Weeks Prior to the End of Term. If the eligible employee begins leave under I.A.1., I.A.2., er-I.A.3 or I.B.3.. of this Rule during the period that commences five weeks prior to the end of the

academic term, the District may require the employee to continue taking leave until the end of such term if:

- 1. The leave is of greater than two weeks duration; and
- 2. The return to employment would occur during the two-week period before the end of such term.
- C. Leave Less than Three Weeks Prior to the End of Term. If the eligible employee begins leave under A.1.a., A.1.b., or a.1.c. I.A.1., I.A.2., I.A.3., or I.B.3. during the period that commences three weeks prior to the end of the academic term and the duration of the leave is greater than five working days, the District may require the employee to continue to take leave until the end of such term.

X. Definitions

- A. Academic Term shall mean either of the two school semesters.
- B. Active Duty or Call to Active Duty Status shall mean duty under a call or order to active duty or notification of an impending call or order to active duty in support of a contingency operation pursuant to 10 U.S.C. §§ 688, 12301(a), 12302, 12304, 12305, 12406, and Chapter 15 of Title 10 of the United States Code. A call to active duty refers to a Federal call to active duty and State calls to active duty are not covered unless under the order of the President of the United States pursuant to the above statutesunder a provision of law referred to in 10 U.S.C. § 101(a)(13)(B).
- C. Contingency Operation shall mean the same definition given to such term in 10 U.S.C. § 101(a)(13) and 29 C.F.R. 825.800.
- D. Covered Servicemember shall mean a <u>current</u> member of the Armed <u>Ff</u>orces, including a member of the National Guard or Reserves, who is undergoing medical treatment, recuperation, or therapy, is otherwise in outpatient status, or is otherwise on the temporary disability retired list, for a serious injury or illness incurred in the line of duty or active duty.
- E. Eligible Employee shall mean an employee who has been employed by the District for at least 12 months and for at least 1250 hours of service with the District during the previous 12-month period.
- F. Employment Benefits shall mean all benefits provided or made available to district employees, regardless of whether such benefits are provided by a district practice or written policy or through an employee benefit plan.
- G. Health Care Provider shall mean a doctor of medicine or osteopathy who is authorized to practice medicine or surgery (as appropriate) by the state in which the doctor practices or any other person determined by the Secretary of Labor to be capable of providing health care services.
- H. Instructional Employees shall mean those whose principal function is to teach and instruct students in a class, small group, or on an individual basis. This term includes not only teachers, but also athletic coaches, driving instructors, and special education assistants. This term does not include teacher assistants or aides who do not have as their principal function actual teaching or instructing, nor auxiliary personnel such as counselors, psychologists, curriculum specialists, cafeteria workers, maintenance workers, bus drivers, or other primarily noninstructional employees.
- Next of Kin of a Covered Servicemembers shall mean the nearest blood relative other than the covered servicemember's spouse, parent, son, or daughter, in the following order of priority: blood relatives who have been granted legal custody of the covered servicemember by court decree or statutory provisions, brothers and sisters, grandparents, aunts and uncles, and first cousins, unless the covered servicemember has specifically designated in writing another blood relative as his or her nearest blood relative for purposes of military caregiver leave under the FMLAshall mean an individual's nearest blood relative.
- J. Parent shall mean athe biological, adoptive, step or foster father or mother parent of an employee or an individual who stood in loco parentis (i.e., in the place of a parent) to an employee when the employee was a son or daughter. This term does not include parents in law.
- K. Reduced Leave shall mean a leave schedule that reduces the usual number of hours per work week, or hours per work day, of an employee.
- L. Serious Health Condition shall mean an illness, injury, impairment, or physical or mental condition that involves inpatient care in a hospital, hospice, or residential medical care facility, or continuing treatment by a health care provider.
- M. Serious injury or illness shall mean for members of the Armed Forces including members of the National Guard or Reserves, an injury or illness incurred by the member in the line of duty on active duty in the Armed Forces that may render the member medically unfit to perform the duties of their office, grade, rank, or rating.
- N. Son or Daughter shall mean a biological, adopted, or foster child, a stepchild, a legal ward, or a child of a person standing in loco parentis, who is under 18 years of age or who is 18 years of age or older and incapable of self-care because of a mental or physical disability.
- O. Spouse shall mean husband or wife as defined or recognized under State law for the purposes of marriage in the State where the employee resides.
- P. Twelve-Month Period shall mean, for purposes of leave under subparagraphs I.A. and I.B.2, the twelve months constituting the school year which begins August 1st and ends July 31st. For purposes of leave under subparagraph I.B.3, the term Twelve Month Period shall mean the first day the eligible employee takes FMLA leave to care for a covered servicemember and ends twelve months after that date.

Student Discipline 5400.1

I. <u>General Statement</u> The District's disciplinary rules and procedures are designed to protect the students' constitutional and statutory rights within the context of an orderly and effective educational process. Students will be excluded from school and/or school activities when their conduct interferes with an orderly and effective educational process.

- II. Types of Exclusion and Disciplinary Action.
 - A. <u>Short-term Suspension</u>. Exclusion from all schools in the District not to exceed five (5) school days.
 - B. <u>Emergency Exclusion</u>. Immediate exclusion if:
 - 1. The student has a dangerous communicable disease transmissible through normal school contacts and poses an imminent threat to the health and safety of the school community; or
 - 2. The student's conduct presents a clear threat to the physical safety of himself, herself, or others; or
 - 3. The student's conduct is so extremely disruptive as to make temporary removal necessary to preserve the rights of other students to pursue an education.
 - 4. An emergency exclusion shall be based upon a clear factual situation warranting it and shall last no longer than is necessary to avoid the dangers necessitating the exclusion.
 - 5. <u>Emergency Exclusion for Five (5) Days or Less.</u> The same procedures for short-term suspension shall be used for an emergency exclusion for five (5) days or less.
 - 6. <u>Emergency Exclusion for Over Five (5) Days</u>. If the Superintendent or Superintendent's designee determines that the exclusion will extend beyond five (5) days, the following procedural provisions must be followed:
 - a. <u>Hearing/Final Determination</u>. A hearing will be held and a final determination made within ten (10) school days after the initial date of exclusion.
 - b. <u>Hearing Procedures</u>. The hearing will be conducted in compliance with the disciplinary hearing procedures which are used for long-term suspension, expulsion and reassignment.
 - C. <u>Long-term Suspension</u>. Exclusion from all schools in the District for more than five (5) school days but less than twenty (20) school days.
 - D. <u>Expulsion</u>. Exclusion from all schools in the District (except the location designated for alternative education) for a period not to exceed the remainder of the semester in which it took effect with the following exceptions:
 - 1. If the misconduct occurred within ten (10) school days prior to the end of the first semester, the expulsion shall remain in effect through the second semester; or
 - 2. If the misconduct occurred within ten (10) school days prior to the end of the second semester, the expulsion shall remain in effect for summer school and the first semester of the

following school year subject to the annual review provision of Section IID (3) (c), below.

