A meeting was held of the Board of Education of the School District No. 17, in the County of Douglas in the State of Nebraska. The meeting was convened in open and public session at 6:30 p.m., Monday, September 21, 2009, at the Don Stroh Administration Center, 5606 South 147<sup>th</sup> Street.

Present: Dave Anderson, Brad Burwell, Mike Kennedy, Linda Poole

Absent: Mike Pate and Julie Kannas

Notice of this meeting was given in advance thereof by publication in the Daily Record on Friday, September 18, 2009; a copy of the publication is being attached to these minutes. Notice of this meeting was given to all members of the Board of Education and a copy of their Acknowledgment of Receipt of Notice and the agenda are attached to these minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in advance notice and in the notice of the Board of Education of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public.

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At 6:30 p.m. Dave Anderson announced the public meeting Act is posted on the wall and available for public inspection. Dave Anderson asked everyone to say the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll call was taken and board members present included: Dave Anderson, Brad Burwell, Linda Poole, and Mike Kennedy. Absent were Mike Pate and Julie Kannas.

Motion by Brad Burwell, seconded by Mike Kennedy, to excuse Mike Pate and Julie Kannas from the meeting, upon roll call vote, all members voted aye. Motion carried.

The president and vice president from the MECO Henne firm spoke to the board in regards to the district's decision not to accept their bid for painting at the Excel Building.

Motion by Linda Poole, seconded by Brad Burwell, to approve the Board of Education Minutes – September 8, 2009, approve the bills, and receive the Treasurer's Report and Place on File, upon roll call vote, all members voted aye. Motion carried.

Dave Anderson summarized the Committee of the Whole meeting held on Monday, September 14, 2009. The topics which were discussed that evening included the PLP's with the new Naviance software, and legislative standing positions.

Superintendent Comments:

1. Last week attended the Learning Community Coordinating Council's second meeting of September. Millard will continue to attend their meetings. It looks like September thru December will prove to be very interesting meetings for the Learning Community Coordinating Council, which Brad is a member.
2. Reminder that the NFUSSD Conference will be October 11-14, 2009, so there will not be a Committee meeting on October 12, 2009.
3. A suggestion was given to Board members to think about having next fall an open house and demonstration on what the programs will entail for the Horizon High School. More discussion will continue on how this will be finalized.
4. The student absentee rate for last week reported to the Douglas County Health Department was 3%, which is below average for the district.

Board Comments:

Brad Burwell gave an update on the activities of the Learning Community Coordinating Council meetings, and his Sub-District meetings. He especially wanted to thank Susan Anglemyer for her presentation to the sub-district 4 on the 40 Assets Program and how it was implemented at Upchurch Elementary.

Mr. Burwell said there was an Executive meeting on September 11<sup>th</sup>, and a full meeting of the Learning Community Coordinating Council on September 17, 2009.

The topic the board probably has more interest in is the Diversity Task Force meetings. They have been reviewing the procedures for open enrollment, the dates and finalizing those dates. This task should be done within the next 30 days. The biggest question is when will inter-district transfers have to be done. There will be continued discussion on these topics in the weeks to come. It was suggested that each sub-district hold a public forum to receive comments from their own community areas.

The Poverty Plans and Limited English Proficiency Plans will be presented to Sub-District 4 on November 12<sup>th</sup> by Elkhorn and Millard. Also during this meeting on November 12<sup>th</sup> will be a presentation on the Montessori Program. Other meetings coming up will be held on October 8, 2009, which will be held at the Elkhorn Board of Education offices, and on December 10, 2009, if available, a meeting will be held at the Horizon High School with a presentation on the Career Center.

Linda Poole said her preference for the Horizon High School would be to have an open house and have the opportunity to show off the district's programs.

Mrs. Poole also said she was having difficulty getting online to do the Gallup Strength Finder required for the NFUSSD Conference, because of a duplication of the assigned password.

Rachel Saenz, student representative from Millard West High School, Josh Kenney, student representative from Millard South High School, and Maurice Green, student representative from Millard North High School, gave highlights in academics and athletic activities for the past few weeks.

Motion by Brad Burwell, seconded by Mike Kennedy, to approve Job Description 2100.10 – Director of Special Education, Job Description 2100.14 – Director of Pupil Services, and Job Description 2100.22 – Administrator for Special Education Programs & Compliance, upon roll call vote, all members voted aye. Motion carried.

Motion by Linda Poole, seconded by Brad Burwell, to approve the Poverty Plan for 2010-2011, upon roll call vote, all members voted aye. Motion carried.

Motion by Linda Poole, seconded by Mike Kennedy, to approve the Limited English Proficiency Plan for 2010-2011, upon roll call vote, all members voted aye. Motion carried.

Motion by Linda Poole, seconded by Brad Burwell, that the low bid on the SSC-II (Excel) Project be rejected due to the contractor not meeting construction schedules on its last two projects with the District, that the contract for said Project be awarded to Construct, Inc. in the amount of \$3,656,000 and that the Associate Superintendent for General Administration be authorized and directed to execute any and all documents related to such Project, upon roll call vote, all members voted aye. Motion carried.



**Action Desired:** Approval:

**Background:** Currently the District provides expelled students the opportunity to take one class per semester through homebound services or at the Millard Learning Center after hours. Those students subject to long-term suspensions (between 10 and 19 days) are provided no educational services. The purpose of this program is to provide students, grades 6 - 12, with a minimum of three hours of educational services during each day of the long-term suspension or expulsion at a site staffed by certificated teachers using both teacher-directed instruction and online curriculum. Such a program would allow for educational continuity and credit acquisition thus maintaining a comprehensive educational program during the period of disciplinary action. The contract calls for 60 slots, 30 in the morning and 30 in the afternoon, at a cost of \$667,500. The contract would provide services for students from January 2010 to May 2011 with options for renewal. Ombudsman (Educational Services of America) provides such contracted services in 13 states.

The number of long-term suspensions and expulsions for the last two years and this academic year (to-date) are provided in the following table.

Under the contract Ombudsman would provide a suitable store-front site equipped with the necessary furnishings and technology to support instruction. The center would be staffed by a Nebraska Certificated administrator and teachers to meet Nebraska Department of Education Rule 10 and Rule 17 requirements. The academic curriculum would be delivered using online resources supplemented by teacher-directed instruction/tutoring. A copy of available high schools courses is attached. The Ombudsman program is accredited by the North Central Association and AdvancEd; the same accrediting association used by the Millard Public Schools and the Nebraska Department of Education.

