Explanation of Calculations:

"Needs" were first calculated on a district-by-district basis. Then, calculations were made to determine what percentage of the total needs in the learning community were attributable to each district. The total state aid certified to the learning community was then distributed based upon those percentages.

Statutory provisions require that net option funding (Section 79-1009) and retirement aid (Section 79-1028.03) be paid directly to the school districts. Thus, those two factors were added to each district's total after the percentage distribution was calculated.

Since the learning community received equalization aid, ARRA-SFSF funds were attributed to each member district based upon the percentages noted above. The amount of the ARRA-SFSF funds attributed to each district are noted in the box to the left. Those funds are <u>included</u> in the "District Total."

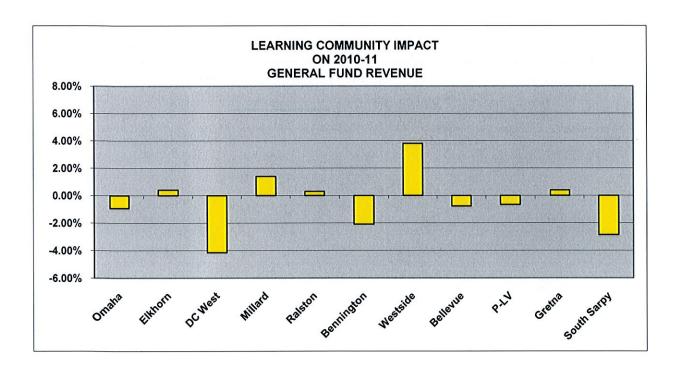

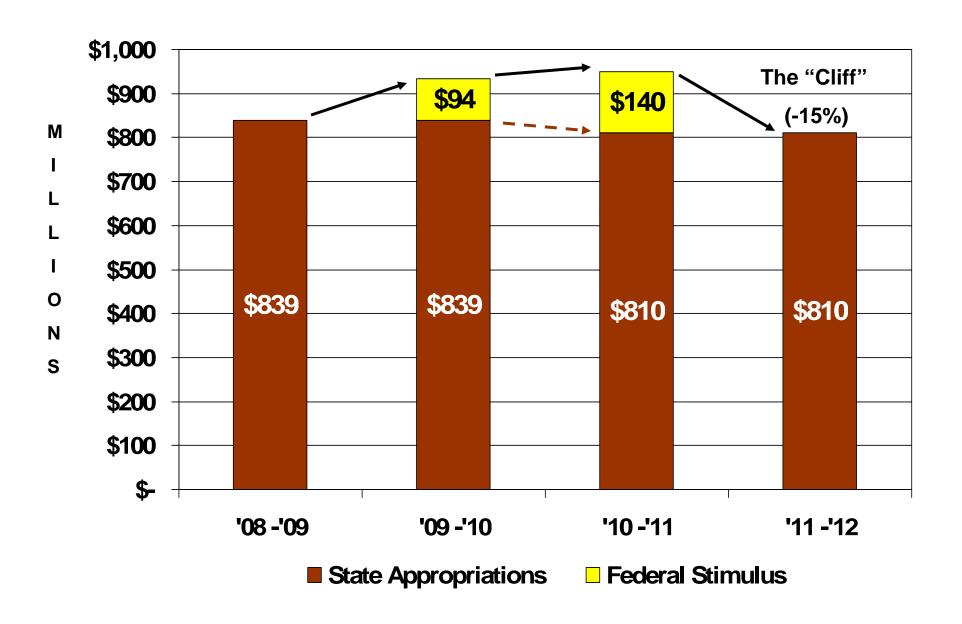

BUILDING STRATEGIES AND SPECIFIC RESULTS

1. We will design and implement plans to expand the scope of Professional Learning Communities.

We identified staff member to organize resources and administered needs assessment to staff to determine staff development needs. We located and obtained resources (people and materials) to support differentiated student and staff learning. Designed and implemented ongoing differentiated staff development based on needs assessment.

We developed resource center for students and staff to access differentiated learning materials and professional resources and we identifed staff member to manage resource center.

Scheduled vertical team meetings quarterly, and provided opportunities for self-improvement (professional readings, attend conferences, workshops, make classroom observations, participate in reading groups, attend teacher led workshops). Finally, we created and implemented new staff induction procedures and we provided training for PLC team leaders as well as increased staff awareness of pyramid interventions.