- 3. The time periods above do not apply to the following infractions which have the following periods of exclusion:
 - a. <u>Firearms and/or Guns</u>. Exclusion from all schools in the District for not less than one (1) year of any student who is determined to have knowingly and intentionally possessed, used, or transmitted a firearm (see Rule 5400.6 (II)(D)(1)) on school grounds, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by a school being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or his or her designee, or at a school-sponsored activity or athletic event. This subsection shall not apply to:
 - i. The issuance of firearms or the possession of firearms by members of the Reserve Officers Training Corps when training; or
 - ii. Firearms which lawfully are possessed by the person receiving instruction under the immediate supervision of an adult instructor who may lawfully possess firearms.
 - b. Personal Injury. Students who knowingly and intentionally use force in causing or attempting to cause personal injury to a school employee, school volunteer, or student (unless caused by accident, self-defense, or other action undertaken on the reasonable belief that it was necessary to protect some other person as hereafter provided) or the knowing and intentional possession, use, or transmission of a dangerous weapon, other than a firearm, shall be excluded for a period not to exceed the remainder of the school year in which it took effect if the misconduct occurs during the first semester. If the expulsion takes place during the second semester, the exclusion shall remain in effect for summer school and may remain in effect for the first semester of the following school year unless modified or terminated by the District at any time during the expulsion period. Personal injury caused by accident, self-defense, or other action undertaken on the reasonable belief that it was necessary to protect some other person shall not constitute a violation of this provision.
 - c. Sexual Assault. Students who sexually assault or attempt to sexually assault any person on school grounds shall be excluded for one (1) year. Students who sexually assault or attempt to sexually assault any person off school grounds may be excluded for one (1) year, provided that a complaint must have been filed by a prosecutor in a court of competent jurisdiction alleging that the student has sexually assaulted or attempted to sexually assault any person off school grounds not at a school function, activity, or event, and the student's presence at school has a direct and immediate effect on maintaining discipline, order, or safety in the school. Sexual assault shall mean sexual assault in the first degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. § 28-319, sexual assault in the second degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. § 28-320, or sexual assault of a child in the second or third degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. § 28-319.01, or sexual assault of a child in the first degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. § 28-319.01, as such statutes now provide or may hereafter be amended. Neb. Rev. Stat. § 79-267(9).
 - d. Annual Review. Any expulsion that will remain in effect during the first semester of the following school year shall be automatically scheduled for review before the beginning of the school year. The review shall be conducted by a Hearing Examiner after the Hearing Examiner has given notice of the review to the student and to the student's parents or guardian. The review shall be limited to newly

discovered evidence or evidence of changes in the student's circumstances occurring since the original hearing. This review may lead to the Hearing Examiner's recommendation that the student be re-admitted for the upcoming school year. If the Board (or Board Committee) took the final action to expel the student, the student may be re-admitted only by Board action. Otherwise, the student may be re-admitted by the Superintendent.

- E. <u>Mandatory Reassignment</u>. Involuntary transfer to another school in the District in connection with any disciplinary action.
- F. <u>Exclusion from School Grounds and Activities</u>. During any time period that a student is excluded from school due to short-term suspension, long-term suspension, expulsion, or emergency exclusion, the student will be prohibited from being on school grounds (except the location designated for alternative education) and from participating in any District-sponsored extracurricular activities and from attending any extracurricular activities which take place on District property.
- G. Other Disciplinary Action. Administrative and teaching personnel may take actions regarding student behavior which are reasonably necessary to aid the student, further school purposes, or prevent interference with the educational process. Such actions may include, but need not be limited to, counseling of students, parent conferences, rearrangement of schedules, requirements that a student remain in school after regular hours to do additional work, restriction of extracurricular activity, or requirements that a student receive counseling, psychological evaluation, or psychiatric evaluation upon the written consent of a parent or guardian to such counseling or evaluation.
- III. Standards for Student Conduct (Rule 5400.6). In conjunction with the Student Discipline Act, the District shall adopt Standards for Student Conduct contained in Rule 5400.6 that will set forth student misconduct and the maximum sanction that the District shall impose. Rule 5400.6 shall be reviewed annually by the Board, and shall be distributed to students at the beginning of the school year or, in the case of student transfers, upon enrollment in the District.
- IV. <u>Effective Date of Exclusion</u>. When a notice of intent to discipline a student by long-term suspension, expulsion, or mandatory reassignment is filed with the Superintendent, the student may be suspended by the principal until:
 - A. If no hearing is requested, the date the disciplinary action takes effect; or
 - B. If a hearing is requested, the date the Hearing Examiner makes the report of his/her findings and a recommendation of the action to be taken to the Superintendent, if the principal determines that the student must be suspended immediately to prevent or substantially reduce the risk of interference with an educational function or school purpose, or a personal injury to the student himself or herself, other students, school employees, or school volunteers.
- VI. <u>Procedures for Exclusion</u>. The District will adhere to the procedural requirements of federal and state law for the exclusion of students from school and school activities.
- VII. <u>Hearings</u>. In cases involving emergency exclusion for more than five (5) school days, long-term suspension, expulsion, and mandatory reassignment, the student will have the right to a hearing to contest the exclusion. A Request for Hearing form will be provided to the student and the student's parents or guardian along with a description of the hearing procedures provided by the Student Discipline Act along with the procedures for appealing any decision rendered at the hearing.
- VIII. <u>Formal Hearings and Appeal</u>. If a principal makes a decision to discipline a student by long-term suspension, expulsion, or mandatory reassignment, the following procedures shall be followed:
 - A. <u>Written Charge and Summary of Evidence.</u>

- 1. On the date of the decision, a written charge and a summary of the evidence supporting such charge shall be filed with the Superintendent or designee.
- 2. The principal shall, within two (2) school days of the decision, send written notice by registered or certified mail to the student and his or her parent or guardian informing them of the rights established under the Student Discipline Act.
- B. Written Notice. Written notice must include the violation and summary of evidence; the recommended penalty; the right to a hearing; the hearing procedure; and a statement that the principal, legal counsel for the school, the student, the student's parent or the student's representative or guardian shall have a right to examine the student's academic and disciplinary records and any affidavits to be used at the hearing, plus the right to know the identity of the witnesses to appear at the hearing and the substance of their testimony. A form on which the student, the student's parent, or the student's guardian may request a hearing must accompany the written notice.
- C. <u>Suspension until Hearing</u>. When a notice of intent to discipline a student by long-term suspension, expulsion, or mandatory reassignment is filed with the Superintendent or designee, the student may be suspended by the principal until:
 - 1. The date the disciplinary action takes effect if no hearing is requested;
 - 2. If a hearing is requested, the date the hearing examiner makes the report of his/her findings and a recommendation of the action to be taken to the Superintendent or designee; or
 - 3. If the principal determines that the student must be suspended immediately to prevent or substantially reduce the risk of interference with an education function or school purpose or a personal injury to the student himself or herself, other students, school employees, or school volunteers.
- D. <u>Procedures if a Hearing is not Requested</u>. If a hearing is not requested by the student or the student's parent or guardian within five (5) school days following receipt of written notice, the punishment recommended in the charge by the principal or his/her designee will automatically go into effect upon the fifth (5th) school day following receipt of the written notice by the student or his/her parent or guardian.
- E. <u>Procedures if a Hearing is Requested.</u>
 - 1. <u>Request for Hearing</u>. A hearing must be requested within five (5) school days after receipt of the written notice.
 - a. Request of Hearing Beyond Five Days. If a hearing is requested more than five (5) school days but not more than thirty (30) calendar days following the actual receipt of the written notice, the hearing shall be held but the imposed punishment shall continue in effect pending final determination.
 - 2. <u>Appointment of Hearing Examiner.</u> If a hearing is requested the Superintendent shall appoint a hearing examiner. The hearing examiner can be any person designated by the Superintendent or designee if such person has not brought the charges against the student, is not a witness at the hearing, and has no involvement in the charge.
 - 3. <u>Notice of Time and Place for Hearing.</u> Within two (2) school days after being appointed, the hearing examiner shall give written notice to the principal, the student, and the student's parent or guardian of the time and place for the hearing.
 - a. The hearing shall be scheduled within a period of five (5) school days after it is requested, but such time may be changed by the hearing examiner for good cause.

- b. No hearing shall be held upon less than two (2) school days actual notice to the principal, the student, and the student's parent or guardian, except with the consent of all the parties.
- 4. <u>Right to Examine Records and Statements</u>. The principal or legal counsel for the District, the student, and student's parent or guardian, or representative, shall have the right to examine the records and written statements referred to Section VII (B) of this Rule, and the statement of any witness in the possession of the principal at a reasonable time prior to the hearing.