Ombudsman has an 85% success rate of returning students to their home school districts, retaining them in the program to earn credit, or graduating them with a school district or Ombudsman diploma. References have been called (list attached) and a site visit is being considered. Those contacted praise the program's effectiveness and the company's collaborative approach.

**Recommendations:** It is recommended that the program with Ombudsman (Educational Services of America) for long-term suspended and/or expelled students be approved for an amount not to exceed \$667,500 and that the Associate Superintendent for Educational Services, in consultation with District Legal Counsel, be authorized and directed to execute any and all documents related to this project.

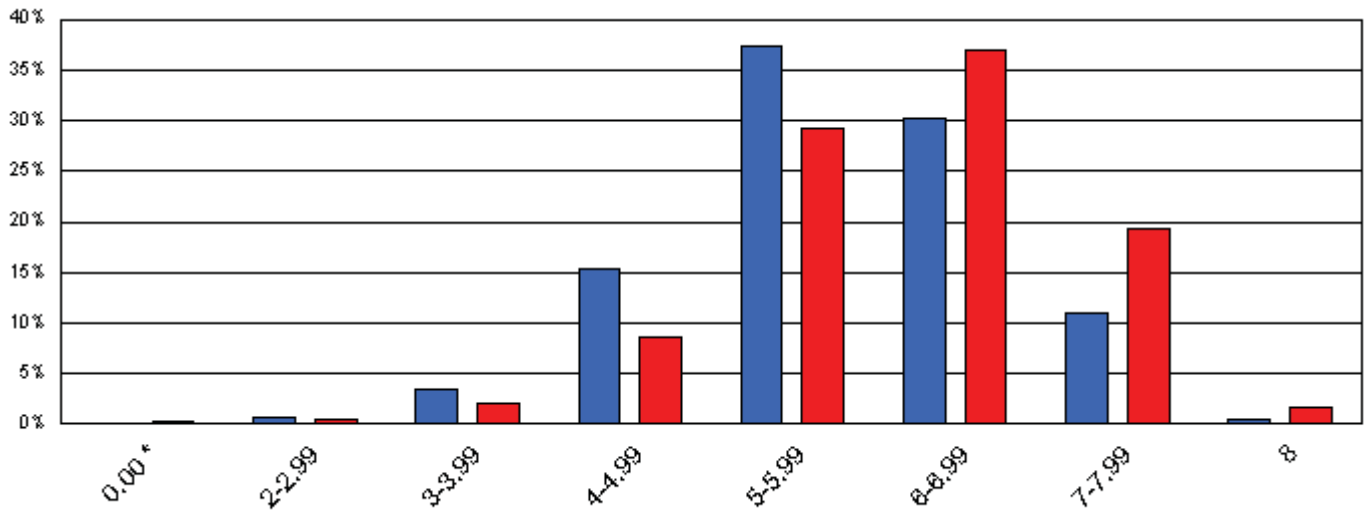

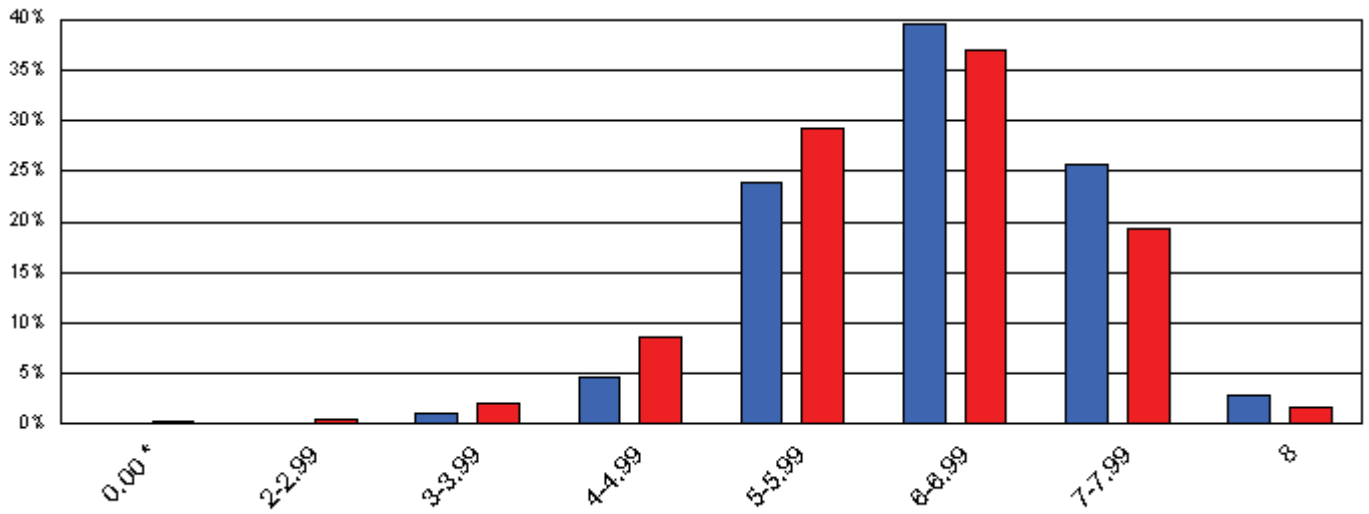


**BACKGROUND:** Supporting data indicates that the Advanced Placement culture implemented as a result of the District Strategic Plan, begun during the 2005-06 school year, has continued to grow. More Millard high school students are participating in Advanced Placement courses, more students are taking Advanced Placement Exams, and, overall, students are performing better on the exams than in past years.

**RECOMMENDATIONS:** The recommendation is to continue to support growth of the AP culture established within the district by encouraging students to take AP courses and exams. In addition, continuing to add AP course opportunities for students.

**STRATEGIC PLAN:** Prior: District Action Plans were put in place to address creating an AP culture, providing systematic training and support for AP teachers, and ensuring AP curriculum for all AP courses is aligned with College Board standards for Advanced Placement exams.

### Points of Interest

- During the 2008-09 academic year, Millard high schools provided twenty-one A.P. courses. New courses added included Comparative Government & Politics and Human Geography.
- Thirty-nine students also took A.P. exams in areas for which A.P. courses are not currently offered. Examples this past year included: Art History, Microeconomics, Physics C: Electricity & Magnetism, and Physics C: Mechanics. Summarized data is listed below.
- Within the original AP exam plan was the objective to increase the number of students taking the AP exam annually. The goal for 2008-09 was a testing rate of at least 65% of students taking courses and to help assure that students would make a serious effort to do well on the exam. In 2008-09 the test completion rate was 67%, thus exceeding all of the previous goals within the original plan.