2. We will develop and implement plans to address the needs of the whole child.

We established a committee to oversee the evening academic programs quarterly themes such as: science fair, math night, reading night, cultural night, and we expanded mini-class offerings. We evaluated participation based on the number of students participating each quarter.

In the area of service learning, we Educate the staff on service learning.

Purchase books such as Community Service-Learning: A Guide to Including Service in the Public School Curriculum by Rahima C. Wade. We provided an opportunity for the staff to establish an ongoing relationship with an outside agency to experience service learning first hand. In addition, we scheduled periodic all-school assemblies that recognize contributions and accomplishments of individuals or groups of students.

Example: Assembly can take the place of PRIDE meeting – one per quarter.

We provide opportunities for students to get to know all staff members through events such as ice cream social, faculty talent show, read and feed, etc. or interview staff for school newsletter. We developed a program wherein all staff will take a special interest with at least two students outside of their own classroom. We also identified students who would benefit from additional adult interaction, such as mentoring, and we matched up students with identified adults.

3. We will develop and implement plans to increase cohesiveness of the Montclair community.

We created a plan for communicating news and events amongst the staff. (How to share information about things going on with staff members — illnesses, deaths, etc...) We created a committee to plan a social event outside of school once a quarter.

We scheduled a quarterly activity between Montessori and Traditional classrooms. (Examplesend of the year picnics, common lessons, field trips, etc...) We created a learning buddy program between the Montessori and Traditional programs.

4. We will develop and implement plans to actively promote Montclair.

We updated marquee regularly by creating a marquee club for parents and students to update the marquee once per month. We encouraged two-way relationship with businesses through our PAYBAC liaison. We facilitated quarterly family nights at Montclair. We also kept the Montclair website updated and we facilitated the staff development of technology with topics such as blogging, Gaggle, and Skype.

CONSENSUS ON MAJOR DECISIONS

We made a decision to hire and Assistant Principal to provide support for both programs with an emphasis in Montessori.

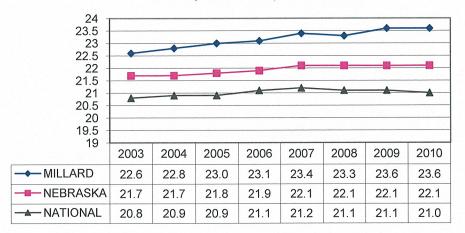

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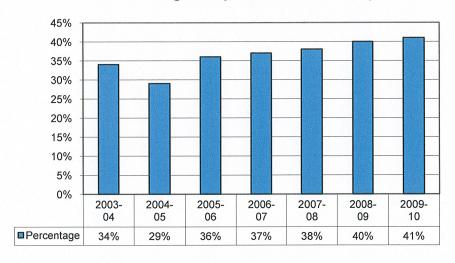

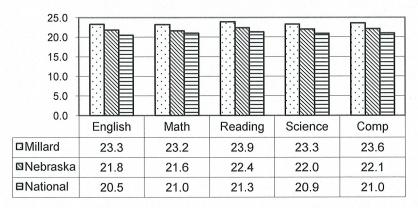
ACT Composite Scores Over 8 Years Millard, Nebraska, and National