F. <u>Hearing Procedures</u>.

- 1. <u>Required Attendance at Hearing</u>. The hearing examiner, student's parent or guardian, the student's representative, if any, and legal counsel for the principal or District, if any, shall attend the hearing.
- 2. <u>Witnesses</u>. When present, witnesses shall be present only when they are giving information at the hearing. The student, the student's parent, guardian, or representative, the principal, or the hearing examiner may ask witnesses to testify at the hearing. Such testimony shall be under oath, and the hearing examiner shall be authorized to administer the oath. The hearing examiner shall make reasonable effort to assist the student or the student's parent, guardian, or representative in obtaining the attendance of the witnesses.
 - a. <u>Cross-examination</u>. The student, the student's parent, guardian, or representative, the principal, the principal's or the District's legal counsel, and the hearing examiner shall have the right to question any witness giving information at the hearing.
 - b. <u>Immunity</u>. Any person giving evidence by written statement or in person at a hearing shall be given the same immunity from liability as a person testifying in a court case.
- 3. <u>Student Testimony</u>. The student may speak in his or her own defense and may be questioned on his or her testimony, but he or she may choose not to testify and, in such case, shall not be threatened with punishment nor be later punished for refusal to testify.
- 4. <u>Individuals may be Excluded from the Hearing</u>. The student may be excluded from the hearing in the discretion of the hearing examiner at times when the student's psychological evaluation or emotional problems are being discussed. The hearing examiner may exclude anyone from the hearing when his or her actions substantially disrupt an orderly hearing.
- 5. Evidence on the Student's Conduct and Records. The principal may present to the hearing examiner statements, in affidavit form, of any person having information about the student's conduct and the student's records, provided that such statements and records have been made available to the student or the student's parent, guardian, or representative prior to the hearing. The information contained in such records shall be explained and interpreted, prior to or at the hearing, to the student, parent or guardian, or representative, upon request, by appropriate District personnel.
- 6. <u>Rules of Evidence</u>. In conducting the hearing, the hearing examiner shall not be bound by the rules of evidence or any other rule of courtroom procedure.
- 7. <u>Proceedings Recorded</u>. The proceedings of the hearing shall be recorded at the expense of

the District.

- 8. <u>Joint Hearings</u>. A joint hearing may be conducted when more than one (1) student is charged with violating the same rule and acted in concert, and the facts are substantially the same for all such students.
 - a. <u>Discretion of Hearing Examiner</u>. A joint hearing may be conducted if the hearing examiner believes that a joint hearing is not likely to result in confusion and no student shall have his or her interests substantially prejudiced by a single hearing.
 - b. <u>Order for Separate Hearing</u>. If during the conduct of the hearing the hearing examiner finds that a student's interests will be substantially prejudiced by a joint hearing or that the hearing is resulting in confusion, the hearing examiner may order a separate hearing for any student.
- G. <u>Post Hearing Report</u>. After the hearing, a report shall be made by the hearing examiner to the Superintendent or designee. The report shall contain the hearing examiner's findings and recommendation of the action to be taken, and the report shall explain in terms of the needs of both the student and the District, the reasons for the particular action recommended.
 - 1. <u>Range of Recommendations</u>. The recommendation by the hearing examiner may range from no action, through the entire field of counseling, to long-term suspension, expulsion, mandatory reassignment, or an alternative education placement.
 - 2. Review by Superintendent or Designee. A review of the hearing examiner's report shall be made by the Superintendent or designee. The Superintendent or designee may change, revoke, or impose the sanction recommended by the hearing examiner but shall not impose a sanction more severe than that recommended by the hearing examiner.
 - 3. <u>Decisions Based on Evidence</u>. The findings and recommendations of the hearing examiner, the determination by the Superintendent, and any determination on appeal to the Board, shall be made solely on the basis of the evidence presented at the hearing or, in addition, on any evidence presented on appeal.
- H. <u>Final Disposition</u>. Written notice of the findings and recommendations of the hearing examiner and the determination of the Superintendent or designee shall be made by certified or registered mail or by personal delivery to the student or the student's parent or guardian. Upon receipt of such written notice by the student, parent, or guardian, the determination of the Superintendent or designee shall take immediate effect.
- IX. Request for Appeal to the Board. The student or the student's parent or guardian may, within seven (7) school days following receipt of the Superintendent's written notice of the determination, appeal the determination to the Board by a written request which shall be filed with the secretary of the Board or with the Superintendent.

A. Appeal Hearing.

- 1. When. A hearing shall be held before the Board within a period of ten (10) school days after it is requested, and such time for a hearing may be changed by mutual agreement of the student and Superintendent.
- 2. <u>Deliberating Body</u>. The hearing may be held before a committee of the Board of not less than three (3) members.
- 3. <u>Admissible Evidence</u>. Such appeal shall be made on the record, except that new evidence may be admitted to avoid a substantial threat of unfairness and such new evidence shall be

recorded at the expense of the District.

- 4. <u>Deliberation.</u> After examining the record and taking new evidence, if any, the Board or designated committee may withdraw to deliberate privately upon such record and new evidence.
 - a. <u>Limitations</u>. Any such deliberation shall be held in the presence only of Board members in attendance at the appeal proceeding but may be held in the presence of legal counsel who has not previously acted as the designee of the principal in presenting the school's case before the hearing examiner.
 - b. <u>Questions during Deliberation</u>. If any questions arise during such deliberations which require additional evidence, the deliberating body may reopen the hearing to receive such evidence, subject to the right of all parties to be present.
- 5. <u>Action on Appeal</u>. The deliberating body may alter the Superintendent's disposition of the case if it finds the decision to be too severe but may not impose a more severe sanction.
- 6. <u>Dispatch of Final Action</u>. The final action of the deliberating body shall be evidenced by personally delivering or mailing by certified mail a copy of the deliberating body's decision to the student and his or her parent or guardian.
- B. <u>Judicial Review</u>. Any person aggrieved by a final decision in a contested case under this Rule, whether such decision is affirmative or negative in form, shall be entitled to judicial review. Nothing in the Rule shall be deemed to prevent resort to other means of review, redress, or relief provided by law.
- X. <u>Settlement</u>. Nothing in this Rule shall preclude the student, the student's parents, guardian, or representative from discussing and settling disciplinary proceedings with appropriate school personnel prior to the hearing stage.
- XI. <u>Reporting of Criminal Acts to Law Enforcement Agencies</u>. The school principal or principal's designee shall notify as soon as possible the appropriate law enforcement authorities of any student act which the principal or principal's designee knows or suspects is in violation of the Nebraska Criminal Code.
- XII. <u>Annual Report to State Department of Education</u>. The Superintendent or Superintendent's designee shall annually provide to the State Department of Education:
 - A. An assurance that the District has in effect the expulsion policy for bringing a firearm to school required by state and federal law; and
 - B. A description of the circumstances surrounding any expulsions imposed under this Rule, including: the name of the school concerned; the number of students expelled from such school; and the types of weapons concerned.