- AP course enrollment increased at each high school as noted in the above table.
- Of the students taking AP exams in 2008-09, 57% of students tested earned a score of 3, 4 or 5, compared to 53% in 2007-08.
- The cost of taking an AP exam in 2009 was \$86.00. During the 2008-09 school year, \$38,700 was provided by the Foundation for 185 students who requested support through an application process to take 450 exams.
- The number of students recognized by the College Board as AP Scholars continued to grow during 2008-09 with 209 AP Scholars in Millard, an increase of 42 AP Scholars during the 2007-08 school year.
- In 2008-2009, both of the Nebraska State Scholars were from Millard Public Schools, attending Millard South and Millard West.
- For the AP courses offered in Millard, in 2006-07 students accounted for 1,573 of the exams taken in the state, which had a total of 4,833 exams in the same courses, for 32.5%. In 2007-08, Millard students took 1,856 exams within courses offered, while 5,788 were taken within the state, for 32.0%. During the 2008-09 school year 2,138 were taken in Millard with 6,529 in the state in like courses, for 32.7%

### Advanced Placement® Courses

Advanced Placement® Courses follow the curriculum recommendations of the College Board. The course and corresponding exam provide for a rigorous, fast paced, college level class. During the 2008-09 school year, Millard offered 21 Advanced Placement® courses.

Students may also choose to test in other areas identified by the College Board. We do have some students who choose to take exams even though we do not provide a corresponding course specifically preparing students in those curricular areas. Examples this past year include: Physics C-Electricity and Magnetism, Physics C-Mechanics, Microeconomics, and World History.

### Advanced Placement Strategy & Action Plans

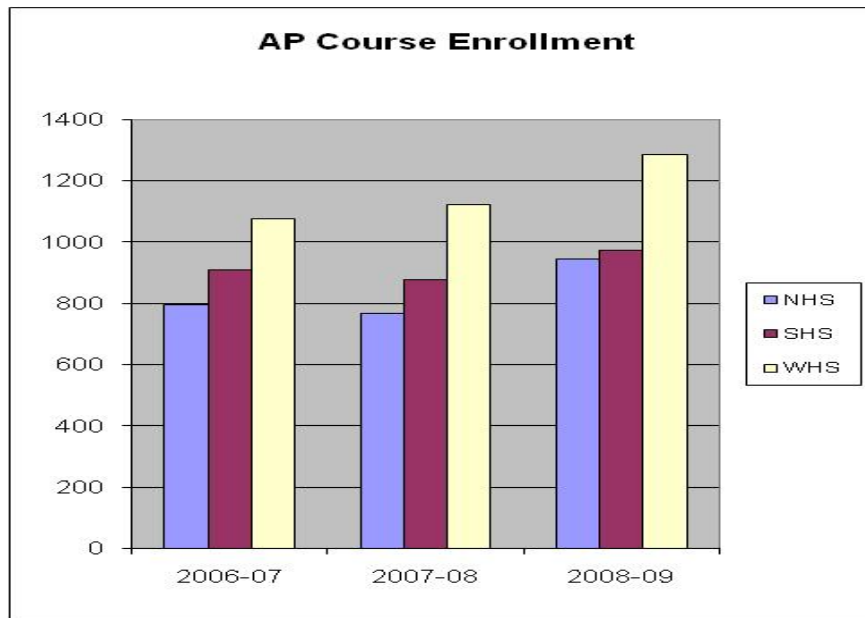
In the previous Strategic Plan, there were four Action Plans that addressed Advanced Placement topics. They were to create an Advanced Placement® (AP) Culture; develop a systematic plan for training and support of Advanced Placement® (AP) teachers; ensure Advanced Placement® (AP) curriculum alignment across all levels with College Board standards for AP exams; and increase student participation in and performance on Advanced Placement (AP) exams. Although these strategies have reached full implementation and are now imbedded in the MPS culture, we remain committed to similar goals.

The current Strategic Plan includes Strategies 2 and 4, which both support promoting personal excellence, increasing student achievement, and engaging students.

### Student Enrollment in Advanced Placement® Courses

Overall, there has been an increase in enrollment in Advanced Placement® classes by students over the last three years.

