Notice of this meeting was given in advance thereof by publication in the Daily Record on Saturday, September 17, 2010; a copy of the publication is being attached to these minutes. Notice of this meeting was given to all members of the Board of Education and a copy of their Acknowledgment of Receipt of Notice and the agenda are attached to these minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in advance notice and in the notice of the Board of Education of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public.

Mr. Pate called the meeting to order and announced the public meeting Act is posted on the wall and available for public inspection. Mr. Pate asked everyone to say the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll call was taken and members present were: Mike Pate, Dave Anderson, Brad Burwell, Linda Poole, and Mike Kennedy. Absent was Julie Kannas.

Superintendent's Comments:

1. Reminder to Board members about the Strategic Planning sessions scheduled for September 27 and 28, 2010. Howard Feddema will be here to facilitate the meeting.

3. The Board should think about if they want to have a Committee meeting in October. They were asked to notify Dr. Lutz about their thoughts on having a meeting.

Board Comments:

Brad Burwell reported on the meeting of the Learning Community on September 16th, and reported a director for the Elementary Learning Centers was selected, and will be effective October 15, 2010 after negotiations are completed.

The Learning Community Sub-council #4 will be meeting on October 12, 2010 at 6 p.m. at Elkhorn South High School. He said the Poverty Plan and the Limited English Proficiency Plan that are on the agenda for approval will then go to Sub-council #4 meeting on October 12th to be approved. A Community forum will be held on October 12th at 7 p.m.

Mr. Burwell reported he will be reading a Cather Elementary this week, he will be attending the Strategic Planning sessions next week, and he will be available for a Board Committee meeting on either Monday that Dr. Lutz discussed. Mr. Burwell said he will be out of town on vacation on October 4, 2010, so he will not be at that board meeting.

Mrs. Poole said she will be available for a Committee meeting on either of the Mondays in October that Dr. Lutz discussed, too.

Dave Anderson expressed his thank you to the staff at Cather Elementary when he was there reading.

Mike Kennedy commented on the proposal from a Learning Community School Districts for a focus school. Mr. Kennedy asked Mr. Burwell to propose as policy to the Learning Community, that each focus school proposal should have an operating budget, and should also have a financial impact statement in regards to transportation. Mr. Kennedy expressed his concern about the cost of transporting students from one district to another when the money used for transportation could be better spent on the students in the classroom.

Explanation of Calculations:

"Needs" were first calculated on a district-by-district basis. Then, calculations were made to determine what percentage of the total needs in the learning community were attributable to each district. The total state aid certified to the learning community was then distributed based upon those percentages.

Statutory provisions require that net option funding (Section 79-1009) and retirement aid (Section 79-1028.03) be paid directly to the school districts. Thus, those two factors were added to each district's total after the percentage distribution was calculated.

Since the learning community received equalization aid, ARRA-SFSF funds were attributed to each member district based upon the percentages noted above. The amount of the ARRA-SFSF funds attributed to each district are noted in the box to the left. Those funds are included in the "District Total."