Standards for Student Conduct

5400.6

I. Introduction.

- A. <u>Policy Statement</u>. Every Millard School District student has the right to an education. The following Standards have been instituted to ensure that right. Each student and their parents are required, on their own, to become familiar with these Standards, and to help provide an atmosphere conducive to learning.
- B. <u>Grounds for Exclusion</u>. A student may be excluded from school if there is reasonable evidence that the student has committed a prohibited act listed below while on school grounds, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by a school being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or by his or her designee, or at a school-sponsored activity or athletic event, or any other place where the governing law permits the District to discipline students for prohibited conduct.
- C. Exclusion from School Grounds and Activities. A student who is excluded from school for a suspension or expulsion shall not enter upon district property, or ride in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by the District being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or his or her designee, or participate in or attend a school-sponsored activity or athletic event. Expelled students may enter upon District property for the sole purpose of attending alternative education at a location and time designated by the Director of Pupil Services.
- D. <u>Length of Expulsions</u>. Unless specified otherwise within these Standards, the expulsion of a student shall be for a period not to exceed the remainder of the semester in which it took effect unless the misconduct occurred within ten (10) school days prior to the end of the first semester, in which case the expulsion shall remain in effect through the second semester, or within ten (10) school days prior to the end of the second semester, in which case the expulsion shall remain in effect for summer school and the first semester of the following school year. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-283(2).
- E. <u>Contact of Legal Authorities</u>. The principal of a school or the principal's designee shall notify as soon as possible the appropriate law enforcement authorities, of the county or city in which the school is located, of any act of a student described in Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267 which the principal or designee knows or suspects is a violation of the Nebraska Criminal Code. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-293(1).
- F. <u>Sanction to be Followed</u>. If minimum and maximum sanctions are not specified for a specific prohibited act, the recommended sanction shall be imposed.
- G. <u>Expulsion as Sanction</u>. Expulsion is specified as a sanction for particular conduct because the District's Board of Education finds that the type of conduct for which expulsion is specified has the potential to seriously affect the health, safety, or welfare of the student, other students, staff members, or other persons, or to otherwise seriously interfere with the educational process. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-262(1).
- H. <u>Students with Disabilities</u>. Disciplinary procedures for students who have disabilities as defined by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 shall be subject to the disciplinary procedures set forth in District rules 5400.2 and 5400.3 and applicable federal and state law.
- I. <u>Mandatory Compliance</u>. Students and their parent(s) or guardian(s) are hereby notified that compliance with the District's Standards for Student Conduct is mandatory. It is the responsibility of all students and their parent(s) or guardian(s) to become familiar with these Standards.

II. <u>Violations Against Persons.</u>

- A. <u>Use of Violence</u>. Use of violence, force, coercion, threat, intimidation or similar conduct in a manner that constitutes a substantial interference with school purposes.
 - 1. Pushing, Shoving or Related Noninjurious Behaviors.
 - a. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
 - 2. <u>Fighting</u>. Mutual attempt to physically harm another person through mutual combative physical contact.

a. First offense.

- (1) Minimum Sanction. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. There is no mandated minimum sanction below grade six (6).
- (2) Maximum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- (3) Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 79-267(1) and 293.

b. Two offenses or more.

- (1) Minimum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- (2) Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- (3) Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(1) and 293.
- 3. Physical Assault. Initiation of a violent act against another person through aggressive physical contact.
 - a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. There is no mandated minimum sanction below grade six (6).
 - b. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - c. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(1) and 293.
- B. <u>Physical Injury to District Employees, Volunteers, and Students</u>. Causing or attempting to cause personal injury to an employee, a school volunteer, or to any student. Personal injury caused by accident, self-defense, or other action undertaken on the reasonable belief that it was necessary to protect some other person shall not constitute a violation of this provision. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(3).

1. Sanctions on School Grounds.

- a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- b. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §\$79-267(3) and 293.

2. Sanctions off School Grounds.

- a. <u>First Offense</u>. Citation during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection II(B). Suspension from extracurricular activities for remainder of the semester or nineteen (19) school days, whichever is more.
- b. <u>Second Offense</u>. Suspension for extracurricular activities for one (1) year. Prior violations of II(B) on or off school grounds will be included as previous offenses.

C. <u>Use of Threats or Intimidation</u>.

- 1. <u>Use of Threats (Verbal and Written)</u>. All threats, including those alleged to be jokes, will always be taken seriously and are subject to the following disciplinary action.
 - a. <u>Level One Threat</u>. Using a threat as part of a common expression or in a context that the recipient does not feel threatened, frightened, or coerced (e.g., "Oh, I could just kill you for that" or "I will punch you in the nose").

- (1) Maximum Sanction. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricul a cativities during time of suspension.
- b. <u>Level Two Threat</u>. Using an expression or an implied or veiled threat with the intent of threatening, frightening, or coercing another and the recipient feels threatened, frightened, or coerced (e.g., "I will kill you.").
 - (1) Minimum Sanction. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. There is no mandated minimum sanction below grade four (4).
 - (2) Maximum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
 - (3) Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(1) and 293.
- c. <u>Level Three Threat</u>. Threatening to kill or injure another person or threatening to damage property with potential for personal injury, without possessing a weapon or other object that could kill or injure the threatened or intimidated person, and the student describes how it will be done, including any threats that concern dangerous chemical substances, biochemical attacks, or bioterrorism.
 - (1) Minimum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. There is no mandated minimum sanction below grade four (4).
 - (2) Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - (3) Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(1) and 293.
- d. <u>Threatening with an Object</u>. Threatening with an object which looks like a weapon or an object that could be used to injure someone. To qualify as a look-a-like weapon, the object must closely resemble a real weapon in size, shape, and color even when examined up close.
 - (1) Minimum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of the suspension.
 - (2) Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - (3) Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(1) and 293.
- 2. <u>Bomb Threat (Verbal or Written)</u>. Threatening to use any type of explosive or incendiary device generally referred to as a bomb to injure a person(s) or destroy property.
 - a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Mandatory expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - b. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-1221; Neb. Rev. Stat. §879-267(1) and 293.

D. <u>Firearms, Explosives, and Weapons</u>.

1. <u>Guns, etc.</u> Knowingly possessing, handling, transmitting, using, intimidating with, or threatening with any object or material that is ordinarily and/or generally considered a firearm, explosive, destructive device, or weapon, including, but not limited to, guns, firearms, pipe bombs, stun guns, paint ball guns, air soft guns, B.B. guns and pellet guns.

a. Sanctions on School Grounds.

- (1) Minimum Sanction. Mandatory expulsion for one (1) year. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- (2) Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-1202 to 1204.04, 1215, 1216 and: 1220 Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267 (5) and 293.

b. <u>Sanctions off School Grounds</u>.

- (1) Citation for illegal possession of a weapon during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection II(D). Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- 2. <u>Other Weapons</u>. Using or threatening with a knife, throwing star, brass knuckles, chemical substances (including, but not limited to, mace, pepper guns, and bleach), and any other object that could be used to injure a person.

a. <u>Sanctions on School Grounds</u>.

- (1) Minimum Sanction. Mandatory expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- (2) Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-1202 to 1204.04; Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267 (5) and 293.

b. Sanctions off School Grounds.

- (1) Citation during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection II(D). Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- 3. <u>Possession of Certain Prohibited Objects</u>. Knowingly possessing, handling, or transmitting knives, throwing stars, brass knuckles, or other objects not enumerated above which could cause injury.
 - a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
 - b. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- 4. <u>Possession of Look-a-Like Weapons</u>. Possessing a look-a-like weapon, the object must closely resemble a real weapon in size, shape, and color even when examined up close.
 - a. <u>Minimum Sanction.</u> Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
 - b. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- 5. <u>Exception for Certain Firearms</u>. Subsection II(D) shall not apply to:
 - a. The issuance of firearms to or possession of firearms by members of the Reserve Officers Training Corps when training; or
 - b. Firearms which may lawfully be possessed by the person receiving instruction under the immediate supervision of an adult instructor who may lawfully possess firearms.
 - c. Firearms and guns which may lawfully be possessed and used off school grounds, not at a school function, activity, or event.
- E. <u>Extortion</u>. Threatening or intimidating any student for the purpose of or with the intent of obtaining money or anything of value from such student.

- 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- 2. Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(4) and 293.
- F. <u>Sexual Assault or Attempted Sexual Assault</u>. Any sexual assault or attempt to sexually assault any person. Sexual assault shall mean sexual assault in the first or second degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-319 and 320 or sexual assault of a child in the first, second or third degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 28-319.01 and 320.01. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(9).