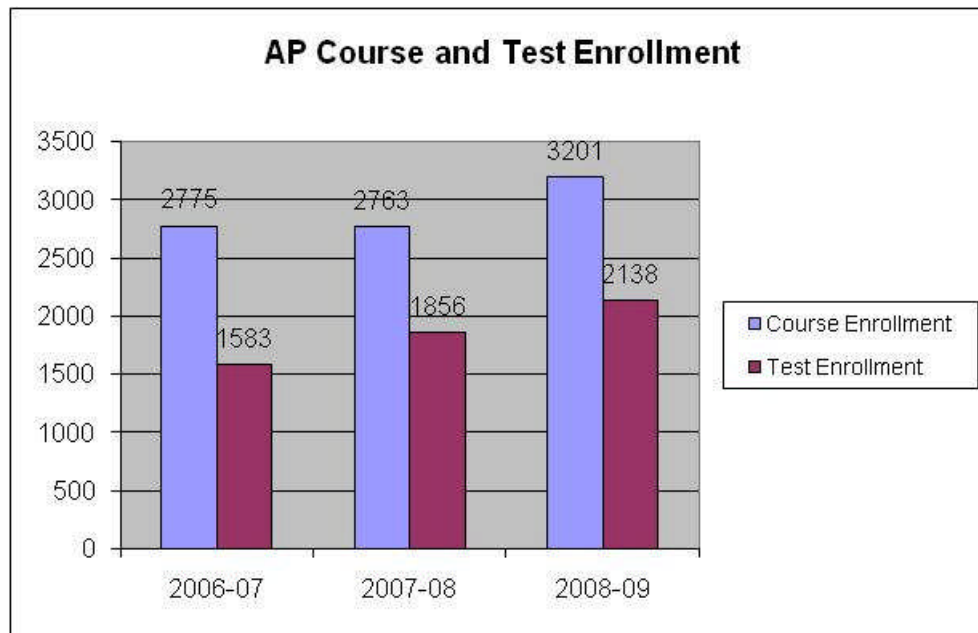




### Student Test Enrollment

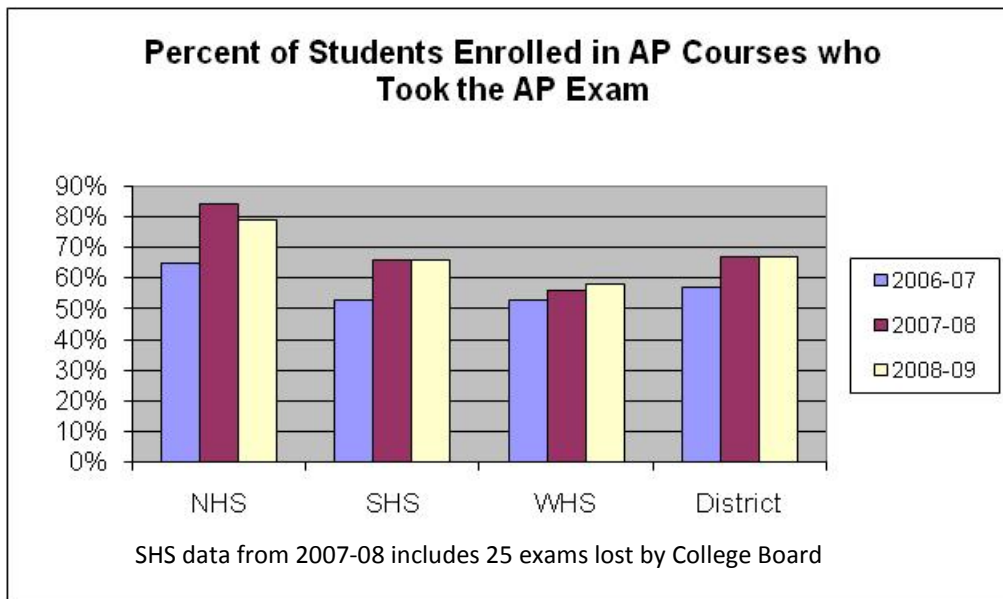
The focus of testing is to provide students the opportunity to take a national test. Students may compare their testing results with students nationally who are taking the same exam.

Test enrollment has increased annually.



### AP Exam Plan

According to the AP Exam Plan, it was expected that there would be an annual increase in the number of students enrolled in AP classes who also take the AP exam. The 2008-2009 goal for the district was 65%, and the actual percentage of students who took the course and then the exam was 67%.

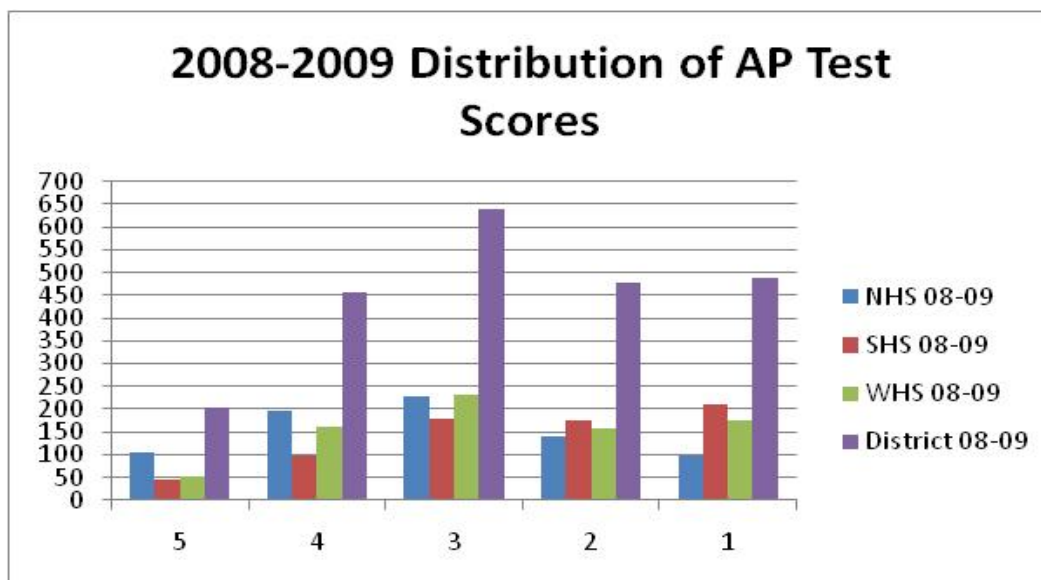


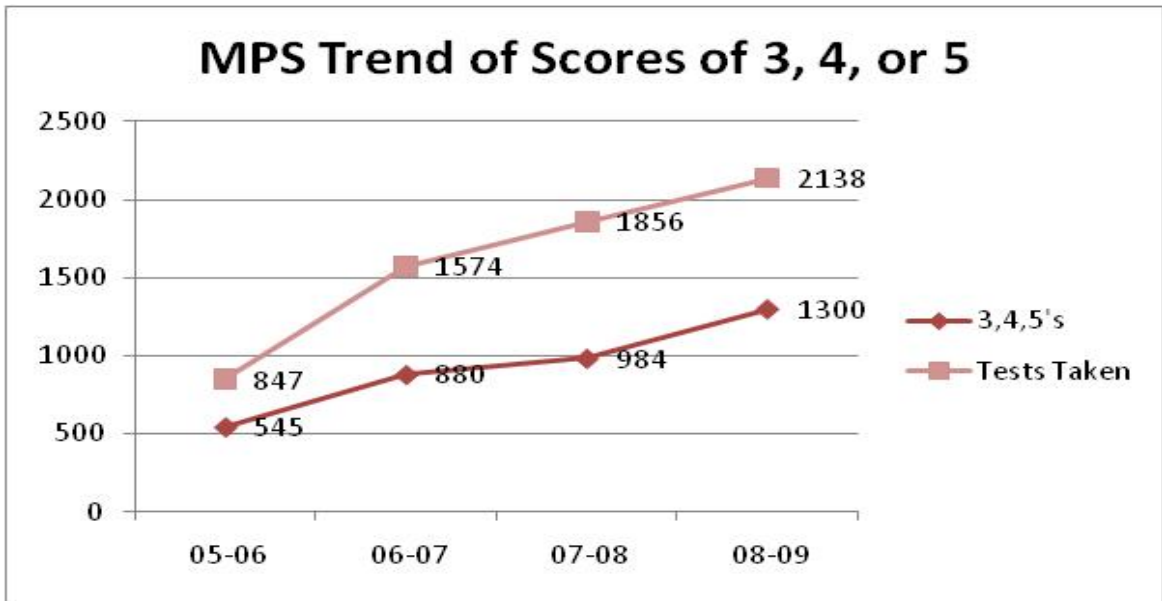
**Test Scores**

Advanced Placement® Examination grades are reported on a five-point scale as follows:

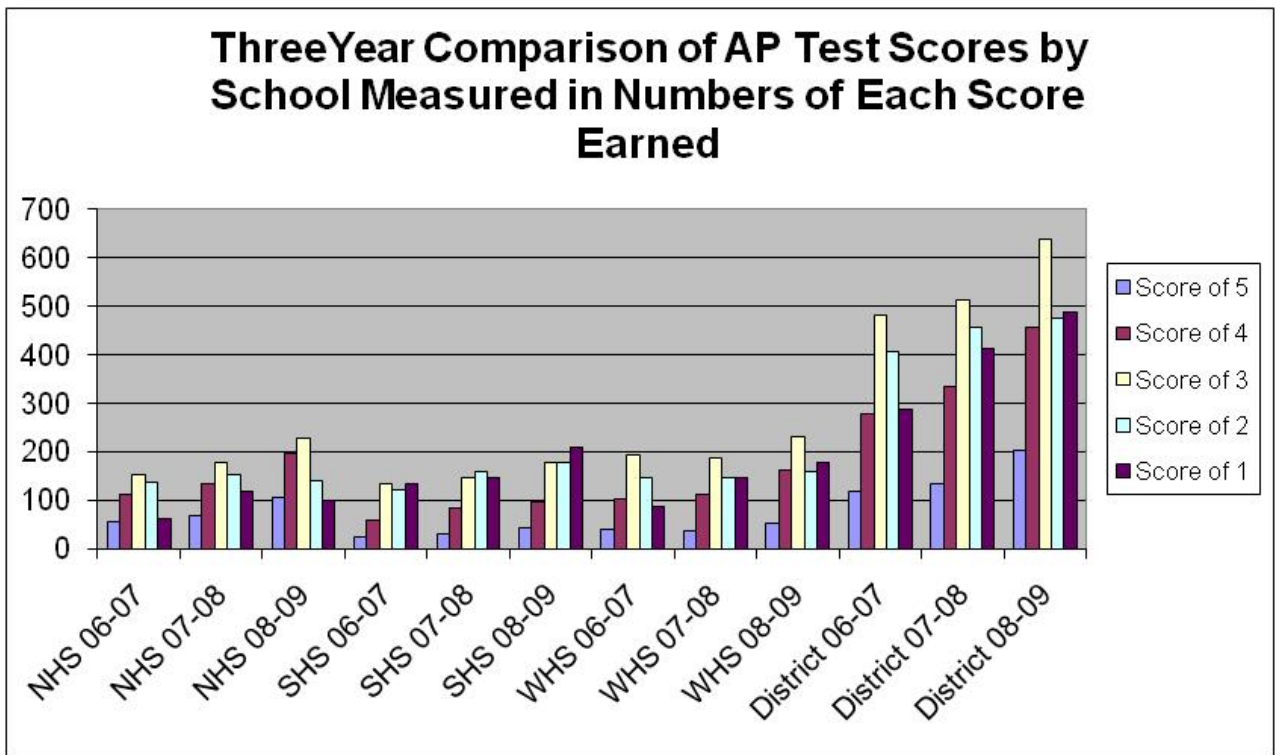
- 5 = Extremely well qualified;

- 2 = Possibly qualified;

These grade categories are designed to reflect achievement scores in the AP course that is analogous to performance in a comparable college course. Of the students taking AP exams in Millard in 2008-2009, 57% of students testing earned a score of 3, 4, or 5, compared to 53% in 2007-08.





Comparison of district scores from the last two years to this year show that the number of students performing at high levels on this national measure has increased at each building and at the district level.



**MPS Foundation Advanced Placement® Support**

As the number of Millard students taking AP Exams increased, a greater need for financial support has continued. The cost per exam is \$86. The Millard Public Schools Foundation continued their scholarship program for the 2008-09 school year. During the 2008-09 school year, \$38,700 was provided by the Foundation for 185 students who requested support through an application process to take 450 exams. This was an increase from \$22,428 for 114 students who took 267 exams supported by the Foundation during the 2007-08 school year.

### AP Scholars

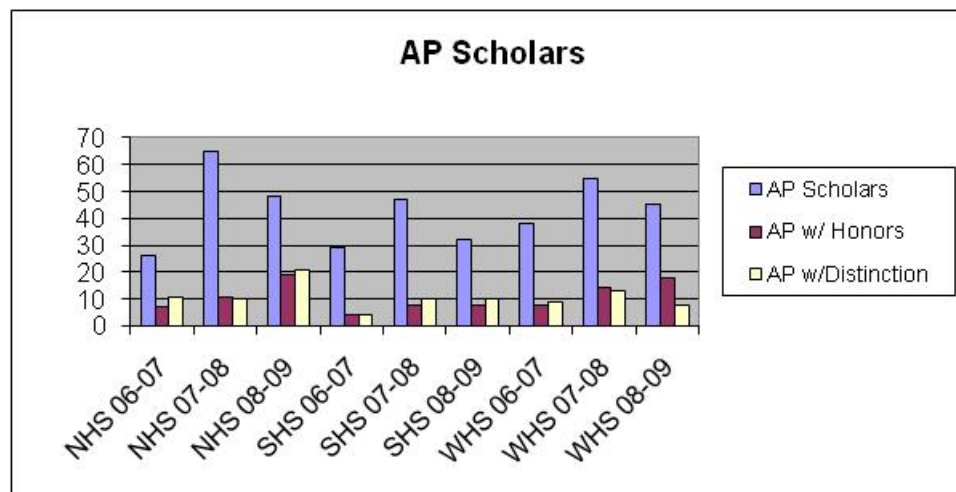
The College Board recognizes students who have distinguished themselves academically by announcing AP award recipients.

- AP Scholars = Grades of 3 or higher on 3 or more AP exams (full year courses)
- AP Scholars with Honors = Average grade of 3.25 or higher on all AP exams taken; 3 or higher on 4 or more exams (full year courses)
- AP Scholars with Distinction = Average grade of 3.5 on all AP exams taken; grades of 3 or higher on 5 or more exams (full year courses)

The number of Millard students being recognized as College Board Scholars has continued to increase. With the implementation of the plan in 2004-05, Millard Public Schools had a total of 41 AP scholars while in 2005-06 the number increased to 82 student scholars. During the 2006-07 school year, 136 Millard students were selected as scholars and in 2007-08, 167 Millard students were AP Scholars. Our students continued that climb in 2008-09 with 209 Millard students recognized as AP Scholars.