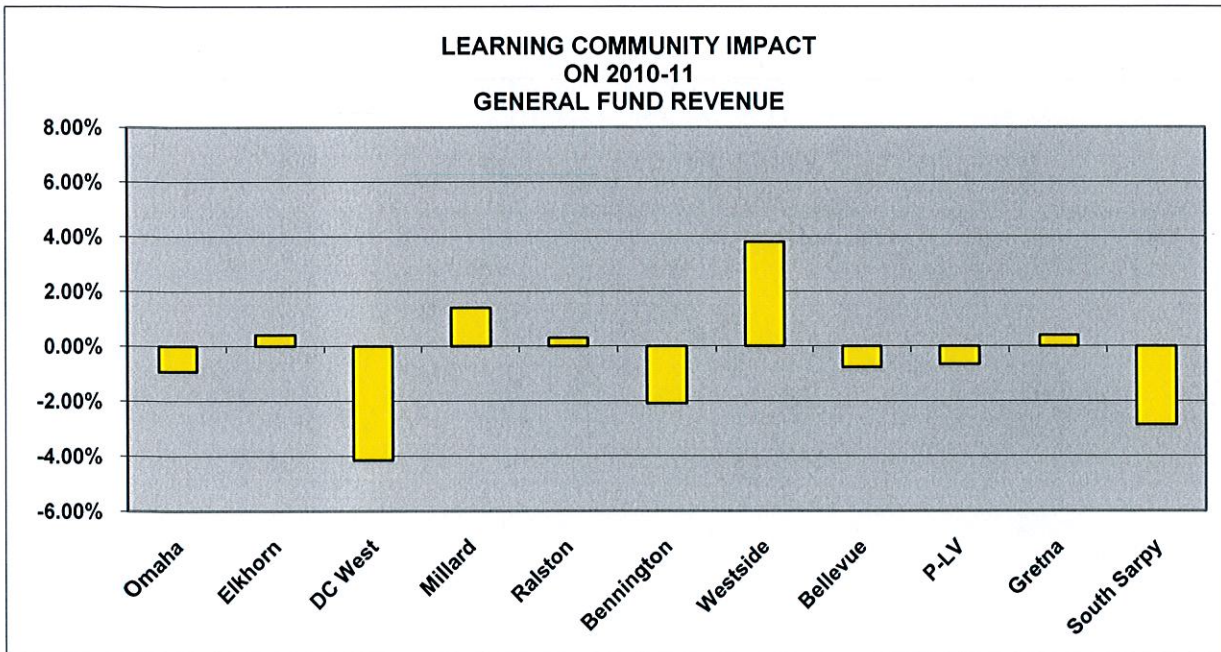

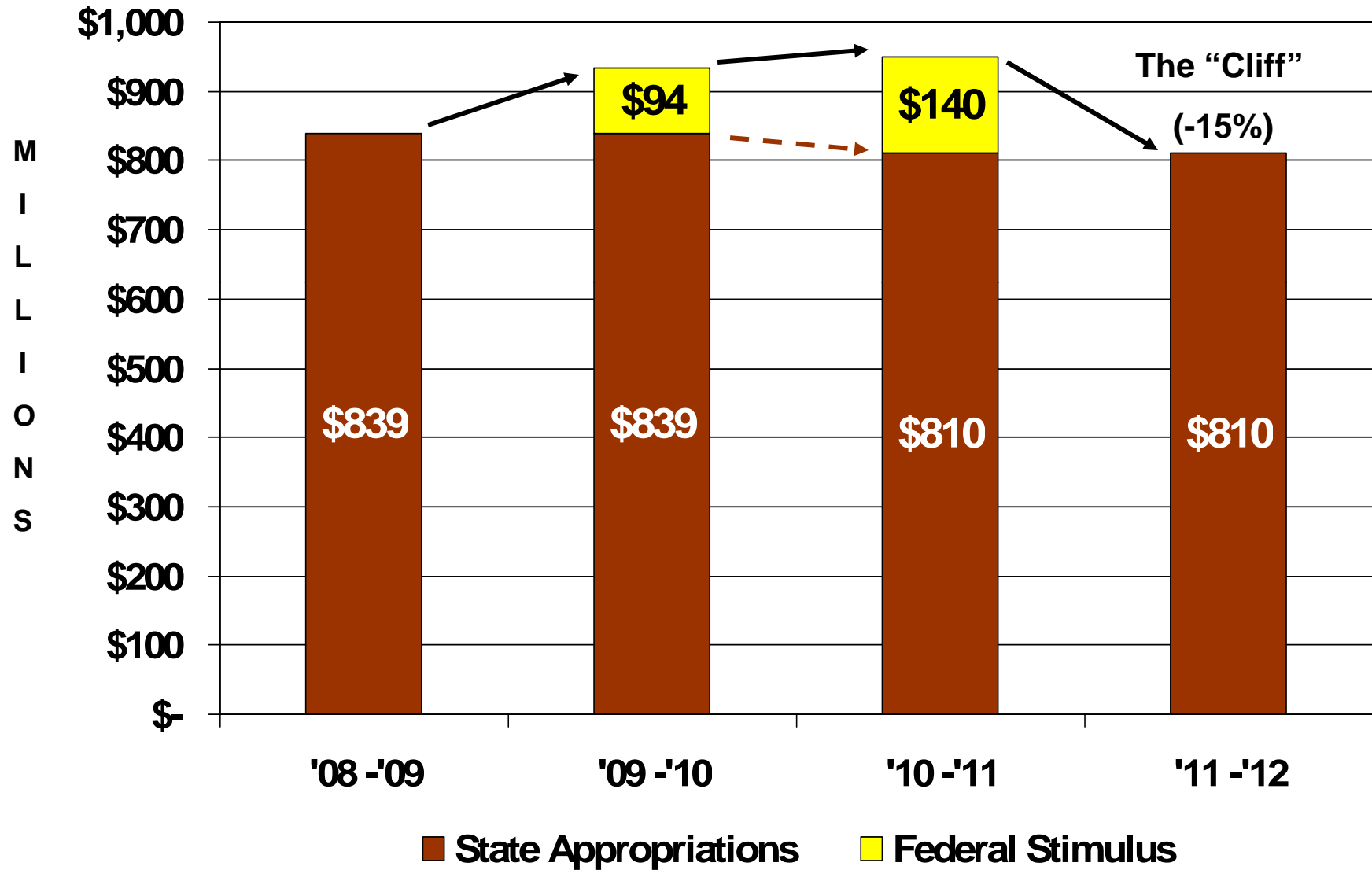

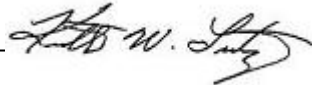

All schools are on a cycle for site planning. This cycle allows us to allocate resources to help facilitate their school site planning process. This cycle is planned in conjunction with the North Central Accreditation (NCA) school improvement cycle. The NCA has accepted our strategic and site planning process as our school improvement process so we no longer have to run two systems. The attached site plan reports are descriptions of the individual site plans and a summary of school improvement meetings.