1. Sanctions on School Grounds.

- a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Mandatory expulsion <u>for one (1) year</u>. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year <u>during time of expulsion</u>.
- b. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(9) and 293.

2. Sanctions off School Grounds.

- a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- b. Maximum Sanction. Expulsion for one (1) year. A complaint must have been filed by a prosecutor in a court of competent jurisdiction alleging that the student has sexually assaulted or attempted to sexually assault any person off school grounds not at a school function, activity, or event, and the student's presence at school has a direct and immediate effect on maintaining discipline, order, or safety in the school. Sexual assault shall mean sexual assault in the first degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-319, sexual assault in the second degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-320, sexual assault of a child in the second or third degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-319.01, or sexual assault of a child in the first degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-319.01, as such statutes now provide or may hereafter be amended Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(9).
- G. <u>Sexual Contact</u>. The intentional touching of another person's sexual or intimate parts or the intentional touching of another person's clothing covering the immediate area of the other person's sexual or intimate parts, without the consent of the other person. Sexual contact also includes the non-consensual touching by the other person of the actor's sexual or intimate parts or the clothing covering the immediate area of the actor's sexual or intimate parts when such touching is intentionally caused by the actor. The sexual contact must be such that it can be reasonably construed as being for the purpose of sexual arousal or gratification of either party. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-318 and 320.

1. <u>Sanctions on School Grounds</u>.

- a. <u>Minimum Sanction.</u> Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- b. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- c. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities must be contacted upon the request of the offended party. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-293.

2. <u>Sanctions off School Grounds</u>.

- a. Citation during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection II(G). Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- H. <u>Sexual Harassment</u>. Unwanted or unwelcome activity of a sexual nature which materially interferes with or substantially disrupts the educational process. This may include, but is not limited to, unwanted touching, pinching, patting, verbal comments of a sexual nature, sexual name-calling, pressure to engage in sexual activity, repeated propositions, written messages, notes, cartoons or graffiti of a sexual nature, and unwanted body contact.
 - 1. Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.

- I. <u>Harassment.</u> Any intentionally hurtful, demeaning, or disparaging acts, words, symbolic represeliestions, or behavior used by a student or students against another student or students that is disruptive of the educational process. This includes, but is not limited to, verbal, physical, visual, or graphic actions such as name-calling, taunting, mocking, slandering, humiliating, defaming, teasing, pestering; and making derogatory remarks, demeaning jokes, disparaging drawings or notes.
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- J. <u>Bullying</u>. Any intentionally hostile or offensive verbal, written, graphic, demonstrative, or physical act that has the purpose of exerting domination over another student through the act of intimidating, frightening, oppressing, or adversely controlling the student, and that is disruptive of the educational process or any ongoing pattern of physical, verbal, written, graphic, demonstrative or electronic abuse, on school grounds, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by a school being used for a school purpose by a school employee or his or her designee, or at school-sponsored activities or school-sponsored athletic events. This may include, but is not limited to, verbal, graphic, written or electronic activities such as name-calling, taunting, blackmailing, inciting to fight, terrorizing, or physical or demonstrative activities such as poking, blocking or impeding, following, hair pulling, mock hitting motions, intentionally bumping, tripping, and damaging clothing.
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- K. <u>Hazing</u>. Any activity by which a person intentionally or recklessly endangers the physical or mental health or safety of an individual for the purpose of initiation into, admission into, affiliation with, or continued membership with or participation in any group or activity. Such hazing activity shall include, but shall not be limited to the following: whipping; beating; branding; forced and prolonged calisthenics; prolonged exposure to the elements; forced consumption of any food, liquor, beverage, drug, or harmful substance not generally intended for human consumption; prolonged sleep deprivation; harassing by exacting unnecessary or disagreeable work, banter, ridicule, or criticism; or any brutal treatment or the performance of any unlawful act which endangers the physical or mental health or safety of any person. Consent to the hazing by the student(s) shall not be a defense to hazing.
 - 1. Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.

III. Violations Against Public Health and Safety.

A. <u>Possession of Alcohol or other Drugs</u>. Possession or use of an illegal narcotic drug, controlled substance, moodaltering or behavior-affecting substance, or look-a-like substance, or possession or use of a prescribed medication by a student for whom the prescribed medication was not prescribed; or possession or use of drug paraphernalia. Possession or use of alcohol or an alcohol-containing beverage or liquor capable of human consumption.

1. Sanctions on School Grounds.

- a. <u>First Offense</u>. Suspension for nineteen (19) school days. Suspension from extracurricular activities while not in school due to the suspension. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the suspension and curtailment of extracurricular activities by a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) days out of school).
- b. <u>Second Offense</u>. Mandatory expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion. Prior violations of subsection III(A) on or off school grounds will be included as previous offenses.
- c. Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(6) and 293.

2. Sanctions off School Grounds.

- a. Citation during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection III(A). Curtailment of extracurricular activities for nineteen (19) school days.
 - (1) First Offense. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the curtailment of extracurricular activities by a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) school days curtailment of extracurricular activities). Previous offenses of subsection III(A) on or off school grounds during the current

- (2) Second Offense. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- B. <u>Distribution of Alcohol or other Drugs</u>. Distribution or attempted distribution to any other person, of any illegal narcotic drug, controlled substance, look-a-like substance, mood-altering or behavior affecting substance, drug paraphernalia, or alcohol.

1. <u>Sanctions on School Grounds</u>.

- a. <u>First Offense.</u> Mandatory expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- b. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(6) and 293.

2. Sanctions off School Grounds.

- a. Citation during academic school or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection III(B). Curtailment of extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- C. <u>Possession, Use and Transportation of Medications</u>. The possession, use, and transportation of prescribed and non-prescribed medications shall be in accordance with the following rules.
 - 1. <u>Possession of Medications (Preschool and Elementary Levels)</u>. Possession of prescribed or non-prescribed medications, or possession of prescribed or non-prescribed medications on school grounds during transportation to and from school, is prohibited. Elementary school students may possess and use inhalers, as well as glucose tablets, according to the provisions of rule 5600.2.
 - a. <u>First Offense</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.

b. <u>Second Offense</u>.

- (1) Minimum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- (2) Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- 2. <u>Possession of Medications (Middle School Level)</u>. Possession of prescribed or non-prescribed medications, or possession of prescribed medications on school grounds during transportation to and from school, is prohibited. Middle school students may transport non-prescribed medications to and from school but must turn it into the nurse upon arrival at school. Middle school students may possess and use inhalers, as well as glucose tablets, according to the provisions of rule 5600.2.
 - a. <u>First Offense</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.

b. <u>Second Offense</u>.

- (1) Minimum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- (2) Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- 3. <u>Possession of Medications (High School Level)</u>. Possession of prescribed medications is prohibited. High school students may possess non-prescribed medications, but they may not possess prescribed medications except in transport to and from school. Prescribed medications must be turned into the nurse upon arrival at school. High school students may possess and use glucose tablets and inhalers according to the provisions of rule 5600.2.

a. First Offense.

(1) Maximum Sanction <u>Long</u> <u>Short</u>-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.

b. Second Offense.