The College Board designates 2 State Scholars per state, one male and one female, with grades of 3 or higher on the greatest number of AP Exams, and then the highest average grade (at least 3.5) on all AP Exams taken. In 2008-2009, both of the Nebraska State Scholars were from Millard Public Schools, attending Millard South and Millard West.

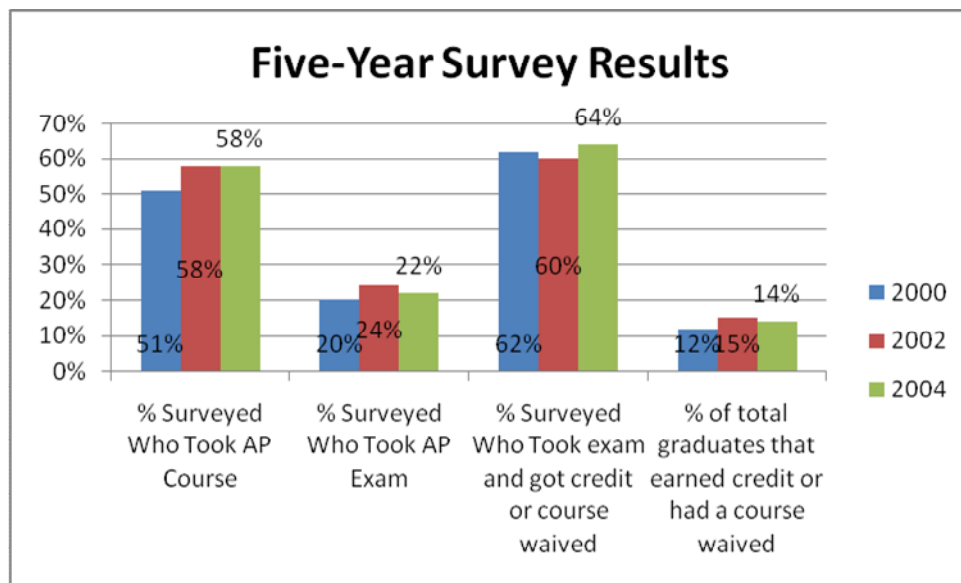
The College Board designates National AP Scholars to students who receive an average grade of at least 4 on all AP Exams taken, and grades of 4 or higher in eight or more of these exams. This past year, NHS had one, SHS had three, and WHS had two. This was an increase from a total of four in 2007-08 to six in the district in 2008-09.



### Five-Year Post Graduate Study

Every other year the district conducts a five-year survey of graduates. The five-year post graduate study conducted in June of 2009 with the graduates of 2004 shows that 58% of that class took at least one AP course and 22% of the survey respondents took at least one exam.

Among those who reported taking an AP exam, 64% stated that they either received college credit or had a college course waived. This translates to 14% of the graduates overall having earned college credit or having courses waived. Data from the last three five-year surveys is displayed below.



**BACKGROUND:** Results show that the International Baccalaureate Diploma Program, implemented in the 2002-2003 school year, has continued to grow both in student enrollment and in academic measures. Students that graduate from this program are provided with numerous scholarship opportunities.

### Points of Interest

- In 2008-2009 there were 53 seniors at MNHS who were IB diploma candidates.
- 39 of the 53 or 74% of the candidates received their IB diploma.
- Enrollment in the DP program has continued an upward trend.
- 90 DP students completed 373 subject tests in May 2009.
- Millard North students scored passing or higher on 73.2% of the tests taken.
- The average score of MN students was 4.7, equal to the international average.
- A score of D (mediocre) is passing on the Extended Essay and Theory of Knowledge. While 98.1% and 100% of MN students received a passing score on the extended Essay and Theory of Knowledge respectively, 75.5% and 90.% received a score of Satisfactory (“C”) or higher.
- Candidates must accumulate at least 24 points to be awarded the IB Diploma. The average number of points earned by MN students was 30. The international mean was 29.57 points earned.
- 25 Advanced Placement<sup>®</sup> tests were taken by students enrolled in IB courses.

### Reflections and Considerations

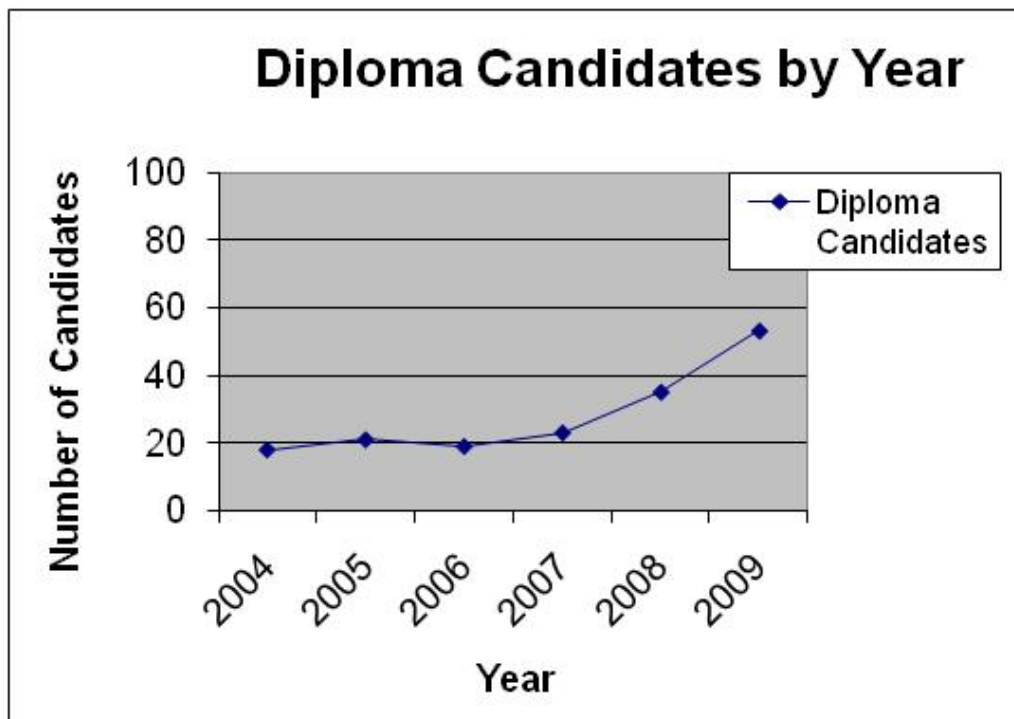
- Although overall enrollment continues to climb, there is a need to explore the reasons for changes in the retention rate from freshman to senior year. Possible solutions already started this school year may include the building’s effort to cluster MYP students in classes solely dedicated to the IB philosophy, as well as increased collaboration between staff and students at all three IB levels for service learning and other projects, which started last school year.
- Currently the mean test score and points earned are equal to or higher than the international mean. It will be important to create and implement plans that continue to foster growth and success for Millard IB students.