Schools follow the same basic schedule that the district follows in strategic planning. They meet to write a plan, form action teams, work for 3-4 months to develop action plans, and then meet again to approve those action plans. Schools implement plans over 4 years. Schools write a plan, implement the plan the next year then update the plan the following year. This is one way we align all site plans with district plans. You will notice that mission statements and objectives are all aligned with the district mission and objectives.

The attached reports identify the school improvement team members from each school. The report also lists the mission, objectives and strategies for the building. Each report also highlights action plans for each strategy. The last section of the report lists consensus items on major decisions for the school including things like schedule, calendar decisions, parent/teacher conferences and the allocation of building resources. Our system of support for sites includes training CADRE Associates Jane Pille and Chris Wilcoxon to facilitate planning and updates as needed. This process is outlined in policy 10,000 and rule 10,000.1. The policy and rule are reviewed every other year.

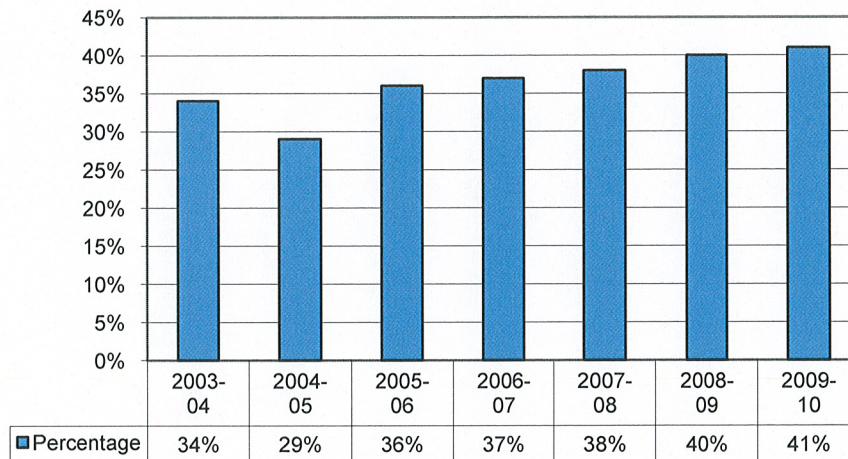

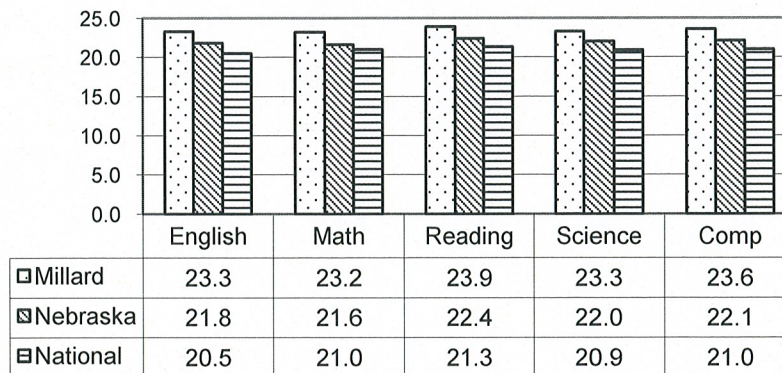
ACT Composite Scores Over 8 Years Millard, Nebraska, and National