- (1) Minimum Sanction. <u>Long term suspension.</u> <u>Mandatory Expulsion</u>. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of <u>suspension</u> expulsion.
- (2) Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- D. <u>Distribution of Prescribed Medications</u>. Distribution or attempted distribution to any other person, of any prescribed medication.
 - 1. First Offense. Suspension for nineteen (19) school days. Suspension from extracurricular activities while not in school due to the suspension. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program that in part must offer instruction on the dangers of abusing medications. Successful completion of this program may reduce the suspension and curtailment of extracurricular activities by a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) days out of school).
 - 2. <u>Second Offense.</u> Mandatory expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - 3. Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(6) and 293.
- E. <u>Distribution of Non-Prescribed Medications</u>. Distribution or attempted distribution to any other person, of any non-prescribed medication.
 - 1. <u>First Offense</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
 - 2. Second Offense.
 - a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
 - b. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- F. <u>Receiving Non-Prescribed Medications</u>. Receiving non-prescription medications by high school students that are distributed by another student at school.
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- G. <u>Under the Influence of Alcohol or Other Drugs</u>. Being intoxicated or under the influence of any illegal narcotic drug, controlled substance, prescribed medication by a student for whom the prescribed medication was not prescribed, mood-altering or behavior-affecting substance, or alcohol.
 - 1. Sanctions on School Grounds.
 - a. <u>First Offense</u>. Suspension for nineteen (19) school days. Suspension from extracurricular activities while not in school due to the suspension. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the suspension and curtailment of extracurricular activities by a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) days out of school).
 - b. <u>Second Offense</u>. Mandatory expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion. Prior violations of subsection III (G) on or off school grounds will be included as previous offenses.

c. Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(6) alt 293.

2. Sanctions off School Grounds.

- a. Citation during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection III(G). Curtailment of extracurricular activities for nineteen (19) school days.
 - (1) First Offense. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the curtailment of extracurricular activities by a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) school days curtailment of extracurricular activities). Previous offenses of subsection III(G) on or off school grounds during the current academic school year would not allow participation in this option.
 - (2) Second Offense. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- H. <u>Exposure to Bodily Fluids</u>. Intentionally spitting, throwing, wiping, or otherwise dispersing bodily fluids on or to another student or staff member for the purpose of infecting, inciting, demeaning, or intimidating that person.
 - 1. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
 - 2. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- I. <u>Tobacco</u>. Possession or use of tobacco or tobacco products.
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- J. Possession of Fireworks.
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- K. <u>Use of Fireworks</u>. Use or lighting of firecrackers or fireworks of any description.
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- IV. Violations against Public Decency and Good Morals.
 - A. <u>Public Indecency</u>. Behavior resulting in public indecency (see definition). This subsection shall apply only to students above grade five (5). Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(7).
 - 1. Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - B. <u>Profanity and Obscenity</u>. Written or oral language that is reasonably offensive or repulsive to the person hearing the same and which is disruptive of the educational process.
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - C. <u>Disparaging Language/Symbolism</u>. Disparaging or demeaning language or symbolic actions of any kind including, but not limited to gestures or language that is intended to disparage, demean, or subject another student or staff member to ridicule.
 - 1. Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - D. <u>Secret Organizations/Gangs</u>. Participation or membership in any secret fraternity, sorority, club, association, or organization is prohibited. The wearing of any ring, pin, or insignia of such a secret organization is also prohibited. Organizations or gangs, which initiate, advocate, or promote violence, drug or alcohol use, sex, criminal activity, or activities which disrupt the school environment or threaten the safety or well being of persons or geographic territory, unique appearance, or language, are a substantial disruption to and material interference with the educational environment, and are prohibited. The use of hand signals, graffiti, or the presence of any apparel,

jewelry, accessory, or manner of grooming which, by virtue of its color, arrangement, trademark, symbol, or other attributes indicates or implies membership in or affiliation with such a group, constitutes a substantial disruption to and material interference with the educational environment, and are prohibited.

1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.

V. Violations against Property.

- A. <u>Damage to Property</u>. Willfully causing or attempting to cause substantial damage to property, or repeated damage to property. This shall include school property lent to the student which the student damages. As to any such damaged property, the student's parent(s) or guardian(s) shall be liable for the damage to the school property. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(2).
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - 2. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted when the value of the property is five-hundred dollars (\$500.00) or more. Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-519; Neb. Rev. Stat. §879-267(2) and 293.
- B. <u>Theft/Larceny</u>. Stealing or attempting to steal property, or repeated theft of property. This will include school property lent to a student that is not returned upon demand by an authorized staff member and for which there is no reasonable justification for the failure to return the property. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(2).
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - 2. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted when the value of the property involved is two hundred dollars (\$200.00) or more. Neb. Rev. Stat. §\$28-511 and 518; Neb. Rev. Stat. §\$79-267(2) and 293.
 - 3. <u>Sanctions off School Grounds</u>. Committing burglary or theft which constitutes a felony provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection V(B). Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- C. <u>Arson or False Fire Alarm</u>. Intentionally starting a fire. Use of any fire causing agents to start or attempt to start a fire. Purposely or knowingly causing a false fire alarm. Neb. Rev. Stat. §\$28-502 to 504 and 907; Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(10).
 - 1. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. There is no mandated minimum sanction below grade six (6).
 - 2. Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - 3. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted if it is believed the arson was criminal. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-502 to 504 and 907; Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(10) and 293.
- D. <u>False Alarm or Report</u>. Purposely making a false alarm or false report, or purposely furnishing false information or making a false communication or statement, whether verbal, written or electronic, concerning the existence of any bomb, explosive device or weapon, dangerous chemical substance, or biochemical or terroristic device, or concerning another's intent or attempt to be made to kill, injure, or intimidate any individual or to use any bomb, explosive device, or weapon, dangerous chemical substance, or biochemical or terroristic device, or concerning the need for medical, police, or emergency services or procedures. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-907 and 1221; Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(10).
 - 1. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
 - 2. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - 3. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-907 and 1221; Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(10) and 293.
- E. <u>Computers</u>. Direct or indirect use of District computers, computer networks, or computer systems, which involves offensive, personal, commercial, and/or religious messages, or any unauthorized access or use of a District

computer, computer network, or computer system which violates District policy or state or federal law. Neb. Rev. Stat. §828-1341 to 1348; Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(10).

- 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- 2. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted if the action constitutes a felony. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-1341 to 1348; Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(10) and 293.

VI. <u>Violations against School Administration</u>.

- A. <u>Truancy</u>. Unauthorized absence from school. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-201 and 209.
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- B. Gambling. Playing any game of chance for money or other stakes. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(10).
 - 1. Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- C. <u>Dishonesty</u>. Dishonesty that interferes with the educational process.
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- D. <u>Cheating or Plagiarism.</u> Cheating on examinations including but not limited to ELO examinations. Plagiarism on projects including but not limited to reports, research papers, and portfolios.
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- E. <u>Insubordination</u>. Disrespect for, defying authority of, or refusing to obey requests or directions of teachers, school officials or school employees.
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- F. <u>Disruptive Behavior</u>. Behavior or possession of any item that materially interferes with or substantially disrupts class work, school activities, or the educational process.
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- G. <u>Nuisance Items.</u> Any item in a student's possession that is sufficiently annoying, offensive, unpleasant, or obnoxious that it substantially interferes with or materially interrupts the educational process. These items may include, but are not limited to radios, camera cell phones, beepers, walkie-talkies, tape and CD players, <u>Ipods</u>, MP3 players, cameras, devices that emit laser light beams, and other electronic devices.
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. <u>Expulsion Long term suspension</u>. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- H. <u>Unlawful Activity</u>. Engaging in any unlawful activity not specifically covered herein, which constitutes a danger to other students or school personnel, or interferes with school purposes or the educational process. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(10).
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- I. <u>False Complaints</u>. False accusations or complaints against another student or staff member.
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- J. <u>Noncompliance with Code Yellow or Code Red</u>. Intentionally leaving an assigned area already in containment during a Code Yellow or Code Red alert unless specifically given permission to do so by the supervisor of the assigned area.
 - 1. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of

suspension. 134

2. Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.

- K. <u>Student Identification</u>. Failure of a high school student to present the school approved student identification card upon the request of a District staff member while on school grounds, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by a school being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or by his or her designee, or at a school-sponsored activity or athletic event.
 - Maximum Sanction. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.