### Participation

The International Baccalaureate Program in Millard Public Schools culminates with the Diploma Program for 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grade students at Millard North High School. This is a two-year diploma program that allows students to self-select into and out of the program. The diploma program focuses on students completing all requirements to receive the IB diploma.

Requirements include 6 subject exams, a Theory of Knowledge course, an Extended Essay, and a Creativity, Action, and Service (CAS) component. CAS includes activities such as arts, sports, and service projects. This is in contrast to IB certificate programs, in which students take IB courses and exams with the aim of receiving a certificate for the successful completion of each exam, much like Advanced Placement<sup>®</sup> (AP) courses and exams.

In 2008-2009, the seventh year of IB testing at Millard North, there were 53 seniors, or “diploma candidates” in the IB program. In addition there was one previous student who retook the exam. There has been a steady increase in the number of students completing the IB Diploma Program as can be seen in the graph below.





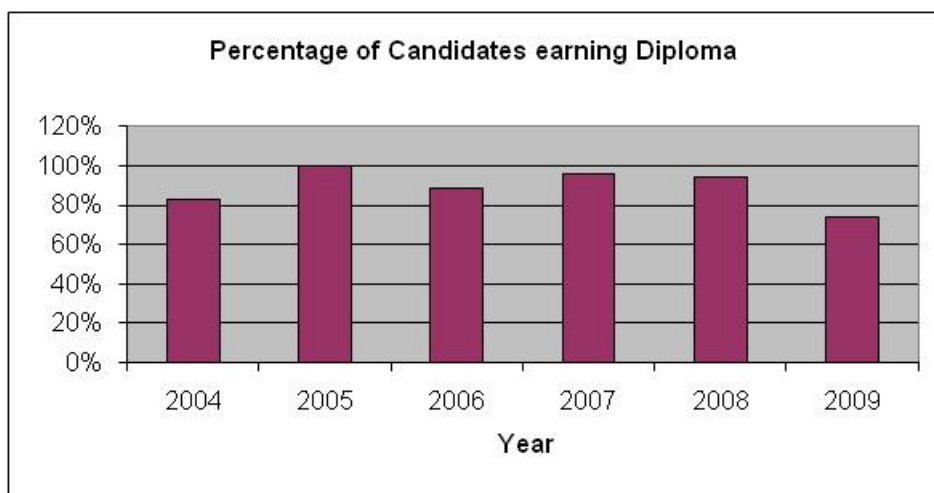
### IB Enrollment by School Year

### Diploma Results

In 2008-2009, Millard North had 53 IB Diploma candidates and one former student who retook the exams. Thirty-nine students or 74% were successful recipients of the Diploma.



### Test Results

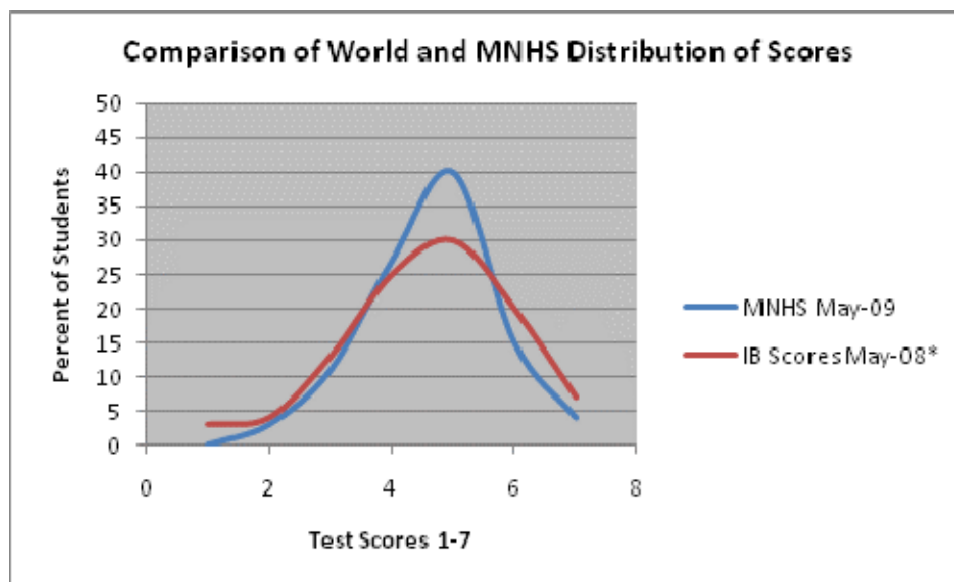
As part of the requirements to receive the IB diploma, each candidate must complete the coursework and tests in 6 subjects during their junior and senior years. The subject tests fall into 2 levels, Standard Level (SL) and Higher Level (HL). Standard Level tests are taken after 1 year of coursework with the exception of World Languages which tests at the end of 5 years for French, German, and Spanish and at the end of 4 years for Latin. Higher Level tests follow 2 years of coursework. Millard North had 90 students complete 373 subject tests in May 2009. Results by subject are shown in the following table.

Tests are scored from 7 (excellent) to 1 (very poor), with 4 being the minimum passing mark. The “International Mean” is the mean of all IB students worldwide that tested in May, which is the IB testing date for students in the northern hemisphere. On the May 2009 subject tests, the average score of Millard North IB students was 4.7, the same as the International average. The distribution of the Millard North students’ IB subject test scores is shown in the following table. Millard North students scored passing or higher on 273 of 373 tests taken (73.2%).