Percentage of Millard Students Scoring in Top Quartile Nationally

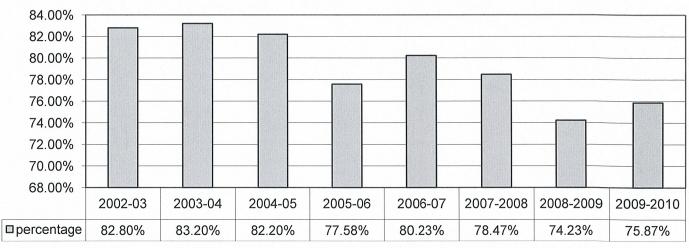


Comparison of the ACT Average Scores with Other Groups 2009-10



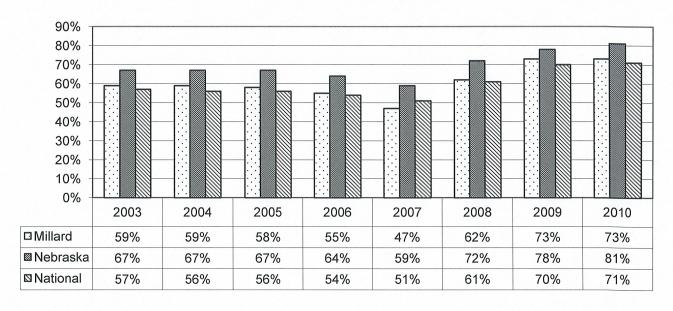

Percent of Millard Seniors Taking the ACT Over Eight Years

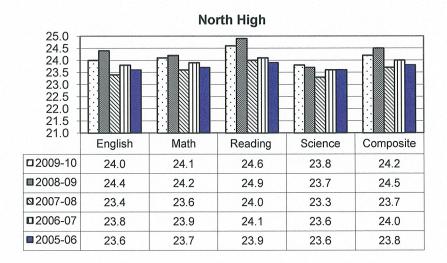

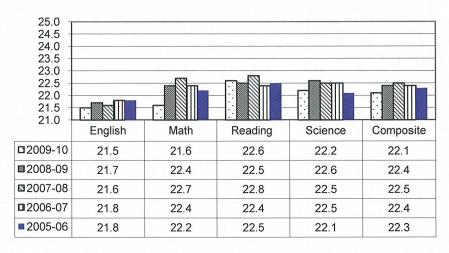
Percent ACT Tested Students Who Have Taken Core Curriculum



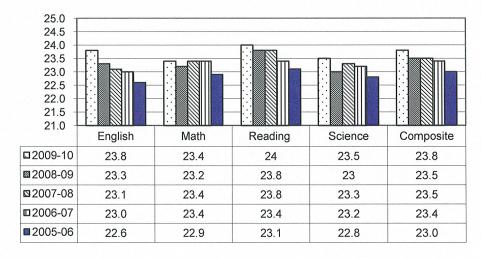
ACT Average Scores for Five Years



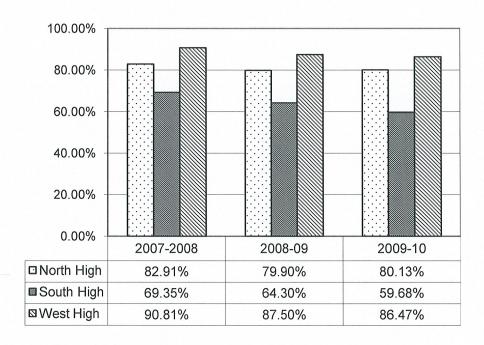

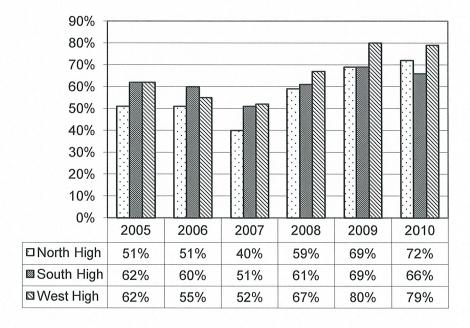

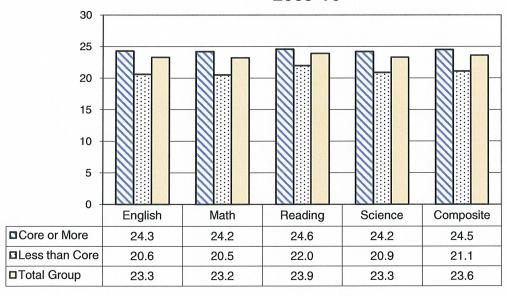
Percentage of Seniors Taking the ACT Test by School 2007-2010



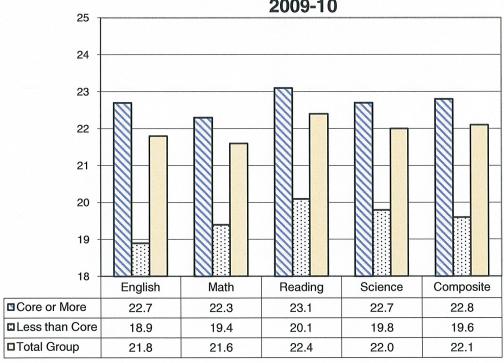
Percentage of ACT Tested Students Who Have Taken Core Curriculum