VII. Repeated Offenses or Series of Prohibited Conduct.

- A. Two (2) or more violations of prohibited conduct or violation of two (2) or more of the acts prohibited herein within the academic school year which constitute a substantial interference with school purposes. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(11).
 - 1. <u>Sanction</u>. Unless otherwise provided herein, prohibited conduct otherwise subject to short-term suspension shall be subject to long-term suspension; conduct otherwise subject to long-term suspension shall be subject to expulsion; prohibited conduct initially subject to expulsion shall be again subject to expulsion.

VIII. Curtailment of Extracurricular Activities.

A. <u>General Statement</u>. When reasonably necessary to aid the student, further school purposes, or prevent interference with the educational process, the District shall curtail a student's participation in District extracurricular activities. Students shall not be permitted to be on District property or participate in or attend District-sponsored extracurricular activities during the time period that the student is excluded from school for disciplinary reasons. In addition, students may be curtailed from extracurricular activities for misconduct taking place off school grounds and not at a school function, activity, or event during the academic school year pursuant to the provisions of this section and Rule 5400.4.

B. Period of Ineligibility for Conduct on School Grounds.

- 1. Period of Ineligibility. During any time period that a student is excluded from school due to short-term suspension, long-term suspension, expulsion, or emergency exclusion for conduct occurring on school grounds, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by a school being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or by his or her designee, or at a school-sponsored activity or athletic event, or any other place where the governing law permits the District to discipline students for prohibited conduct, the student so excluded shall also be ineligible for participation in extracurricular activities for the entire period of exclusion, and will also be prohibited from being on District property or attending any District-sponsored extracurricular events during the period of exclusion from school.
- 2. <u>Effective Following Semester if Necessary.</u> The ineligibility period shall remain in effect during the following semester (including the following school year) if there are insufficient school days in the semester to complete the ineligibility period.
- C. <u>Period of Ineligibility for Conduct off School Grounds</u>. The following prohibited conduct occurring off school grounds not at a school function, activity, or event during the academic school year shall subject the student to the following periods of ineligibility for extracurricular activities:
 - 1. <u>Guns, etc.</u> Knowingly possessing, handling, transmitting, using, intimidating with, or threatening with any object or material that is ordinarily and/or generally considered a firearm, explosive, destructive device, or weapon, including, but not limited to, guns, firearms, pipe bombs, stun guns, paint ball guns, air soft guns, B.B. guns and pellet guns, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
 - a. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
 - 2. Other Weapons. Using or threatening with a knife, throwing star, brass knuckles, chemical substances

(including, but not limited to, mace, pepper guns, and bleach), and any other object that could be used to injure a person, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.

- a. <u>Sanction</u>. Ineligibility period of one (1) year.
- 3. <u>Sexual Contact</u>. The intentional touching of another person's sexual or intimate parts or the intentional touching of another person's clothing covering the immediate area of the other person's sexual or intimate parts, without the consent of the other person. Sexual contact also includes the non-consensual touching by the other person of the actor's sexual or intimate parts or the clothing covering the immediate area of the actor's sexual or intimate parts when such touching is intentionally caused by the actor provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
 - a. <u>Sanction</u>. Ineligibility period of one (1) year.
- 4. <u>Possession of Alcohol or other Drugs</u>. The use or possession of an illegal narcotic drug, drug paraphernalia, look-a-like substance, controlled substance, mood-altering or behavior-affecting substance, or alcoholic beverage, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
 - a. <u>First Offense</u>. Ineligibility period of nineteen (19) school days. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the curtailment of extracurricular activities a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) school days curtailment of extracurricular activities).
 - b. <u>Second Offense</u>. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year. Prior violations of subsection III(A) on or off school grounds will be included as previous offenses.
- 5. <u>Distribution of Alcohol or other Drugs</u>. The dispensing, sale, or the intent to sell or dispense an illegal narcotic drug, look-a-like substance, controlled substance, mood-altering or behavior-affecting substance, or alcoholic beverage, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
 - a. Sanction. Ineligibility period of one (1) year.
- 6. <u>Under the Influence of Alcohol or other Drugs.</u> Being intoxicated or under the influence of any illegal narcotic drug, controlled substance, prescribed medication by a student for whom the prescribed medication was not prescribed, mood-altering or behavior-affecting substance, or alcohol, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
 - a. <u>First Offense</u>. Ineligibility period of nineteen (19) school days. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the curtailment of extracurricular activities a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) school days curtailment of extracurricular activities).
 - b. <u>Second Offense</u>. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year. Prior violations of subsection III(G) on or off school grounds will be included as previous offenses.
- 7. <u>Physical Injury to District Employees, Volunteers, and Students</u>. Causing or attempting to cause personal injury to any District employee, school volunteer, or to any student, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
 - a. <u>Sanction</u>. Ineligibility period of remainder of the semester or nineteen (19) school days, whichever is more.

- b. <u>Second Offense</u>. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year. Prior Adations of subsection II(B) on or off school grounds will be included as previous offenses.
- 8. <u>Sexual Assault or Attempted Sexual Assault.</u> Sexually assaulting or attempting to sexually assault any person, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection, the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection, or a complaint has been filed by a prosecutor in a court of competent jurisdiction alleging that the student has sexually assaulted or attempted to sexually assault any person.
 - a. <u>Sanction</u>. Ineligibility period of one (1) year.
- 9. <u>Theft/Larceny</u>. Committing a burglary or theft that constitutes a felony, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
 - a. <u>Sanction</u>. Ineligibility period of one (1) year.
- 10. <u>Repeated Offenses</u>. Two (2) or more offenses of one (1) of the above prohibited actions. Prior offenses of the above prohibited actions will be included as previous offenses.
 - a. <u>Sanction</u>: Ineligibility period of one (1) year.
- D. <u>District Events During Ineligibility Period</u>. Students who are ineligible for participation in extracurricular activities will also be prohibited from attending any District-sponsored extracurricular events during the ineligibility period.
- E. <u>Effective Following Semester if Necessary</u>. The ineligibility period shall remain in effect during the following semester (including the following school year) if there are insufficient school days in the semester to complete the ineligibility period.
- F. <u>Commutation</u>. Penalties assigned under this Section may be reduced by the Superintendent or Superintendent's designee upon the successful completion of counseling, community service, or other alternatives to curtailment set by the District. The District shall have the sole discretion in determining whether the student is eligible for commutation, and what form the counseling, community service, or other alternatives to curtailment must be successfully completed before commutation may take place. Any costs associated with counseling, community service, or other alternatives to curtailment shall be borne by the student or the student's parent(s) or guardian(s).
- G. <u>Effective Date</u>. The effective date of the curtailment of extracurricular activities shall be the date that the principal or principal's designee provides the student with the oral or written notice of the charges except the principal shall not issue a letter of curtailment until there is a student admission, court decision or uncontested citation.

DEFINITIONS:

- A. "Alcoholic beverage" shall mean any substance subject to the jurisdiction of the Nebraska Liquor Commission.
- B. "Citation" shall mean a summons to appear in court issued by a law enforcement officer.
- C. "Controlled substance" shall mean opiates, opium derivatives, depressants, stimulants, and the substances and derivatives as defined by Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-401(4) including, but not limited to, "uppers", "downers", barbiturates, amphetamines, LSD, heroin, hashish, hallucinogenic or cocaine, and substances, such as glue, to the extent any such substance is used for the purpose of mood or behavior alteration by a student, and any other substance which alters the mood or behavior and which is not taken for medical purposes (e.g., steroids).
- D. "Curtailment of extracurricular activities" shall mean that the student is ineligible for participation in or attending any extracurricular activities. During any time that a student is excluded from school for conduct occurring while within school jurisdiction, the student is ineligible for participation in or attending any extracurricular activities.
- E. "Destructive device" shall mean (1) any explosive, incendiary or poison gas-bomb, grenade, rocket having a propellant charge of more than four (4) ounces, missile having an explosive or incendiary charge of more than one-quarter ounce, mine, or device similar to any of the devices described in the proceeding clauses; (2) any type of weapon (other than a shotgun shell which is generally recognized as particularly suitable for sporting purposes) by whatever name known which will, or which may be readily converted to expel a projectile by the action of an explosive or other propellant, and which has any barrel with a bore of more than one-half inch in diameter; and (3)

any combination of parts either designed or intended for use in converting any device into any destructi\slashed? device or from which a destructive device may be readily assembled.