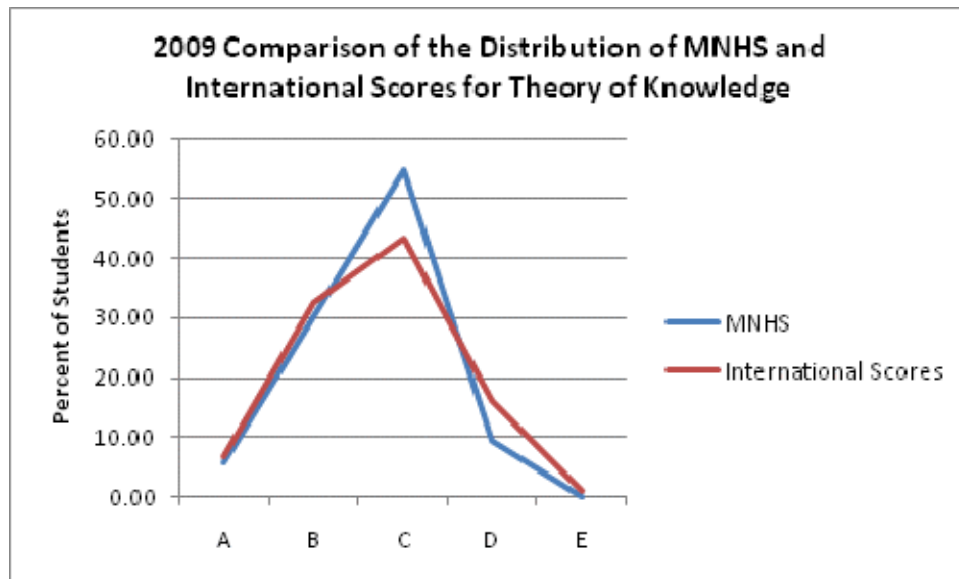
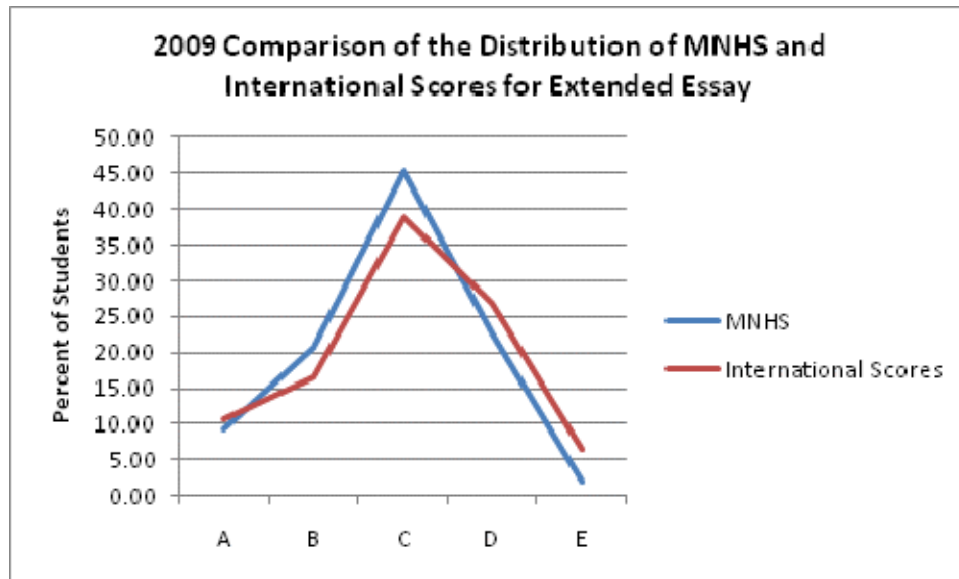

### Extended Essay and Theory of Knowledge

Additional requirements for the IB diploma include completion of an original research project called the Extended Essay (EE) and a 2-year Theory of Knowledge (TOK) course. These are in addition to the subject tests, and are scored using a letter scale, A-E. The score of A is excellent, B is good, C is Satisfactory, D is Mediocre and E is elementary. A score of D or better must be obtained on either the Extended Essay or Theory of Knowledge for a student to receive the IB diploma. In other words, D is the minimum passing score. Score distribution percentages are shown below for the 53 students that completed the IB Diploma Program in May 2009, with Millard North data from previous years included for comparison.

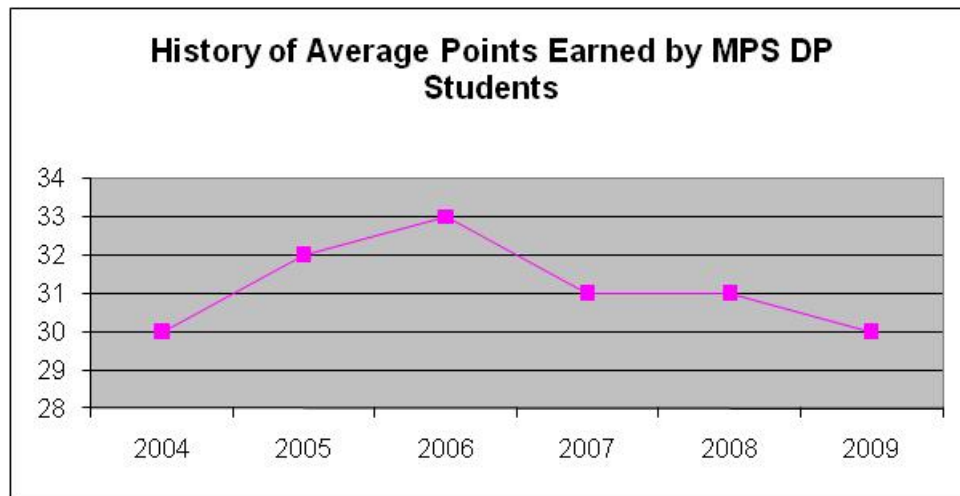

Millard North students scoring a D or better on the Extended Essay (EE) in 2009 made up 98.1% of the total students completing the essay. In the Theory of Knowledge (TOK) course at Millard North, the percent of students scoring a D or better was 100%. This represents a consistently high percentage of students with a D or better each year in both the EE and TOK.



### IB Diploma Points

IB diploma candidates must accumulate at least 24 points to be awarded the IB diploma. These points come primarily from the subject tests, with up to 3 possible extra points based on the student's performance on the Extended Essay and Theory of Knowledge. The maximum possible point total is 45. The average of IB Diploma Points for all 39 students who received the IB Diploma during the 2008-2009 school year was 30 points. The international mean of points earned was 29.57.



## Academy Development Progress

On August 13, the first full day of school, academy students participated in an orientation to the academy calendar, transportation practices and attendance procedures at their assigned high school. The first day of transportation to academy classes was August 14. Nationwide, the average start up enrollment is 8-10 students per academy.

Each academy hosted a parent information night; Entrepreneurship on August 16, Education on August 17, and Finance on August 20. Representatives from Metropolitan Community College attended the Entrepreneurship and Finance Academy curriculum nights.

All participants will earn 40 credits per year toward high school graduation and have the option to participate in dual enrollment credit with Metropolitan Community College and University of Nebraska Omaha. The number of dual enrollment participants is noted in the table below.