Percentage of Millard Students Scoring in Top Quartile Nationally

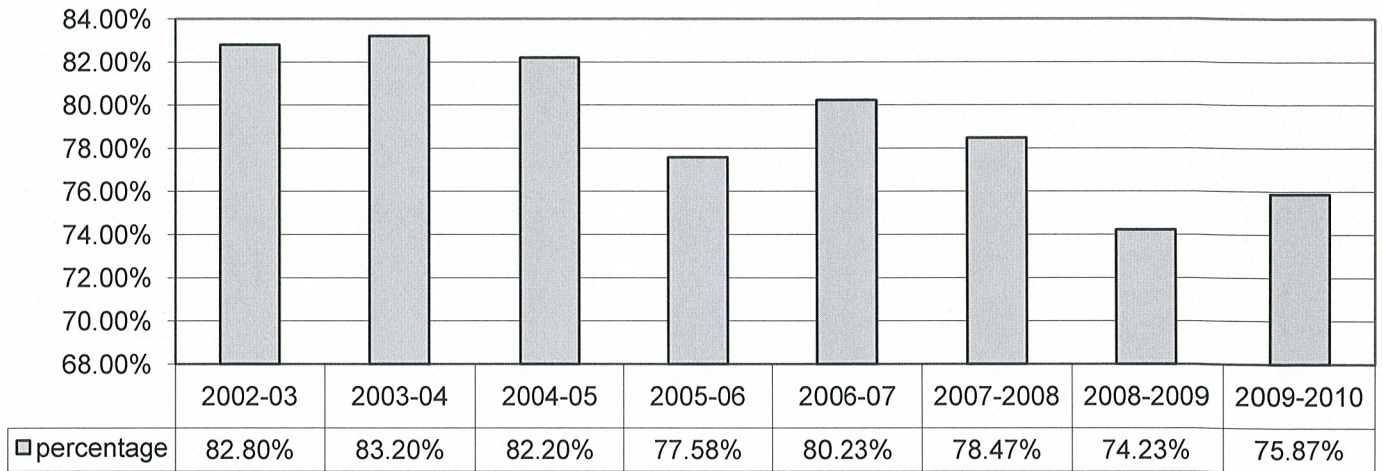


Comparison of the ACT Average Scores with Other Groups 2009-10



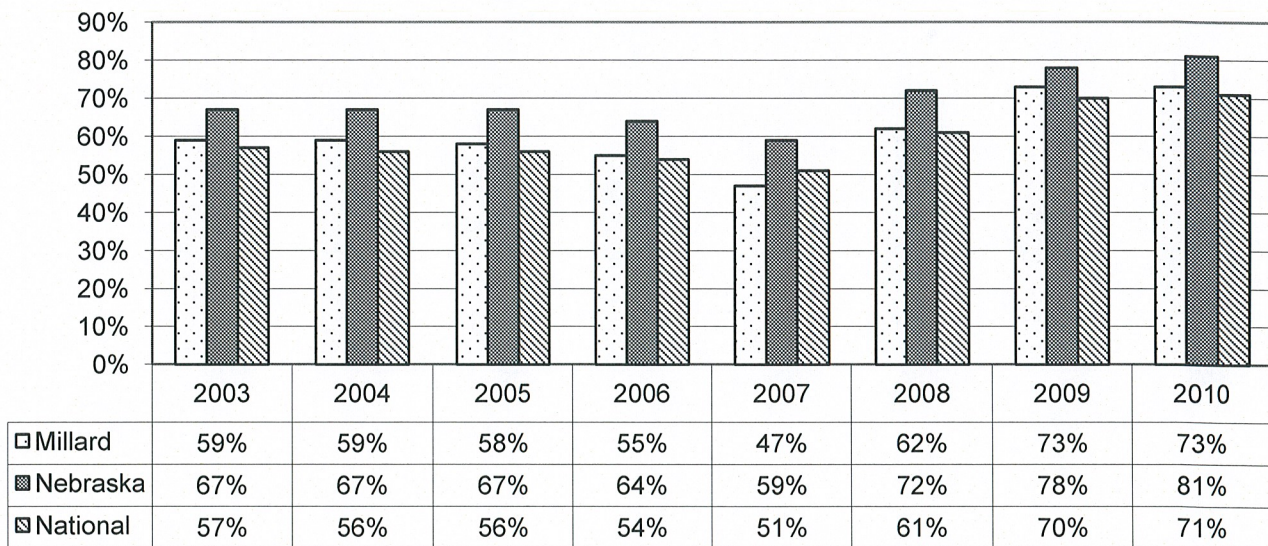

Percent of Millard Seniors Taking the ACT Over Eight Years



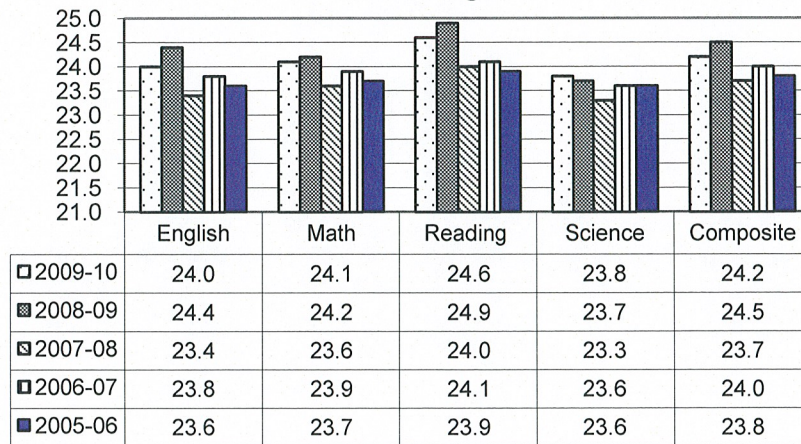