- F. "Exclusion" shall mean that time period a student is excluded from school during short-term suspension, long-term suspension, emergency exclusion, or expulsion. It may also mean that period that the student is mandatorily reassigned.
- G. "Expulsion" shall mean exclusion from all schools in the District (except the location designated for alternative education).
- H. "Extracurricular activities" shall mean all athletic teams, activities, groups, clubs, homecomings, proms, dances, graduation ceremonies, and all other organizations or events sponsored by or associated with the District which are not part of the District curriculum.
- I. "Firearms" shall mean (1) any weapon (including a starter gun) which will or is designed to or may readily be converted to expel a projectile by the action of an explosive, or by the action of compressed gases or air, or by the action of the frame or receiver; (2) the frame or receiver of any such weapon; (3) any firearm muffler or firearm silencer; or (4) any destructive device. Such term does not include an antique firearm. Such term does include any object that is ordinarily or generally considered a firearm or gun, including, but not limited to, stun guns, paint ball guns, air soft guns, B.B. guns, and pellet guns.
- J. "Illegal narcotic drug" shall mean the illegal substances as defined by Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-401(15).
- K. "Ineligibility period" shall mean that period of time that a district student is prohibited from participating in and/or attending any district extracurricular activities.
- L. "Injury" shall mean damage to a person that results in a specific wound or wounds that requires first aid treatment or a physician's care.
- M. "Long-term suspension" shall mean exclusion from all schools in the District for more than five (5) school days but less than twenty (20) school days.
- N. "Look-a-like substance" (also known as imitation controlled substance) shall mean any substance which is not a controlled substance, but which by its appearance (including, but not limited to, color, shape, size, markings, or packaging) or by representations made, induce or are intended to induce, persons to believe that the substance is a controlled substance. "Look-a-like substance" shall include any beverage containing alcohol or a beverage that is represented to contain alcohol.
- O. "Medication" shall be broadly defined and shall mean all prescribed medications, over the counter and other non-prescribed medications, and all chemical substances, compounds, homeopathic substances, herbs, vitamins, and/or devices, which purport to aid in a person's health or well-being or are intended for use in the diagnoses, cure, mitigation, treatment, or prevention of diseases, or are intended to affect the structure or any function of the body; and any device, instrument, apparatus, implement, machine, contrivance, implant, or other similar or related article, including any component part or accessory, which is prescribed by a physician, physician assistant, or advanced practice registered nurse, and dispensed by a pharmacist or other person authorized by law.
- P. "Non-prescribed medication" shall mean all medications which are available without a prescription or order from a person who is licensed under the laws of Nebraska to prescribe medications.
- Q. "On school grounds" shall mean on District property, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by the District being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or his or her designee, or at a school-sponsored activity or athletic event.
- R. "One year" shall mean the three hundred sixty-five (365) days that follow the acts at issue.
- S. "Prescribed medication" shall mean all medications which are available only with a prescription or order from a person who is licensed under the laws of Nebraska to prescribe medications.
- T. "Public indecency" shall mean performing, procuring, or assisting any other person to perform, in a public place and where the conduct may reasonably be expected to be publicly viewed: (1) An act of sexual penetration; (2) An exposure of the genitals, female breasts or buttocks of the body done with intent to affront or alarm any person; or (3) A lewd fondling or caressing of the body of another person of the same or opposite sex.

- U. "School day" shall mean any day that school is in session and students are attending academic courses. 138 does not include practices for extracurricular activities held during the summer, or weekends and vacations that occur during the academic school year.
- V. "School jurisdiction" shall mean on District property, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by the District being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or his or her designee, or at a school-sponsored activity or athletic event, or any other place where the governing law permits the District to discipline students for prohibited conduct.
- W. "Sexual assault" shall mean sexual assault in the first degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §828-319, sexual assault in the second degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-320, sexual assault of a child in the second or third degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-320.01, or sexual assault of a child in the first degree as defined in Neb Rev. Stat. §28-319.01, as such statutes now provide or may hereafter be amended.
- X. "Sexual or intimate parts" shall mean the genital area, groin, inner thighs, buttocks or breasts.
- Y. "Short-term suspension" shall mean exclusion from all schools in the District not to exceed five (5) school days.
- Z. "Under the influence" shall mean the manifestation of physical and physiological symptoms or reactions caused by the use of any illegal narcotic drug, controlled substance, mood-altering or behavior-affecting substance, prescribed medication by a student for whom the prescribed medication was not prescribed, or alcohol.
- AA. "Weapon" shall mean any object or material that is ordinarily or generally considered a firearm, explosive, or weapon, including, but not limited to, guns, firearms, pipe bombs, stun guns, paint ball guns, air soft guns, B.B. guns, and pellet guns.

Bids were received for the Interactive Whiteboard Installation project at the Don Stroh Administration Center Conference Room C on April 6, 2009 at 2:00 p.m. Per the attached bid tab, six bids were received. The low base bid was submitted by Starks Electric in the amount of \$234,864 (two hundred thirty four thousand eight hundred and sixty four dollars). There were no alternates for this project. The bid from Strategic Electric was not opened due to lack of bid bond. The range of bids was \$234,864 (two hundred thirty four thousand eight hundred and sixty four dollars) to \$434,136 (four hundred thirty four thousand one hundred and thirty six dollars). The large variances in bids are typical on technology projects.

Our estimate for the project construction cost was \$350,000 (three hundred and fifty thousand dollars). The project bids were lower than estimated due to current bidding climate and declining commodity costs.

We recommend a contract be awarded to Starks Electric in the amount of \$234,864 (two hundred thirty four thousand eight hundred and sixty four dollars).

Senators have now completed 80 days of 90 day session, ten days and counting.

LB 545

LB 545 passed Final Reading on Wednesday. There was a compromise that added more money to the averaging adjustment. This compromise proposal raised our projected increase to 19.5 million (stimulus funds). The vote was 40 yes and 0 no so it is likely that this bill will be passed this week. Passing this bill allows the Nebraska Department of Education to proceed with state aid certification.

Learning Community

LB 392 advanced to Final Reading with the following provisions:

- 1. Primary election
- 2. County treasurer distributes common levy funds
- 3. Delays the Elementary Learning Centers 11 months
- 4. School districts can use checks instead of warrants for paying debts
- 5. Non-voting members can participate in achievement sub-councils
- 6. LCCC is political subdivision under Tort Claims Act

The language that allowed focus schools to be eligible for the new school adjustment in the formula was deleted. It is my understanding that this is being deleted in response to the Governor's request. Senator Adams said that the Learning Community (Kermit) brought amendments that were more than technical and that did not get a hearing and he did not include them.

ESU Bills

LB 521 was killed in committee. There will be an interim study on the ESU and how it relates to the Learning Community.

National News

President Barack Obama's first budget proposal would boost U.S. Department of Education spending by 2.8 percent and provide substantial resources to turn around low-performing schools, reward effective teachers, and bolster early-childhood programs.

The president's fiscal 2010 budget proposal, released last week, would provide \$46.7 billion to the Education Department, an increase of \$1.3 billion over fiscal 2009.