Millard Public School Results 2009-10

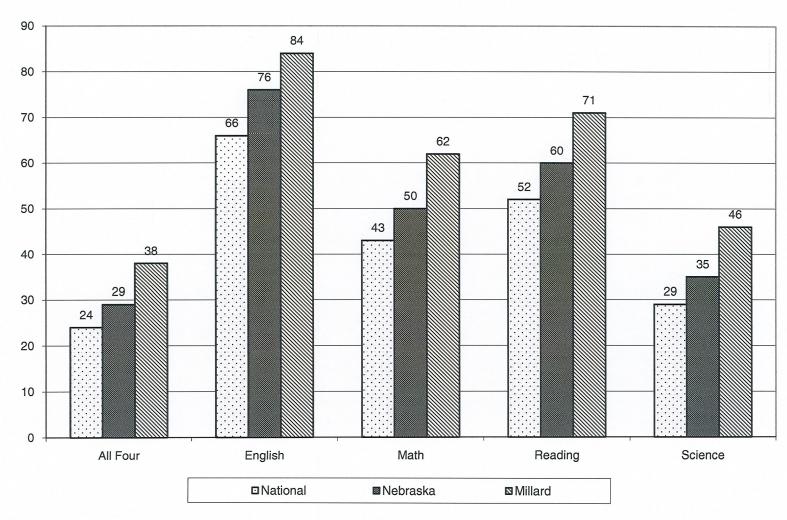


Nebraska Statewide Results 2009-10



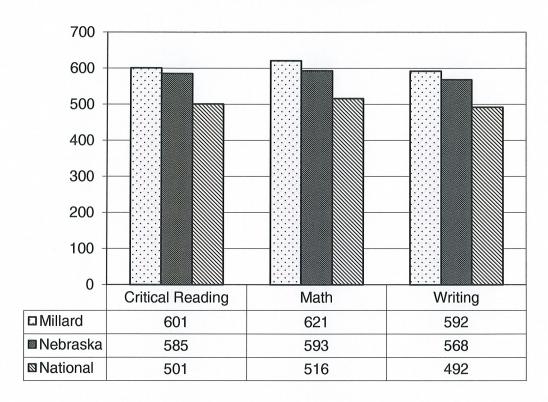

Percent of Students Meeting ACT College Readiness Benchmark Scores 2009-10

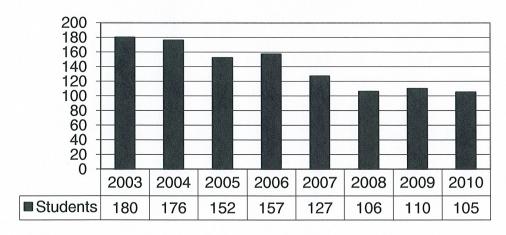


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SAT SCORES 2009-2010

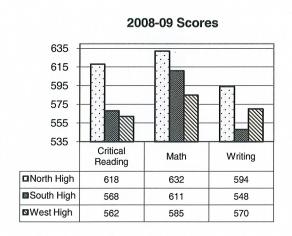


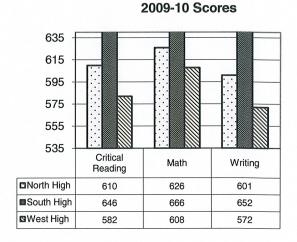
Number of Millard Students Taking the SAT Over Eight Years



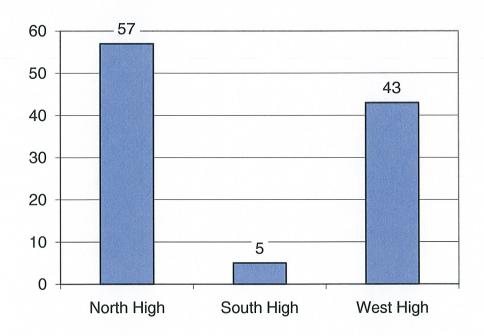

SAT Scores by School

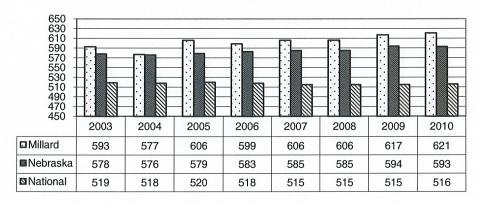




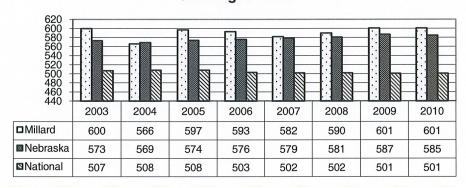
Number of Students Taking the SAT by School 2009-10



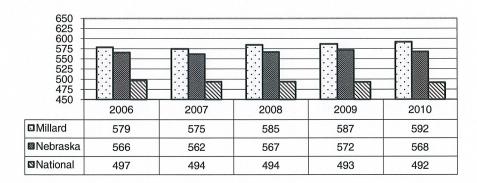
SAT MATH Scores