Percent ACT Tested Students Who Have Taken Core Curriculum

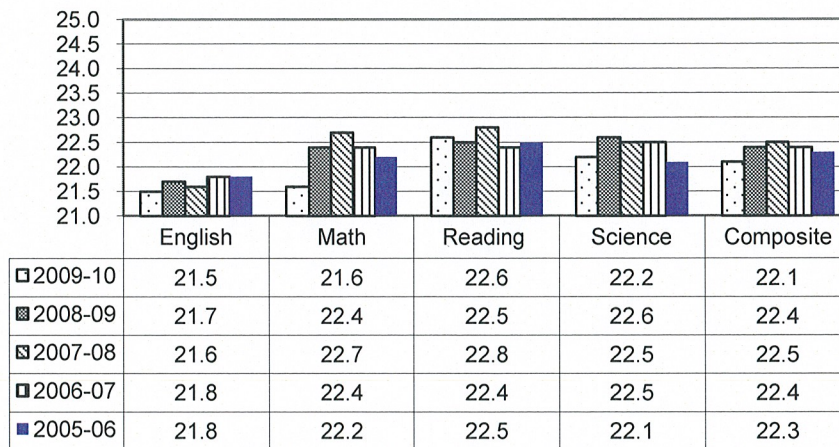

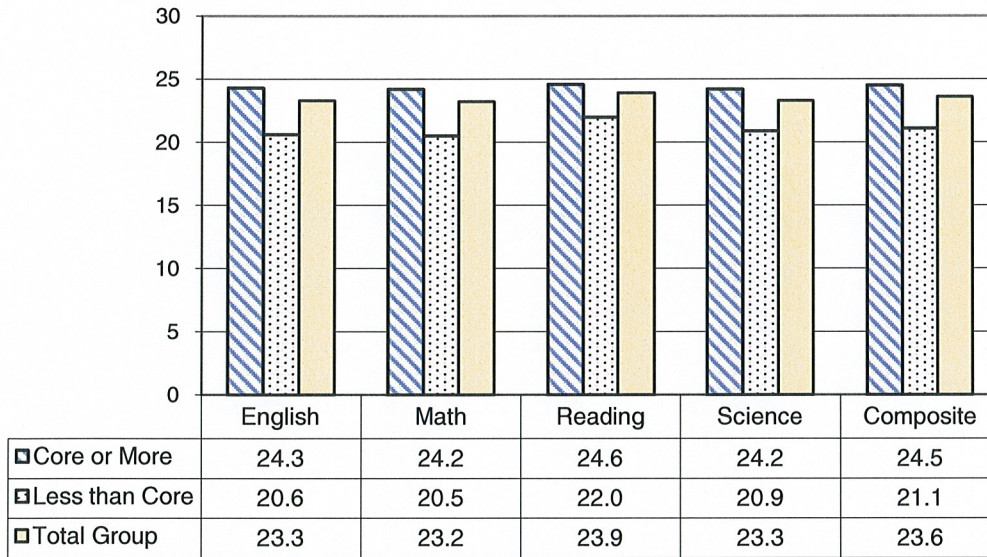
Percentage of Seniors Taking the ACT Test by School 2007-2010



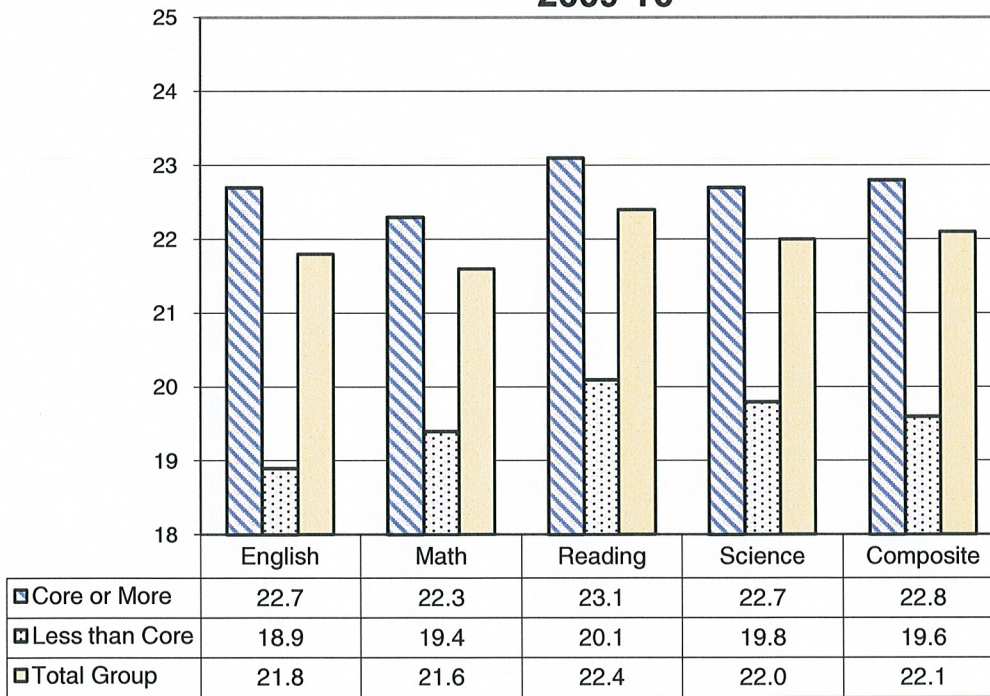
Percentage of ACT Tested Students Who Have Taken Core Curriculum



Millard Public School Results 2009-10

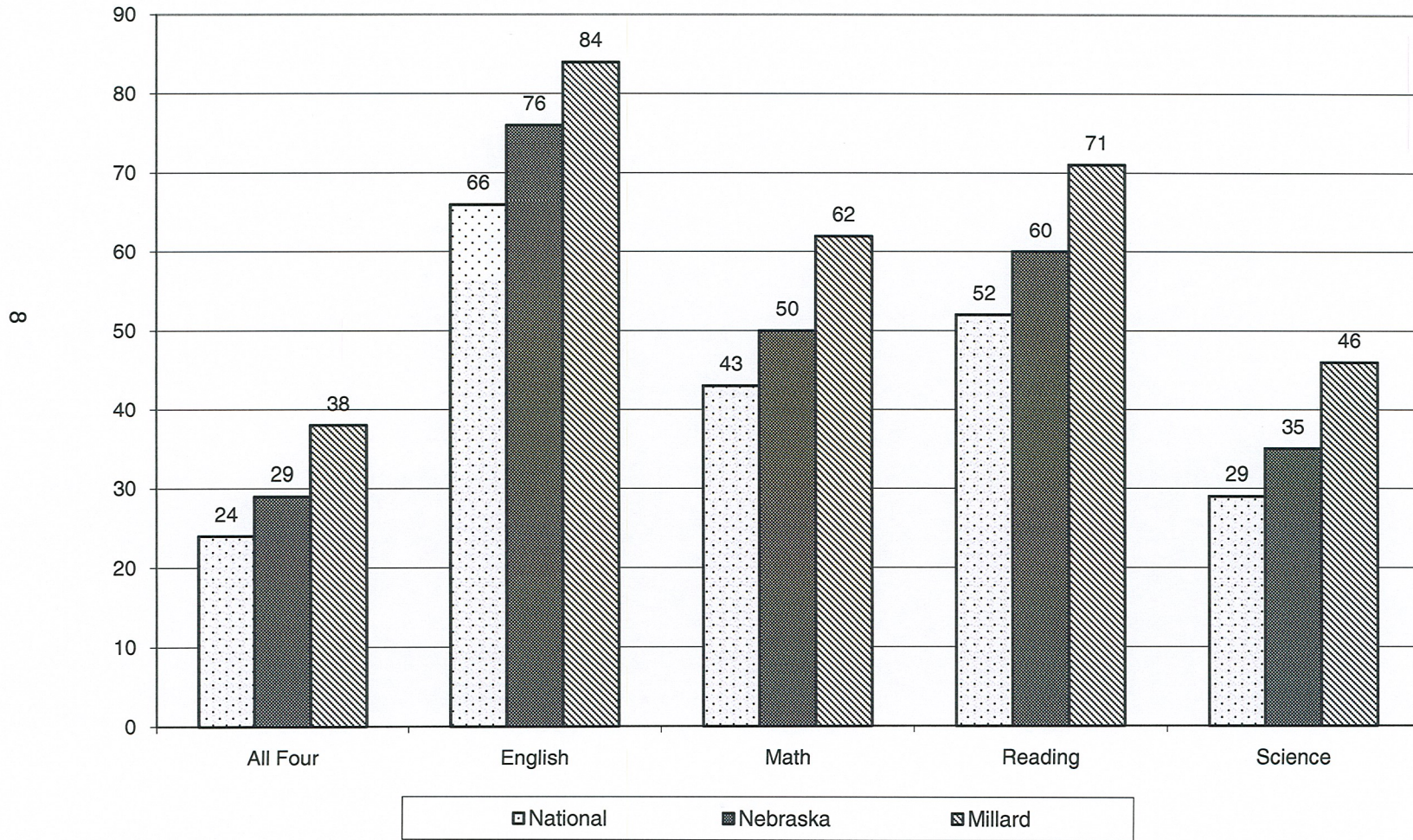


Nebraska Statewide Results 2009-10

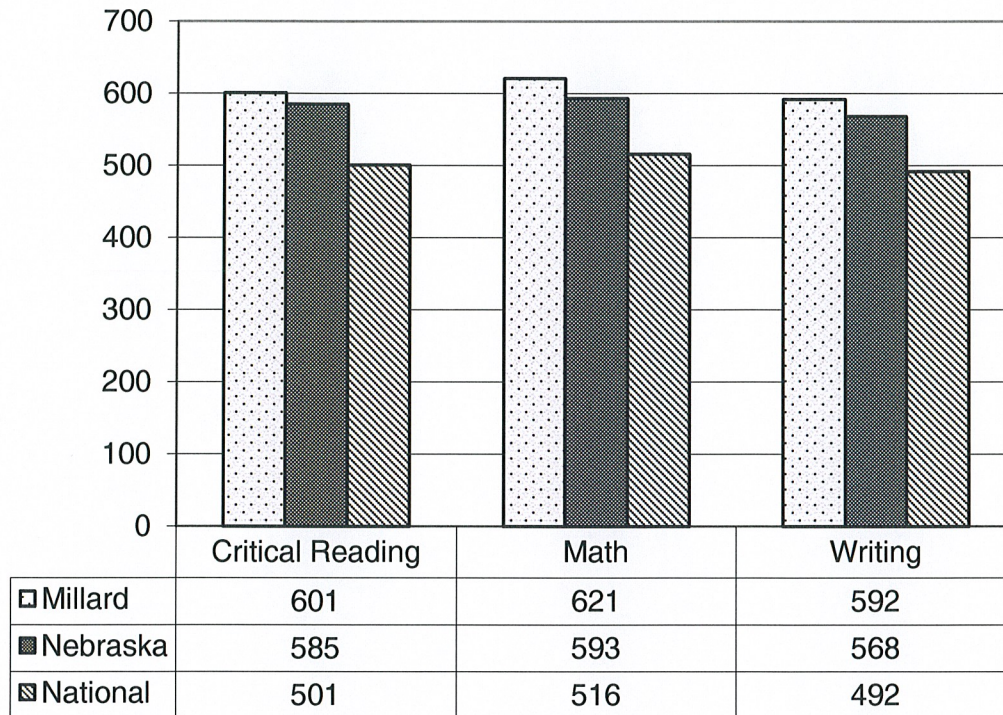

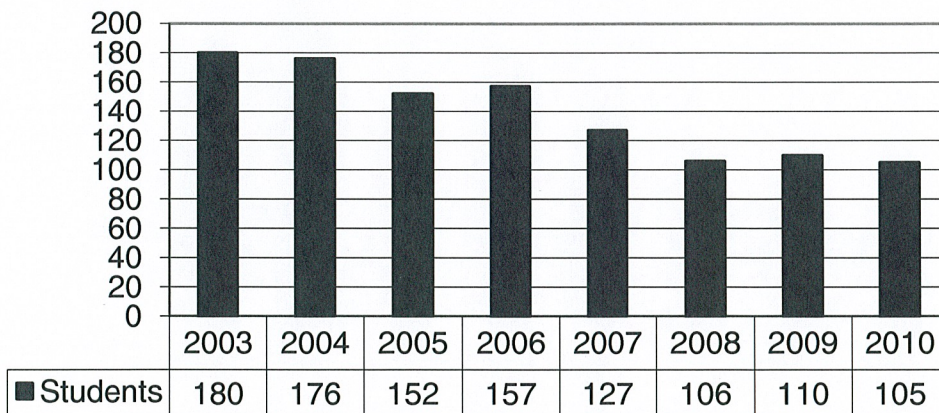

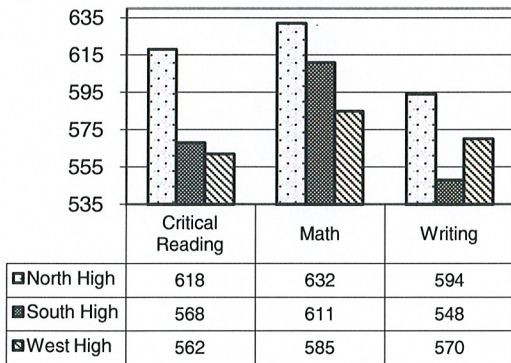
Number of Millard Students Taking the SAT Over Eight Years



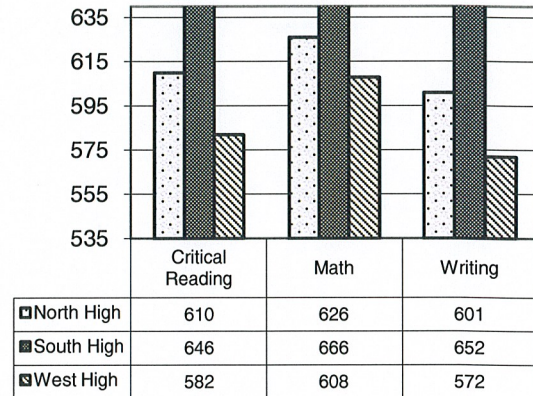

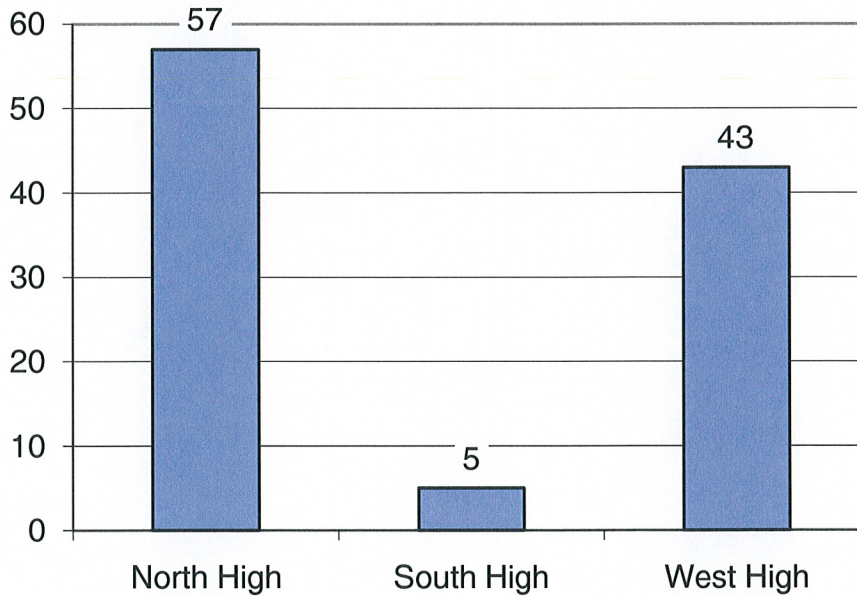

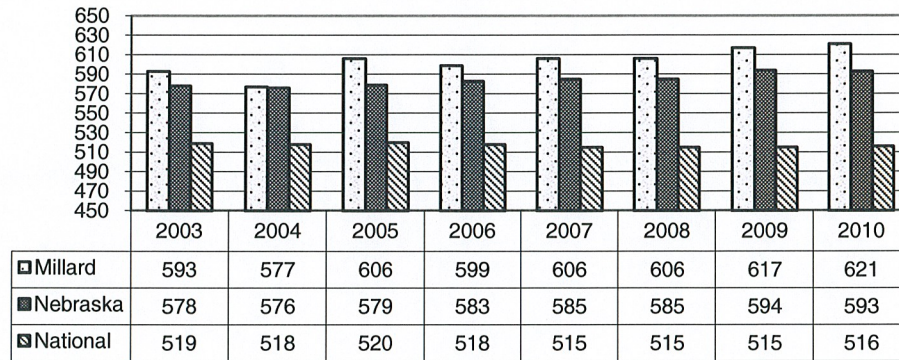

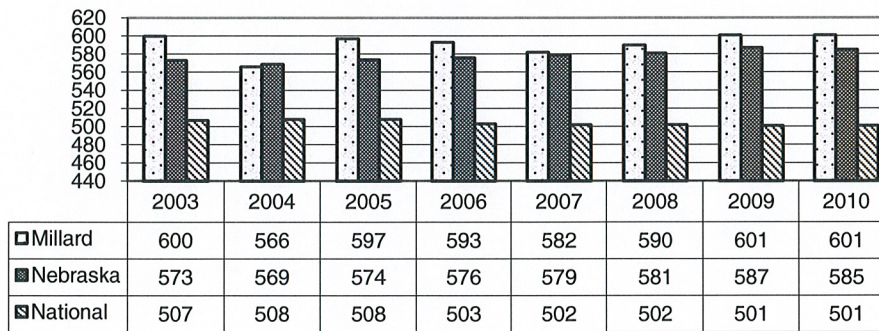
Number of Students Taking the SAT by School 2009-10



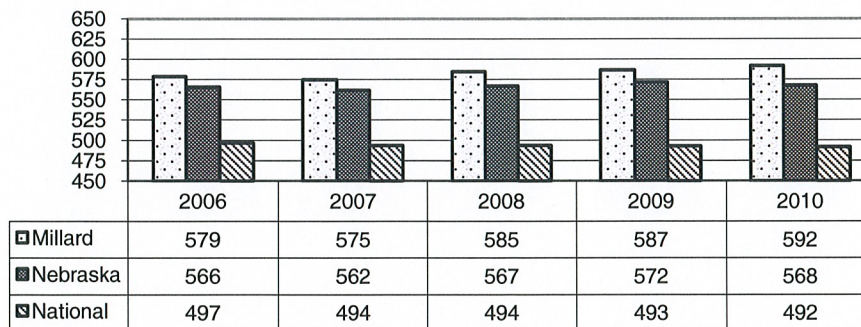
SAT MATH Scores Over Eight Years
